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The other thing is is I would like to share an announcement. I mentioned at the last couple Council meetings, but our Open

alarms. So, a rather busy month for us for a

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total of 52 calls.

House is going to be October 3rd from 11:00 to 3:00 p.m. at our main station on Brightwood Road, which is right down the street here by Bethel Bakery, for those of you not aware.

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We ask everyone to bring the kids out. We have -- we're going to have our fire trucks out. We're going to have station tours. We're going to have a plug -- we have a little talking fire -- fire hydrant that is remote controlled that we'll bring out. And the kids really love it. And we're going to have Sparky the Fire Dog.

The big thing is with Fire Prevention Week is October 3rd to October 9th. And, really, the theme this year is Learn the Sounds of Fire Safety.

To learn more about that you can go to NFPA.org, and make sure you got to the right link, click on the Fire Safety. But our Open House is going to be themed around that. So I hope to see everybody there.

Municipal Manager's Report, and Mr. Christian.

MR. CHRISTIAN: Members of Council, ladies and gentlemen, thank you so much. I'd just like to take a couple of minutes real quick and give you a quick update on Bethel Park, what's been going on for the last month, and some things to look forward to in the future.

Some of the things that we're working on here within the staff is we're -- we continually to strive to communicate with our residents. And to do so, we're looking at our social media and our subscriptions for our website.

So on that website you can see -- you can sign up for different subscriptions, how you like to communicate, whether that's with -- we can check on Facebook, we have our website text and email subscriptions. You can click on different -- different types of communications that Bethel Park can better communicate with you.

Some things, whether you know or not, Bethel Park was just recently in a movie. For the last week and a half, couple weeks, they were filming at our Community Center and other various locations around Bethel Park.

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So you can look for the movie called Cha Cha Real Smooth in theaters sometime in the next 12 to 18 months. It was an independent film. But, you know, we can get Bethel Park on the map a little more.

Recently, we had our Rev'em Up For Kids. We had 655 cars out there on display.

And an amazing amount of money, over \$11,000 was raised for it to help out for the kids.

Some of the things that are coming to a close is our Farmers Market, as it winds down to a close. It has been incredibly successful over the last several months.

We have had two second-round best in the different contests. One of them is the OR Best Farmers Markets are listed under the shopping categories. So it's called -- it's www.or-best.com. And if you look under the shopping category, Bethel Park Farmers Market can be found under that.

And as the Farmers Market winds down, the No Cook Tuesdays will begin again in October -- October 5, and every other Tuesday right after that over there at the Community Center. Come get some No Cook Tuesday, and the food trucks will be there plentiful.

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We just had some fitness equipment installed in Village Green. It's fabulous.

Our Public Works Department is installing the mulch right now. So those will be operational here in a couple of days.

And recently we had Saw Mill Run groundbreaking. That was an extreme restoration project that will begin in earnest. That's going to help that stream stay very well in the coming years. That project will work to stabilize the stream, mitigate erosion, and reduce sediment and nutrients in the Saw Mill Run.

This was our very first groundbreaking event for the new community engagement process we're doing. The next several of them will commence here. We're going to have one for Birch Tree Park, Oak Tree Park, and Millennium Park in the coming

1 weeks to months.

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We have a communication survey that
we are getting ready to roll out. This will
help us, as I spoke about the first part, help
us better communicate with our residents.
Right now, it's being physically with tablets
and paper at the Farmers Market and over there
in the Library.

A couple small things. One wonderful thing, the census results are back in. And Bethel Park continues to grow. We're up 3.9 percent. That is about 1,264 resident increase from the 2010 census, to a grand total of 33,577 residents in Bethel Park. So as we continue to grow, that is right along in line with the county.

One last thing -- or, actually, two last things. Community Day's upon us. It is back. Community Day will be held on September 25th from 10:00 to 3:00 p.m. at the Bethel Park High School. And after such a divisive and difficult 18 months, let's use this as an opportunity to rally around our community.

The Community Day parade will start

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right out front here at 9:00 a.m., and will go
right down from the Municipal Building. The

parade route is West Library, turns left on

Highland, to Bethel Church Road, to Church

Road, and then down Black Hawk Drive.
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And then one last final: Halloween is getting ready to be upon us here next month. With October coming, Halloween will be October 31st. We always -- we don't cancel it. We just recommended, highly encourage October 31st is the actual day of Halloween, from 6:00 to 8:00 p.m. We just recommend that one.

And don't forget, we got something coming up the day before Halloween. You might have remembered it from last year. But I'll -- I'll let the Mayor tell about that one here in his report.

But thank you so much. I appreciate the time.

be determined. They may -- they may -- or
probably will be a little bit different than
last year.

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And I was informed, also, that when they do the pumpkin painting, they won't make it in permanent paint this time. So if you live on a street that has a faded pumpkin, you'd better look for a new one because the faded ones really won't mean much.

And then speaking of Halloween, also, we're having our third -- third year for having our Halloween house decorating contest. So if you're interested in becoming a judge, call Janet Davin at 412-831-6800, Extension 211.

The invitation goes out to last year's winners, but they don't always come through, so we may need some judges. You can check with Janet on that.

And while you're on the phone with

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- Janet, our Fall Clean Up will be Saturday,

 October 23rd. So if you or you represent a

 group that might be interested in

 participating, we do all the supplying, and

 you just have to show up and help us clean our

 roads. So if you could call Janet at that

 same number.
- And, lastly, we're still planning on 8 9 doing our 90-plus luncheon. Things change 10 daily. But if you have someone or know 11 someone that is 90 years old-plus, call Janet. 12 They will -- she will in turn send out an 13 invitation. And then we look forward to having it. That will be October 9th at the 14 15 Community Center. So it's -- it's a nice 16 event, and it's been probably going on for 15 17 or 16 years.

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But the big thing is, as Laurence said, the Halloween parade. We got so many calls on it. It's certainly the biggest event that we've had since I've been around. And we look forward to doing it again.

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This meeting was held to pass a Resolution, as we are looking to refinance a bond issue. And part of the process is, we have to adopt the debt -- I believe it's a Debt Ordinance. And we give a target of minimum savings of two percent.

So if the markets are in the right position, the bond issue that we did from the Public Works Complex, we may be refinancing.

And you'll probably hear more about this in the future.

Two percent equates to roughly \$200,000 minimum savings that we're targeting. And we have selected to reduce our debt service, so the payments -- the amount will stay the same, just our payments each month or each year will diminish slightly based on whatever rate we do. So that will be upcoming. But that was a Special Meeting.

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On my street -- on my block, ten

houses -- or 20 houses, ten on each side, not one single person put any garbage or recycle out. Until about 7:00 in the morning, one of their recycle trucks came up the street real slow, then you saw all the neighbors running, putting their garbage out, dragging their recycle to the other side of the street because that truck wasn't going to do that trip again.

And I called Waste Management a couple times and got passed around, and asked for a supervisor that was there, to be told that everybody's working from home. It must have been a holiday or something.

I also called the Mayor, to find out that I wasn't the only person that called about this. And not from my area, but from other areas -- streets around there.

So I just would like that maybe when you go to negotiations, you have somebody that's bringing something to the table that's over 65 or so, that may be walks with a cane, and dragging that can up your driveway that goes like this (indicating).

Empty is a -- is a problem, and then

to get it out there on the wrong day or miss your collection. My garbage, then recycle, sat out for the full cycle. I wasn't bringing it back in again.

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So, that's all I bring, just that when you negotiate, that you think about the people -- since Bethel Park is getting older, that you think about the people that might have some issues with that.

I don't know what the background was, but we changed to Waste Management. The other service, you could put anything at the curb and they took it. This has to be specially wrapped and -- I don't know. It just seems like a whole lot of nothing.

So that's -- that's all. My name and address are at the bottom, my phone number, and an email address, if anybody has anything to say or wants me to help them in any way.

PRESIDENT MOURY: Thank you very much. We apologize for the inconvenience.

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3 She does have a driveway and a 4 garage. I don't know, you know, how many people are there. I don't care. My concern is the six cars in the cul-de-sac.

First off, the emergency vehicles, if there's a fire truck, an ambulance, or whatever, that has to come down, police, they're going to have a tough time.

Right now, the garbage trucks have a difficult time picking up the trash and getting around the cul-de-sac due to the cars that are parked there. I mean, some of those buggers are really big, the trucks. It takes them sometimes 20 minutes to pull back, pull up, pull back.

I am here to request either a zoning change, or at the very least have several "no parking at any time" signs to be placed there to replace a "private driveway" sign, which is obsolete and does not pertain to driveways, because there's none there.

In the winter, the large salt trucks, snow plows have a nearly impossible task of

clearing -- clearing the snow and salting the road due to all the parked cars.

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Last winter, when the snow plow finally made its way out of the cul-de-sac and up the street -- I'm like the fourth house up -- I had the job of cleaning the snow off the street in front of my driveway. Because after jockeying around all those cars, the guy, I guess, was just wanting to get up the street.

It's also difficult for delivery trucks, grass-cutting vehicles with their equipment and trailers in tow to manage.

Finally, over this past weekend, I spent several hours riding through various

Bethel -- I'm sorry -- various areas of Bethel that had either dead ends or cul-de-sacs, of which there are many. Some of them had "no parking" signs, some did not.

Out of all these, a maximum of three streets are dead ends had only one car parked there. The rest of the dead end cul-de-sacs had no cars. Some had signs, some did not.

But this is really a -- it's more of a nuisance than anything else. It's -- it's

dangerous. And I think it's impeding other

people's rights. So, I was always taught your

rights end when they start going into

everybody else's rights. Thank you.

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PRESIDENT MOURY: Thank you.

I'll -- I'll quickly address. We'll have the police go up and look to see if it becomes a safety issue.

Historically, with "no parking"

signs, we like to ask the residents to maybe circulate a petition in -- even in stop signs, making sure everybody in the neighborhood's comfortable with it. And then you can present it, send it to the manager, and then we can do it, if that's the wish in the neighborhood.

We would normally ask the police to look at it, and then we can potentially put "no parking" up under the manager's 90-day clause. Thank you.

opportunity here to maybe make some changes.

I think the property owner has done a lot with the developments there. I think one of the things we believe will happen is, if this zoning does go through per the PennDOT, a lot of the parking that is currently on Broughton Road that's perpendicular and on Route 88 will probably go away as part of this.

They need more internal parking, I think, to make that facility, which started this whole process, that have they park- --

they don't have adequate parking to handle what they have. So while they didn't show us any plans and we didn't approve anything, the concept behind it was, how do we get more additional parking on that site?

We also talked about, informally, even stormwater management. Months ago, we talked about, down at the Walmart/Giant Eagle plaza, that they were coming in piecemeal, and they weren't doing the total site for any stormwater management.

Well, if this is rezoned, even if it's not, during the development process they're going to be forced to do re- -- stormwater management, which will help the neighbor- -- neighboring properties below and, really, the businesses below.

Having said all that, I think we have one opportunity to do this. Two-thirds of it's already zoned some form of commercial.

Part of it is not. And we're going to be changing it all to general commercial.
