Some classes of note for adults: This month we have a class that introduces you to Reiki. We also are teaching a class on the Savvy Citizen's app. So we'll teach you how to download the app and use it so you can keep abreast of all municipal news and events. We have a class on home buying and selling, one on marketing, and one on finance.

I am happy to announce the following recipients of the Bethel Park Police
Meritorious Award College Scholarship. That's a mouthful. Everybody received a check because they are very diligent scholars. And the first presentation went to Jacob Dixon, who attends Duquesne University, Brittany Kach and Nicole Kach who each attend California University of Pennsylvania, and our last recipient was Carly L. Tanney of Slippery Rock University.

And, of course, they are off studying hard right now so they can't be here. But we want to congratulate them for their efforts and it -- which resulted in them receiving a check.

Okay. Oh, 2, Crime Watch resumes Monday, October the 7th, at 7:00 p.m. in the Community Center. We hope to see everyone there and we

1 will tell you all about crime in Bethel Park, 2 which we have had a busy summer so this will 3 take a while. And, finally, see us at Community Day on 4 5 Saturday the 14th. We'll have a table. We'll 6 be in with fire and EMS, and we'll be giving 7 out some kind of goodies. I don't know what 8 they are, but stop by and get one. Okay. 9 Ouestions? MR. HARRISON: 10 Chief. HARRISON: I'll just tell you 13 about your competition for October the 7th. 14 That's the night the Zoning Hearing Board 15 meets for the appeal on the Cool Springs. just for information. 16 17 CHIEF O'CONNOR: Well, I'll tell 18 you, I would put Crime Watch against the 19 Planning and Zoning Board any day. Don't underestimate the Crime Watch crowd. 20 21 Is that good? 22 MR. MOURY: Very good. Thank you, 23 Chief. 24 CHIEF O'CONNOR: Okay. Thank you. 25 MR. MOURY: Can we turn to the Fire Chief's report, please.

MR. BROWN: Good evening, everyone.

My name is Bob Brown. I'm the Deputy Fire

Chief. I'll give you the report for August

here in a moment. A couple other items before

that.

We have some congratulations in order for a few of our fire fighters. We've had two fire fighters just obtain the certification of Fire Fighter 1, Joe Hartung and Luke Valecko. And we've had two fire fighters obtain the certification of Fire Fighter II, Steve McGough and Chris O'Sullivan. So we're very proud of these four individuals and just wanted to make the public aware of that.

Our upcoming Open House is going to be on October 13th, Sunday, from 11:00 to 3:00. I believe the Steelers -- I think it's either -- I think it's a night game that day. After yesterday, I'm not sure we all want to watch it, but I'm sure hopefully they'll be doing better by then. We invite everyone to come down between, like I said, 11:00 to 3:00. We'll have our usual demonstrations. I believe the police will be there,

Tri-Community will be there. We'll have hot dogs and drinks for everyone. So we hope to get a nice turnout from the public. Just stop by and say hello.

The last item I wanted to bring to everybody's attention, we recently -- I believe it was on August 20th, it was a Tuesday morning, we had a house fire on Maplevue Drive.

It was determined the result -- or the cause of the house fire was the homeowner had stained and -- actually, had stripped and stained some of his hardwood floors. He put the rags -- he just bunched them altogether while they were still wet and damp, put them in a plastic bag, set it outside in front of his house in some mulch right up against the house, which during the night at about 6 o'clock or 5:45 in the morning, caught the outside of the house on fire.

Fortunately, it was on the outside. So I apologize, but I'm going to read to you the steps you need to take if you are doing any staining with oil based stains. Well, it is oil based. If it's not oil based, you don't

have to particularly worry about it.

But Step 1, again, I apologize for reading, you want to gather the stain-soaked rags and take them away from the house or your workshop where you were using them. Don't clump them, don't squeeze them together.

Simply carry them away.

Step 2, you want to lay the rags over metal hangers or the edge of a metal trash can. Be careful. You don't want to place them on top of each other. Lay them separately and individually. Depending on the number of rags, you may need a lot of hangers or a couple garbage cans.

Step 3, which is really important, you want to allow the rags to cure or dry completely. You want to wait until they're stiff and totally dry. It may take some time depending on how soaked they were prior to starting the drying process, and if you're drying them outside, humidity and the weather.

And, finally, Step 4, you want to place the rags, once they're completely stiff and dry, into a garbage bag. Place the bag in a garbage can for collection at that time. It's

important to get them completely dry, stiff.

This isn't the first incident we've had in Bethel Park where that's happened. We've had I believe one, possibly two others that were a result of stain-soaked rags being just crumbled up and thrown away. So just keep that in mind when you're staining. The last thing we want to do is come to anybody -- anybody else's house for that matter.

And, finally, fire calls for the month of August. We still continue to be very busy.

Not quite as busy as July. I believe it was 70 calls in July. August we have a total of 50.

Quickly, the breakdown is 23 fire alarms, 2 elevator rescues, 7 good intent calls, 2 structure fires, 5 CO alarms, we had 1 natural gas leak, 1 garbage can fire, 4 electrical conditions, 3 traf -- assists with traffic control, 1 smoke investigation, and 1 HAZMAT investigation, for a total of 50 calls for August.

I'll start with Tim Roney. He is the assistant munici -- municipal engineer. He's been working for the Municipality for about 20 Tim is a Navy veteran with service years now. in the Seabees. His main duties entail storm water, storm ponds, inlets, paving, and putting together contracts for repair of storm sewer systems and maintains and updates the Municipal storm water infrastructure on the GIS system. That's the municipal map system. He has developed a phone app to aid in the inspection for storm sewer system. does on a daily basis, again, is very technical, but it's really important for how we operate within the city -- within the municipality.

John Quinlisk, right here, environmental engineer. He's been working for the municipality since 2017. And John brings 37 years of experience to the fight. John and his wife of 37 years have four children, have lived in Bethel Park since 1999. So he's a

1 long -- long duration Bethel Park resident. He maintains -- his main duties focus on MS4 2 3 permit compliance, storm water management application review, flood plain administrator, 4 managing storm water projects for flood 5 6 control, grading permit application review, 7 and engineering review for Planning and Zoning Commission. 8 9 Again, these two individuals do a fantastic job day in, day out. They are the 10 unsung heroes that you probably have never 11 seen or never knew about. But they are there 12 13 sweating it out day in, day out. 1119 Logan Road. I'm here talking about the flooding again over in Logan Creek basin, especially on my property, but I'm going to get a little bit away from that.

I'm a little bit concerned about the mixed signals that Council kind of puts out there. You know, we've talked about the flooding more than enough, but you guys come across as, you know, we're going to live in a great community here. You're here to help us. The nine of you make the decisions or don't make them.

And the mixed signals I see are, you know, you say you're here to help us, but personally I've had -- you know, the people I've talked to in the past, except Mr. Christian, I'll give him a pat on the back because he didn't, the first thing out of everybody's mouth in the Municipality is if you don't like it, then sell your house.

So that's not helping people and I don't think that's telling people this is a great community, okay. When you're telling people to sell their house, there's a problem.

Rather than the Municipality taking care of

it, that's a problem in itself.

Some of the other mixed signals are, you know, I've sat through these Council meetings for over a year now and, you know, I think it's called the Guttman property, the property down there on 88 and Connor Road that you guys are very interested in buying. Every single one of you said that you need green space and you need all this in Bethel Park and you guys are willing to do whatever it takes to get that space. Yet the conflict is you're willing to take up land in the neighborhood parks to put detention systems.

Now, doesn't that -- isn't that -- that's green space being taken away when there's other better locations for those detention ponds, but you just won't make that decision.

You won't even discuss the decision to buy properties or buy those areas that are best suited for the detention systems. So how can you say you want green space, but you'll use it up before you'll use -- before you even look at any other situations to fix problems in the -- in the community.

So, you know, that's something I think is

for all the residents, is more about this, that these nine people make all the decisions. So when things aren't getting done, it's their fault. Anybody else can say what they want, but if it's not getting done in this community, it is those nine people's fault because they ultimately make the decision based on the Home Rule Charter.

So thank you very much.

MR. ENRIGHT: Hi, Tim Enright, that's E-n-r-i-g-h-t, 2019 Cool Springs Drive.

I wanted to take a chance in front of the cameras to update everybody on the petition that we talked about last month, the month before. Unfortunately, Pennsylvania state law does not permit petition drives to cover zoning issues. So that petition item from our standpoint is dead.

And I've been getting so many calls on the hotline, I wanted to try to get the word out there. And despite the fact that there is so much support from the people on this hotline, I have to suggest that instead of

calling me, if you're unhappy, call your
Council member and let them know what you
think about how their vote went.

The second thing I want to mention is I would suggest everybody come to the Monday, October 7th, Zoning Hearing Board meeting because our friends at the Sheridan on Cool Springs Drive will be presenting a substantive validity challenge to the ordinance that re-zoned the land for the American Natural gas station.

And so if you want to be in on the next step of this procedure, please come to that meeting. Again, the date is Monday, October 7th, 7:30 p.m., here at the Council chambers.

MR. MOURY: Okay. Hearing none; can we turn to the agenda, General Policy and Finance, and Mr. McLean.

MR. McLEAN: Thank you, Mr. President.

First item under General Policy and Finance is Ordinance 9-9-19, Public Works General Obligation Bonds Parameters Ordinance.

I move that we approve Ordinance 9-9-19 authorizing the Municipality to incur non-electoral debt in an amount not to exceed \$12,295,000 by issuing its taxable general obligation bonds, refunding series of 2019, to be issued by the Municipality for the purpose of an advance refunding of the outstanding general obligation bonds, series of 2015 of the Municipality that are scheduled to mature after December 1, 2020, and for capital improvements representing the capitalized amount of savings realized by the refunding program.

MS. GIBBONS: Second.

MR. MOURY: There is a motion and a second that we approve Ordinance 9-9-19 authorizing the Municipality to incur non-electoral debt in an amount not to exceed \$12,295,000 by issuing its taxable general obligation bonds, refunding series of 2019, to be issued by the Municipality for the purpose of an advance refunding of outstanding general

obligation bonds, series of 2015 of the Municipality that are scheduled to mature after December 1, 2020, for capital improvements representing the capitalized amount of the savings realized by the refunding program.

That was a very long motion. In essence, we did a bond issue back in 2015 to do the public works facility. What we're looking to do is to refinance that debt based on current market conditions. Today we would exceed in excess of \$500,000. We're going to do these as taxable bonds. It's just an anomaly.

Normally municipal government does

non-taxable, but the market -- the rates are a little bit inverted so there's a benefit to us to do this.

Our debt isn't going to change. Our debt service will not change. Council has established -- a minimum of a 3 percent is the floor in which we want to proceed with a refinancing. We will not know the total amount -- we'll have a general idea based on market conditions, but we won't know the actual amount until it's actually done. So

1	we're giving our bond Council the parameters
2	that they can go ahead and move forward once
3	we go through there's several paperwork
4	steps you have to complete. But hopefully if
5	it does, that will be generate an
6	additional half a million-plus dollars to the
7	Municipality.
8	The only thing with that money, it's got
9	to be spent on capital projects. It cannot go
10	into the general fund. So whether I confused
11	you or not, that's essentially what we're
12	looking to do.

19	couple months ago we adopted an ordinance to
20	propose two changes to the Home Rule Charter
21	that will appear on the ballot in November.
22	And, quickly, the background related to
23	those. Under the Charter as it was adopted 35
24	or 40 years ago, there were four staff
25	positions, department head positions where we

had a residency requirement.

If you were going to be the municipal manager, the chief of police, the financial officer, or the planner, you needed to either live in Bethel Park or move in to Bethel Park within a year.

And what our experience has shown is that as to two of those positions, the financial director and the planner, we think we're going to be better served if we do not have that specific residency requirement.

Without comment to the people who currently hold those positions, we've been lucky to find good people in those positions. But we know that the number of applicants we get is being deterred by the residency requirement.

So the two proposed changes will be to remove the residency requirement for the financial director and for the planner. We are making no change to the municipal manager position or the chief of police. This also has no change in other municipal personnel such as police officers who have a requirement to live within a certain radius of the town.

The Department of Elections has approved the questions, so they are now certified to appear on the ballot. There will be two questions, one for each position. They will be on the ballot on November 5th. If approved, then we will make that change to the Home Rule Charter.

MR. MOURY: Thank you, Mr. McLean.

MR. McLEAN: The second additional item is just to note that under our Home Rule Charter, the preliminary budget for 2020 is required to be delivered by the municipal manager to Council by the end of September. So we will receive it then. We will be considering that budget during the month of October. We will be holding public hearings on October 14th and 28th for the public to provide us with any comments that we have.

A copy of the municipal budget will be available, including in the library. And then under our schedule, we look to adopt the budget for 2020 in November.

Thank you, Mr. Moury.

So, Dr. Campbell, maybe you can give a brief overview of what your -- what you accomplished or where you were sent.

DR. CAMPBELL: Well, you're correct, Mr. Moury. I'm properly embarrassed. Thank you.

DR. CAMPBELL: Okay. Just to give you an appreciation of how fragile things can be in our lives, at the end of our council

meeting two -- our committee meeting two weeks ago I was -- my phone went off and I took a look at it and I politely excused myself from the end of the committee meeting because I was being deployed as part of my DMAT team.

DMAT, it's interesting. It stands for Disaster Medical Assistance Team. Not a lot of folks know about this. It's -- it's under the auspices of HHS and the Federal Government, and it's part of the National Disaster Medical System framework. It's a response that actually we have in place.

There are 72 teams across the country.

And each of these teams are professionals,
usually typically four to six doctors, four to
six mid levels, maybe eight nurses, eight
paramedics, respiratory therapists. We can
pretty much get four hours' notice and they
say, okay, be at the airport, we're going to
send you out because we have a diaster brewing
or something has occurred.

And it's just a nice asset, to be able to

-- to know that it's in your back pocket in

case you ever do have difficult times, that

there are some folks who are able to go out

and respond. In Pennsylvania, Western
Pennsylvania we have the PA-1 DMAT team and
it's based out of here in Pittsburgh.

Some of the responses we've gone to in the past -- have you ever seen the show MASH? It's a Mobile Army Surgical Hospital. kind of like a MASH unit. We can set up a hospital in about two, two-and-a-half hours. We can treat 200 to 250 people a day. can load us in the back of a C-17 or a couple Black Hawk helicopters, drop us in place, and then we could just set up a hospital and it would be fully -- fully self-sustaining, enough water or electricity we can generate, All the medical supplies in our cache that we need to be autonomous for about two weeks. Then we have components that could support us to be able to be longer.

We were deployed to Puerto Rico. And Puerto Rico, if you recall from Hurricane Maria two years ago, there were over 3,000 deaths in Puerto Rico alone.

The initial tracks of the hurricane were it was to go over the mid portion of the island and the feds were very -- very worried

about this. All the planners were very concerned because there are still 30,000 houses under the blue tarps on their roofs in Puerto Rico. It's still recovering terribly across the board.

We were very fortunate. So they put us in a place -- we're the ones who fly into the hurricane. They put us in ahead of time. We hunkered down in place, let the hurricane blow over. Favorably, it blew through the east of the island. But after that they realized, oh, no, it looks like it's heading towards the Bahamas and towards the Florida coast.

And all the spaghetti models predicted it was going to be a Cat 4 or a Cat 5 hurricane by the time it hit Florida. So they repositioned our team over to Miami and we stayed and hunkered down there.

And, as you know, it became a Cat 5 storm and it just hovered right over the Bahamas. It crept. Sometimes it wasn't moving more than a mile an hour. 189 mile an hour winds and the Bahamas were just devastated, absolutely devastated.

We still don't know the amount of damage.

It may be weeks, years before we know the total body count across the board. But thank God that the United States was largely spared from the effects of the storm.

So -- and just to let you know, those are resources that are out there, available, and they're all folks who are just willing to go ahead and help, want to make a difference, want to kick back and do it.

And this is an unabashed plug, if you have any kind of healthcare background or logistics or command background, the DMAT teams across the country, five years ago we had 10,000. Now we're down to 4,000 responders. So if you -- if you have capability, you just -- you might be called at any notice to go ahead and go out, but you can make a big, tangible, meaningful difference. You know, give back. Just volunteer a little bit. That's how -- that's how our community works.

keep it going because it was sort of trickling in. Now the amount is around 25,000. So we still have 10,000 to go. So I'm going to make one more pitch to tell you folks that we -- if you would like to see this developed, we have to -- the public has to donate at least up to 35,000, the total.

So I would suggest that if -- if you intend to make a donation, now is a good time because the sooner we get to the 35,000, the more emphasis is going to be placed on the project.

So thank you very much, and I'll let you know next month how we're doing. Thank you.

MR. MOURY: Yes. To follow up on Mr. Harrison's comments, it's -- the Allegheny Land Trust will be the steward or owner of the property. And I believe we have some fliers in the municipal offices. We have some here tonight. You'd make your checks payable to the Allegheny Land Trust/care of Bethel Greenway Project so you can dedicate it right to our project.

But, correct, Mr. Harrison, that we're around 25,000. We're also applying for --

they have applied for two additional major state grants and, hopefully, over the next few months we'll be able to, if approved by the State, announce these.

But they have the property under agreement through the end of this year with I believe a 60 or 90-day extension to go into next year. So thank you for keeping everybody apprised, Mr. Harrison.

MR. HARRISON: And one of the things I want to mention, if I may, they get donations for many things that they're involved in. So if you write a check, make sure in the comments section that you note that it's designated for the Guttman property project.
