(Commencing at approximately 7:30 p.m.)

PRESIDENT MOURY: Okay. I'd like to call to order the Regular Council Meeting of March 8, 2021.

Mr. Christian, would you please call the roll.

MR. CHRISTIAN: Dr. Campbell?

DR. CAMPBELL: Present.

MR. CHRISTIAN: Mr. Cenci?

MR. CENCI: Here.

MR. CHRISTIAN: Mr. Consolmagno?

MR. CONSOLMAGNO: Here.

MR. CHRISTIAN: Ms. Gibbons?

MS. GIBBONS: Here.

MR. CHRISTIAN: Mr. Hannan?

MR. HANNAN: Present.

MR. CHRISTIAN: Mr. Harrison?

MR. HARRISON: Present.

MR. CHRISTIAN: Mr. McLean?

MR. McLEAN: Here.

MR. CHRISTIAN: Mr. Moury?

PRESIDENT MOURY: Here.

MR. CHRISTIAN: Mr. O'Brien?

MR. O'BRIEN: Present.

1 PRESIDENT MOURY: All nine members
2 are present at this time.

3 Can we stand for the Pledge of
4 Allegiance.

5 (Whereupon, the Pledge of Allegiance
6 was recited.)

7 PRESIDENT MOURY: Okay. At this
8 time, I'd like to turn to Chair Announcements.
9 An Executive Session of the Council was
10 conducted on February 22, 2021 for police
11 personnel issues.

12 At this time, I would like to turn
13 the Reports of the Official; and the Library
14 Director's Report.

15 MS. McINTOSH: Good evening. My name
16 is Christine. I'm the director of your public
17 library, where we provide opportunities to
18 explore, learn, create, and connect.

19 I want to say happy spring to
20 everybody, and to remind you that the Library
21 is open regular operating hours. We are there
22 from Monday through Thursday, 10:00 a.m. until
23 8:00 p.m.; Friday and Saturday, 10:00 a.m.
24 until 5:00 p.m.; and Sunday, 1:00 to 5:00 p.m.

25 Just a reminder that the Library is

1 not offering AARP tax preparation this year.
2 If you're looking for a location near you, you
3 can pick up the phone and dial 211, where you
4 will be connected to the United Way help line.
5 From there, you will press 7 to be put in the
6 tax help queue, and you can leave a name and
7 number and they'll get back to you.

8 The Library is hosting a eResource
9 Treasure Hunt for adults from mid-March until
10 the end of March. So you'll just follow the
11 link from the Library's website or from our
12 social media post and answer five questions
13 about the Library's services and resources,
14 and you'll be entered into a drawing for a \$25
15 gift card for South Park Shops.

16 We ask that you submit one entry per
17 person. And it's an opportunity for us to
18 call to your attention data bases, web pages,
19 and services with which you may not already be
20 aware.

21 All story times and classes for youth
22 are still being provided virtually. We do
23 have take and bake kits available in the
24 library, which are cute little crafts for the
25 kids.

1 The Library will be closed on Sunday,
2 April 4th in celebration of the Easter
3 holiday. And the Library will be hosting a
4 pop-up book sale on Sunday, April 18 from
5 10:00 a.m. till 3:00 p.m. in the parking lot
6 at Evey's True Value Hardware.

7 And because of quarantining issues,
8 the Library cannot accept book donations at
9 this time. If you have some that you would
10 like to have included in this pop-up book
11 sale, we ask that you hold on to them until
12 the week of the sale, and you can drop them
13 off at Evey True Value Hardware.

14 And that is all I have this evening.

15 PRESIDENT MOURY: Thank you very
16 much.

17 At this time, can we turn to the
18 Police Chief's Report; and Chief O'Connor.

19 CHIEF O'CONNOR: Our Mayor, Council,
20 Colonel, good evening, everyone. Chief here.

21 I just want to report on what's been
22 going on around the area and how it's impacted
23 us. As of early February until 12 noon today,
24 235 Bethel Park residents have reported to us
25 that they've received debit cards in the mail,

1 and these cards were opened without their
2 authorization. Most of these cards have been
3 issued by Chase Bank.

4 So what -- we are not alone in this.
5 Many South Hills communities and residents in
6 the City of Pittsburgh have also received
7 these cards. So there's many agencies
8 investigating this. We here have been in
9 contact with Chase Bank security department
10 and also the United States Secret Service.

11 If you get one of these cards, please
12 report it to Bethel Park Police so we can
13 document it, and immediately cancel the card
14 with Chase. We will continue to investigate
15 this and hopefully bring these people to
16 justice that are causing all this havoc around
17 town. So, again, call -- you get the card,
18 call us.

19 On a final note, I just want to make
20 everybody -- wish them have a happy and safe
21 St. Patrick's Day. I know there's no parade
22 again this year. It will come back. Correct?

23 UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: Absolutely.

24 CHIEF O'CONNOR: I won't be there,
25 though. I gave them up years ago. I was

1 getting in too much trouble down there.

2 All right. Ciao. Questions?

3 MR. HARRISON: Chief?

4 CHIEF O'CONNOR: Yes.

5 MR. HARRISON: Tell me about these
6 cards. I don't -- apparently I didn't get
7 one. I don't know what you're talking about.

8 CHIEF O'CONNOR: There's people that
9 are getting debit cards in the mail from Chase
10 Bank, and they did not request them.

11 MR. HARRISON: Okay.

12 CHIEF O'CONNOR: So that's -- that's
13 why -- we believe that -- Chase Bank's running
14 a promotion: You open a new account, they'll
15 give you \$200. That might be the motive
16 behind this. So they open one in your name,
17 and then they get a \$200 award for it, but
18 delivered somewhere else.

19 MR. HARRISON: They passed me by.
20 That's fine.

21 CHIEF O'CONNOR: Yeah. Yeah, you
22 just stay under the radar.

23 PRESIDENT MOURY: Thank you very
24 much, Chief O'Connor.

25 CHIEF O'CONNOR: Okay.

1 PRESIDENT MOURY: Can we turn to the
2 Fire Chief's Report.

3 MR. USELMAN: Good evening. My
4 name's Rob Uselman. I'm the Assistant Chief
5 with the Bethel Park Volunteer Fire Company.
6 And I have the monthly report for February
7 2021.

8 We had a total number of incidents of
9 33; three structure fires, one cooking fire,
10 three gas leaks, four electric conditions, one
11 vehicle accident, three smoke conditions, one
12 assist the police, six good intent, ten fire
13 alarms, and one CO detector. It wasn't a very
14 busy month, and we like it that way.

15 But we do have a few reminders as we
16 head into spring. We know a lot of people
17 will be out doing yardwork and cleaning up
18 debris in their yard. There is a county
19 ordinance against what you can and cannot burn
20 in your burn pits, and rules and regulations
21 to follow there.

22 If you go to our website
23 [www. bethelparkvfc. com](http://www.bethelparkvfc.com), there' s actually a link
24 you can click on on how to burn and recreation
25 fires and how to use that. So we suggest you

1 do that before you do any spring cleaning
2 around your yard.

3 Another interesting thing that's out
4 on our website is our Annual Report is out for
5 the year 2020. So if you're interested on the
6 number of calls we went on, where are the
7 zones, where are the districts, things like
8 that, you'll be able to go out there and
9 download the Annual Report of the fire
10 department.

11 Another big thing is, this weekend we
12 all spring forward for Daylight Savings. We'd
13 like to remind residents to change your
14 batteries in your smoke detectors and your CO
15 detectors, your carbon monoxide detectors, and
16 also make sure they're functioning properly.

17 It's a good reminder. Luckily, they
18 put Daylight Savings in there just for that.
19 So we'd like to recommend that all residents
20 do that.

21 And, finally, we are 100 percent
22 volunteer. I'm not sure how many people still
23 realize that. So one good thing is, is even
24 though we're in a COVID environment, we're
25 always accepting new members and memberships.

1 So if you're interested in joining or want to
2 find more about the fire department, Monday
3 nights around 6:30 or 7:00, come down to our
4 main station right here on Brightwood Road,
5 right beside Bethel Bakery, and someone's
6 there, and we'll give you a tour and tell you
7 what we're all about. And we are always
8 accepting new members.

9 So that's all I have for this
10 evening. Are there any questions?

11 PRESIDENT MOURY: Any questions from
12 Council?

13 (No response.)

14 PRESIDENT MOURY: Hearing none; thank
15 you very much.

16 And we'll turn to the Municipal
17 Manager's Report; and Mr. Christian.

18 MR. CHRISTIAN: Thank you, sir.
19 Appreciate it.

20 I'd like to take just a couple
21 minutes real quick and provide an update on
22 some of the key projects. Specifically,
23 having to do with our information system,
24 information technology upgrades that were in
25 the 2020 -- sorry -- 2021 budget.

1 A couple of the big projects --
2 actually, all of the big projects are being
3 lead by this gentleman right over here, Drew
4 Dowdell. He is our Director of Special
5 Projects. And he's handling these over the
6 course of the next probably about 12 months in
7 fruition.

8 The first one is the IT transition
9 project. For the most part, all of the
10 municipal staff have been transitioned to
11 Microsoft Office 365, and they're now
12 transitioning to Microsoft Teams.

13 This is a collaborative suite that
14 was -- training has already begun. It's going
15 to allow the staff to be a lot more
16 collaborative in nature and also efficient and
17 effective.

18 Transition to Microsoft Office 365
19 will provide a host of capabilities that we
20 have not seen previously and have not had
21 previously. We've already begun transitioning
22 to several onsite premises servers to these
23 cloud-based operations and capabilities
24 specifically within our Finance and Public
25 Works departments already. So that's -- we've

1 already seen some transition to our
2 cloud-based servers.

3 We're in the process of doing a data
4 center move and also a building rewire. The
5 building hasn't been updated in about 15 to 20
6 years. They're still using coaxial cable
7 throughout. Now we're getting to Cat6 cable
8 throughout. And what that's going to provide
9 is pretty much on a magnitude of 10 factor for
10 speed and connectivity across the board.

11 We have a firewall takeover project.
12 Currently the Municipality doesn't own the
13 firewalls that it utilizes. But that's what's
14 being rectified in the near future.

15 They are also doing a printer refresh
16 project. This project seeks to audit our
17 current printer utilization, see how much
18 we're actually using for printing and
19 spending, and that will help us identify where
20 we can do some cost savings. And then
21 implement a commercial off the (inaudible)
22 from a low-cost solution for security and
23 management utilization.

24 Because right now, I mean, everything
25 is susceptible to cyber security. I think we

1 probably all heard across the United States
2 sister communities outside and inside
3 Pennsylvania that have been susceptible to
4 cyber attacks.

5 And the majority of all of these IT
6 projects are going to harden our internal and
7 infrastructure to help us be more defensive in
8 nature against these types of attacks.

9 We have a couple of different ones
10 that will help our community and nature. One
11 of them specifically is our field and program
12 management system. That's going to be done by
13 the Recreation Department.

14 That's going to be really beneficial
15 for a lot of our athletic associations because
16 that's going to allow us to schedule and
17 maintain all of our fields, all of our
18 programs across the board. That will allow a
19 collaborative nature at the association level
20 all the way up to both the municipal level,
21 and utilizing the school district facilities
22 as well.

23 The last couple ones are ones that
24 will take over time. Our geographic
25 information system, this is a multi-department

1 initiative right here. This involves the
2 Department of Engineering, this is Code
3 Enforcement, Public Works. This will help
4 across the board both in a collaborative
5 nature, but also as a repository for all of
6 our paperwork.

7 Right now, Bethel Park Municipality
8 is a paper-based system. We're trying to go
9 to an online web-based system that we can use
10 these documents and access these documents
11 anywhere, out in the field, here. And search
12 and survey doesn't take hours or days; it
13 takes key strokes and seconds. That's --
14 that's our ultimate goal for this system.

15 We are transitioning our document
16 management system and a document archiving
17 system. What this allows us to do is stay
18 compliant with the Pennsylvania Commission
19 archives, the retention and destruction
20 standards.

21 There's a very long book -- a lengthy
22 manual that allows and puts the retention and
23 destruction structure standards out for local
24 government municipalities. That's -- that
25 whole system I just talked about will allow us

1 to get to that stage.

2 And, finally, we're looking at a --
3 an HRIS, a human resources information system.
4 This is potentially both a human resources and
5 potentially a payroll upgrade to our system.
6 We haven't quite figured out what the depth
7 and scope is going to be.

8 But all of these items over the next
9 12-plus months will help the Municipality of
10 Bethel Park become efficient, effective, more
11 -- it will provide more rigor in our operating
12 system and our infrastructure, and allow us to
13 become a better organization focused on
14 serving our residents.

15 So, thank you, sir.

16 PRESIDENT MOURY: Thank you,
17 Mr. Christian.

18 At this time, can we turn to the
19 Mayor's Report; and Mayor Allen.

20 MAYOR ALLEN: Thank you, Mr. Moury.

21 PRESIDENT MOURY: Excuse me.

22 If the people online, if you can
23 mute, because we're getting some feedback,
24 please. Thank you.

25 MAYOR ALLEN: Okay. I have a short

1 report tonight, a few items. I want to
2 mention, with the weather changing, it's not
3 too early to think about our spring cleanup.
4 This year, that will be April 24th.

5 If you're interested or you have a
6 group that may be interested, please call
7 Janet at 412-831-6800, Extension 211.

8 And don't forget our No-Cook
9 Tuesdays. It actually starts this week. And
10 this will be held at the Community Center from
11 4:00 to 7:00 every Tuesday. And that will go
12 through April 27th.

13 And that's just in time for our
14 award-winning Farmers Market. That will begin
15 May 4th by the ice-skating rink in South Park.
16 And so far we have 30 vendors signed up. And
17 that will go on through the summer, into the
18 fall.

19 Again, I want to thank Spartan
20 Pharmacy and the volunteers at the vaccine
21 clinic that have been held at the Community
22 Center, a great job. Mr. Moury was there a
23 couple weeks ago.

24 Dr. Campbell, we can't say enough,
25 the job that you're doing.

1 It's just -- they've had three so
2 far, and it's just very smooth. And
3 everyone's doing a great job over there.

4 Operation Feed a Neighbor, the spring
5 food drive will be held Saturday, March 27th,
6 from 9:00 to 12:00 at the Spencer Family YMCA
7 by the high school. If you can drop off
8 foods -- or food, gift cards, paper products
9 to help support our local families.

10 I also wanted to mention a show that
11 I do. It's called Jack of All Trades. It's
12 on BPTV and also YouTube. We've been doing it
13 about six months. We've had shows about the
14 best breakfast in Bethel Park, the trolley
15 beautification project, the oldest homes in
16 Bethel Park. We've also done interviews with
17 the Skyliners and our own Mark Ferrari.

18 And the reason I bring it up is, next
19 month we will have our local state reps,
20 including Devlin Robinson, our state senator,
21 just to go over some of the things that
22 they're doing in Harrisburg.

23 And, finally, I just received this
24 afternoon that Bethel Park has once again
25 received the Banner Community Award for 2021.

1 So thanks to our staff. I mean, it's a great
2 accomplishment, and it's well-deserved for all
3 the work they do.

4 And that's all that I have this
5 evening.

6 PRESIDENT MOURY: Okay. Thank you
7 very much, Mayor Allen.

8 At this time, can we turn to the
9 Approval of the Minutes; and Mr. Hannan.

10 MR. HANNAN: I move that we approve
11 the minutes of the February 8, 2021 Regular
12 Council Meeting.

2 the Residents' Comments section for non-agenda
3 items.

4 (No response.)

5 PRESIDENT MOURY: Hearing none, if we
6 can turn to General Policy and Finance; and
7 Mr. McLean.

8 And we have no residents signed up to
9 speak.

10 MR. McLEAN: Thank you,
11 Mr. President.

12 Compensating for the 22 motions I had
13 to make last month, I'd like tell everyone
14 that we have no items under General Policy and
15 Finance this evening.

16 PRESIDENT MOURY: We do truly
17 appreciate that, Mr. McLean. And thank you.

18 Are there any additional items?

19 MR. HANNAN: Mr. President?

20 PRESIDENT MOURY: Mr. Hannan.

21 MR. HANNAN: I just want to update
22 everybody on some upcoming events that we have
23 currently going on.

24 The COVID-19 vaccination clinics,
25 again, as the Mayor said, I'd like to thank

1 Spartan Pharmacy for holding the third vaccine
2 clinic at Bethel Park Community Center this
3 past Saturday.

4 I'm happy to report that over 6,000
5 total shots have been given to date,
6 2,000-plus people have been fully vaccinated.
7 And they are planning more events in the
8 coming weeks. Stay tuned.

9 I would encourage eligible people to
10 register on the Spartan Pharmacy web site at
11 www.spartanpharmacy.com, and they will
12 communicate directly with you when there are
13 available appointments. We all appreciate the
14 work that Spartan has done putting -- into
15 hosting these events.

16 There are a few others I'd like to
17 acknowledge for making these events possible
18 and run as smooth as they do. First, my
19 colleague, Dr. Tim Campbell, for helping
20 facilitate and work these events, all of the
21 Bethel Park Community Center staff, and our
22 Public Works employees, and especially our
23 Community Center director, Cathy Muscato, who
24 coordinated the logistics of this effort, the
25 Bethel Park Police Department for making sure

1 things flowed smoothly inside and outside the
2 building, and all the volunteers that donated
3 their time to help others, including all the
4 medical professionals who mainly volunteered
5 to administer the vaccines.

6 To the casual observer, it would
7 appear that this is a well-oiled machine. But
8 there are countless hours that went into the
9 planning process to make this event go as
10 smooth as it did.

11 I would like to also thank Laurence
12 Christian for all his hard work in
13 coordinating this effort. In speaking with a
14 medical professional, to put things in
15 perspective, it is estimated that this effort
16 could have saved nearly 100 lives.

17 I had the opportunity to attend this
18 past Saturday's event and was totally amazed
19 at how smooth things ran. In times of need,
20 Bethel Park people come out to help no matter
21 what the circumstances are. And that is why
22 I'm proud to call Bethel Park my home.

23 Thank you.

24 PRESIDENT MOURY: Thank you,
25 Mr. Hannan.

1 Are there any additional items?

2 (No response.)

3 PRESIDENT MOURY: At this time, can
4 we turn to Health, Safety and Welfare; and
5 Mr. O'Brien.

6 And we have no residents signed up to
7 speak.

8 MR. O'BRIEN: Mr. Chairman, there are
9 no items under Health, Safety and Welfare.

10 PRESIDENT MOURY: Are there any
11 additional items?

12 MR. O'BRIEN: I have one.

13 PRESIDENT MOURY: Mr. O'Brien.

14 MR. O'BRIEN: I guess I'd like to
15 look back. We've had our one-year
16 anniversary. And last month we had a
17 milestone of over 500,000 deaths from COVID-19
18 across our nation.

19 You know, what's the value of a year?
20 Years used to flip by. I mean, I think we all
21 have a different definition of what a year
22 means now and how valuable it really is. And
23 I think I have to recognize -- and I'll start
24 at the top.

25 This Council and the Mayor, we all

1 bring some unique talents to this table, and
2 they're very different. But during this
3 pandemic each Council person used their
4 talents to help do what they needed to do or
5 what they felt comfortable to do to help this
6 community through this pandemic, this
7 emergency, this thing we've never really faced
8 before.

9 And then when you go down to the next
10 level, you have our Manager, and our Chief,
11 and our head of -- the fire department, and
12 EMS, and all the employees, the policemen, the
13 firemen, the EMS, the strain and stress that's
14 been on them. And it's like clockwork; they
15 don't miss a beat. They just don't.

16 They're here to serve. They're here
17 to protect. They're here. And they
18 understand what needs to be done. And they do
19 it under great guidelines. And through the
20 grace of God, we've made it through without a
21 very serious lack of personnel. Although it's
22 not over.

23 And I'd like to talk about our staff,
24 how they reinvented what we do here. And
25 everyone here kind of adapted themselves to it.

1 And then we go -- and our Public Works and all
2 the employees of the Municipality.

3 And then we go down to the next
4 level; our businesses, our restaurants, our
5 organizations that all have stepped up, and
6 the people of Bethel Park, just the volunteers
7 wanting to help, and doing it in a safe
8 manner.

9 You know, we turn on our TV, we click
10 it or we swipe or we tap our mouse or our
11 screen, and we see all the things that go on
12 in the world, and we can shut it off. But
13 until it hits, until it becomes part of your
14 world or your family, it seems far away. And
15 then with a blink of an eye, one-half a
16 second, it's your world. And that is
17 something we have to recognize.

18 And I'd like, tonight, to honor those
19 that we have lost from Bethel Park. The
20 number is 53. That's more than we've lost in
21 all our wars in Bethel Park -- of Bethel Park
22 residents from the American Revolution until
23 today. And we did that in one year.

24 They're not just names and faces.
25 They're fathers, and mothers, and sons, and

1 daughters, grandfathers, grandmothers, and
2 friends, maybe coworkers, people you run into
3 at Ace, and at Evey's, at Pasta II, and at
4 Al's. It really hits home.

5 So I would like to offer a moment of
6 silence for those 53 tonight. And we are on a
7 great place. We're headed in the right
8 direction. We still have to be cautious. And
9 we have to understand where we came from.

10 So, Mr. Moury, I would like to offer
11 a moment of silence for the 53 men and women
12 that we've lost from Bethel Park over the last
13 year.

14 (Moment of silence.)

15 MR. O'BRIEN: Thank you, Mr. Moury.

16 PRESIDENT MOURY: Any additional
17 items?

18 (No response.)

19 PRESIDENT MOURY: Hearing none, can
20 we turn to Planning and Zoning; and
21 Ms. Gibbons.

22 MS. GIBBONS: There are no items on
23 the agenda for Planning and Zoning.

24 PRESIDENT MOURY: Thank you,
25 Ms. Gibbons.

1 Are there any additional items?

2 (No response.)

3 PRESIDENT MOURY: Hearing none, can
4 we turn to Public Works and Maintenance; and
5 Mr. Consolmagno.

6 We have no residents signed up to
7 speak.

8 MR. CONSOLMAGNO: Thank you,
9 Mr. Moury.

10 We're voting tonight on two separate
11 contracts, both related to the 2021 Road
12 Program. The first is the actual contract for
13 the actual paving, and the second contract is
14 for the landscaping around the paving.

15 Last year, we decided to split the
16 contract, as pavers are not good landscapers
17 and landscapers are not good pavers. What we
18 learned is that we received better pricing on
19 both, and we ended up with better service to
20 our residents.

21 In regards to our Road Program,
22 several years ago we were one of the first
23 communities to contract with a company called
24 Robotics. Robotics is a start-up company out
25 of Carnegie Mellon that actually performed a

1 municipal-wide assessment of all our streets.

2 They do this by videotaping all of
3 our roads, and providing an unbiased
4 assessment. Based on this information is how
5 we determine which streets to be paved.
6 There's a little bit of a risk. But it
7 utilizes state-of-the-art technology which
8 takes out the subjectivity for our road paving
9 program. Robotics is now used in over
10 250-plus communities in 34 states.

11 And with that said, I move that we
12 accept the low bid of \$1,533,890.50 from Mele
13 & Mele & Sons for the combined base bid,
14 Alternate No. 1 and Alternate No. 2, per the
15 Director of Engineering's memorandum dated
16 February 17, 2021.

17 MR. HARRISON: Second.

18 PRESIDENT MOURY: There's a motion by
19 Mr. Consolmagno and second by Mr. Harrison
20 that we accept the low bid of \$1,533,890.50
21 from Mele & Mele & Sons for the combined base
22 bid, Alternate No. 1 and Alternate No. 2, per
23 the Director of Engineering's memorandum dated
24 February 17, 2021.

25 Any discussion of this item?

1 (No response.)

2 PRESIDENT MOURY: Mr. Christian,
3 would you please call the roll.

14 Mr. Consolmagno.

15 MR. CONSOLMAGNO: Millennium Park
16 improvements. The project we will be voting
17 on tonight is another step in our recreational
18 facility upgrade plan. In 2018, we
19 commissioned a study of all of our
20 recreational facilities to get a better
21 understanding of where we are and where we
22 want to be.

23 As part of the study, it's
24 recommended that we realign our parks along
25 with upgrading our facilities. It is

1 important for two reasons. First, to align
2 all of our major parks to meet the current and
3 future needs of our residents, and also
4 provide a long-term strategy that allows us to
5 apply for grants to help offset the cost of
6 our upgrades.

7 The first phase of the recommended
8 plan was to turn Village Green into Field
9 Sports Park. With the help of the state and
10 the soccer association, we were able to fund a
11 turf field, upgraded bathroom, concession
12 stand building, new ADA playground, new
13 pavilion, and add a walking trail.

14 Once the Field Sports Park was
15 completed, we are now able to turn the large
16 field at Millennium Park into a diamond park
17 for baseball and softball.

18 The contract we are voting on tonight
19 will add a small baseball field with a turf
20 infield, upgrading bathrooms, adding a
21 concession stand, new playground equipment,
22 and a walking trail around the park.

23 The total cost of this project is
24 nearly one million dollars. But because of
25 our planning and submitting several grant

1 applications, we were awarded around 700,000
2 in grants to accomplish our goal.

3 The third step in our roadmap was the
4 upgrading of Park Avenue fields. We announced
5 back in January that we have received \$900,000
6 in grants to accomplish this project. We are
7 still in the planning stages, but this project
8 will include a splash pad and other amenities.
9 We are hoping to announce the final plan this
10 fall, and construction in 2022.

11 We have all spent a lot of time,
12 along with the Recreation Board, to develop a
13 plan for improving our recreational
14 facilities. The most important part of the
15 planning, as this enables us to seek out and
16 apply for grant money to offset our costs, I
17 am happy to report that we have received
18 nearly two million in grant money. And we are
19 becoming our -- beginning our search for step
20 four grants planning 2023 and beyond.

21 With that said, I move that we award
22 the base bid and Alternate No. 1, 2, and 4 to
23 Plavchak Construction in the amount of
24 \$710,682.50 for the general contracting work
25 per the Director of Engineering's memorandum

1 dated February 18, 2021.

2 MR. HARRISON: Second.

3 PRESIDENT MOURY: There's a motion by
4 Mr. Consolmagno and second by Mr. Harrison
5 that we award the base bid and Alternates No.
6 1, 2, and 4 to Plavchak Construction in the
7 amount of \$710,682.50 for the general
8 contracting work per the Director of
9 Engineering's memorandum dated February 18,
10 2021.

11 Any discussion of this item?

12 (No response.)

13 PRESIDENT MOURY: Mr. Christian,
14 would you please call the roll.

15 MR. CHRISTIAN: Dr. Campbell?

16 DR. CAMPBELL: Yes.

15 state elected officials for working with us as
16 we plan for the future of Bethel Park.

17 Mr. Consolmagno.

18 MR. CONSOLMAGNO: Thank you,
19 Mr. Moury.

20 I move that we award the Plumbing
21 Contract in the amount of \$41,000 to Newman
22 Plumbing per the Director of Engineering's
23 memorandum dated February 18, 2021.

24 MR. HARRISON: Second.

25 PRESIDENT MOURY: There's a motion by

1 Mr. Consolmagno and second by Mr. Harrison
2 that we award the Plumbing Contract in the
3 amount of \$41,000 to Newman Plumbing per the
4 Director of Engineering's memorandum dated

2 three Saturdays. And, you know, he does it on
3 such short notice, 48 hours before you're
4 scheduled to take the first shot, and
5 coordinate everything. You know, he just does
6 a fantastic job.

7 And the volunteers, you know, we
8 couldn't do without them. But he's an
9 outstanding individual. And I'm so happy and
10 glad to have him sitting next to me.

11 And thank you.

12 DR. CAMPBELL: Thank you.

13 PRESIDENT MOURY: Thank you,
14 Mr. Consolmagno.

15 Are there any additional items?

16 MR. HANNAN: Mr. President?

17 PRESIDENT MOURY: Mr. Hannan.

18 MR. HANNAN: As we've discussed,
19 we're trying to get back to a new semblance of
20 order that we're used to. And more people are
21 getting vaccinated, and some restrictions on
22 -- the Governor places on people are being
23 reduced.

24 I'm happy to report that Bethel Park
25 is in the planning stages to return the

1 fireworks to Bethel Park for the July 4th
2 holiday.

3 While we are still in preliminary
4 planning stages, and based on CDC and state
5 guidelines permit, we would like to return to
6 some type of normalcy. As with many things,
7 we all need to adjust what we do and how we do
8 it to protect ourselves and our neighbors.

9 In the past, we had a community
10 celebration that was centralized in Millennium
11 Park. But in 2021, the celebration will be
12 centralized outside of Millennium Park.

13 Our preliminary plans have us
14 shooting off the fireworks at Millennium Park.
15 And since we do not have activities in the
16 park, this will enable us to shoot the
17 fireworks higher, making them visible over a
18 wider area.

19 While the plans are still very
20 preliminary, the current strategy could be to
21 establish a number of smaller areas for people
22 to view the fireworks. While nothing's
23 finalized yet, our communications team will
24 keep everybody updated as we get closer to the
25 event. Stay tuned for more fireworks

1 information.

2 Thank you.


