An executive session of Council was conducted on May 24, 2021 for police personnel issues.

At this time, can we turn to the Reports of the Officials; and our Library Director's Report.

MS. McINTOSH: Good evening. My name's Christine. I'm the Director of your Public Library, where we provide opportunities to explore, learn, create, and connect.

I'm happy to report that the Library has lifted all COVID-19 restrictions except for the wearing of a mask while in the Library, which that will end fairly soon, I hope.

All of our computers have been restored to their locations with the pre-COVID

time limit of three hours per day. All tables
and chairs have been restored. And the
meeting rooms are again open and available for
your use.

Classes and events that are currently scheduled virtually or meeting outside will stay that way. But going forward, newly-scheduled classes and events will be meeting in person.

So the following are now currently meeting in person: One-on-one Technology Classes, Pinochle Club, Scrabble Club, Conversations Salon, our Memory Group, our Writer's Group, Tuesday Morning Movies, Monday Night Book Club, and Mystery Book Club.

Currently, all youth programs will remain virtual or will meet outside until the fall. But you'll be happy to know that all of our toys have returned to the Family Place area except puppets and anything that's soft. So, like, hard blocks, the railroad cars, they're all out.

Summer Reading for Adults is going on through August 1st. So for every book that you read or listen to, you can complete an

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online entry, and, weekly, one winner will be drawn for a $25 gift card. And then all entries submitted over the summer will be entered for a grand prize drawing, which this year is a Garmin smartwatch.

Summer Learning for Kids has started;
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Summer Learning for Kids has started; eight weeks of nonstop fun. Our preschool kids will play bingo to win a book or a picture frame. The kindergarten through sixth grade kids will complete reading and learning challenges for chances to win weekly gift cards.

And teens will check out our new Teen Book Boxes, and they'll be entered to win a \$100 Amazon gift card.

And just a reminder that the Library is closed on Sundays from Memorial Day through Labor Day. So we're not open on Sundays during the summer.

And even more important, we have a lot of elderly people. And some of them are in early stages of dementia. And it causes them great emotional distress when these things are going off like that. So please be responsible.

There's fireworks on the 26th. Enjoy them this year in Bethel Park. If you're going to shoot them off, you got to be on your property. There's still restrictions. You got to follow restrictions.

And just be a good neighbor and a responsible citizen and don't set them off late at night and disturb people's peace. And we're going to ask for everybody's cooperation doing that this year. But we do have plan B.

MR. BEESON: Yeah, we're virtual.

MR. CHRISTIAN: Sure can.

MR. BEESON: All right. Deputy Fire Chief Russ Beeson here for Chief Dave Gerber to give you the Bethel Park Volunteer Fire Company report for the month of May.

In the month of May, we saw four structure fires, three mulch fires, five gas leaks, one vehicle accident, five electrical conditions, four calls to assist the police, six good intent calls, 16 fire alarms, and a total of six CO alarms, for a total of 50 calls for the month of May.

Your fire company would like to remind you of some summertime grilling tips, some dos and dont's. We ask that you keep your grill at least 10 feet away from your house, clean your grill on a regular basis, check for gas leaks prior to igniting your grill, keep any decorations away from your grill, keep a spray bottle of water handy so if the flames and the grease start to get up,

you can suppress them back down, and to keep a fire extinguisher within a couple steps of your grill.

Some of the dont's. Do not turn on the gas while your grill lid is closed, leave -- never leave your grill unattended, and use your grills outdoors. It's important to say that.

To further touch on what Chief
O'Connor said in regards to fireworks, we ask
that you always keep a bucket of water or
garden hose handy in case a fire does ignite
from the launch site, and to douse the
fireworks before putting them in the trash
can, never allow young children to play with
or ignite the fireworks, never carry fireworks
in your pocket, or shoot them off in metal or
glass containers that will create projectiles,
never point and throw fireworks at another
person, and, most of all, just be safe.

That's all we have for you.

Our Farmer's Market has over 40 vendors participating in either full season, half season or once a month capacity. And now the flea market returns on June 19th at a brand-new location, Christ United Methodist Church, with markets available in July, August, and September.

Still more programs. The swim program is busy, and all the private lessons

are filled up. I'm sorry. Please, we'll be adding more lessons coming up soon.

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Room rentals are returning to the Community Center with birthday parties, grad parties, and more. Please contact our friendly staff over at the Rec Department to schedule your event.

Our Community Center, its back entrance has a beautiful new garden area complete with a large, welcoming topiary bear. Please stop by. It looks fantastic. Our own Public Works worked on it over there. It's fantastic. It's great.

Looking ahead, we've got some new welcome signage that will be installed on the back entrance wall of the Center. And plans are in the works for outdoor permanent signs at the front of the Center.

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Now, therefore, I hereby terminate the above-referenced declaration of a state of emergency and all the restrictions and orders contained therein.

This declaration is effective
June 14, 2021.

MAYOR ALLEN: So, that's all I had,

CHAIRMAN MOURY: Well, as the Mayor is going back, I'll comment on his declaration.

It's been a long time coming. I'd like to especially thank the community, all the volunteers, and everybody that really stepped it up to help us.

And I would encourage you -- if you haven't got your vaccine shot, I would strongly encourage you to get your shot, you know, to protect yourself and everybody around you.

Mayor?

MAYOR ALLEN: Okay. Thank you,

Mr. President.

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So it's my honor and privilege to provide the annual State of the Municipality as required by our Home Rule Charter.

I would like to begin by recognizing and commending our Municipal Council, the Municipal Staff, the Police Department, Volunteer Fire Department, and the Emergency Medical Team for all their hard work and dedication to this community.

2020 was a year that no one will forget. Through the generosity of our local businesses, we were able to assist many hundreds of families that needed help.

Essential workers were there every step of the way, including grocery stores, pharmacies, restaurants, and the restaurants for food pickup and delivery. And the list can go on and on.

The Municipality never closed. We were open for any questions and concerns that you may have had. My office sent out messages on a regular basis to keep all of our citizens updated. We worked together as a community to

1 | pull through the pandemic.

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Since the pandemic started, Bethel

Park has had over -- or 2,700 COVID cases.

I'm happy to report that we have not had any deaths in the last two months. But we do have an occasional case every week.

The county today had four cases for the whole county. Yesterday, it had seven. So we're definitely in the right direction. As restrictions are loosened, we must not let our guard down. Continue to practice safe measures to keep yourself healthy.

Our financial situation is sound.

The municipal millage is at 2.78, including the fire department at .34. That's among the lowest in the county.

Our three bordering neighbors, South Park is at 3.06; Mt. Lebanon, 4.71 mils; and Upper St. Clair at 3.83 mils.

My last report, I mentioned some significant developments in redevelopments within the community. I'm pleased to report that this is an ongoing process.

And since the last report, we've seen the following: We have up at Cool Springs,

there's 65 townhouses being built up there in the near future. Bethel Pines plan of lots, which is behind the American Legion, there's 19 lots there. They're all sold. And there's actually five houses under roof. The new Duncan Donuts will be next to Ann's, which was the old PNC building.

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If anyone hadn't tried it yet,

Condado Tacos, up in South Hills Village,

opened, I believe, in March. And that's a

great place. We also have the Parkside

development right behind Papa John's.

For commercial, we have the Dream Greener Landscape on south -- or Route 88, right across from Hillcrest. And they're also building a Chase Bank next to the Firestone.

Recreation has become a main focus of this Council. We're in the middle of upgrading our neighborhood parks by adding playground equipment, plus making large capital investments in the larger parks.

We are currently upgrading Millennium

Park to have baseball/softball fields only.

Village Green is now a soccer/lacrosse field

with artificial turf. In addition, we've

added new playground equipment to these parks.

And Simmons Park was just upgraded two years

ago.

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And as you may have heard, we're in the preliminary stages of building a splash pad at Park Avenue. This should be completed sometime in 2020 [sic]. And we'll now have a recreation program for all ages.

Even though it was a pretty quiet 2020, we're still making progress on the 40 acres in partnership with Allegheny Land Trust that's located at the intersection of Connor Road and Route 88. So look for changes down there.

I believe that this Council and staff, we must continue to have the vision that Bethel Park will always be looking to the future. And it is our responsibility to walk the delicate line between development and protecting our residents and our neighbors.

So, Mr. President, it's my observation and my opinion that the State of the Municipality is strong in all areas. I think that it continues to go forward, and that we're positioned to adequately meet our

I just want to update everybody on the American Rescue Plan Bethel Park. Last week, we did officially get a letter from Governor Tom Wolf outlining that our maximum allocation will be up to \$3,385,525.66 from the federal government. Since Bethel Park has a population of less than 50,000, we will be receiving these funds through the state.

As mentioned in the past, we expect to receive 50 percent of the money in 2021 and the balance in 2022. In order to receive

these funds, you must register with the state, and there's documentation that we must submit.

Our Finance Director, Lisa Lapaglia, has submitted most of all the information needed. And if all goes well, we should be receiving our first allocation sometime in July.

We have not received official correspondence on how the money can be spent. We have been provided by our auditor what they believe to be the classifications.

And they are the following: Support public health response, address negative economic impact, provide government services to the extent of a reduction in revenue, provide premium pay for essential workers, make necessary investments in water, sewer, stormwater or broadband infrastructure.

The subcommittee will be meeting again in two weeks to review our current expenditure that were COVID related and review our finances. I will provide an update at next month's meeting.

As outlined in category 5, we will be spending about a quarter of a million dollars

Park renovations, which was pre-COVID two years ago, we actually -- Mr. Consolmagno and Mr. Christian arranged a neighborhood meeting to let the kids, the people that are using the parks, the ones that make the selection on the playground equipment.

We worked with two different suppliers, came up with two different options. So the kids got to pick what's going in at Miner's Park.

Obviously, last year with COVID -we'll be hearing this forever, I guess -- we
delayed everything from last year to this
year. And because of COVID, it was going to
be much more challenging to have a
neighborhood meeting.

So what each member of Council did was put a flyer out to the neighboring property owners to get their pick of the two options. It was kind of neat that a lot of the people wanted their kids to pick.

And I ran into one couple that -- they said, "Can we wait until this week --

until next week to get back to you because we have the grandchildren coming, and we want them to be part of it?"

We had an overwhelming response. And I'm happy to announce -- and these will be published on social media. On Oak Tree Park, the winning one was -- you can't see this, but we'll get these to you -- option one for those who participated. And for Birch Tree Park, the winning was option two. Which are both kind of interesting, they're more brown, woodsy kind of things, as people like to say.

And for option -- or, excuse me.

For Millennium Park, it was actually also,

again, option two. So we will be publicizing this.

We're going to get these ordered in, hopefully, the next 60 to 90 days, and get them installed in each of the parks.

One other thing that we did, tonight we had a -- before we came to the floor,

Council approved -- the Recreation Board came to us, as we're putting these trails in the community the parks. In particular, we did it over at Village Green last year -- two years

ago, I guess, pre-COVID.

And there's a walking track. So what the Recreation Board did was recommend that we put maybe some exercise equipment similar to what they have down at the park. So it will be some outdoor type of equipment. I think there's four pieces that will be stationed up at Village Green Park.

Council welcomed the recommendation from the Recreation Board. We will get that ordered. And, once again, that should be installed within the next 60 to 90 days.

I think a goal in our strategy overall is, you know, we talk about lot of things we do, but we don't do as much follow-up as what we need to do.

So, I know the Rec Board brought this up, and I know staff is working on it, improving our communications. So one of the things we're looking to do is a series on the neighborhood parks, what we've done.

Each park has its own identity. It's something a little different. So you won't find the same playground equipment in each of the parks. You'll find something a little bit

different.

And I will announce tonight that, look for in Oak Tree Park, Gaga Ball is coming. Now, you're going to have to look that up to figure out what Gaga Ball is.

But there will be a Gaga Ball court at Oak Tree Park in addition to the playground equipment.
