An executive session of Council was conducted on October 28, 2019, for personnel matters and legal issues, and tonight,

November 12, 2019, before we came to the floor for personnel manners -- matters.

At this time can we turn to the Library Director's Report.

MS. McINTOSH: Good evening. My name is Christine. I'm the director of your public library where we provide opportunities to explore, learn, create, and connect.

I just have a few announcements tonight. First of all, tomorrow, Wednesday, November 13th, at 11:00 a.m., Ms. Elaine and some of her staff will be doing a special story time inside the trolley over at the Schoolhouse Arts and History Center.

This is a joint event with the Historical

Society. So we'll do stories and songs about trolleys and all things transportation for children birth through preschool. No registration is necessary, but we -- because of the size of the trolley, we're limiting it to the first 40 to 50 kids. Parents, you can enjoy coffee at Reginald's during story time. We're trying to get as many kids on the trolley as possible. So if you have a chance, come on over tomorrow.

The library is getting new carpeting installed and so we will be closed for a while. We will be closed beginning Monday, November 25th, through at the latest December 15th. I don't think it will take that long, but we're doing the longest possible and then if we open early you'll all be happy.

During the renovation no late fees will be charged. Items may be returned to our outside book drops at either the front or back entrance or you can visit any other library in Allegheny County. We have one card for the whole county. If you've requested any items to be held, we'll hold them until we reopen.

Now, some of our clubs and programs will

meet in other areas of the building. For instance, our gingerbread workshop on Saturday, November 30th, will take place but

it will take place here in Council Chambers.

And just one more announcement. you, a lot of you, we have Facebook followers, for Momma the cat that you see out in our courtyard or around the outside of the building often. She lives next door in the apartment above Kathleen's Kollections. the left of the Municipal Building. They have a few other cats. You may see a white and gray cat around or a black cat with a white chest. They are not strays. They are not feral. They do have a home. So please do not feed them. And Momma keeps trying to sneak in in the -- because our doors, the automatic doors take a long time to close. She sneaks in sometimes. But they do have a home. They're well cared for. They're chubby and their fur's very nice. So please do not feed them. So just a public service announcement.

MR. O'BRIEN: The library cat.

MS. McINTOSH: That's what everybody calls her, the library cat. She's

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wonderful. She's very friendly. 1 2 MR. MOURY: Any questions from 3 Council? (No response was heard.) 5 MR. MOURY: Hearing none; thank you 6 very much. 7 Can we turn to the Police Chief's Report, Chief O'Connor. 8 9 CHIEF O'CONNOR: Good evening, our 10 Mayor, Council. Hi, everybody. Chief here. 11 Last Monday we had our Crime Watch. want to thank the postal inspectors for 12 13 sending one of their own agents to talk about 14 mail fraud. It was very enlightening. 15 Our next Crime Watch will be December the 16 2nd, 7:00 p.m., in the Community Center. 17 We'll see if we can have another speaker. And 18 if you can't make it, follow us on Facebook and our other accounts. We'll update them as 19 20 timely as we can to keep you informed. 21 And then finally, just on behalf of the 22 men and women of the Bethel Park Police 23 Department, I want to wish everyone and their 24 families that they have a safe Thanksqiving 25 holiday. I hope everyone enjoys and God

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bless.

MR. MOURY: Hearing none; thank you, Chief.

Can we turn to the Fire Chief's Report.
Chief Gerber, it's so nice to have you this evening.

CHIEF GERBER: I don't get to come up here very often anymore. So I'm glad I'm here. Thank you.

For the month of October the Bethel Park Volunteer Fire Company ran 38 calls. We had one structure fire, one tree on fire, one transformer fire, five gas leaks, three motor vehicle accidents, four electrical conditions, one water condition in a building. We assisted the police with traffic control with some flooding. We assisted the police also in gaining entry into an apartment building where there was an elderly person that was inside that couldn't get out. We had seven good intent calls, eleven fire alarms, and two CO

alarms, totaling 38 calls for the month.

For the year, through the end of October, from January 1st to October 31st, we've run 523 total calls so far. Last year in all of 2018, January 1st through December 31st, we ran 527 calls. So we are already above and beyond our call volume for what we had last year. So it's just been a very busy -- busy year, even more than normal.

I know it's the day after, but I just want to wish all the veterans out there, in here, thank you very much for all of your service, being yesterday was Veteran's Day. We had that on our list there.

Christmas safety. I know Thanksgiving's coming up. Unfortunately, maybe to some people unfortunately because of how fast it's coming, Christmas is coming up. I just want to talk real quick about some safety for holiday tips.

We'll be decorating our houses soon, whether it's lights on the outside, decorating inside and all. Believe it or not, my wife was actually putting Christmas lights in the bushes this past weekend because it was a

little bit warm and she'd rather do it when she had a chance.

So outdoor lighting -- No. 1, outdoor and indoor lighting, make sure that when you plug things in, normally everything gets plugged in with an extension cord, indoors/outdoors, make sure you get the appropriately rated extension cord, the right size. You want to make sure that when you have everything plugged in, they tell you no more than three strands of lights plugged in together. So be careful with that. You don't want to have too many lights plugged in even if you have a heavy rated extension cord.

Also, make sure that if you have the extension cords outside, try not to leave them in low lying areas. It snows, water puddles up, the extension cords float and they're sitting in water. That's never a good idea. That can be very, very dangerous.

More than one-third of home decoration fires are started by candles. I know it's the holiday time. People want to light candles. You know, it sets a real pretty holiday scene and all. Candles can be very dangerous. I'm

not telling you not to light them. I'm just telling you be very careful with them. Never leave them unattended. Always make sure if you have kids around, I've got little guys at home, you try to keep them away from where the candles are. Make sure the matches are hidden up high somewhere where the kids can't get them.

Make sure if you're going to leave, you go to bed, leave the room, don't leave the room unattended with candles in them. Blow the candle out. They also make those cute little candles that are battery operated. It almost looks like the real thing. So that's always another good option for you.

And then one last thing. More than two out of every five decoration fires happen because decorations are placed too close to a heat source. You want to make sure if you're wrapping -- they sell the Christmas greens and stuff. People wrap them around light poles and around lights and stuff. You need to make sure you keep them away. The lights warm up, it can tend to catch some of your decorations on fire. As pretty as it can be, it can be

very dangerous.

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So not -- I'm not telling you not to use any of that stuff. Just make sure that when you do do it, you do it safely so everything's happy and fine and you don't have to see us showing up at your front door because you've had a problem.

So with that, as Chief said, happy
Thanksgiving to everybody and we will see you
next month.

Can we turn to the Municipal Manager's Report, and Mr. Christian.

MR. CHRISTIAN: Thanks, Chief.

In the ongoing effort to introduce the Municipal staff, what I'm going to do today is introduce a young gentleman by the name of Michael Hoffman. He is the code enforcement officer for the Municipality. He's the youngest member on the code enforcement team and he does a fantastic job.

What Michael brings to the fight here is pretty amazing. He's got a lot of energy, he's got a lot of dedication, and he truly helps the residents of Bethel Park understand the ordinance and really the code because it is -- it is confusing at best to those of us that don't look at it every single day.

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But he -- he really does -- he goes the extra mile. So if you see his little white car, little white Ford out there with code enforcement going through the neighborhoods, he's really -- feel free to flag him down, stop him, ask him questions. He is passionate about parting all tenets and knowledge about our local ordinance onto the residents.

He's been with the Municipality for a little over a year now.

MR. HOFFMAN: It's about to be a year.

MR. CHRISTIAN: About to be a year. He started, like I said, the first week of February. He has a wife and they've been together for eight years. So his family here is -- you've been in -- one daughter, two years old.

MR. HOFFMAN: Yeah. Her name's 1 2 Sophia. 3 MR. CHRISTIAN: Sophia. So he 4 brings the family also to the Municipality. 5 He grew up in Castle Shannon. And he has 6 one fun filled fact. He is the oldest 7 grandson of the late mayor, Alan Hoffman. 8 Right? 9 MR. HOFFMAN: Right. 10 MR. CHRISTIAN: Well, again, I want 11 to thank you. It's a wonderful time to 12 showcase our Municipal employees. We're going 13 to continue doing this. I might bring a few 14 more here and make it a little bit longer 15 because we have a lot of employees. 16 topping out over 100 right now. So I want to 17 bring those and showcase them to the -- to the 18 public. 19 Thank you so much for what you do each 20 and every day. It truly is appreciated. 21 MR. HOFFMAN: Thank you. 22 (Clapping was heard.) MR. MOURY: Okay. Anything else, 23 Mr. Christian? 24 25 MR. CHRISTIAN: No, sir.

MR. MOURY: Okay. Can we turn to the Mayor's Report, and Mayor Allen.

MAYOR ALLEN: Good evening,
everyone. I have a few things tonight and
that's why we have a lot of people here. But
before I start on -- on my program part, I'd
like to introduce our State Representative,
Natalie Mihalek. Natalie, if you could come
up. And also Joe and Christian -- or
Laurence, if you can come.

Welcome.

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MS. MIHALEK: Thank you.

MAYOR ALLEN: Natalie has a gift, a presentation of a check for our Park Avenue area. So if you want to talk about it.

MS. MIHALEK: I do. So this is my official congratulations to the Bethel Park Municipality for \$250,000 for the Miner's Park Memorial, and this is really a testament to all the work that was done on the Municipal level. I helped to lob it over the finish line, but this is, you know, something that you have all worked on, Mayor Allen, Laurence, everyone up here, Tim Moury. I don't know where you found Laurence, by the way, but he

was a fantastic find. He's fantastic to work with.

MAYOR ALLEN: He was in the Army.

MS. MIHALEK: But I want to

officially congratulate you. Based on past

projects, we know that you're going to make

good on the money and this is for the

playground, for the ramps, for everything to,

you know, just further improve the community.

I don't have the big Publishers Clearing House check for it, but it was announced just this afternoon, the CFA board met, and there'll be another \$100,000 coming your way for the Allegheny Land Trust Project, the Bethel Greenway Project for the acreage down off of Route 88. But if you want another check, I can bring one next month.

(Clapping was heard.)

MS. MIHALEK: So this is, you know, something that we can partner on together through the Municipality and through the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania. It does, you know, really make a difference to have a good partner in the community to work toward those goals together and I thank the Municipality

for being good working partners.

MAYOR ALLEN: Thank you.

(Clapping was heard.)

MAYOR ALLEN: Thank you very much. You're welcome back any time.

It just dawned on me that this is the first Council Meeting that I remember having on a Tuesday night and that must have been because the banks were closed yesterday and we couldn't deposit this check. So we'll do it tomorrow.

The first thing I wanted to do this evening was -- this year we decided to do -- we've always had a house decoration contest for Christmas, New Year's, the holiday season.

This year it was brought to our attention that maybe we should do it for Halloween. So this is our -- actually our first event or try at our Halloween decorating contest and it was a great success.

VA Healthcare System for our veterans. It's time to make our so-called leaders do their job.

Being a veteran myself, I want everybody to know how disappointed I am with the lack of action by the Municipality of Bethel Park when it comes to addressing the problems I have incurred with the property I bought here almost 30 years ago when I got out of the Air Force.

It was supposed to be a starter home, but it's turned into a prison sentence and a money pit not just for me, but my family, also.

We've had to deal with massive financial and emotional burdens that no resident expects when purchasing a home. My home has flooded numerous times. My property floods every time it rains.

In 2016 and again this year my property has sunk due to all the flooding and the leaking storm pipe that runs through my property.

The Municipality of Bethel Park will not take any responsibility for the lack of infrastructure upgrades and the damage it

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causes. Just look what's going on around the community the last couple years. How many storm sewers have you seen collapsing like this around (indicating). This was taken yesterday on Logan Road. The hole is big enough for a small kid to fall through.

They're everywhere. This -- this past summer I was weeding in front of my yard and stepped back into the street near my storm catch basin. The road gave way, injuring my heel seen here. Here's the hole and here's the injury I got (indicating). My wife reported this to the police, they came out, did not even care that I'd gotten injured.

To all the residents of Bethel Park, remember your property could be the next one with these problems.

When it comes to my sinking yard, how in the world can anybody believe that a leaking storm sewer did not cause the sinking of my property and cause all the damage to my concrete. Common sense, which there is a lack of nowadays, says this.

In 2016 after my neighbor asked me about her house making noises, the same month I got

a call out of the blue from the Municipality's engineer, telling me that they are going to replace the storm sewer pipe that runs through my property. After I questioned this with Mark O'Brien, it all changed and she was fired.

I noticed the sinking right after that.

I contacted the state Mine Subsidence
Insurance Agency. After a thorough
investigation, it was determined it was not
mine subsidence. I asked the inspector what
else could it be and she told me it must be a
leaking pipe washed away the ground under my
property. I contacted the Municipality. They
videoed the storm sewer and told me it was not
leaking. After that they came and lined the
pipe. Why would they line a pipe that's not
leaking.

Since then the storm sewer basin in front of my property partially collapsed as I just told you. Now I'm finding holes appearing on my property along the line of where the pipe is. The property is still sinking, my concrete is still cracking, and still you will not take responsibility. I don't know what

it's going to take for you to do something.

If the Municipality would take as much time fixing these problems as they do trying to get out of being responsible for it, it might be taken care of by now.

At the 8/12/19 Council Meeting under Public Works and Maintenance, there was an item Steeplechase Landscape landslide repair due to leaking storm pipe. I'm not the only one this is happening to. The difference is that you took care of this. Why. Maybe because the size of the homes are a lot bigger and more expensive there.

So I guess if you have the money, you are treated better than the majority of us here in Bethel Park. What does this say about the great community that we live in.

This Council hides under an extremely fake facade. How do we really know that you're all not like former councilman Brandon Colella. For those of you who don't know him, he resigned after he was arrested on drug and fraud charges. Since then he's been arrested on theft and DUI charges.

MR. CONSOLMAGNO: Mr. Moury, I

1 think he's out of line. 2 MR. MOURY: Yeah, conclude your 3 comments, please, sir. Stick to the issue. 4 MR. PAHLER: Okay. Since this has 5 all started I've been lied to, threatened and 6 tried to be bribed by borough employees. 7 on record. I even got harassed by the police 8 and code enforcement at one point costing me 9 more money. 10 I've been told by -- numerous stories 11 from present and past residents, business 12 owners of massive corruption in this 13 community. 14 What I have experienced --15 MR. MOURY: Can you conclude --16 MR. PAHLER: -- makes sense. 17 MR. MOURY: -- your comments, 18 please. 19 MR. PAHLER: Okay. This Council 20 only wants to talk about how great this is, 21 okay. If you have something nice to say in 22 this community, you can take all the time you 23 want to. If you're talking about problems, 24 you get cut off in three minutes. Thank you.

O'BRIEN: Rich, you and I had a 3 conversation a while back and your comments 4 were questionable and very -- not very 5 complimentary to me. 6 You brought an issue about your storm 7 sewer and your sanitary sewer on your property 8 and the Municipality has three different ways to check it. We dye test it, we televise it. 9 10 And we didn't find any results. So after last 11 month's meeting, I still represent you, I 12 asked the manager if we could do one more test 13 called a smoke test. And we were out there to 14 do it and we did not find anything wrong with 15 those pipes. 16 MR. PAHLER: Those tests were done after --17 18 MR. O'BRIEN: Rich. 19 MR. PAHLER: -- you sealed the 2.0 pipe. 21 MR. O'BRIEN: Rich. 22 MR. MOURY: Excuse me, sir. 23 I have the floor. MR. O'BRIEN: Wе 24 did not find anything wrong with the storm 25 sewer or the sanitary sewer.

Now, it's behoove to us if we have a problem with our system and we can't find anything wrong it with, then we can't -- we're not obligated to spend tax payers' money to fix it.

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Now, we have been looking for those problems, but they're not there. I'm sorry that your property is falling and your things are damaged. But there's no evidence that those two pipes running through your property are the problem.

Also, the catch basin you speak of is on the state road. It's not a Municipal catch basin. It's a state catch basin. We'll work with the state to get it fixed.

And your comments about this Council being corrupt, you're way out of line, Rich. You're way out of line.

MR. PAHLER: A lot of people agree.

MR. O'BRIEN: You're way out of

line.

And you've -- sometime you'd like to share with the veterans of this town what you wanted to do with the memorial out there. You can share that, too. Thank you, Mr. Chairman.

have three other MS4 flood control projects that are planned for 2020, and that is part of this budget that we're voting on tonight.

Other highlights in the budget include some important key vehicle replacements that we needed to do at public works. We are also adding an IT person to the Municipal staff. We felt that was a position that deserved having someone who could devote their daily work activity to that. And then we have a number of improvements in the parks and recreation area, not the least of which to compliment what representative Natalie Mihalek told us about tonight. We have the municipal share of the improvements to Miner's Park as part of the budget and our contribution to the Bethel Greenway project is also in this So those are the highlights. project.

The voters 23 decided against that change and, therefore, 24 have decided to keep the Charter as written, 25 which means those two positions as well as the manager and the chief will continue to have the requirement that the holders of those positions either be residents of Bethel Park or become residents within one year.

So we proposed the change. The voters said no. We will live with the voters' decision and we will do the best we can.

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If the original bond was 40,000, then clearly I'm totally opposed to it. The reason I'm opposed is that there's still quite a number of major items in the development that need to be taken care of. There's a significant amount of trash in the water There's rebar sticking out of it. basins. There's an unfinished sidewalk that goes down to the mailboxes. The lawns were very poorly in place, a lot of -- a lot of open patches, and there's a number of wires and connections that are protruding that we've contacted Rolling Lambert and they've responded by saying it's -- it's up to the utility. And we say, well, who's the utility, and we have not yet been informed of that.

We're happy to contact the utility if it's -- if it's their responsibility to take

care of these many wires protruding out of the ground, but we don't know who it is.

So for those reasons I'm opposed to this -- this motion because the residents do not know how much the bond is to begin with or what the requirements are to get it, you know, eliminated for the builder.

It's just -- it's really an overall strategy, where we'd like to go. It talks about some demographics of where we are today, a little bit about where we're going, some of the potential opportunity for redevelopment of some of the existing areas we have. It's fairly comprehensive.

It talks also about the mobility, the walkability of Bethel Park, and it makes some recommendations on sidewalks. And for me it's an interesting process. The plan's one thing, but it's -- we did a lot of feedback from the community, a lot of surveys over the last year, had a number of public meetings. There was a committee set up specifically for this. And it was interesting to hear that -- the residents' comments maybe in this plan versus where it was maybe 10 years ago and just the different expectations. That's going to help guide us not only in 2019, but for many years to come.

So this is putting it on public display

and it will be available and Council will not 1 2 address this until February 24, 2020. 3 Any discussion? 4 MR. HARRISON: Mr. Moury. 5 MR. MOURY: Mr. Harrison. MR. HARRISON: I still think the 6 7 idea that's in this plan for downtown Bethel 8 Park is -- is what I call high in the sky. 9 would surely hope that the people that bother to review this would address the issue about 10 it's going to be very expensive to implement 11 12 this plan that's proposed and I think, therefore, it means that there would have to 13 14 be a tax increase to -- to -- to start the 15 process. 16 So I just -- I just wanted to make this 17 comment and see if we get any feedback from the citizens, recognizing that -- that I 18 believe we'd have to increase taxes to 19 implement this plan. If we -- if we want to create a -- a central business district and call it downtown Bethel Park or whatever, that's simply a guiding document. It's an idea that we have that we would like to pursue. It helps develop that -- that area of the community, but it's certainly not something that we are going to go out and -- and develop on our own with a tax increase. That's just absurd. It's not -- put that out of your mind, please.

MR. MOURY: Thank you, Mr. Dixon.

I'll just briefly comment. This is a vision. I mean, it's -- this is the difference maybe between mine and Mr. Harrison's philosophy, where he lives in the past, I plan for the future. This is a vision where we want to go. Not everything's going to be accomplished. Don't scare people, saying it's going to be a tax increase when

you're not even sure what the whole plan says.

This is what we're looking for, getting ideas. We're not going to do everything in here. You need to look where the community is going to be 5, 10, 20 years from now, not only for the people who live here today, but to bring new people into the community.

You know, if we sit back and do nothing, you know, we're going to be an aged community and you're not -- you're not going to have people want to move here. That's maybe the different philosophies where it's easier to live in the past than it is versus planning in the future.

So I encourage you, look at it. Take -give us some feedback. Give us some ideas.

Not everything's great. I don't agree with
everything in it. But it's just -- it's a
road map and a direction and a vision. Thank
you.

And Scott passed away last August unexpectedly, and a group of his friends got together and last year we did the Scott Beynon Memorial Scholarship Fundraiser. And last year we raised a lot of money for the chance of a Bethel Park graduate going into the automotive industry. And this year we want to do another fundraiser for him. And it's Sunday, December 8th, at 3 o'clock.

It's against the Steelers and Arizona Cardinals game. Tickets are \$50 per person, and you can obtain those tickets either at the Beynon Service Center or Evey Hardware. But Scott was a great guy and gave a lot to the community and is sorely missed, but his son and family are running the business as he was. And, also, I wanted to take the opportunity to thank State Representative 11 Natalie Mihalek for that generous grant and 12 sum of money for Ward 1, which I represent, and I also represent the citizens of Bethel 13 14 Park. We appreciate that. 15 I also want to thank our staff, 16 especially Stacey Graf, for doing the work for 17 the grant, which, you know, that takes time 18 and money and effort. So thank you to both of 19 you. Thank you. 20 MR. MOURY: Thank you, Mr. 21 Consolmagno. 22 Are there any additional items? 23 DR. CAMPBELL: Mr. President.

DR. CAMPBELL: I have two special

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items that are coming up with the -- well, we have two special items coming up with the Live Well Bethel Park program, first with our Speaker Series.

We have our second -- our second engagement coming up this coming Tuesday at the Community Center. That will be at 7 o'clock. It's about an hour long, 7:00 to 8:00. And we've invited some speakers to come, mental health professionals from St. Clair Hospital. They're going to talk, just a frank discussion, about mental health.

And I feel like really this is so important. I really wanted to put this at this time of year for a reason. A lot of folks don't pay much attention to the -- the significant rise that we see in mental health issues at this time of year. Seasonal affective disorder is real, it really is.

We have more alcohol and more drug abuse this time of year that peaks. There's more suicidality, especially around the holidays and immediately afterwards, and this ought to be addressed.

In my practice I had seven patients who

were like outdoorsmen, foresters, landscapers.

Every single one of these folks, come fall I'd have to put them on antidepressant medications. Come spring I take every single one of them off of it.

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And what's kind of interesting, all of these folks were working outside. It raises the question did they seek that particular employment because they were treating, self-medicating with seasonal affective disorder.

So we're really privileged to be able to have some real good professionals talking, just engage the dialogue, and talk about treatment options and things that can be done in this time of year.

The second issue, we have a turkey trot coming up. This is going to be on Thanksgiving. It's our -- our first annual turkey trot. Expect more. It will be at 7:30 a.m. on Thanksgiving day on the Montour Trail. The starting line is about 800 miles (sic) north of the -- of the JR Taylor Bridge.

Lorrie, I think you signed up for it, didn't you?

MS. GIBBONS: I did.

MS. GIBBONS: My daughter, my husband, both grandchildren, we'll all be there.
