MACINTOSH: Good evening. My 22 name is Christine. I'm the director of your 23 public library. We provide opportunities to explore, learn, create, and connect. 24

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Over the holidays, I was home for a

few days, and I was reminded of a great service that the library provides. It's Hoopla. And Hoopla is a digital media service offered at the library that allows you to borrow movies and music to enjoy on your computer, tablet, phone or your TV.

So there's no waiting. Titles can be streamed immediately or downloaded to your phone or tablet for offline enjoyment. Movies can be borrowed for two or three days, music for seven days, and all new current stuff.

So if you're tired of paying for Netflix, Hulu, Amazon TV, you can get it free at the library with your library card.

And a few events that are coming up.

Family STEM Day on Saturday, January 18. Stop in any time between 11:00 a.m. and 2:00 p.m. for hands-on activities and demonstrations incorporating science, technology, engineering, and math. All ages are welcome. But children ten and under must be accompanied by an adult. No registration is necessary.

Also on Saturday, January 18, we're having international -- or not international -- intergenerational bingo at the Residence at

Logan, located at 5851 Keystone Drive, here in Bethel Park. So, it's an opportunity for us to connect with members of another generation. It's fun for the whole family, including teens. Prizes will be awarded.

And we have sports author and historian Jim O'Brien coming to the library on Tuesday, January 21 at 7:00 p.m. He'll be here to discuss his new book Franco Rocky and Friends that provides insight into why Chuck Noll and the Steelers were the NFL team of the decade, and how Rocky and Franco fit into the picture.

So, if you want any information on these or many of the other great programs and services, you can visit the library's website, give us a call or stop on in. That is all.

Can we turn to Police Chief's Report, and Chief O'Connor.

CHIEF O'CONNOR: Mr. Mayor. Council.

Hi already everybody, Chief here.

First of all, I want to thank
everyone who contributed presents for the
Presents from Police program for the kids at
Children's Hospital. Bethel Park had a
tremendous generous donation of presents.

The presents were taken out, and all the kids received presents on December the 20th. So it was a big success. And, again, just thank everyone who contributed. Thank you so much.

Also, I want to thank all those who attended the Coffee with Police on January the 3rd at the Schoolhouse Arts building. It was such a success. I think we'll make that a regular event.

How's that, Mr. Seasak (phonetic)?

MR. CONSOLMAGNO: Sounds good.

CHIEF O'CONNOR: Oh, thank you.

It was his idea, that's why.

(Laughing was heard.)

CHIEF O'CONNOR: And we will have Crime Watch on Monday, February the 3rd, 7:00

p.m. at the Community Center. So hope to see you there.

And, finally, I just wanted to wish everybody a safe New Year. Thank you.

Any questions?

PRESIDENT MOURY: Any questions?

Hearing none; can we turn to the Fire

Chief's report. And we've got two special

guests here tonight.

MR. GERBER: Good evening. My name's Dave Gerber. I'm the Fire Chief for the Bethel Park Volunteer Fire Company.

This evening, I bring along help with me tonight. I'd like to introduce to everybody the new president of the fire department. This is Steve McGuff.

Steve's been a member now for going on three years?

MR. McGUFF: Yes, sir.

MR. GERBER: Three years with the fire department. Steve is a very smart, young man. He is a teacher, a music teacher at Peter's Township Middle School. Middle school?

MR. McGUFF: Four through 12, music.

MR. GERBER: Okay, four through 12, music. Bigger kids than I thought, so...

Anyway, I just wanted to introduce him. We're up here for another presentation in a little bit. But I just wanted to introduce him to everybody so everybody knows who he is.

In December, the Bethel Park

Volunteer Fire Company ran 38 calls. We had

six fires. One person -- or one group of

people stuck in an elevator, one gas leak, one

motor vehicle accident, four smoke conditions,

eight good intent calls, seven CO calls, and

ten fire alarms. So like 38 calls for the

month of December.

To finish out the year, the fire department ran 616 calls January 1 through December 31. That is up 89 calls from 2018. It's up 176 calls from 2016. And it's up 264 calls from 2007.

Our call volume keeps going up and up. We do our best to do what we can to keep up with that. But, you know, we -- we try our best and do what we can.

So calls by Ward: Ward 1 through

2019 ran 48 calls. Ward 2 ran 32. Ward 3 had 31. Ward 4 had 97. Ward 5 had 56. Ward 6 had 20. Ward 7 had 64. Ward 8 had 107. Ward 9 had 29. And we ran 132 calls out of town.

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And then just one last bit of info.

Call totals, we had 60- -- we ran 63 fires

last year, two over-pressure hazardous

condition calls, 15 rescue calls, 125

electrical hazardous condition calls, 28

system and services calls, 134 good intent

calls, 242 fire alarm and CO alarms, and seven

severe weather calls. So with that equals

another very busy year for the fire

department.

We thank everybody for their support. Council and everybody, we always appreciate everything you guys do for us. So thank you very much.

And just one last safety tip.

Eventually it's going to snow this winter. I

have a feeling it's going to. So if you have

a fire hydrant in your front yard, across the

street from you, whatever, it's always very

important that if it snows and the fire

hydrant gets covered and all, we ask that you

go out and try and shovel out a little bit of an area so that if we have a call, we do have maps in the truck that tell us where all the hydrants are so we can find them. It's just getting to them. And if we have to connect to a hydrant, we need to get to it quickly.

So if you have one in your front yard or anything like that, we ask that you try and shovel out a three-foot area around the hydrant so that we can get to it, easily access it, and do what we need to do in case there is a fire.

So with that, that is all I have. Unless anybody has any questions?

MAYOR ALLEN: Thank you.

HOLLICK: Okay, great. Thanks, 8 Jack. 9 Hi, everyone. Like he said, I'm 10 going to be the new president of the Community 11 Foundation this year. I've been here in 12 Bethel Park with my State Farm office for the 13 last four years, so going into year five. 14 I've learned a lot from a lot of people. So 15 I'm really excited to be a part of this 16 community. 17 Tonight, I have Erin Musciano with me. She's a realtor here in Bethel Park. 18 19 She's part of the Community Foundation. But 20 we wanted to give a shout-out and present

these checks to the Bethel Park Volunteer Fire Department.

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If you guys want to come up and take a picture with us.

And then Tri Community South EMS,

they both had submitted grant requests for safety equipment. If you want to describe the safety equipment, you can probably do a much better job than I can.

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But we truly appreciate all the hard work that they do, and especially risking their lives for the community of Bethel Park. So, we wanted to say thank you. And we figured this would help you save more people.

MR. BOWER: The way things are happening in the community and all over the world right now, we, along with the fire department, decided that we needed to offer protection for our personnel. So we approached the Community Foundation, and they were able to give us grants to purchase protective vests for the fire department and the EMS personnel.

So we're really happy we can provide this service and protect our personnel at the same time. We really appreciate the Community Foundation's help in doing that.

But it is a good piece of equipment just in case anything crazy goes on, unfortunately, the way seems to do. So, thank you guys very much.

PRESIDENT MOURY: Okay. At this time, I would like to turn to the Residents' Comment section for non-agenda items. If anybody would like to say anything, come up to the microphone, state your name and address.

MR. DUERR: Hi everyone. Tom Duerr, 1008 Brianna Lane. I just wanted to come and introduce myself. I'm the new County Council member for Allegheny County for District 5, which includes all of Bethel Park, Mt. Lebanon, Upper St. Clair, and Bridgeville.

I've lived in Bethel Park my whole life, since I was two. So it is a tremendous honor for me to now be an elected official representing this area. And I look forward to working with this entire body to continue the work that you guys have done my entire life living here. So thank you all for that.

And, you know, looking forward to getting started. I had my first meeting a couple weeks ago. And I'm going to do my best to come to as many Council meetings here in

1 Bethel Park as I can over the next four years 2 here. So thank you very much. I just wanted 3 to come and introduce myself. PRESIDENT MOURY: Thank you very 4 5 much, and welcome. Are there any other residents that 6 7 would like to speak? Hearing none; can we turn into -- to 8 9 General Policy and Finance, and Mr. Hannan. 10 MR. HANNAN: There are no agenda 11 items under General Policy and Finance, 12 Mr. President. PRESIDENT MOURY: That you, Mr. 13 14 Hannan. 15 Are there any additional items? 16 MR. HARRISON: Mr. Moury? 17 PRESIDENT MOURY: Mr. Harrison. MR. HARRISON: I had some information 18 19 I'd like to enter into the record. 20 Welcome to 2020. I've been waiting 21 92 years for this occasion. 22 I announced at the December meeting that the \$35,000 budget item from the Bethel 23 24 Park population for the Bethel Park Green Land

Development, Guttman property, was

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approximately \$700 short of the goal.

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I requested that people who intend to make contributions, please make a contribution before the end of the year to reach the stated goal. When the meeting ended that night, one of my Fifth Ward constituents approached the dais with checkbook in hand and requested the information needed to make a contribution. Subsequently, several other people made contributions before the end of the year.

I am happy to report that at the end of the year the total was \$37,243. So a lot of people made Christmas gifts. I wanted to express my sincere thanks to all the folks who responded to the donation request.

This is an important year for the nation and for Bethel Park. We have a national election. We're blessed with the President who is keeping his campaign promises.

One important promise is to drain the D.C. swamp. That is an arduous task for the -- for the residents -- for the President due to the resistance of the swamp dwellers.

Hopefully, with his one more year in this term

and four more years in his second term, he will accomplish this important mission.

Bethel Park has its own swamp that has to be drained. Mr. Moury and his cohorts at this dais verbally trashed me at every opportunity. The most recent time was at the November 2019 meeting. The subsequent was the introduction of the proposed Master Plan.

I expressed my concern that the plan is overburdened with unnecessary details. In particular, I objected to the Bethel Park downtown plan along Brightwood Road and West Library Avenue. I alluded to the plan as pie in the sky. Implementation of the plan would be very expensive and require a tax increase.

In essence, Mr. Moury said they were looking futuristic -- futuristic and I'm living in the past.

The Master Plan is a ten-year plan.

And they admit that the downtown plan will not likely be implemented in that time frame. I guess if not favoring unreal- -- unrealistic plans for the future is what Mr. Moury considers living in the past, then we have a disagreement. He is basically saying that I'm

not allowed to disagree with him and his cohorts.

Now I will further enlighten the public to the disservice that the Moury group provided to the public.

A gentleman named Tom Dougherty, who is an executive in an organization named Allegheny Land Trust, presented a development plan to Council to preserve open space located on the east side of Route 88 between Milford Drive and Connor Road. This line -- this land is located north of Valley Drive and east of Richard Drive.

This property and the Millenium Park property are both located in the Fifth Ward, which I represent. The property is known as the Guttman property.

Tom Dougherty presented a budget plan for acquiring this property. The budget plan includes the 34,000 -- \$35,000 line item, which is a proposed population financial contribution.

I was unaware of this plan until Tom Dougherty gave the presentation. Moury spoke up and said, "Harrison can contribute \$1,000."

I then spoke up and said, "I will contribute a year of my Council's pay to the project." Tom Dougherty thanked me. A promise made, a promise kept.

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When I reported my contribution from this dais and noted that Moury had made the \$1,000 comment, he immediately told a bold-faced lie by denying he said it. Several people sitting at this dais right now were at the meeting when Moury made that comment. They tolerated him lying.

Many times, I have told the public that my mother reared my siblings and me by the use of adages. She had an adage for most every situation. The adage for this situation is silence is consent. Their silence probably results from Moury having the power of appointments and disappointments. They probably tolerated his lie to maintain their committee chairmanships.

Now, another more significant item.

Due to the ineptness of Moury and the general policy chairman, the ordinance to place a question on the primary ballot to enact -- to enact a tax for the fire department was

invalid. It violated the Home Rule Charter.

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The Ordinance did not support the Election Bureau timeline for putting the question on the primary ballot. I had informed the Council members of the concern prior to the vote on the ordinance.

Therefore, the Council members were aware that a yes vote on the proposed ordinance violated the Home Rule Charter. All of the Council members, except me, who were present at the meeting voted yes on the invalid ordinance even with the fore knowledge.

Mr. McTiernan, Solicitor, did not comment on this violation. The proof that Mr. McTiernan was a willing participant in the violation was made crystal clear by Mr. McTiernan's following action.

According to the Home Rule Charter, an ordinance is not effective until 30 days after its enactment. Mr. McTiernan delivered the ordinance to the Election Bureau three days after its enactment by Council. This is 27 days before the ordinance effective date in accordance --

I believe that Council thought when I found out the cost of my legal representation, I would forgo the expense. Council was wrong again.

The case was heard in Common Pleas

Court, and the Court ruled in my favor.

Council returned the case to Common Pleas

Court, claiming that additional evidence had been obtained. The Court again ruled in my favor.

Council appealed the case to

Commonwealth Court. The Commonwealth Court

ruled in my favor. Council was pursuing an

appeal of the case to the State Supreme Court.

My lawyer said not to worry. He was preparing an appeal for reimbursement of my legal fees plus a claim for punitive damage. Council's spines got weak, and they dropped the case. I had spent several thousand dollars on a legal defense that spanned over

eight years.

I then did some research -- I then did some research and discovered that the Solicitor had rendered approximately 150 legal opinions relative to my case. This is after he said he couldn't represent one party of Council against another.

He charged the Municipality for each opinion, taxpayer money. I reported this information to the public at each Council meeting for over the next two years. Council was mum on my complaint -- my claim.

Finally, Council could not tolerate this information being spread on the record. Council directed the Solicitor to reply to my claims. At the next meeting, the Solicitor replied to three of my claims. There was no mention of 147 claims. I motioned to terminate the Solicitor. The motion was passed.

I requested that the total cost to the Municipality be tabulated and provided to the public. This request was never honored.

I estimated the total expenditure for the politically motivated, unfounded court action

cost the Bethel Park taxpayers well over \$100,000.

Mr. McTiernan was appointed as the replacement solicitor. Mr. McTiernan apparently didn't learn from the basis for his appointment. As noted above, Mr. McTiernan -- Mr. McTiernan built a case against himself. He was complicit in the violation of the Home Rule Charter.

Therefore, the information presented above should provide sufficient evidence to terminate Mr. McTiernan as the Municipality Solicitor. Thank you.


