# **Tennis Courts at Amberley Green**

The tennis court refurbishment at Amberley Green results from an agreement reached in September between Mount Notre Dame High School (MND) and Amberley Village. MND is completing the resurfacing and net post reinstallation of five tennis courts and will maintain priority use of the courts for their tennis team.

Amberley residents will be able to use the courts other than when MND is practicing or hosting a match. MND's official tennis season presently runs approximately August through October, but they will utilize the courts during other times of the year as needed; schedules will be posted on the Village website.

Work on the courts was expected to be completed by late October. As part of the project, many MND freshmen and their parents spent a day cleaning up sticks that had fallen on the walking paths and also pruned several bushes, forming piles of the sticks that were later cleaned up by the Village Maintenance Crew. Steve Rasfeld, Village Public Works Supervisor, expressed appreciation for their efforts. "Having the piles ready to be picked up made our work much faster and more efficient."

The agreement with MND results from the efforts of the Amberley Green Citizen Advisory Committee, appointed by Village Council in March 2009 to research options for use of the site while maintaining green space and without incurring additional costs to the Village.

# **Amberley Green Walking Paths**

The Village staff has created a map of the walking paths at Amberley Green that is available in a box at the

path entrances on the west side of the parking lot, to the right of the building. Three paths have been identified on the map as well as their



approximate length to give walkers an idea of a path's distance. Additionally, colored arrows that correspond with

the map have been painted on the paths. Residents are asked to return the maps after using them. The map is also available on the Village website, AmberleyVillage.org under Parks and Recreation/Amberley Green.

fter 12 years on Council, the last six as Mayor, I have decided not to run for reelection. I also served 21 years on the Planning

First, of course, is the acquisition of the Amberley Green and our conviction to keep that beautiful property open space for all residents to enjoy. I am proud that we were able to support and help facilitate the construction of the Jewish Community Center in Amberley Village. This state of the art facility has added great value to the quality of life in Amberley. We are blessed to have such a top-notch institution in our community.

I am pleased that we were able to pass a property maintenance code which has been helpful in encouraging property owners to maintain their properties at a level commensurate with the first-class neighborhood we are.

I am pleased that we passed legislation establishing Amberley Village as a Tree City USA community and creating our energetic Beautification Committee that has done much to enhance our Village with programs like Arbor Day and tree planting.

I am delighted that our most popular social event, the annual Ice Cream Social, has continued to expand and grow, drawing several hundred people this last August.

# **Why Fertilize Trees**

It is often asked "Why should I fertilize my trees? Trees seem to grow guite well in the woods without any fertilizer." This thought process is slightly amiss. Trees do alright in the woods on their own, but when one of many dies it is not missed. When a tree in a landscaped area dies, it is missed.

Trees in the woods are

actually fertilized by the decaying leaves, branches and other organic matter. A homeowner might reduce the need to fertilize trees by not raking the leaves; however vour lawn would suffocate and the

neighbors might not

be very happy. Speaking of grass, there is no sod under trees in the forest. Grass is a heavy user of nitrogen and almost all the fertilizer applied to the turf is used by the grass plant. Very little gets to the tree roots. The grass plant is a heavy competitor with the tree for nutrients and water. The trees would do better without a lawn: however what would the suburbs be without our lawns?

This season has been a very good one for growth. Cool temperatures and plenty of rain have helped correct but not solve problems from 2007 and 2008 drought. Environmental stress placed on the trees can be lessened by tree fertilization. The application of nitrogen, phosphorus and potash will not necessarily save a dying tree but can create improved growth and leaf color in a weakened tree. Helping the tree cope in a tough environment is about all we can do.

He will also demonstrate the positive impact gardeners can play in furthering diversity in the ecosystem

and how unsustainable deer numbers are causing harm.

Scott is a member of the Ohio Nursery and Landscapers Association, Professional Grounds Maintenance Society, and several other organizations. In 2006, he was part of a group that won a Gold Medal, the Governor's Award, and the Bole Horticultural Award for displays at the Cincinnati Flower Show.

# **Village Leaf Collection** Reminders

The Village began leaf collection on October 15 and will continue this service until December 31. Please note the following procedures:

- 1. Pile leaves on your property just behind the curb, extending no more than 10 feet into your yard. Leaves placed in the street clog gutters and storm drains, and may constitute a road hazard. Do not pile leaves in the street.
- 2. Keep grass, brush clippings and other debris (rocks, gravel, trash, metal, etc.) separate from leaves. Such debris can damage leaf collection equipment. Brush material is picked up by a separate Amberley crew. Leaf piles containing brush and other debris will not be picked up.
- 3. Provide clear access to leaf piles. If leaves are blocked by parked cars or low hanging tree limbs, they will not be picked up because the leaf collection equipment cannot reach into such tight areas.
- 4. Do not place leaves for collection around fire hydrants, mailboxes, sign posts, utility poles, and wires.

The judges reviewed the nominations according to specific criteria such as plants used proportionally in scale with the site and architecture, overall layout of gardens and planting beds, hardscape design and function, appropriate selection of plant material, general maintenance and if applicable, design of water features.

The judges were very complimentary and impressed with all the nominees' passion and expertise as reflected in their comments below:



# **Best Backyard Haven** by Homeowner - Terry & Paul Hogan

This relaxing backyard haven is perfect for entertaining. At the poolside patio a spa-inspired atmosphere is achieved by installing stone pavers and a sitting wall. Plants of varied color, texture and height enhance the natural design of the pool and a variety of grasses have been used to provide privacy. The integration of reused tree stumps supporting pots of dramatic annuals provide a unique feature to this backyard haven.



# **Best Overall New Landscape** by Owner – Chris Bierman & Keith Luckett

This expansive English garden paints a stunning palette of primary colors that invites butterflies and bees. An impressive collection of perennials throughout, in addition to the integration of planters and found objects that have been incorporated into retaining walls create a truly memorable experience. It was nice to see a huge compost pile in the backyard.

# **Best 'Green' Curb Appeal** by Owner & Professional – Judy Young

What is most appreciated about this garden is the location of the curbside planting bed. The view to the main entry is successfully announced, discretely integrating an existing manhole cover and drip-line irrigation system. A variety of native plant cultivars abound supporting regional wildlife.



# **Best "Genre/Overall Theme" Award** by Owner - Ginny Wright

A former pool and pool house have been repurposed into a lovely garden and guesthouse. Colonial garden inspiration and recycled brick pavers, in addition to antique garden furniture have been integrated to create a truly memorable ambience. Carefully placed garden statues surrounded by a variety of traditional plant varieties including boxwoods, Russian sage, and flowering perennials add to the dramatic effect.

# **Best Backyard Haven** by Professional - Stephen Cushard

Well-executed terraced spaces tame a steep back yard to be an aesthetically pleasing functional space for entertaining. Hardscape material selections of appropriate size minimize the impact to the beauty of the natural setting.







# **Best Overall 'Established' Landscape** by Professional and Owner -Ella & Jacob Moskovich

A well-manicured and lush garden for a difficult site. Well-chosen plants for sunny, semi shaded and deeply shaded areas in addition to an exciting integration of contrasting groundcover varieties. Groundcovers soften the driveway edge and a wonderful wood sculpture accentuates the arrival experience.

# **Honorable Mention: Backyard Haven** by Homeowner - Jean & John Wood

A work in progress for nearly thirty years, these homeowners have created a backyard haven incorporating a fountain, sitting areas, an established wisteria vine covered arbor, a perennial garden walkway and side yard shade garden. A large number of plants are well established demonstrating many years of consistent care.



# **Honorable Mention: Backyard Haven** by Homeowner - Dave & Dianna Tibbetts

A well-designed gazebo incorporates the artful use of wood trim and is accented with beautifully colored groundcover rocks. A wonderful perennial garden was created along the fence line, incorporating several layers of plant material of coordinated color, size, and texture.

# **Honorable Mention: Curb Appeal** by Professional - Stuart Holman

Exquisitely installed massive and neutral-colored flagstone pavers announce the front entry. Broad bands of groundcover massing help define sculptures and enhance the mid-century horizontal aesthetic of the architectural. An exceptional example of how the texture and earth tones of a 'tar and chip' driveway can look so appealing.

# Rumpke of Ohio, Inc. Wins Waste Collection Bid

At the October meeting, Council passed a resolution to accept the Rumpke of Ohio, Inc. bid for solid waste removal and recycling collection and disposal for Amberley Village for the term beginning January 1, 2010. The current contract was set to expire at the end of 2009. The new contract is for a three-year term with the option to renew for a fourth year. The rate is approximately 8% higher than this year with additional, smaller increases in the succeeding years.

The Education, Health and Welfare Committee, chaired by Councilmember Leslie McIntosh, conducted an extensive survey of optional approaches to solid waste disposal. In the end, a bid specification was prepared that met the Village needs with the least amount of increase in cost. The Committee took a tour of the

Rumpke Recycling facility in St. Bernard to better understand the process. To see a video of the recycling process should go to rumpkerecycling.com.

The new contract includes a provision for Rumpke to notify each resident in writing of the offer to sell to the resident a special 65 gallon waste and/or recycling cart at a cost of \$65.00. These carts on wheels are designed with twice the capacity of the standard garbage can.

In addition, the Village receives a small rebate for the weight of recycled materials that are collected from residents. If you are currently filling up your recycling bin, call Rumpke at 242-4600 to order a replacement or new larger bin. Putting more recyclable materials into the bins instead of the trash benefits the Village and the environment.

# **Snow Removal**

The Village Maintenance
Department prides itself on its
response to winter storms. Our
goals are to keep the main roads
and priority routes passable and
then to clear all streets as soon
as possible after the storm has
subsided.

The roads are treated in order of priority with the predicted weather in mind:

- ➤ Main roads, hills.
- ➤ Access to Village buildings to enable police/fire, maintenance and administration employees to do their jobs.

Every winter storm is different. Some of the variable factors include existing weather conditions, expected volume of snow, temperatures, length of the storm, effectiveness of de-icing agents, volume of traffic and availability of manpower and equipment.

Here are some things you can do to help the crews' work most efficiently:

- ➤ Park in your driveway, not in the street, especially not in cul-de-sacs or near intersections.
- ➤ When you plow or shovel your driveway, keep it on your property. Don't plow it into the road.
- ➤ Avoid unnecessary travel.

If you must go out in snowy conditions, follow these precautions:

➤ Clear all snow and ice off your car to

increase visibility.

- ➤ Allow more space than usual between your car and the car in front of you.
- Stay behind plow trucks. Do not pass them or pull out in front of them.

With residents' assistance in these matters, plow crews will be able to get the streets cleared with less interference from traffic and parked or stranded vehicles. They'll be able to cover their routes more quickly.

# **Winter Storms**

This is the final article in a series. Periods of extreme cold and snowfall present challenges for which preparation can be made:

- ➤ Stock up on food, water and medicines.
- ➤ Buy bags of rock salt and sand for use on walkways.
- ➤ Weather-strip windows and doors to prevent drafts.
- ➤ Wear several layers of clothing and a hat outdoors.
- ➤ Cover your mouth with a scarf to protect your lungs.
- Watch for signs of frostbite: loss of feeling along with paleness in tip of nose, fingers, toes and ear lobes.

➤ Beware of hypothermia. Signs include uncontrollable shivering, slurred speech, drowsiness, memory loss and disorientation.

If you are stranded in your vehicle, pull off the road and turn on your hazard lights. Do not start walking unless you can see a building where you can take shelter. If no buildings are in sight, stay in your vehicle and take the following precautions:

- ➤ Wrap yourself in blankets, or use seat covers, floor mats and maps
- ➤ Run the engine for 10 minutes each hour to keep warm, opening a window slightly for ventilation.
- ➤ Balance use of the heater and lights to conserve the battery. <a>
