PRESIDENT MOURY: Okay. We have no Chair Announcements this evening.

At this time, I would like to turn to the Reports of the Officials; and the Library Director's Report.

MS. McINTOSH: Good evening. My name's Christine McIntosh. I'm the director of your Public Library where we provide opportunities to explore, learn, create, and connect.

First, I want to thank -- say a thank you to all those who participated in our Fourth Annual Bethel Park Fantastic Four Golf Charities -- Golf Outing.

So if you sponsored -- were a sponsor of the event, if you were a golfer, a volunteer, or you donated a raffle basket, a big, big thank you.

We had 104 golfers and a fun time on

a very beautiful Monday day. The net profit of this event was just over \$19,000. So that was divided equally among the four charities, which are the Community Foundation, the Educational Foundation, the Historical Society, and the Library. And each organization -- organization received \$4,700 and -- \$4,753.

That was one -- one event that the Library participated in during the month of September for Love Your Library month. The Library raised an additional \$15,080 through direct donations, raffles, and special sales.

Funds raised by all libraries in Allegheny County during the month of September are eligible for a prorated match through a \$200,000 match pool generally provided by the Jack Buncher Foundation.

So, just to be clear, this is not a dollar-for-dollar match. But, historically, the match has been about 25 cents on the dollar. So that will mean an additional \$3,700 for Bethel Park Library.

We have some classes and events coming up. And I wanted to remind everyone

that masks are required while in the Library regardless of your vaccination status. Of course, those with a medical condition or those under the age of two are exempt. And masks are required during all classes and events.

For adults, we have a few really fun things coming up. Preventing Identity Theft on Wednesday, October 13, at 6:30 p.m. We have our annual Haunted Hat Tea on Friday, October 15, at 11:00 a.m. There's still a few spots left for that. But we need to know pretty quickly for -- because we provide lunch.

We have the author of Haunted Roads of Western Pennsylvania coming on Wednesday, October 20, at 6:30 to tell some spooky stories from his book. And we have How Money Works on Tuesday, October 26, at 6:30 p.m.

For our little ones, we do have Story
Time two times a day, five days a week. And
we're trying something new this fall. We're
doing Library Play Dates. So on Mondays
through November 1, from 10:00 a.m. until
noon, for those ages one to three with a

caregiver. You can come and join other families for free play and sensory exploration with stations prepared by the Library staff.

For our elementary age kids, we have a program called Compare and Contrast Military Footlocker, which will be held on Thursday, November 4, at 6:30 p.m. for grades three through six.

Representatives from Soldiers and Sailors Museum will be here and will focus on a solider's life with comparisons made between the Civil War, World War I, World War II, the Korean War, Vietnam War, and Desert Storm.

The adults is welcome to stay as well. It sounds like a very interesting class.

For teens, we have Fear Factor on Thursday, October 28, at 6:30 p.m., where teens in grade seven and up will come and compete in challenges. The person with the highest score will win a \$25 Amazon gift card.

We do have Teen Lounge hours every
Tuesday and Thursday from 3:00 to 5:00 p.m.
So you can come and enjoy some snacks, get
your homework done, play a game. The Teen
Lounge is always open. But during these set

Coming up in November, it's our favorite time of year in the fire service. It's change your clocks, which also means change your batteries in your smoke detectors and CO detectors.

Obviously, it's a built-in reminder.

We like to use that as a constant reminder.

Whenever you change your clocks forward or backwards, we recommend changing your batteries in your smoke detectors and CO detectors.

And one other thing. The weather will eventually get colder. We check -- we ask now that -- now's a good time to get your furnace serviced and have, you know, any other appliances, whether it be a chimney, have it checked and make sure it's working properly, and there's no cracks that can create incidents as the weather does turn cooler -- colder.

MR. CHRISTIAN: Council, thank you so much.

I just want to take a couple minutes and brief the public on a little bit of reports of what's happened on -- last month.

I normally like to introduce employees. But we have no new employees to introduce today. But what I'd like to do is just give a quick update on some initiatives.

You heard me talk about our sustainability certification. And the Municipality has been looking for new ways to innovate, conserve resources, and reduce costs. To that end, we have received our level Sustainable Pennsylvania Community Certification. This is a voluntary performance recognition program to help municipalities reach sustainability goals.

I am proud to say that Bethel Park has achieved gold certification, one of only 50 communities in Pennsylvania. And we will

continue to improve. And we're looking to
achieve platinum certification, which will put
us as one of only ten communities in
Pennsylvania. This will be a great
distinction. And we want to keep moving
forward with this.

over the last several -- the last month, we had done several groundbreaking events. The first one started with the Saw Mill Run stream restoration project, Birch Tree Park's new playground and stormwater management project, Oak Tree Park's new playground and stormwater management project. And this Friday, we will conduct another groundbreaking event at Millennium Park.

At each groundbreaking local -groundbreaking event, local residents have
been invited to come out, talk with the
officials, learn more about the respective
projects.

The new playgrounds are really coming along, and especially Birch Tree Park is actually wrapping up installation right now.

It looks awesome. The kids are going to love it.

As soon as they get done with Birch

Tree Park, the contractor will immediately

move over to Oak Tree Park and begin that

installation. That -- as soon as they're done

with Oak Tree, they're going to jump right

over to Millennium. We're going to do our

groundbreaking on Friday.

If you would like to know more about these projects, our project information is posted on our project site, along with the information on the Municipal website, blog, Facebook page, and BPTV's YouTube channel.

I want to talk a minute about the budget and our strategic plan. The staff has been working tremendously developing the 2022 budget and the strategic plans.

The preliminary capital and general budgets have been posted. And this evening Council conducted the first of several budget meetings with Municipal staff. We're using a new format for the budget that allows for greater transparency, readability, and should provide for a better user interface for our residents.

The strategic plan will be adopted

alongside the budget at next month's Council meeting. We have taken feedback from key partners and stakeholders to help develop to the Municipality's path going forward into 2022.

Due to COVID, the number of participants was reduced. But we do look forward to a more robust group in future years.

The website. As you've seen, our website is making leaps and bounds over the last 12 to 24 months. But it still lacks in user interface and resident recognition. So I've asked the staff to look at the website. And, specifically, our project manager, he's going to conduct a complete overhaul and reorganize our website to provide a better experience for all of our site visitors.

As most of you know, we just completed our Communications Survey. This was a really under- -- in-depth undertaking. And we allowed our residents to provide us that feedback in either a written form, an online survey either at the Community Center, the Farmers Market, and at the Library.

Well, we got the results and we are tabulating them. And this will let us know how our residents receive information and for how best to get information out to them.

So and, finally, closing, as we bid farewell to our very, very successful Farmers Market. We ranked No. 2. We're up one from last year. And we have one more to go. We're going to -- we should receive the results here in late October. I'm hoping for a first place finish on that one.

But as we -- as I said, as we bid farewell to our Farmers Market, we say hello and welcome back to No Cook Tuesdays. I'm a fan. So please get on out there, the middle community -- the Community Center parking lot and the playground and partake in No Cook Tuesdays.

That will continue from 4:00 p.m. to 7:00 p.m. each Tuesday until November 23. So head on out there. A list of the vendors will be at -- will be posted on the recreation page each week so you can know exactly what to get.

And whereas, under Nora's leadership, the system remains financially stable and operates with a positive ledger balance requiring no funding from the Municipalities' tax bases.

- The first item is the Consent Order.

This has been going on for a few years. A third of Bethel Park is in the ALCOSAN watershed. As you probably read in the paper, they have been -- the DEP and the EPA has mandated improvements in the ALCOSAN system.

2.3

And since a third of Bethel Park flows into this system, you know, we're -- we're required -- it's highly recommended that we sign on to the Consent Order.

And I'll summarize it by saying, the Consent Order is a mandate that you invest money to take water and ionide (phonetic) infiltration out of the sanitary sewer system.

So if we sign it, we're going to spend money. And if we don't sign it, we'll probably spend more money. Because the regulators are the ones that negotiating this. The ACHD is actually the Allegheny County Health Department.

This is a long-range plan. We met with the authority a few weeks ago. They have been working much more diligently than, you know, from what we have because they kind of control it.

So the first one is the Consent

Order. The next two are tied to it, but more indirectly. They are Transfer Agreements.

2.3

As part of the regionalization of ALCOSAN, they're taking over the main trunk lines, one being Saw Mill Run, which runs into Bethel Park at Route 88. And the other one is the McLaughlin watershed or interceptor, which actually runs to Bethel Park from Upper St. Clair.

If we sign and do the transfer over to ALCOSAN, they then will be responsible for any upgrades or any work needed to be done on that, on either one of these interceptors.

If we don't sign on it, they could mandate that the Municipality does it.

Essentially, we -- it's a regionalization plan.

If we do vote to turn these over, it really means that ALCOSAN is going to come back and at some point do some projects in those two areas. We're still going to be required as part of this agreement to continue to do additional work in the watershed.

So there's three separate items.

They're kind of all tied together indirectly.

But, once again, we don't have a lot of choice.

MR. O'BRIEN: Wow, we've been at this a long time. This Council and the Municipal Authority has worked very hard at this, like the Councils and the Municipal Authorities in the past.

And sometimes things get under your skin. And this kind of gets under my skin, because a Consent Order is an unfunded mandate. And the only thing that we have to pay for it is the sewer rates.

And we took a stand a long time ago in understanding that we needed to do something. And the Authority and Council had a wonderful approach with plans in place. And we understood that if we don't start now, the cost later will be tremendous.

Other communities kind of just put their head in the sand and waited for tomorrow. The one that really gets me in this is the McLaughlin Run. We always knew there

were problems. If you drove up McLaughlin Run Road on a hot summer day, you knew there were problems.

2.3

So we -- we are at the top of that watershed. And we were asked -- we were asked to do certain things. And we met and we exceeded those benchmarks. And, once again, even with that in mind, we are receiving a Consent Order or a mandate or an unfunded mandate.

And that just is just -- I just think people need to have explanations. And the body that does the majority of the work is the Municipal Authority.

And I know I'm going to put John on the spot here because he is the vice chairman of the Municipal Authority. If he doesn't mind, on the spur of the moment, to come up and explain -- or give us an update, an overview of the status.

I think it's necessary, at least for me, because I've been in this for such a long time, to explain and just give us an update of what kind of money and what the update --

We did far more than any other community did, a lot by far, and we have to be credited for that. And I want to make sure Bethel Park is treated fairly. And that would be our only sticking point.

So coming up in -- our next meetings in October, we're going to be going over that and voting on it, and talking more about it.

We do have to sign it by the end of October.

But that will be my views on both.

But I definitely -- I definitely want to make sure that, you know, Bethel Park's treated fairly and we get credit for all the
