1 MR. O'BRIEN: Present. 2 PRESIDENT MOURY: Okay. At this time, can 3 we stand for the Pledge of Allegiance. (Whereupon, the Pledge of Allegiance was 4 5 recited.) 6 PRESIDENT MOURY: We apologize for running a 7 little late tonight. We had a couple Executive Session 8 items. Just for the people in the audience, items E, F, 9 G, and H have been removed from the agenda. 10 And at this time I would like to turn to 11 Chair Announcements. 12 Executive Session of Council was conducted on March 9, 2020 for personnel and legal issues. 13 14 At this time I would like to return the 15 Reports of Officials, and our Library Director's Report. 16 MS. McINTOSH: Good evening. My name is 17 Christine. I'm the Director of your public library, 18 where we provide opportunities to explore, learn, 19 create, and connect. 20 Usually March of every year I kind of do a 21 state of the Library Report. So I have a few things I'd 22 like to talk about. At the end of 2019, 38 percent of Bethel 23

Park's residents have an active library card.

active, it means it's been used in the last two years.

159,078 people visited the library in person in 2019.

So that's 591 people on a typical 12-hour operating day.

That's a lot of people using our bathrooms. 24,605

people, that's birth through adult, attended one of our

1,284 free classes or programs.

Of those classes or programs, 185 were considered STEM programs; so, science, technology, engineering, and math, not only for children but for adults, with 2,300 people attending.

We had some updates to our library -- I
don't know, the physical library. We had carpet and
vinyl plank flooring installation throughout the
library, which is lovely. We had additional electrical
outlets installed, some with USB ports. Our teen lounge
was planned, established, painted, and furnished. And
the kids are really enjoying it.

We have some upcoming classes and programs. We have story time every day at 9:30 and 10:30. And if you're here at that time, you know that parking is really difficult. But it's good. It's a good thing. It means a lot of people are here.

But on Mondays, we have Sensory Story Time.

So that is for children of all ages, but with particular

attention paid to those who have sensory issues or on the autism spectrum. So it's quieter. We limit the number of people.

We have Toddler Tuesdays on Tuesdays. So that's for ages two and three. Wednesdays is Mother Goose on the Loose. That's for birth through age three. Thursdays is Baby Jam, birth through age two. And Fridays is Preschool Power, story time for ages three to five.

A program we started, actually last summer, and it's really caught on, it's New Movie Release

Tuesdays. That's where we show the new Blockbuster DVD release of the week. And we do that at 10:00 a.m. in the fireplace room.

So coming up on the 10th, we have "Bombshell." On the 17th, we have the movie "Richard Jewell." And then on the 24th, we have "1917," the action movie about World War I.

And for those who want something a little more highbrow, we have Ed Bonner Poetry Reading on Wednesday, March 17th, at 7:00 p.m. He is a Bethel graduate from quite sometime ago. And his latest collection examines themes of romance, spirituality, and nature.

One fundraiser to tell you about was a really fun one, the Yinzers' Happy Hour for BP Library. This will be our third year doing this. Friday, April 24th, from 4 to 6- -- or, 6:00 to 8:00 p.m. Excuse me.

O'BRIEN: I already have a set. 11 PRESIDENT MOURY: Thank you very much, 12 Chief. 13 CHAIRMAN MOURY: Can we turn to the Fire 14 Chief's Report. 15 MR. USELMAN: Thank you. Good evening. My 16 name is Rob Uselman, Assistant Chief of the Bethel Park 17 Volunteer Fire Company. 18 Before I get to our Incident Survey for the month of February, I just have a few things. 19 20 Obviously, everybody here changed their 21 clocks ahead because we're all on time. So I appreciate 22 that. But along with that, we'd like to recommend that 23 everybody changes batteries in their smoke detectors and

24

CO detectors.

Also, you should test your smoke detectors and CO detectors monthly. Manufacturers recommend the smoke detectors and CO detectors, normally between five and seven years, you should replace them completely.

So as you're changing your batteries, normally there's a sticker on the back that says when it was manufactured. So just check it then. We want to make sure everybody is safe. So that's one key thing.

Another thing is, as we had two beautiful days finally, people start to get out and start to do open burning. So we recommend that you go to the County -- well, the County has an open burn policy, which you can find on our website Bethelparkvfc.com.

So please go there and make sure you're in compliance with the rules of Allegheny County and the Bethel Park Municipality.

So, for the month February, we had a total of 33 incidents; one fire, one chimney fire, one gas leak, two odor investigations, two people stuck in elevators, one vehicle accident, one good intent call, five cancelled en route to the scene, three CO calls, and 16 fire alarms.

So, glad to report again nothing major this month. Knock on wood. And please be safe out there.

And that will be up in Cool 22 Springs from 6:00 to 8:00 in their banquet hall. 23 That's to go over any questions that you may have about the new 40-acre park off of Valley Drive. 24

There will be tables there. There will be volunteer opportunities to get their project going. So that will be this Thursday --

MAYOR ALLEN: Wednesday. Yeah, the Coronavirus is Thursday.

Allegheny Trust is Wednesday. So 6:00 to 8:00 at Cool Springs.

Also, Friday -- or, not this Friday.

March 27, the Recreation Department is having a Disney trivia night at the Community Center. So this is great for all you Disney buffs that are out there. The doors open at 6:30. The program begins at 7:00.

You can wear outfits. You can come as Mini Mouse. You can come as whatever. There will be prizes and different categories. There's a slight registration fee. And I believe it's \$25 for four or less people, and \$35 if you have a team of more than four.

I move that we approve Ordinance No. 3-9-20, authorizing the Municipality to incur Lease Rental Debt in an amount not to exceed \$40,000,000 by entering into a Ninth Supplemental Agreement of Lease and a Sixth Supplemental Guaranty Agreement for the Guaranteed Sewer Revenue, Federally Taxable, Refunding Series A of 2020 to be issued by the Bethel Park Municipal Authority for the purpose of advance refunding the outstanding amount of the Guaranteed Sewer Revenue Bonds, Refunding Series of 2013, and for capital improvements representing the capitalized amount of savings realized by the refunding program.

MS. GIBBONS: Second.

PRESIDENT MOURY: There is a motion and a second that we approve Ordinance No. 3-9-20, authoriz-

-- authorizing the Municipality to incur Lease Rental
Debt in the amount not to exceed \$40,000,000 by entering

In theory, we did this -- if you may recall, Mr. McLean announced an early Christmas present in December. We issued bonds back in 2013. With the markets the way they are, we're looking to potentially refinance them. They will be taxable bonds, which really means nothing to us.

The Municipal Authority will be the one that will actually be doing it, to be guaranteeing the bonds. So we're not incurring new debt. We're just going to take some revenue out of there. And we've established a level we could get a couple hundred thousand dollars, which in turn would have to be used for capital improvements at the plan.

And I'm surprised to say that if I were to ask you how many of you had Coronavirus, every single one of you would have to raise your hand. It's 20 percent. 20 percent of our colds that we get every year. This one is just a little bit different.

But if we're armed with knowledge and with education, it gives us incredible power in which to approach this. So we're going to talk about the signs and symptoms of the Coronavirus. We'll talk about incubation time. We're going to talk a little bit about what you can do to protect yourself and to protect your family.

We're going to talk about quarantine and isolation. But we're going dispel a lot of myths and a lot of just misinformation that's out there. And, yes, we're going to talk about treatment and medication,
