4	to order the Regular Council meeting of
5	December 9, 2019. I apologize for us running
6	a few minutes late.

MR. MOURY: Okay. At this time can we stand for the Pledge of Allegiance.

(The Pledge of Allegiance was said.)

MR. MOURY: Okay. At this time I'd like to turn to Chair Announcements.

An Executive Session of Council was conducted on Tuesday, December 3, 2019, for personnel and legal matters, and tonight before we came out, December 9, 2019, for personnel and legal matters.

At this time can I turn to the Reports of the Officials, and the Library Director's report.

MS. McINTOSH: Good evening. My name is Christine. I'm the director of your public library where we provide opportunities to explore, learn, create, and connect.

Our big announcement is that the carpet installation is complete one week early and the library did open this morning. That carpet was 17 years old, it needed to be replaced, and we had to move so much stuff.

We had to request a waiver from the state library to close, and I hope that this carpet

MS. McINTOSH: So during the time that we were closed we also had our wireless access points replaced and we added an additional three wireless access points to accommodate the increase in mobile devices that are coming onto the network. And we also had some painting done in what will be our library's Teen Space. We are expecting the furniture to be delivered for that area next week.

So we will be having -- well, Ms. Elaine will be hosting a grand opening of the library's Teen Space on Monday, December 23rd from 3:00 to 5:00 p.m. Stop in, see the space, have some refreshments.

The library took first place in the nonprofit 18 and older division of the City of Pittsburgh's Gingerbread House competition with our King Friday's Castle entry. So I want to say a special thanks to library staff members Jackie Williams and Rob Kalchthaler who really helped with the design. Jackie's

an artist so she really helped with the execution. And Michele Loria and me for all of our hard work. My job was to get it down there in one piece, so I succeeded.

(Laughing was heard.)

MS. McINTOSH: The library is hosting an 8-foot Christmas stocking full of premium toys fundraiser through -- well, now through Friday, the 20th of December, we will be drawing. The ticket are a dollar each and they are name brand toys. It's a huge stocking.

So, like I said, the drawing will be Friday, December 20th, at 4:00 p.m. A dollar each. We've raised so far 200 bucks doing that.

And then the library will be closed, I hate to say this because we just were closed, Christmas Eve and Christmas for the Christmas holiday and then again New Year's Eve and New Year's Day for the New Year's holiday.

Just a reminder that late fees are not charged when the library's closed. The book drop is always accessible if you need to return something if you're going out of town.

That is all I have. 1 2 MR. MOURY: Thank you very much. 3 Any questions? 4 (No response was heard.) 5 MS. McINTOSH: Thank you. MR. MOURY: Thank you very much. 6 7 Can we turn to the Police Chief's Report, and Chief O'Connor. 8 9 CHIEF O'CONNOR: Good evening, Mr. 10 Mayor, Council. Hi, everybody, Chief here 11 with some announcements. 12 Our Crime Watch this month, we want to 13 think Emily, the municipal planner, she was our guest speaker and she was talking about 14 15 blight and development. Our next Crime Watch will be -- the first 16 17 one of the year will be January the 6th, 7:00 p.m., at the Community Center. I don't know 18 19 if we'll have a guest or not, but it's always 20 informative. 21 If you cannot follow us at Crime Watch in 22 person, then just go on and check our Facebook 23 page out and -- for updates. In fact, 24 something tells me there might be an update 25 coming tomorrow morning on Facebook. So you

1 might want to check it out. 2 (Laughing was heard.) 3 MR. MOURY: It's not a picture of O'Brien, is it? 4 MR. O'BRIEN: 5 No. CHIEF O'CONNOR: No. No. 6 7 wasn't the one shoplifting at Macy's. (Laughing was heard.) 8 9 MS. McINTOSH: Not today. 10 (Laughing was heard.) 11 MR. MOURY: Strike that from the 12 record. CHIEF O'CONNOR: We are in the 13 middle of our annual Presents from Police 14 15 where we collect presents and we -- for the 16 kids at Children's Hospital. 17 So we have a box in the lobby of the police entrance at the Municipal Building and 18 19 also on Saturday from 10:00 to 12 noon in the Millennium Shops. The Froggy radio station 20 21 will be doing their show, and they'll be collection boxes down there, also. 22 23 So what we need is unwrapped toys. we'll take anything from an infant up to late 24 25 teens. So we need a wide variety of toys.

And our last run will be on Monday, the 16th. We will take the toys that we have collected here out to Aspinwall Police Department and from there they'll get down to the hospital. And on the 20th, which is I think a Friday, all the officers from the area who are involved will convoy down from Aspinwall Police Department to Children's Hospital in the police cars and the presents will all be distributed to the kids. 

So it's a really good contribution, if you can drop by an unwrapped present either here or down at Millennium Shops on Saturday. So I thank you for that.

And, finally, just have a Merry Christmas from everyone at BPPD. Thank you. God Bless.

MR. MOURY: Thank you very much, Chief.

We have no Fire Chief's report this evening so we'll turn to the Manager's Report, and Mr. Christian.

The fire department's having their yearly elections tonight and so they are tending to that business. They wish everybody a very

Merry Christmas.

MR. CHRISTIAN: So one of the greatest things I get to do is introduce the amazing employees from the Municipality of Bethel Park. So if I could have Louis come on up. Carol and Karen, if you could come up, please.

First and foremost, I want to thank them for coming here. This is an ask, it's not a task. So getting here and introducing them to council and the public, it's important to me. Because, one, it showcases our employees. They are amazing. They are what make this Municipality kick each and every day.

Young Mr. Louie Lambros here, you may or may not have seen him out there on the roads. He is part of the engineering department and he is in charge of the road program right now and he is going to be working on the next road program.

So young Mr. Louie there, he has been here a year-and-a-half right now from the Municipality. He has been married for a year and he is a brand new father. They have a little baby of three weeks old.

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(Clapping was heard.)

So, as you can see, MR. CHRISTIAN: he's probably got a little bit of bags under the eyes. So he's working on that one. we're going to get him out of here real quick after the introductions.

So one of the great things that Louie does for us, again, he does the road program and he works on the closed caption television. So he gets out there with the sewer lines and the storm lines and he gets to go over that wonderful stuff that everybody gets to use every single day. But people need to look at it to make sure that it's still in good working order. So he's one of the guys who gets to do that in the engineering department.

Louie has a dog named Reggie.

MR. LAMBROS: Yes.

MR. CHRISTIAN: And one of the things you may not know about Louie is, as you notice, he a has a pretty good beard going on there. Probably not as good as yours (indicating), but it's pretty close. of the things that people don't know about Louie is he's one of the Renegades of the

1 Rotunda waving flags at the Pirates baseball 2 So you will see him there and you might 3 see him on television. 4 MS. McINTOSH: Right on, Louie. 5 MR. CHRISTIAN: So we thank him for everything you do each and every day and we're 6 7 so appreciative of it. 8 MR. LAMBROS: Thanks, guys. 9 (Clapping was heard.) 10 MR. CHRISTIAN: Next in line is 11 Carol. You may not know her, but you might 12 have spoken to her. Her voice is probably one 13 of the first ones you'll see when calling in 14 to the Municipality. 15 So she's been here for a few years, about 16 12 now. 17 MS. HENDRICKSON: 13 years. MR. CHRISTIAN: 18 13. 19 MS. HENDRICKSON: Something like 20 that. 21 MR. CHRISTIAN: So she handles 22 everything having to do with permits, code 23 enforcement. 24 MS. HENDRICKSON: Planning 25 commission.

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MR. CHRISTIAN: Planning commission. Yeah, I mean, she has her fingers and hands in almost everything across the engineering, community services department. So she is a jack of all trades and master at most of them, which is nice. Carol was married for 40 years and she lost her husband a couple years ago. She has two children, four grandchildren, and one cat named Gracie. MS. HENDRICKSON: That's right. 

MR. CHRISTIAN: And she is a long-term Bethel Park resident, 24. And one interesting fact about Carol, she's related to Captain John Sommers, great, great, great, great grandfather, who served with George Washington in the Revolutionary War. They like to think they were eating beans with George.

MS. HENDRICKSON: They were starving, actually, but we won't go into that.

MR. CHRISTIAN: So, again,
long-term Bethel resident and one of the
amazing people that work for you all in the
Municipality of Bethel Park. So thank you.

(Clapping was heard.)

MR. CHRISTIAN: And our newest addition, most recent employee, is Karen Colussi. We just started the IT department and Karen is our IT communications administrator. And so she's -- we were able to steal her away from the county and she now works for us.

But I'll let you do the introduction.

Let's go with background on yourself.

MS. COLUSSI: Okay. Hi, everybody.

I'm Karen Colussi. I've been here at Bethel

Park now for a couple months. I did come here

from the Allegheny County Police where I was

an IT and network administrator for 10 years.

And prior to joining the County Police, I was a field service engineer for HP where I worked on servers and desktop computers and laptops and also printers.

I have a bachelor's and a master's in information science, and it -- this is a very great place to work and I thank you all for the opportunity.

I am joined here tonight by my husband Al of 18 years, and I have a son who is 14, and

we live in the community just right across the 1 2 border in Upper St. Clair. 3 MR. CHRISTIAN: Well, thank you all so much for coming. We truly appreciate it. 4 5 (Clapping was heard.) Thank you so much. MR. CHRISTIAN: 6 7 We truly appreciate it. MR. MOURY: At this time can we 8 9 turn to the Mayor's Report, and Mayor Allen. 10 MAYOR ALLEN: Before Carol leaves, 11 you may have talked to her if you had a 12 problem with different things, with code enforcement, but what you really know her from 13 is she took care of all the trash can 14 15 questions. 16 (Laughing was heard.) So that's -- that's MAYOR ALLEN: 17 the voice. She is our trash can lady. 18 MS. HENDRICKSON: I tried very 19 20 hard. 21 MAYOR ALLEN: So thank you. 22 MS. HENDRICKSON: No problem. 23 MAYOR ALLEN: First of all, I want 24 to thank everyone that came to our tree 25 lighting last week. Public works and the

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recreation department did a great job. We had over 200 people, and it just gets -- it keeps getting bigger and better every year.

The other thing is our Christmas lighting contest, which is this month obviously.

Houses will be judged the last two weeks of December. And if you have any nominations, please call Janet Davin at (412)831-6800, extension 211. I believe we have enough judges, which is great to have them in place this time of year. But call Janet if you have any particular nominations.

One thing I wanted to do, it was -- it was requested and it sounded like a great idea, is have a proclamation. And this is to designate December 13th, which is Friday, as Pancreatic Cancer Awareness Day. So, whereas, in 2019, an estimated 56,770 Americans will be diagnosed with pancreatic cancer in the United States. Whereas, pancreatic cancer is the third leading cause of cancer related deaths, and it will be the second leading cause by the end of 2020.

So, therefore, I, Mayor Jack Allen, Mayor of the Municipality of Bethel Park, do hereby

1 proclaim December 13, 2019, as Pancreatic 2 Cancer Awareness Day. 3 The community is encouraged to participate and dedicate as each word 5 represents in an action to make a difference in the fight against this disease. 6 7 And, therefore, I, Mayor Jack Allen, encourage the Bethel Park businesses and 8 9 residents to purple out to show support to the 10 many who have been affected by this disease. 11 At this time I would like to bring up our 12 council president, Mr. Moury, please. MR. MOURY: Good evening and 13 14 welcome everybody. 15 As everybody knows that I like to play a 16 little bit of surprise on people, but I don't like them played on me just so you know. 17 (Laughing was heard.) 18 19 MR. MOURY: Mr. Dixon, could you please join me up here. This is your life. 20 (Laughing was heard.) 21 While Paul's coming up 22 MR. MOURY: 23 here, you do have to come up, and I'll ask his family to come up, also, who's with us this 24

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evening.

Just for everybody's information, tonight is commemorating Paul's 20th year on Bethel Park Council. At this time last year Paul opted to -- not to run and seek re-election for the position. And he had given 20 years on the Municipal Council, as well as a few years on the planning commission.

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So I thought I would tell a little funny story that we don't often talk about. When I first met Paul a few years ago, Paul was on the planning commission. As you have been here, long-time residents, council was pretty tenuous. There was different groups and we argued and fought and didn't get a whole lot done.

Well, Paul happened to be on the planning commission when I first got on Council, and what do you do when you think somebody's maybe not seeing the things the way you do, maybe on the other side, when Paul's turn to come up for reappointment, he was not reappointed to Council (sic).

So when he opted to run for Council, we had a little disagreement. You know, we didn't -- never really talked about it. But

to Paul's credit, not until today have we ever really talked about that, that once he was elected and got on Council -- and his family and his father was also here because there's a history of service to Allegheny County and Bethel Park and the community with Paul, but we never really talked about it. We kind of joked about it this morning. But to Paul's credit, he didn't hold it against me, at least not -- I don't think.

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But he's always been a big supporter of what we're doing and our success as a group is our ability to work together to really agree to disagree and move on. But I just thought that was a little funny story. Twenty years later I can tell it now.

MR. DIXON: It wasn't funny then. Only in retrospect.

MR. MOURY: Yes, it was for me.

But, no, I -- I am here to present Mr.

Dixon and his family a plaque commemorating

Paul's 20 years on Council, plus his

additional service to the community.

And let me read it to you. It says Paul J. Dixon, Bethel Park Council, Ward 4,

December of 1999 through December of 2019.

Presented to Council member Paul J. Dixon for distinguished service to the Municipality of Bethel Park. Your dedication to the residents of Bethel Park is in keeping with the finest traditions of public service. There is no greater service to your fellow man than to be of public service.

So I wish you well, Mr. Dixon, on your retirement, and we do thank you and I appreciate all your years, and congratulations.

(Clapping was heard.)

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MR. DIXON: Thank you.

MR. MOURY: You guys will be seeing a lot more of him. I don't know if that's good or bad.

MR. DIXON: That's not a good thing from their perspective.

Tim touched on a couple of things that -that are pretty important to me, too. We did
have a rough start based on that planning
commission situation we'll call it. But when
I got on Council, I pledged to every member of
this Council that I would make every vote on

every single issue based on what I believe to 1 be in the best interest of our community and 2 the residents of Bethel Park. And I'm -- I'm 3 going to recognize Mr. Moury as doing the same 4 5 thing. We discussed that right at the beginning and -- and we've always done just 6 7 that, haven't we? I'm proud of the service that -- that 8 this entire Council provides to the -- to the 9 10 Municipality of Bethel Park. I'm proud to 11 have played a small part in that. And I have some additional comments that I'll make in a 12

(Clapping was heard.)

few minutes.

MR. O'BRIEN: Mr. Moury.

MR. MOURY: Mr. O'Brien.

MR. O'BRIEN: You know, Paul, we worked together for a long time.

MR. DIXON: Yes, we have.

MR. O'BRIEN: I really didn't know how many years it was, but they said 20. You know, I gave a lot of thought about what I was going to say tonight and how would I describe

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working with Mr. Dixon, Councilman Dixon, over 1 2 these past 20 years. He's professional. 3 patient. He's a logical thinker with a passion for his home, Bethel Park. 4 5 MR. DIXON: That's right. MR. O'BRIEN: He has always 6 7 understood what it takes to make the difficult 8 decision using information, conviction, and 9 compromise. Councilman Dixon, I have faith that in 10 your retirement you will find peace and joy 11 that awaits you. I will miss working with you 1.2 and I am proud to call you my friend. 13 MR. DIXON: Thank you. 14 MR. O'BRIEN: Thank you for 15 everything. It was a job well done. 16 MR. DIXON: Thank you. 17 (Clapping was heard.) 18 MR. MOURY: Mr. McLean. 19 20 MR. McLEAN: Mr. Moury, I just wanted to note I have -- my family and Mr. 21 2.2 Dixon's family go way back. MR. DIXON: Yes, they do. 23 MR. McLEAN: My father and his 2.4 father were very good friends --25

MR. DIXON: They were very good 1 friends. 2 3 MR. McLEAN: -- and have a lot of respect for each other. 4 5 MR. DIXON: Uh-huh. I know Mr. Dixon's 6 MR. McLEAN: 7 He and I are fellow lawyers. But I brother. 8 really got to know Paul when I was on the 9 planning commission --10 MR. DIXON: That's right. MR. McLEAN: -- and Paul was on and 11 I was new to the body and I learned a lot from 12 13 Paul until they kicked him off. 14 (Laughing was heard.) 15 MR. MOURY: Whoa, whoa, whoa. 16 MR. McLEAN: No; I'm just kidding. 17 So -- but after Paul got demoted to Municipal 18 Council, I then had the occasion of working 19 with him while he remained a liaison to the 20 planning commission when he became a member of 21 Council --22 MR. DIXON: That's right. -- and I continued to 23 MR. McLEAN: 24 work with him and appreciate his guidance and 25 insight.

And then 10 years ago when I joined this body, I had the chance to work with him again. So I've had a chance to see Paul at the planning commission level as a liaison and now as a fellow Council person and I've appreciated all of it.

The one thing I've really come to appreciate over the last few years is that I never had to worry about whether I'd gotten my hair cut.

(Laughing was heard.)

MR. McLEAN: But beyond the humor, what I have really appreciated is the insight and the guidance. And Paul has provided a lot of very good advice on tough issues when we faced them and that has meant a lot to me and it has meant a lot to this community.

And so it will be missed, Paul. We will miss that insight. But stop by occasionally and share it with us when you think we need it.

But thank you again for your service.

MR. DIXON: Thank you. I appreciate it.

(Clapping was heard.)

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MS. GIBBONS: Well, Paul, our stories are kind of funny in that way. We did start together on the planning commission and I also got thrown off the planning commission.

(Laughing was heard.)

MS. GIBBONS: And, look, here I am, too.

But I want to thank -- I mean, I've known you for a very long time and I want to thank you for all the help you've provided and it's been a pleasure working with you together on Council. Thanks.

MR. DIXON: Thanks, Lorrie. It goes both ways.

(Clapping was heard.)

MR. HANNAN: Paul, people on the outside don't realize what it takes to be an elected official, and you have -- your efforts and, as Jim said, your insights to various things have made this group a better group and as we've matured and grown together to work together to -- for the benefit of where we live, you're a very, very real part of that and I appreciate all the efforts that you've put forward in that, that matter. So thank

1 you. 2 MR. DIXON: Thanks, Jim. 3 (Clapping was heard.) MR. CONSOLMAGNO: Excuse me, Paul. 4 5 I also am a past member of the planning commission. It must be a prerequisite to get 6 7 on Council. 8 (Laughing was heard.) But you stayed on. 9 MR. MOURY: MR. McLEAN: Yeah, he stayed on. 10 MR. MOURY: He didn't get thrown 11 12 off, though. MR. DIXON: You didn't get thrown 13 off, did you? 14 MR. CONSOLMAGNO: I didn't get 15 16 thrown off. (Laughing was heard.) 17 MR. CONSOLMAGNO: I don't have that 18 distinction. 19 But, no; in the short time that I've been 2.0 21 on Council, I appreciate the professionalism that you've shown towards myself and also the 2.2 fellow Council members and to the residents of 23 Bethel Park. You truly will be missed. And I 24 appreciate working with you and good luck on 25

1 your retirement. Thank you. 2 MR. DIXON: Thanks, Joe. 3 (Clapping was heard.) 4 DR. CAMPBELL: Paul, I get to make 5 some comments, also. I was never on planning and zoning. 6 7 MR. McLEAN: What's he doing here? 8 (Laughing was heard.) 9 DR. CAMPBELL: And, if anything, I 10 have the shortest tenure in working with you, 11 sitting alongside you. And I don't 12 necessarily remember what everybody says, but I remember how they make me feel. And from 13 14 the first couple days, couple weeks, couple 15 months on Council, I just remember you being a kind, compassionate, caring individual, 16 friendly, you know, really kind of wrapping 17 18 arms around a person who is new and wet behind the ears on the board and made him feel 19 20 comfortable and one of the team. (Clapping was heard.)

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MS. DIXON: I can't pass up a microphone.

Okay. All right. My dad has always been a doer. He is a person that doesn't stop with well enough, but pushes and pursues until the job is well done. Admiring him from afar, I didn't realize the impact that would have on me throughout my life, as a student, a nurse, and then as a citizen in the human race.

When he ran for and was elected to

Council for the first time, I was a

15-year-old who obviously knew everything and

I told him he would become just like any other

politician to which he responded with

something that would change the way I would

perceive things for the rest of my life. And

he said, no, Ab, it takes people like me to

make sure the politicians don't have their way

with the people they are supposed to serve.

Thinking about this memory of my dad who has served Bethel Park as the Councilman of Ward 4 brilliantly for the last 20 years, only one quote and one thought spoken by one person came to mind, and these are words by Theodore Roosevelt.

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It is not the critic who counts; not the man who points out how the strong man stumbles; or where the doer of deeds could The credit belongs to have done them better. the man who is actually in the arena, whose face is marred by dust and sweat and blood; who strives valiantly; who errs, who comes short again and again, because there is no effort without error and shortcoming; but who does actually strive to do the deeds; who knows great enthusiasms, the great devotions; who spends himself in a worthy cause; who at the best knows in the end the triumph of high achievement; and who at the worst, if he fails, at least fails daring greatly, so that his place shall never be with those cold and timid souls who neither know victory nor defeat.

Thank you, Dad, on behalf of our slice of

Bethel Park and our family, and thank you from my heart for being a great example of what makes the world a better place.

(Clapping was heard.)

MAYOR ALLEN: Now you've got him going.

MR. DIXON: I guess that proves that there's a first time for everything. Thanks, Ab.

MAYOR ALLEN: Before you sit down, I just wanted to add my comments.

I started on Council two years before you did. So I was a newbie when you came on. I looked forward to your opinions, especially when it came to planning and zoning, because it's like what do we do here, how do we do this, and you always seemed to have the answers. And even to this day, you know, sitting at the meetings in the back.

But we've spent a lot of time together.

We had -- the Community Center was built while you were here, Millennium Park, the Fire Station. We can go on and on. But I personally want to thank you for -- for mentoring me when I first got on and I wish

MOURY: Is there anybody else up here that's an alumni to the planning 8 commission? 9 10 (Laughing was heard.) 11 MR. MOURY: Mr. Dixon. 12 Well, where do I start? MR. DIXON: 13 You guys took away half the stuff I wrote 14 here. I mean, I only have like just a few 15 pages. 16 (Laughing was heard.) 17 MR. DIXON: You put a microphone in 18 front of an Irishman and that's what you get. Tim touched on a couple of things that --19 20 that are important to me, and I think we 21 covered that. It was a tumultuous atmosphere 22 when I came on Council and -- and together we 23 pitched in and we fixed that. And it wasn't 24 my doing, it was all of us together 25 collectively that did that.

And, you know, just look at the progress that we've made in the last 20 years. There's so many things you can't -- we don't have the time to list them all, from the Community Center and -- and Millennium Woods. We did those two pretty much at the same time.

The -- you know, the Recreation Center addition that we put on, the very difficult process that we went through to build the firehouse.

All of these things we did together as a Council and we became I think one cohesive unit that worked together for the betterment of this community. And we put -- we put aside our egos and we just -- you know, you could argue a point, we could lay out our positions for each other, and whether you win or lose the issue, we put our arms around each other's shoulders and walk out of here friends. We just put it behind us and moved right on to the next issue.

We've always dealt with each other in a very collegial and friendly way, and I really seriously consider all of you my friends. And that's been so important to me.

Coming on Council when I first got on, I was pretty nervous because of the -- the fractious nature of -- of the way things were back then. But we were able to put all of that behind us and -- and -- you know, look at the -- the growth and the prosperity that we've achieved in the last 20 years, and that's going to continue in my absence, I promise you that. I know that we leave -- that I leave this community in good hands, you know.

So I better stop there.
(Clapping was heard.)

so our municipal staff, my hat's off to them. 1 2 Thank you all so much for everything that you've done. 3 And, Mr. McTiernan, I can't forget you, 4 5 either. I've grown to -- I've grown very fond of you over the years even if you are a 6 7 Philadelphia lawyer. (Laughing was heard.) 8 And so, you know, I MR.
