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MR. CHRISTIAN: Mayor Allen. 1 MAYOR ALLEN: Here. 2 3 MR. MOURY: Okay. We have eight 4 members present. 5 At this time can we stand for the Pledge of Allegiance. 6 7 (Pledge of Allegiance was said.) MR. MOURY: Okay. I just have a 8 couple of announcements. 9 One, I would like to introduce Laurence 10 Christian. He is our new Bethel Park 11 Municipal Manager. He started last Monday, 12 13 July 1st. So welcome. We told him we'd be 14 nice to him for maybe one meeting, not real 15 sure. The second item is under Chair 16 Announcement. We had -- an executive session 17 of Council was conducted tonight, July 8, 18 2019, for personnel items. 19 And at this point I would like to turn to 20 the Reports of Officials, and the Library 21 Director's report. 22 MS. McINTOSH: Good evening. 23 Christine, I'm director of your public library 24 where we provide opportunities to explore, 25

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learn, create and connect. Just a few announcements.

First, the library's collecting blankets, sheets and towels for the South Hills Pet Rescue through the end of July. So if you have any items that have outlived their usefulness at your home, you can bring them in to help make the life of a rescue dog more comfortable while they wait for their forever home.

Summer Reading Club for adults ends on July 28th and for youth it ends August 17th, but there's still time to join.

And also -- oh, beginning July 1st we started a new lending project with our eBook collection. It's called Lucky Day, and it works the same way a print bestsellers collection works. So if you use our OverDrive app or Libby app and you see a Lucky Day title that's available when you log in, you can check it out even if there are holds on that title. Lucky Day is in a pilot phase right now, and the Bethel Park Library has signed up as a pilot library.

Also, eAudio titles through the Libby app

are now compatible with Apple CarPlay and has improved support for Android Auto. So this makes listening to your audio books while driving easier and safer than ever.

And that is all that I have.

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MR. MOURY: Thank you very much. Any questions?

(No response was heard.)

MS. McINTOSH: Thank you.

MR. MOURY: Hearing none; can we turn to the Police Chief's report, and Chief O'Connor.

CHIEF O'CONNOR: Thank you. Good evening, Mr. Mayor, Council. Hi, everybody, Chief here.

So in August, this is one of our favorite activities, is National Night Out. So we are going to have Tuesday, August the 6th, National Night Out, and BPPD will participate.

We're going to do a couple things. If you want to sponsor a neighborhood party, you can get in touch with Detective Gorman. I'm sure he'll have something on Facebook about how to register. And we'll have -- a police officer will stop by and introduce himself and

eat your food.

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(Laughing was heard.)

we're going to do is at Miner's Park at 6:00 p.m. we're going to have -- for the kids we're going to have pizza with police. We're going to try and get a guest speaker to come, too, and talk to the kids.

So if you can't do either of those two activities, just simply put on your porch light to show support. Take a bite out of crime and remember we own the night, the criminals do not.

Okay. So we hope to see you or hear from you on National Night Out, Tuesday, August the 6th. Until then, follow us on social media.

If anything big's happening, we'll put it up there.

MR. MOURY: Mr. O'Brien would like to know what time the pizza's going to be served.

MR. O'BRIEN: I just wrote it down. (Laughing was heard.)

CHIEF O'CONNOR: 6:00 p.m. sharp.

MR. MOURY: 6:00 a.m., Mark. 1 CHIEF O'CONNOR: p.m. 2 MR. MOURY: Thank you very much, 3 Chief. 4 At this time we'll turn to the Fire 5 Chief's report. 6 MS. PARKER: Thank you. 7 Hello. I'm Eva Parker. I'm one of the 8 captains of the Bethel Park Volunteer Fire 9 Company. I'm going to give you the June 10 Chief's Report. 11 For the month of June we had 54 calls, 12 four fires, one electrical fire, one brush 13 fire, four odor investigations, two wires 14 down, one vehicle accident, two natural gas 15 leaks, one traffic control, one person stuck 16 in an elevator, eight good intent calls, eight 17 CO alarms, and 21 fire alarms, for a total of 18 51 (sic) calls. 19 Through the month of June we have had 298 2.0 calls for the year, so we're probably going to 21 hit at least over 600, which will be a record 22 for our department. 23 Once again, I have some grilling tips 24 If you weren't listening last month, from us. 25

you can listen this month. And the chief told me to tell you guys that.

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Only use your grill outside. Keep it at least 3 feet from siding, deck rails and leaves. Keep a 3-feet safety zone around your grill, that way your pets and kids stay safe.

Open your gas grill before lighting.

Keep an eye on your grill, fire pit or patio torches. Don't walk away from them when they are lit. Clean your grill after each use. This will remove grease that will start a fire. Place the coals from the grill in a can with a lid once they have cooled. And, lastly, when grilling, stay safe this summer.

And just as a little side note, if anybody doesn't follow us on Facebook, from this past Friday morning until last evening we had 17 calls. I'll just give you a quick breakdown of what those were. We had one elevator rescue, one natural gas leak, two flooding calls, four fire alarms, one CO alarm, two transformer fires, five possible structure fires, and one vehicle rollover.

So these past few days we've been really busy. You've probably seen us out and about.

We're all lacking a little bit of sleep, but that's why we do what we do.

MR. MOURY: Thank you very much. Any questions?

(No response was heard.)

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MR. McLEAN: Thank you.

MR. MOURY: Hearing none; thank you very much.

At this time can we turn to the Manager's Report, and Mr. Christian.

MR. CHRISTIAN: Good evening. I just want to take a couple minutes and introduce myself. As the president said, my name is Laurence Christian. I just retired from the US Army on the 1st of February. I was there about 24 years. I retired as a lieutenant colonel.

I have been stationed all over the United States, but I was born in Massachusetts, raised in Florida, and lived in about 17 different states, a couple different countries. I've been deployed all over the world, and I've had a fantastic, fantastic Army career. And now I get to join you all here in Bethel Park because this is our -- our

city we've chosen. And what I mean by that is we have family three-and-a-half hours from here and the research I've done about Bethel Park, I can find no better place to settle down and start a family.

So I was excited to be selected to be your municipal manager. I will work diligently, hard, and I will make sure the residents stay informed and taken care of.

And, again, I'm so grateful to be here.

My family, we are going to be here in Bethel

Park. I have three little ones, two, five and seven. And so wherever we go, we bring the crazy and we love it and we absolutely want to be here. So thank you so much. I appreciate it.

MR. MOURY: Thank you very much, Laurence, and welcome.

(Clapping was heard.)

MR. MOURY: Before we get into the agenda, I just have one announcement. I know there's a lot of people signed up to speak on the Cool Springs rezoning. We were notified last week we did not get it properly advertised, that's why we do not see the

rezoning request on the agenda this evening. 1 It will be scheduled on July 22nd in Council 2 Chambers at 7:45 p.m. 3 So the rezoning will be on July 22nd, 4 5 which is a Monday night, two weeks from tonight, at 7:45, right here in Council 6 7 Chambers. 8 If we can now turn to Approval of the Minutes, and Mr. Hannan. 9 MR. CONSOLMAGNO: The Mayor's 10 11 Report. MR. HANNAN: Mayor's Report. 12 I'm sorry, can we turn MR. MOURY: 13 to the Mayor's report. 14 Laurence told me to skip that. I don't 15 know what that was about. 16 (Laughing was heard.) 17 MAYOR ALLEN: First of all, I want 18 to thank everyone who came out to the Summer 19 Spectacular. I mean, we had an awesome day. 20 The fireworks were great. Last year I watched 21 them not at the grounds, but off the grounds. 22 And this year I stayed and they were put to 23 music, which was absolutely incredible. 24 25 had a great turnout.

The fireworks probably lasted 20, 25 minutes. But I want to give a special thanks to the recreation department, public works, EMS, police department and fire department.

Laurence mentioned that he wanted to live in a great city, town, and I got a little information a couple weeks ago that the National Chamber of Commerce listed the best cities in Pennsylvania to live. Bethel Park is No. 13. There's not another one in Allegheny County.

So -- so that's -- so you picked the right place. And that was based on employment, housing, education, health and quality of life.

I wanted to make one final effort to get registered for our Swiftreach program. It's working. We've been sending out a lot of messages about the garbage, about the fireworks, about things in general. So I just want to go over the stats for those who don't know how to get on, if you're not on right now.

For the Swiftreach you go to BethelParkPolice.net, and about three-quarters

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of the way down the page it says sign up for our Swiftreach. You click register now. When you get to that page, you have to enter your name, address, phone number, e-mail. You can have texts come to you, you can have e-mails come to you, or you can have regular phone calls come in to you. But you have to create a password and you can confirm your password and hit submit. I mean, it's as easy as that.

However, if people are still having a problem doing that, you can call Detective Gorman at (412)831-6800, Extension 836. The Chief okayed it, so we didn't do this on our own.

And we'd like to get everybody signed up this week, you know, as many people as we can. Just when an emergency comes up, if it's in your neighborhood, we can pinpoint a neighborhood. If there happened to be a missing child, it can go to the neighborhood. So it's a great program for us to utilize, and we do, but we want everybody signed up if possible.

Next is the Farmers' Market. I just want to remind everyone that it's still Tuesdays

from 3:00 to 7:00 in South Park and that will go until the end of September.

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And, finally, a public service announcement. Our military banners that have been hanging up for five-plus years now, some of them are damaged. Some of them are falling off poles. Some of them are even laying on the ground near the pole. So if you're able — if you see one and you're able to pick it up, bring it here to the municipal building. If you're not able to pick it up, call us at 831-6800, hit 0, and we'll make arrangements to get it.

We've lost a few this year but, of course, as the years go on and they deteriorate, we will replace them. We have a program to replace them. But if you see one damaged, please let us know.

And that's my report.

was for you and your welcome to Bethel Park. 1 (Laughing was heard.) 2 MR. MOURY: And I do have to admit 3 last year when I was told No Bad JuJu was 4 going to be the band, I had to question that a 5 little bit. But I quess I was wrong. 6 were back and the people really liked them. 7 So thank you very much everybody who was 8 involved. 9 Okay. At this time I would like to turn to the Residents' Comments section for non-agenda items, that would be things that we're not going to be voting on this evening.

MR. HARRISON: Mr. Moury.

MR. MOURY: Mr. Harrison.

MR. HARRISON: I think

inadvertently you chased the people out who came to make comments. Your comments just authenticated that that's a non -- it's a non-agenda item. Sorry. But it just happened so fast. But as soon as you did that, about six or seven people got up and walked out. And I had a couple phone calls today telling me they would be here to speak, and I told them to pick up a copy of the agenda and there's a section that says non-agenda items, is when they could speak. So I just wanted to -- if by chance they're watching this program or will watch it, I'll get in contact with them when I get home.

But the -- I'll tell you -- here's what I told them. If they want to speak to that

issue, tonight is the night to do it because we're on TV and they'll pick it up. On -- on the 22nd, I suspect that will be the only item that will be -- there probably won't be TV.

MR. MOURY: Just for clarification, all I said, Mr. Harrison, there were a number of people signed up to speak for Cool Springs, and I just let them know that it is not on our agenda for tonight. They could -- I didn't say they couldn't speak to it.

MR. HARRISON: No, I know. I'm simply telling you they didn't understand. It all happened so fast. I didn't have a chance to speak to it. But --

MR. O'BRIEN: You should have.

MR. HARRISON: -- I told them they didn't have to sign up to speak to that item. If it's an agenda item, they have to sign up. But obviously these are people that we don't frequently see at our meetings.

MR. MOURY: Okay. Thank you.

Is there any resident that would like to speak on non-agenda items?

If you could come up to the microphone, state your name and address for the record.

We have a three-minute time limit. We'll notify you, yes, at the end of two minutes, and would ask that you conclude your comments.

MR. ENRIGHT: Good evening. My name is Tim Enright. I live at 2019 Cool Springs Drive. And I'd like to talk about the zoning proposal submitted by American Natural Retail to build a large gas station and convenience store on Cool Springs Drive, a residential neighborhood.

I agree with Mr. Harrison, that the earlier comments caused the people to leave. There were a half a dozen people that intended to speak but did not feel that they were going to be given a chance to speak based on your comment, my opinion.

So that cuts our turnout down a little bit, but there's a difference between turnout and what's correct. It only takes one person to be right. So if we can't generate the numbers of people that were generated on the previous location proposal, we can still be right.

Those people that came from the Hamilton Road proposal came out in massive numbers from

what I hear. I didn't live here yet. But they all had reasons to turn out. Those reasons have not changed. The reasons that apply to the Hamilton Road location almost to a single number apply to our location, too.

And the people that may not be here for whatever reason, does not imply that they agree with the zoning proposal. It just means they're not here. So don't take the lack of turnout to mean that anybody supports that idea. It may mean they don't know about it or they just don't have as much interest as some of the others of us.

Now, from what I can tell, there has been no traffic study done on Cool Springs Drive.

There was a traffic study done down at the intersection of Baptist and Cool Springs when they worked on the traffic signals and the turning lanes, but there's not been a traffic study on our drive.

Well, according to what are known as the rules of thumb for traffic engineers, a two-lane local road should have no more than 1,000 trips per day, and Cool Springs Drive is definitely a two-lane local road. Some roads

they classify lower than that based on the accessibility and the liveability.

Cool Springs Drive is about 22 feet wide as opposed to Baptist and Hamilton that are in the mid to high 30s and as much as up to 40 feet wide, and they don't have parking.

Cool Springs Drive is residential, so it will have on-street parking. If we have guests, more than our driveway can handle, they'll be parking on that street, turning that 22-foot wide street into essentially a one-lane road. And at that point, we'll be watching the fuel tankers come up and down the road, the delivery trucks delivering all the gourmet food to the American Natural gas station.

Now, when they do a study to get this

1,000 trips per day or less, they look at
things like what generates traffic. A
single-family house generates an average of 10
trips per house, a condo is .7, per 1,000
square feet of office, about 10 trips a day,
per 1,000 square feet of retail, about 38
trips a day. And, guess what, for a gas
station/convenience store, it's a heck of a

lot more.

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If they -- when they do it for the gas station/convenience store, they do what's based on vehicle fuel points. Now, the American Natural gas station in Cranberry has -- has eight pumps, which, since you can park on both sides, means 16 vehicle fuel points.

16 vehicle fuel points times 6.25 trips per hour times 24 hours a day would be 150 trips per day per pump. That would come out to -- for our location, anywhere between 1,800 and 2,250 trips per day, and they all have to go on Cool Springs Drive because that's where they want to put the gas station.

Since we have a road that should not be designed for more than 1,000 trips per day, there is no way that our road can handle that kind of traffic or, could we say, should handle that kind of traffic.

We've got kids that cross that cross-walk at the Cool Springs Sports Complex --

MR. MOURY: If I could ask you to conclude your comments, please.

MR. ENRIGHT: Is my time running out?

MR. MOURY: Yes.

MR. ENRIGHT: Okay.

So we've got a lot of people that use that, people speed, and -- from the stop sign there, and we're -- you're proposing something that will go over double what a road like that should handle.

Thank you.

MR. MOURY: Thank you.

If you could state your name and address for the record.

MR. ACKERMANN: Good evening,
members of council. My name is John Ackerman.
I live at 2013 Cool Springs Drive. I've
actually been a Bethel Park resident on and
off since 1990. Good evening, Mr. O'Connor,
my former neighbor.

In any case, I think what we want you to know is that there's only 25 units up there.

Most of us are a little older and are seeking a quiet place to live our lives. We want to be contributing members of a community, and I think we all respect and appreciate, I know I certainly do, what a great community Bethel Park is and we want to keep it that way.

And no indifference meant towards anyone who wants to develop property and make money.

The 25 units, by my mathematics, have generated about \$6-and-a-half million in gross revenue for the developer, which I believe is

Rolling Lambert company.

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With that said, we -- and I only speak for myself and my wife, of course, we oppose rezoning this property to allow a retailer to come in and sell gasoline. I can't imagine, just several hundred yards from my house, having a storage tank with tens of thousands of gasoline in the ground. It presents a danger in my mind. And, quite frankly, if you guys do go forward with this, I'll be putting up a for sale sign. I'm not going to live there.

We like it. It's a great place. It's close to church. It's close to shopping. And we want to keep it that way and appreciate it.

Like I said, I mean no disrespect to those who want to develop a property and I certainly respect that Bethel Park needs to find ways to generate revenue because your expenses go up every year. I most certainly

appreciate that.

But, again, we have a group of 25 couples or single folks living in a very nice, small community. It's relatively quiet. We'd like to keep it that way. Again, I would ask that you really strongly consider, even though our numbers are small, to not allow a gas station to be built or a convenience store-type business be built so close to our properties.

And, also, out of respect for the senior citizens who live in the nursing home that will sit directly behind this gas station, that will be what they get to view out their windows, is an open retail outlet. And I don't think anyone is here representing those folks.

So, again, please give it your utmost consideration before you move forward. We appreciate you letting us speak this evening and appreciate your time.

MR. MOURY: Thank you.

You need to state your name and address for the record, please.

MS. BUSSE: Barb Cardinal Busse,

2005 Cool Springs Drive. I've been a nurse practitioner for 43 years, and the most compelling reason to oppose rezoning is the health risk.

Gasoline contains 150 different chemicals, but mostly hydrocarbons which are all detrimental to our health whether they're in the liquid or vapor form. One of them is benzene. It is a known carcinogen.

Small amounts of hydrocarbons affect the central nervous system and cause organ damage. Children absorb more gas vapors because their respiratory rate is normally faster than adults and they are shorter. Vapor concentrations are at a higher level closer to the ground.

Numerous reputable studies here and abroad come to the same conclusion, residents with a gas station in their neighborhood have poorer health, poorer pregnancy outcome, more birth defects, increased cancers, a higher incidence of leukemia in their children, increased hospital stays for asthma, more chronic lung, liver, kidney and brain disease.

Underground storage tanks at gas stations

emit toxic vapors. Estimated levels are used by states to create setback regulations, in many states 300 feet. These regulations determine how far a gas station must be set back from a park, a playground, a school or a hospital for safety reasons.

In a 2018 study, Columbia and Johns
Hopkins Universities measured vent pipe
emissions from storage tanks at several
well-run gas stations and they did this for
approximately three weeks. They found the
toxic vapor levels to be 10 times higher than
the estimated emissions used to create these
setback regulations, and the benzene levels
were also much higher than predicted.

Studies also found that the accidental spilling from a typical gas station adds 40 gallons of gas into the environment every year.

MR. MOURY: You have one minute, please.

MR. BUSSE: How could it possibly be safe to put this toxic neighbor next door to the Sheridan and across the street from the Paramount, two senior facilities with a

vulnerable population, or across the street from 23 homes in the sports complex or 350 feet from Millennium Park and near Abraham Lincoln Elementary School.

We purchased our home because of the green space partially, only to find Cool Springs owners want to replace it with a dangerous neighbor. My conclusion is that profit is more important than anything else. I believe, as one of your constituents, that you will make sound fiscal decisions but never at the expense of the health and safety of this community and its residents. Please say no to Penn Cove Group and American Natural Retail.

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MR. MOURY: Thank you.

If you could state your name and address for the record, please.

MS. ENRIGHT: I'm Jean Enright. I live at 2019 Cool Springs Drive. My husband Tim and I moved into our home on May 31, 2019. Imagine our surprise when we realized that the green space and the walking trails that were advertised when we looked at Villas at Cool

Springs were not a reality and, in fact, we were swept into the reality of our Municipal Council considering, even considering, putting a gas station on our small residential street.

We didn't know anything about this when we moved in until we talked to neighbors who actually had had an opportunity to provide at least some feedback. So you can imagine we felt blindsided.

I'm really concerned about this, too.

I'm a nurse, and Barb laid out the indisputable health concerns, including for the residents of the private homes on Cool Springs Drive, the children who use the Cool Springs Sports Complex and Millennium Park and attend the elementary school, and then all the elderly residents of the Sheridan and Paramount across the street. The addition of all these air pollutants into the living environment will have a serious negative effect on the health of all of us.

As Tim pointed out, a gas station is going to bring additional traffic and serious safety concerns. Cool Springs Drive is narrow, and it's already being used as a

cut-through for people who want to avoid the light at Baptist and Hamilton or who are leaving the -- the sports complex.

This is causing safety for us -- safety concerns for us in trying to back out of our driveway. It's -- it's terrifying for me truthfully to back out of my driveway because the cars just speed up that road.

I notice that there's a 25 mile an hour speed limit sign, but 25 miles an hour, in my opinion, is too fast. I'm not comfortable going 25 miles an hour up Cool Springs Drive. So it looks to me like the anticipated increase in traffic is only going to make a bad situation much worse.

So that increased traffic is also going to increase noise pollution. Noise pollution is not just annoying, but it's a significant health concern. It can be a major health hazard. Cars and commercial bustle can disturb sleep and create stress, contribute to cardiovascular disease and impact cognitive development in children.

Gas stations and convenience stores are well lit and they do that to attract

customers. But light pollution can disturb sleep. It creates stress. There you go again, health concerns.

Another interesting thing about the light pollution is convenience stores and gas stations are well lit to attract customers, but also to deter crime. Convenience store holdups account for six percent of all robberies nationally and their employees are more likely to be victims of homicide second only to sexual predators.

So to consider all of these negative impacts that we've talked about, you won't be surprised to know that it's been determined that home values drop approximately \$40,000 when they're within 500 feet of a gas station.

MR. MOURY: You have one minute.

MS. ENRIGHT: Property values will also decrease for the owners of the Sheridan and the Paramount. I can't imagine that you won't hear from them at some point.

So you won't be surprised to know that

Tim and I are completely opposed to the

proposed commercial rezoning in our

residential neighborhood. We bought our house

thinking that this would be a quiet, safe, clean place to live. I trust that the Bethel Park Municipal Council will vote no on the proposed commercial rezoning to put a gas station and food mart on Cool Springs Drive because I would think that your role is to promote the best interest of the residents of Bethel Park and a toxic business in a residential neighborhood is not in the best interest of the residents whom you represent.

Thank you.

MR. MOURY: Thank you.

MS. COSTANZO: Hello. My name is Rosemary Costanzo. I live at 2017 Cool Springs Drive, and excuse me for reading my remarks. I'm nervous.

MR. MOURY: We're nice people usually.

MS. COSTANZO: At the last Council meeting addressing the Cool Springs issue, the pastor of the church on the corner of Baptist and Hamilton expressed that he thought it was a great success that the proposed gas station/food mart -- food mart would be moved so as not to inconvenience his large

congregation on their irregular use of the church facilities.

He succeeded in getting the can kicked down the road, but it was kicked into our yard where families in 23 housing units and hundreds of residents of the personal care, memory care facility would be affected 24/7 since it is where we live, not where we visit.

Why would having the proposed gas station at the corner of Baptist and Hamilton be a bad idea, but moving it to Cool Springs Drive be a good idea.

The proposed gas station was moved to a side street which serves a residential area already plagued with cut-through traffic, which disregards speed limits, pedestrian traffic and the safety of people trying to back out of their driveways or walk to their mailboxes.

Having this gas station on our side street would draw even more unwelcome traffic which would add to the exist -- existing bad situation.

A senior care facility already serving an elderly population with medical and breathing

problems will be most heavily impacted by the toxic fumes from the gas pumping.

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All the residents of the Villas at Cool Springs will be impacted also since this is our home now and we can't get away from the fumes.

Large fuel tankers would, of course, have to drive into the station to refuel the tanks. This would impact traffic, the roadway, cause more toxic fumes and present additional road hazards. And right now we need protection from all the outside traffic cutting through with multiple speed bumps, lower speed limits and additional stop signs. Add a gas station and the problem only becomes much worse.

We will also need visible monitor -monitoring by Bethel Park police to alert
drivers that these restrictions are serious.

Thank you for letting me express myself.

MR. MOURY: Thank you very much.

MR. PAHLER: Rich Pahler, 1119

Logan Road. My house is for sale. If anybody wants to move over there, I'll be glad to sell it to you. Believe me, I'll live next to a gas station.

I'm here to talk about the flooding. A lot has -- we've been through this for over a year now, so I'd like just to comment about the health issues. You know, there's 450 homes in Bethel that have black mold in their basement for the last 50 years and nobody seems to care. So it's really disturbing to me some of the things I hear that go on in the community, you know, about people want pools and they want this, they want that. There's people that can't even live their lives and it's been going on for a long time.

So I just want to stress again how important it is that the flooding in Bethel gets taken care of before anything else because these people deserve that. You know, they've been living with health issues. You know, I've never had a pet that lived long term. All my pets have died from cancer or kidney failure or -- you know, because who knows what's in the flood waters that come through my property every year. And with the black mold, nobody can even use their basements. And the property values of ours is zero because we cannot sell the houses.

So I want you to take that into consideration again. And, Laurence, I'll be glad to meet you. I know you've got a lot on your plate, but I really do want to -- I'll send you an e-mail and at your best convenience I'd like to meet with you about the problems over on Logan.

Mark, I want to thank you for some of the information you gave me, I appreciate that, and look forward to the -- I'll just speak on it now. It's not agenda -- if there's an agenda item. I'd just like you guys to explain what the -- what the changes are going to be during the public works meeting. That's all I wanted to ask. Okay.

Thank you.

MR. MOURY: Is there anybody else that would like to speak?

MR. BUSSE: My name is Tom Busse.

I'm living at 2005 Cool Springs Drive. I'm obviously vehemently opposed to the rezoning suggestion.

It seems to me that the -- when the zoning was established, this was a residential area and there's, in my opinion, sufficient

commercial zoning in Bethel Park to accommodate additional commercial enterprises.

So, you know, I would urge Council to consider that this was residential. Why -- why it should be changed, I don't understand the motivation to change the zoning. If it's a matter of money, I'm wondering what the cost benefit exchange is here in terms of the -- the -- what's going to clearly be a drop in the tax revenue from the residents versus the revenue of -- the tax revenue that the gas station would generate at this location.

I'm also very concerned about the fact that the only entrance and -- and exit to the gas station, as I understand it, is from Cool Springs Drive, which clearly was not designed to handle the level of traffic and large trucks that would -- would be required.

In addition, the -- the confusing postponement of the -- of the issue has caused the folks at the Sheridan's corporate office to think that this meeting was canceled, and so they provided a letter which -- has Council received the letter from their attorney?

MR. HARRISON: Yes.

MR. BUSSE: You all got it?

Because I have additional copies if anybody

would need one. But I would encourage you to

read that letter. The lawyer speaks and

writes better than I do.

But I, again, urge Council to think about it was zoned residential to begin with for reasons that res -- it's for residents. It's not for commercial.

So thank you.

MR. MOURY: Thank you very much.

MR. NOCETI: Good evening. My name is Richard Noceti. I live at 5530 Baptist Road, about one house into Whitehall so I'm not really a Bethel Park resident.

I will feel the effects of this zoning change because right now Baptist Road is pretty much overloaded with traffic and having yet more traffic on Baptist Road to include fuel trucks is not a good thing.

Our medical people have mentioned the environmental health problems of gasoline storage. I believe there is a wetlands at the bottom of the hill. So the state agency will probably have to look into anything -- if gas

leaks, that's where it's going to go.

We have the health problems with the Sheridan, and also has the fire marshal considered how far this gasoline station is away from a facility housing dementia patients and how would you evacuate that facility should there be a catastrophic fire. All the other points about the road are valid. The road is not really made to handle it.

I mean, it's actually a pretty poor location. Now, I can't argue against bad business decisions. Now, that's up to them. But as far as the zoning goes, what we did at first, we questioned the spot zoning of putting a C1, a commercial zoning, in a residential area at Baptist and Hamilton. And spot zoning, while it's not illegal, is not considered to be a good thing to do.

But what I see here is creeping zoning.

So how are these guys going to monetize it.

Well, they're just going to move piece by piece and get C1 zonings until they're already over there and then we can't complain about spot zoning. So they're eating the elephant one bite at a time.

That pretty much concludes my comments. 1 Thank you for your attention. 2 MR. MOURY: Thank you very much. 3 Are there any other residents that would 4 5 like to speak? (No response was heard.) 6 MR. MOURY: Hearing none; can we 7 turn to the agenda. 8 Mr. Moury. MR. HARRISON: 9 MR. MOURY: Mr. Harrison. 10 I'd like to speak to MR. HARRISON: 11 what these folks said. They have done their 12 research and they have presented the facts as 13 they are. The long-range plan designates that 14 They had no reason to believe it area as R-3. 15 wouldn't stay R-3. 16 Now, they recognize that areas can be 17 rezoned, but -- but to -- to change the zoning 18 from R-3 is blatantly ignoring the long-range 19 plans, and -- and they're aware that we're in 20 the process of updating the long-range plans 21 so that will give them another opportunity to 22 23 speak to their concerns. I personally visited the Sheridan. 24 gone through the whole thing. I got a 25

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complete tour, checked prices and that type thing, and it's not inexpensive to get into there. There's a few thousand dollars front money that you have to put up just to walk into the front door. Then you have to pay your rent and that type thing.

I -- I think the people who moved in there obviously can afford to be in there, but I think they had every reason to believe that they're going to have a nice atmosphere beside a nice open space, the golf driving range and that type thing.

I think we're blatantly ignoring the concerns of these people who moved in there because of the atmosphere and now are being told, hey, Council may -- Council may rezone it and put in a Sheetz-type station and eating place there.

And, as it was mentioned, the corporate lawyer for Sheridan has sent us a letter highlighting a lot of these facts. And I just want to encourage Council to listen to these facts in deciding whether they would be willing to rezone that property.

In my opinion, if this Council rezones

this so this Sheetz-type facility can go in, I think we're inviting a lawsuit and that's something we don't need.

Thank you very much.

MR. MOURY: Thank you very much.

I just want to clarify just so the public understands that the rezoning that was scheduled originally, we thought was going to be tonight, has been rescheduled for the 25th at 7:45 -- excuse me, the 22nd at 7:45.

We're just talking about the rezoning of the property. A lot of the -- information was given about traffic. If it's rezoned, I think the Planning Commission's looking at a site plan, and I'm just -- I'm not for or against it, I'm just telling you that's when traffic is going to be discussed, that's when the specific project is going to be discussed.

We look at, first, should it be rezoned in the particular way they're requesting it. They then will make the proposal, and all these things would be hashed out if it got to that point, No. 1.

No. 2 is Cool Springs Drive is a public drive from Baptist Road to the cul-de-sac.

That is a Bethel Park street. Above the cul-de-sac, where many of these homes are, is private and that is owned and controlled by the owners of Cool Springs.

So we have no control on speed or traffic or stop signs, anything like that. Just so you know, no matter what happens here, that should be addressed really with the owners of that property, not with -- with the Municipality. Like I said, we own and control up to the cul-de-sac.

Okay. At this time can we turn to General Policy and Finance, and Mr. McLean. We have no residents signed up to speak.

MR. McLEAN: Thank you, Mr. President.

Authority and Wayne Gerhold, who is the solicitor for the Municipal Authority's bond If interest rates drop, and I don't issue. pretend to understand how it works, but if it hits a certain point where we can refinance and get anywhere between -- a'minimum I think is \$80,000 in refinancing money after all expenses, the Authority's going to pull the trigger.

What we'll do is refinance. That money will be put back into the capital budget for the Bethel Park Municipal Authority to be spent on projects that were dedicated in the original bond issue.

I consider this an excellent development for Bethel Park and the prospect of the development enthralls me. Mr. Moury suggested I should be willing to donate \$1,000. I have committed to donate one year of my Council pay, \$3,000, to this citizens fund. Hopefully this will encourage -- encourage citizens, especially Mr. Moury, to donate at least the amount \$1,000 that he suggested I donate.

We'll see what the future holds.

The tailing mounds are -- are largely covered, forested. There's raccoon. There are deer. There are more birds than you can shake a proverbial stick at. There's chipmunks and gophers and -- and just an incredible array of flora and fauna in that area.

And what a great opportunity we have in partnership with Allegheny Land Trust to pass this on to our children and our children's children in perpetuity, that this land may not be developed for any other purpose but to be kept for a park. And it fits hand in glove with the blueprint for Bethel Park, where our citizens have told us that they want, you know, to be able to preserve precious green

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space like this. So I, too, am very embolden and excited and so hopeful with the activities that are coming forth with the development of this.

We get support and, you know, Municipal Council has dedicated some funds to this property. Allegheny Land Trust has dedicated some funds to this property. And we're looking for grants to make up a lot of the difference.

The citizens of Bethel Park are tasked with raising about \$35,000, our community members, our corporations, our businesses. From talking on the sideline with a lot of folks, I think they'll tell you that the -- I've already had folks tell me that we're -- we're well passed a third of the way, almost to a half a way of that goal already and this plan we have to raise funds hasn't even been really formally launched yet.

So it's going to transpire and it's going to be wonderful and it's going to be -- I've walked the place and the property already.

It's gorgeous. And we're going to make it even more gorgeous, make it accessible and,

again, preserve it for all time and eternity.

And that is -- that's the best gift we could give at this time of this property to our citizens.

When we had the preliminary approval in front of us, I opted to vote no because I wasn't a hundred percent convinced, while I supported the project, that we were getting what we thought was best for the Municipality of Bethel Park.

So I am happy to report I'm going to be voting yes. I am very supportive. I think in looking at malls and other rec -- or, excuse me, commercial facilities throughout the area, it's -- it's tough with the retail establishments, and the people that are successful are re-inventing themselves.

There's going to be a lot of money put into the facility. There's going to be a lot of new business, a lot of new things brought to Bethel Park, and I'm happy to say that I will be supporting this development.

And I appreciate the planning commission staff and the developer for putting up with us, and I think it's going to be a good project for both communities.

Park and on the top of this mountain that we
had a vision to buy this property and develop.
We used it last year and this year for the
first time in a different way.

Morgan Excavating for \$647,061 for Phase 1 stormwater projects in accordance with the director of engineering's correspondence dated June 19, 2019.

MR. MOURY: There's a motion and a second that we approve the contract for Morgan Excavating in the amount of \$647,061 for Phase 1 stormwater projects in accordance with the director of engineering's correspondence dated July 19, 2019 -- excuse me, June 2019.

Just real quick I'll give you a quick overview. As many know, we started last fall after the June issue, we opted to take a little -- expand our approach on stormwater management and actually look not just in the major areas where we've done projects, but look a little bit further up the watershed.

We tasked our staff to go out and look and see what areas could we do that would help improve our stormwater management, our MS4 requirements from the State of Pennsylvania, and really controlling the stormwater management.

Staff went without any input from

Council. They looked at the community. They looked at the problem areas. They looked where we own property. And the first issue was to come up with things that we could do quickly, and in government this is quickly, in areas where property we -- we know or we currently own.

There's actually three projects that are going to be on the docket that we're going to be approving tonight. First is the Logan Road ponds. We're going to do a slight expansion. They're going to be doing some reconfiguration of what flow into the ponds. I don't have the exact numbers, but there'll be expanded service for that area under the Logan ponds.

The second part will be Oak Tree Park. I know this more because it's in my area, but we're going to be -- we're not going to be disturbing any of the neighbors. We're going to be taking the existing stormwater system that's in the -- that goes through the park. Under the parking lot we're going to be putting a 115,000 gallon detection area. And then in the bottom portion of the park we're going to be putting some small, I'll call

them, dry ponds that will catch some of the surface water. The net result will be about 155,000 gallons of water collected over a 24-hour period for Oak Tree.

And we're looking to do something very similar with Birch Tree Park where -- it's up the watershed property we own, and we're going to be doing some expanding of putting some stormwater management in there.

This is what we consider to be Phase 1. Staff is already working on Phase 2. You might have seen at the school board meeting last week, and I appreciate their actions on approving and agreement with the Municipality at Peter J. Page Park, we're looking to do some stormwater management in that area, put some retention areas. And there's two other areas which escape me right now.

But when we go for these PENNVEST loans, No. 1, it's the flexibility. It's a low interest rate. It makes it more accessible versus doing a general bond issue with projects that are small dollars.

Second is we have to get everything approved by the state on all our permits

before we can officially apply for the PENNVEST grant. So hopefully this fall we'll be applying, I think at the October meeting of the PENNVEST board. If all goes well, we will be presenting them three additional projects to be done probably sometime next spring.

The three projects we're looking at tonight, once we execute the agreement, which should be done by the end of August, we believe it will take us approximately 90 days. One contractor's doing two projects and one contractor's doing one. That's why we broke it down into two separate contracts.

So we have an ongoing process. We're not going away. We actually -- and I don't say this very often, but we raised taxes this past year. This is really the fruit of our labors from the tax increases to fund some of these stormwater management, the MS4 projects not only for this year, probably for the next three years to come.

I hope I answered your question.

MR. PAHLER: You did.

MR. MOURY: Is there any other

MOURY: 7 were approximately, we estimated, 1.2 to 1.3 8 They're coming in slightly under million. 9 I think our total projected spend 900,000. 10 over the next five years is going to be in the 11 neighborhood of 5 to \$7 million for all the 12 projects. 13 Obviously that was based on the 14 preliminary numbers.
