2 (Commencing at approximately 7:30 p.m.)

3 PRESIDENT MOURY: Okay. I'd like  
4 to call to order the Regular Council Meeting  
5 of March 14, 2022.

6 Mr. Christian, would you please  
7 call the roll.

8 MR. CHRISTIAN: Dr. Campbell?

9 DR. CAMPBELL: Here.

10 MR. CHRISTIAN: Mr. Cenci?

11 MR. CENCI: Here.

12 MR. CHRISTIAN: Mr. Consolmagno?

13 MR. CONSOLMAGNO: Here.

14 MR. CHRISTIAN: Mr. Espinar?

15 MR. ESPINAR: Here.

16 MR. CHRISTIAN: Ms. Flinn?

17 MS. FLINN: Here.

18 MR. CHRISTIAN: Mr. Janosik?

19 MR. JANOSIK: Here.

20 MR. CHRISTIAN: Mr. Moury?

21 PRESIDENT MOURY: Here.

22 MR. CHRISTIAN: Mr. Oakes?

23 MR. OAKES: Here.

24 MR. CHRISTIAN: Mr. O'Brien?

25 MR. O'BRIEN: Present.

1           PRESIDENT MOURY: All members of  
2 Council are present.

3           At this time, could we stand for  
4 the Pledge of Allegiance.

5           (Whereupon, the Pledge of  
6 Allegiance was recited.)

7           PRESIDENT MOURY: Okay. At this  
8 time, I would like to turn to Chair  
9 Announcements.

10           An Executive Session of Council was  
11 conducted on February 21, 2022 for personnel  
12 items.

13           Another Executive Session of  
14 Council was conducted tonight before we came  
15 out, on March 14, 2022, for personnel items  
16 and legal issues.

17           At this time, I would like to turn  
18 to the Reports of the Officials; and the  
19 Library Director's Report.

20           MS. McINTOSH: Okay. Good evening.  
21 I'm finally here in person.

22           My name's Christine. I'm the  
23 director of your public library, where we  
24 provide opportunities to explore, learn,  
25 create, and connect.

1           This is the time of year where I  
2     have to submit an annual report to the  
3     Office of Commonwealth Libraries in  
4     Harrisburg on the state of the Library's  
5     finances and activities.

6           So there's just a few things I  
7     wanted to share with you. One in three  
8     Bethel Park residents have an active library  
9     card. An average of 29 people visited the  
10    library per operating hours. That's almost  
11    300 people per day. Not quite back to  
12    pre-pandemic levels, but we're getting  
13    there.

14           The average library cardholder  
15    checked out 27 items in 2021. And the  
16    library hosted 745 classes and programs last  
17    year, with an average attendance of 14  
18    people per class. However, if you came to  
19    any of our Storytimes in the Park last  
20    summer, we had 80, 90, 100 people at some  
21    time -- at some of them.

22           It is tax season. The library does  
23    have tax forms, but we have a limited  
24    number. We have the PA-40 individual tax  
25    form and instructions and the 1040, 1040-SR

1 federal forms and instructions. We do not  
2 have any schedules this year. They're just  
3 not sending them. But we will be able to  
4 help you navigate the appropriate website  
5 and print them, if you need them.

6 The library is not a site for tax  
7 preparation. It hasn't been for the last  
8 two or three years now. And nearby sites  
9 have limited, if any, appointments  
10 available. The closest to us is the Bible  
11 Chapel in McMurray.

12 And I'm happy to announce that,  
13 finally, the Allegheny County Library's  
14 mobile app will be launching on March 29.  
15 The library mobile app is compatible with  
16 Apple iOS and Android.

17 You can download the app from your  
18 Play Store. You'll be searching for  
19 "Allegheny County Libraries." And then once  
20 you download the app, you can choose "Bethel  
21 Park Public Library" as your home library,  
22 and attach your library card to the app or  
23 you can search the catalogue place holds.

24 You will have a digital library  
25 card, so you don't have to show us your

1 library card every time. You just pull out  
2 your phone.

3 You'll have the opportunity to sign  
4 up for our monthly e-newsletter. And the  
5 best part, it has a self-checkout feature.  
6 So if you don't want to talk to any of our  
7 lovely staff, you can check out your items  
8 on your own.

9 And we are adding a new type of  
10 item to our collection. We will be having  
11 mobile hotspots beginning March 21. We have  
12 ten mobile hotspots available for you to  
13 borrow for three weeks.

14 A hotspot is just an easy-to-use  
15 wireless access point that connects your  
16 wifi enabled devices to the internet. So,  
17 your tablet, your laptop, if you don't have  
18 a data plan with them, which I don't on  
19 mine.

20 Borrowing and using the hotspots  
21 are free with your library card. You have  
22 unlimited data for the duration of your loan  
23 period. And up to ten devices can be  
24 connected simultaneously. The more devices  
25 you have, the slower it runs, though.

1           And the hotspot will work anywhere  
2           in the United States. It's covered by the  
3           T-Mobile network.

4           We have a fundraiser coming up,  
5           Party in the Park, on Saturday, April 23,  
6           from 4:00 to 7:00 p.m. at South Park  
7           Theater. There will be hors d'oeuvres,  
8           beer, wine, soft drinks. We have live music  
9           from a string quartet.

10           There will be a short performance  
11           by the Children's Theater performers, many  
12           raffle baskets, a 50/50. There will be  
13           children's activities that will be led by  
14           the library's youth services staff.

15           The event will culminate with a  
16           ribbon cutting ceremony for the theater's  
17           new patio that was funded through a grant  
18           from the Bethel Park Community Foundation.

19           Tickets are \$40. Children 12 and  
20           under are free. Tickets are available at  
21           the library, at the South Park Theater, Evey  
22           Hardware or from the library's website.  
23           Proceeds benefit the library, South Park  
24           Theater, and the Bethel Park Community  
25           Foundation.

1           For information on the numerous  
2           upcoming classes and programs for children  
3           and adults at the library, check out the new  
4           edition of the Chronicles that you should  
5           have received recently, visit the library's  
6           website, sign up for our e-newsletter. It's  
7           monthly. It will let you know what's going  
8           on that month. Or come and see us in  
9           person.

10           That's all I got.

11           PRESIDENT MOURY: Any questions?

12           (No response.)

13           PRESIDENT MOURY: Thank you very  
14           much, and welcome back.

15           MS. McINTOSH: Thank you. Glad to  
16           be here.

17           PRESIDENT MOURY: At this time, can  
18           we turn to the Police Chief's Report; and  
19           Chief O'Connor.

20           CHIEF O'CONNOR: Mr. Mayor,  
21           Council. Mr. Vice President, like your tie.  
22           Chief here, everybody.

23           Well, Crime Watch is back in swing.  
24           I want to thank the postal service for  
25           sending us an inspector for our March



1 meeting to talk about mail fraud. It was  
2 very enlightening.

3 Our next Crime Watch meeting is at  
4 7:00 p.m., April 4, that's a Monday, at the  
5 Community Center. And we're working on  
6 getting a speaker for that, too. So we hope  
7 to see you there. If you cannot be there,  
8 you follow us on social media.

9 You know, we have 15,000 people  
10 that follow us. That's way more than  
11 Mt. Lebanon PD. That's because they can't  
12 afford the internet connection, paying their  
13 taxes over there.

14 And if you can't do that, and  
15 you're going out for the St. Patrick's Day  
16 to a bar, have a safe, sober, and happy  
17 St. Patrick's Day. Ciao.

18 Questions?

19 (No response.)

20 PRESIDENT MOURY: That's a tough  
21 act to follow. I have no questions.

22 At this time, can we turn to the  
23 Fire Chief's Report.

24 MR. USELMAN: Council, Municipality  
25 of Bethel Park, my name's Rob Uselman. And

1 I'm the Assistant Chief with the Bethel Park  
2 Volunteer Fire Company. And I'm glad I get  
3 to follow Chief.

4 Anyways, our incidents for February  
5 of 2022: We had five structure fires, four  
6 gas leaks, one CO incident, two electrical  
7 conditions, 11 good intent calls, one assist  
8 police, three odors of smoke, 18 fire  
9 alarms, and one CO alarm, for 46 total  
10 incidents. It was a rather busy month for  
11 us.

12 One thing I would like to bring up  
13 is, while we've out and about in the  
14 community running our incidents, a few of  
15 our apartment complexes that we visited on  
16 incidents, we've noticed some things like  
17 doors open to stairwells, doors open to  
18 laundry rooms.

19 We ask, if you see that and you  
20 live in an apartment complex, please close  
21 those doors. Those are fire-rated doors.  
22 They're there for a purpose. They're  
23 supposed to be closed.

24 The main purpose of that is, if  
25 that door's closed and there's an incident

1       there, it actually slows the spread of the  
2       fire and the smoke in these facilities.

3               So we ask all residents who live in  
4       these multi- -- multi-person dwellings,  
5       please, if you see one that's there, close  
6       it. If it's not working properly, notify  
7       your building manager or maintenance so they  
8       can repair that. And if need be, call us if  
9       you're having issues with them and we'll get  
10      it to the right authorities.

11              So, it's a big safety concern for  
12      us. We noticed it over the past few months.  
13      So we just ask that people watch out for  
14      things like that.

15              And, finally, it is -- if everybody  
16      didn't notice, we sprung forward this past  
17      weekend. So we ask all residents as a  
18      reminder, change your batteries in your  
19      smoke and CO detectors. It's a good way to  
20      do it. When we fall back in the fall, we  
21      say the same thing; change them again.

22              And one other thing I'd like to say  
23      since spring is hopefully here soon, knock  
24      on wood, we ask people to do some spring  
25      cleaning. And one thing we do by that is,

1 your laundry rooms and your dryers, make  
2 sure you clean out your lint traps and your  
3 lint hoses because that can build up and  
4 cause a fire.

5 So, just get some spring cleaning  
6 on. If you can't do that yourself, you  
7 know, there are companies out there that do  
8 that for you, and you can pay them and  
9 everything will be good.

10 And if you have any questions, feel  
11 free to reach out to the Fire Department on  
12 Facebook or email us or call the station and  
13 leave a message.

14 That's all that I have.

15 PRESIDENT MOURY: Any questions  
16 from Council?

17 (No response.)

18 PRESIDENT MOURY: Hearing none --  
19 thank you very much -- can we turn to the  
20 Municipal Managers Report; and  
21 Mr. Christian.

22 MR. CHRISTIAN: Members of Council,  
23 Mayor Allen, thank you so much. Appreciate  
24 it. This is the best part of my job that I  
25 get to do right here, right now, introduce

1 new employees.

2 So if I could have Tom Miller and  
3 Lindsey Sibert come on up here, please.

4 So where do I start? Absolutely.  
5 Okay.

6 So we're going to go ahead and  
7 start with our Farmers Market Coordinator.  
8 This has been fantastic. We are going to  
9 take the Farmers Market to the next level.

10 I'd like to introduce Lindsey  
11 Sibert. She moved to Bethel Park in 2015.  
12 She has -- is married with three boys. So  
13 there's a lot going on in that family.  
14 She's currently PTO president for Ben  
15 Franklin Elementary School.

16 And you've been going to the  
17 Farmers Market for many years now. And  
18 Lindsey's background, organizational skills  
19 experience, really have kind of led us to  
20 this point in time where we think, truly,  
21 have found a gem.

22 And you're going to lead us to that  
23 next level. And we are so happy to bring  
24 you on board. So thank you so much for  
25 accepting our offer of employment. And we

1 are looking forward to the Farmers Market  
2 for the 2022 season. Thank you.

3 MS. SIBERT: Thank you for the  
4 opportunity.

5 MR. CHRISTIAN: Do you want to say  
6 anything?

7 MS. SIBERT: I said, thank you for  
8 the opportunity. And I can't wait for this  
9 upcoming season. I'm excited.

10 MR. CHRISTIAN: Awesome. Thank you  
11 so much. Appreciate it.

12 (Applause.)

13 MR. CHRISTIAN: All right. The  
14 next introduction is for Tom Miller. Tom  
15 Miller comes to us as an internal hire  
16 promotion for our Assistant Director of  
17 Public Works.

18 Tom has a load of experience. He  
19 is the right person at the right time to  
20 come in there and help us with our Public  
21 Works Director, Susan Dolinar, right there.  
22 So, Tom will be her number 2, working in  
23 that department for many years.

24 Tom has a wealth of experience  
25 working for the town of Harbor Creek for

1 over 20 years, and then before moving to the  
2 private sector for well over a dozen. So  
3 what he brings to us in experience,  
4 knowledge, and passion as well.

5 He has been married for over 40  
6 years. And they've got four children.  
7 You've been a Bethel Park resident for seven  
8 of those. And so we are so happy to bring  
9 Tom on board and bring him to be Susie's  
10 number 2 right there. So it's really going  
11 to take that department up. So we are so  
12 grateful.

13 So these two individuals are really  
14 looking for great things. And we're just so  
15 happy to bring them on board. Thank you so  
16 much for everything. Appreciate it.

17 (Applause.)

18 PRESIDENT MOURY: Okay. At this  
19 time, can we turn to the Mayor's Report, and  
20 Mayor Allen.

21 He didn't steal all the good stuff  
22 tonight.

23 MAYOR ALLEN: I was ready to check  
24 them off though, so...

25 Good evening, everyone. I just

1       have a few items tonight.

2               I wanted to mention, and I do a  
3       couple times a year, we have our 90-plus  
4       luncheon in October of every year. And this  
5       past weekend we lost our oldest member.  
6       Mrs. Kappa was 104 years old. So she's been  
7       with that luncheon for the last 14 years.

8               Military banners, I just wanted to  
9       do one more plug on that. If you're going  
10      to order a banner, you have to have them in  
11      by the end of April. And that would be  
12      pushing it, actually.

13              Replacement banners are \$60. All  
14      you have to do if you need a replacement is  
15      let Hiya know here. And it's already in the  
16      system, so all you have to do is send a  
17      check in for \$60 and you're ready to go and  
18      get a new banner, which should last about 10  
19      years.

20              It's not too early to think about  
21      spring cleaning, especially after today. If  
22      we had this meeting on Saturday, we probably  
23      would stay away from the spring comments.  
24      But that will be April 23. We'll talk more  
25      about that next month.



1           But if you contributed before, your  
2 group contributed, just keep that date in  
3 mind because we're ready to go again.

4           I also want to thank the residents.  
5 We had two monumental or big snowfalls in  
6 the last 30 days. And Susie would attest to  
7 that. But, you know, I appreciate everyone  
8 listening to the messages that we send out.  
9 And I noticed just driving around that a lot  
10 of people did heed that. They kept their  
11 cars in their driveway. So we certainly  
12 appreciate that. So that seems to be  
13 working.

14           No Cook Tuesdays, you missed it  
15 today, but today they had lobster. But  
16 they --

17           UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: Tomorrow.

18           MAYOR ALLEN: Oh, you didn't miss  
19 it. Well, if you don't like lobster, they  
20 have meatballs only. So lobster and  
21 meatballs. Now I know where to go for  
22 dinner.

23           And they'll be running through --  
24 well, it's 4:00 to 7:00 through April 26th.  
25 And I'm thinking that the Farmers Market

1 takes over right after that, so...

2 Okay. And that's the -- that's the  
3 report I had this evening. So thank you  
4 very much.

5 PRESIDENT MOURY: Thank you very

7 At this time, could we turn to the

1           At this time, I would like to turn  
2           to the Residents' Comments section for  
3           non-agenda items.

4           And we have one email that  
5           Mr. Christian will read.

6           MR. CHRISTIAN: This is from Tamara  
7           Wauchope. "Dear Representative, I'm writing  
8           to request a possible hearing before the  
9           City Council regarding the prospective  
10          pickleball courts in Millennium Park.

11          I'm cognizant that the Council has  
12          heard appeals regarding proposed courts  
13          before, and that Council advised the  
14          attendees that these courts would be  
15          considered or revisited in the future.

16          We're aware that the junior ball  
17          field, the playground, and additional  
18          walking paths that have been added to the  
19          park, which, by the way, are very lovely.  
20          The extra turf adjacent to the new junior  
21          ball field looks like a sufficient amount of  
22          property to consider the earlier proposed  
23          pickleball courts.

24          As representing many in the  
25          community that are very interested in seeing

1       these courts installed in said real estate  
2       within Millennium Park, we'd be more than  
3       interested in having this considered and  
4       heard before the City Council sometime in  
5       the near future.

6               I'd appreciate your feedback with  
7       this inquiry request, and look forward to  
8       your kind reply.   Sincerely, Tamara  
9       Wauchope, Bethel Park resident."

10              PRESIDENT MOURY:   Thank you,  
11       Mr. Christian.

12              Are there any other residents who  
13       would like to speak?

14              (No response.)

15              PRESIDENT MOURY:   Hearing none --

16              I'll quickly comment on the  
17       pickleball courts.   We had applied for a  
18       grant this year.   It's roughly 1.1 million,  
19       I think, is the estimate.   We appropriated  
20       approximately 600,000 of the capital budget  
21       for 2022.

22              We did not receive the grant that  
23       we hoped to.   We are going to reapply and  
24       include it in our 2023 budget.   And,  
25       hopefully, whether we get the grant or not,

1       there's a will on Council to move forward.  
2       And that will be discussed during the budget  
3       process starting in September.

4               So we didn't forget about it. It's  
5       not going to go away. But we're going to  
6       continue to work on it.

7               Okay. At this time, I would like  
8       to turn to General Policy and Finance; and  
9       Dr. Campbell.

10              And I don't believe we had any  
11       residents signed up to speak.

12              DR. CAMPBELL: No. No, sir.

13              Mr. President, I only have three  
14       items under General Policy and Finance.  
15       Much better than last month.

16              The first item is for Joint Bid for  
17       Solid Waste Collection, Removal and Disposal  
18       Resolution.

19              I move that we approve Resolution  
20       No. R-3-14-22A in order to participate in  
21       the joint bid for waste collection with  
22       SHACOG.

23              MR. OAKES: Second.

24              PRESIDENT MOURY: There's a motion  
25       by Dr. Campbell and, I believe, second by

1 Mr. Oakes that we approve Resolution No.  
2 R-3-14-22A in order to participate in the  
3 joint bid for waste collection with SHACOG.

4 Any discussion of this item?

5 (No response.)

6 DR. CAMPBELL: Mr. Moury?

7 PRESIDENT MOURY: Dr. Campbell.

8 DR. CAMPBELL: This resolution is  
9 for Bethel Park to participate and  
10 coordinate through SHACOG, the South Hills  
11 Area for Council of Government, to -- for  
12 garbage removal. It's not a really sexy  
13 topic, but it's so important for every  
14 single one of us.

15 It's for us to make a bid  
16 collectively with other South Hills  
17 communities so we can get the best possible  
18 rate. And sometimes you just get a better  
19 rate if you bargain with a lot of other  
20 municipalities.

21 PRESIDENT MOURY: Thank you,  
22 Dr. Campbell.

23 Any other discussion?

24 (No response.)

4       of next year.

5                 Dr. Campbell.

6                 DR. CAMPBELL:   Our second item,  
7       Mr. President, Municipal Code Bid Threshold  
8       Ordinance.

9                 I move that we approve Ordinance  
10       No. 3-14-22A per the Finance Director's  
11       Memorandum dated February 24, 2022.

22       Pennsylvania Department of Labor and  
23       Industry is asked to publish changes and the  
24       base amounts that are required to trigger a  
25       bid.   And these bids are necessary for

1       certain contracts.

2               For 2022, they propose using the  
3       Consumer Price Index, which has increased to  
4       5.4 percent. So we need, as a Council, to  
5       reflect that change in the Municipal Code by  
6       ordinance.

18 quick things. The first is the splash pad  
19 that we've been talking about and planning  
20 for the last few years.

21 Unfortunately, a little bit due to  
22 COVID, and the bigger part of it due to the  
23 state and going through the grant approval  
24 process, we were hoping to be under way with  
25 the bidding process now to be installed and

1 open sometime in midsummer.

2 Unfortunately, the grant we had  
3 has to go through a review with the state.  
4 We submitted the initial paperwork  
5 approximately eight months ago. We're  
6 waiting for approval from the state budget  
7 office. What they do is require a lot of  
8 information from us that we have the ability  
9 to pay and do all this.

10 So we're still in the process. It  
11 could take us as long as another year.  
12 We're not sure. But we will keep everybody  
13 apprised. At this point in time, our goal  
14 would be to get this done and open,  
15 hopefully, if all goes well, in the summer  
16 of 2023.

17 The second thing is, you hear a lot  
18 about this on the news about redistricting.  
19 Bethel Park is also, based on the census  
20 data, required to do a redistricting.

21 What we did is to set up a  
22 subcommittee of Council. Dr. Campbell's  
23 chairing it with Mr. Consolmagno and  
24 Ms. Flinn will be the Council  
25 representatives, and the Chairs of both the

1 Bethel Park Democratic Committee and the  
2 Republican Committee will also participate.

3 There's a balance you need to do.  
4 And based on the preliminary numbers, there  
5 may be two wards -- one or two wards that  
6 may need to be adjusted.

7 The only parameters Council gave  
8 the subcommittee was two things: First is  
9 to minimize the impact to the residents.  
10 You have to be within 1 percent up or down.  
11 So we don't need to balance every ward out  
12 to be the actual same number. Number one,  
13 we want to minimize the impact on the  
14 residents.

15 And the second is, not to look at  
16 any demographics or political affiliation.  
17 Strictly use the numbers and balance it  
18 using the numbers.

19 They were the two directives. The  
20 committee has met. They're working with  
21 staff. They're going to be proposing to  
22 Council because we ultimately have the final  
23 say on it. But I'm sure there will be a  
24 hearing and information probably by  
25 midsummer.



1           It won't go into effect probably  
2           until the end of this year. But I just  
3           wanted to let everybody know that we're  
4           working on it and the parameters we set up  
5           to the subcommittee and who's participating.

6           Are there any additional items?

1           The second motion is for  
2     Telegraphis Landscape. We went with this  
3     project of having landscapers come in after  
4     the roads have been paved. And they've done  
5     an excellent job in the past, so...

6           And the last one is to have our  
7     roads repaved this year. Again, they were  
8     bid out, and this company has the lowest  
9     base bids.

10          So, the roads aren't arbitrarily --  
11     or are arbitrarily paved. We just don't  
12     have Council people calling Susan, asking  
13     her to pave a road. These things are done  
14     through a program that checks all of our  
15     roads and details out how they should be  
16     paved. And rural roads are deteriorated the  
17     most.

11 retaining wall re- -- wall placement in the  
12 rear of the property at 1009 Millennium  
13 Drive for the following conditions -- with  
14 the following conditions.

15 MR. OAKES: Second.

16 PRESIDENT MOURY: There's a motion  
17 by Mr. Consolmagno, second by Mr. Oakes that  
18 we approve the retaining wall placement in  
19 the rear of the property at 1009 Millennium  
20 Drive with the following conditions.

24 this motion. It's been some discussion.

25 We've all got an engineering report. We've



1 had a hearing.

2 And I think in order for me to  
3 approve this, I think it should have just  
4 one more addition to it based on all the  
5 history of it.

6 So I'd like to amend the motion to  
7 say, I approve the -- I move that we approve  
8 the retaining wall placement in the rear  
9 property at 1009 Millennium Drive with the  
10 following conditions: That the owner agrees  
11 to indemnify the Municipality from any  
12 liability resulting from the issuance of the  
13 permit, which agreement shall be recorded.

14 DR. CAMPBELL: Second.

15 PRESIDENT MOURY: There's a motion  
16 to amend the motion on the floor that we  
17 approve the retaining wall placement in the  
18 rear of the property at 1009 Millennium  
19 Drive with the following conditions: That  
20 the owner agrees to indemnify the  
21 Municipality from any liability relating  
22 from issuance of the permit, which agreement  
23 shall be recorded.

24 Real quick. This is a real  
25 backstory here. The resident was wanting to

1 put a wall up in an area where we had some  
2 water problems in the past. Initially they  
3 were turned down by our staff. And then  
4 they requested a public hearing, which we  
5 held at our last committee meeting.

6 And to Mr. O'Brien's comments that  
7 we learned a lot of information. We got a  
8 report from the resident. A resident down  
9 below actually came and testified on behalf.

10 So we're -- took the motion. We  
11 amended it. So if there are -- they're  
12 saying there's not going to be any water  
13 problems or any issues in the engineer's  
14 study we got.

15 This will hold harmless agreement  
16 to indemnify the Municipality. It protects  
17 all of us so if there are any future  
18 problems, that, you know, we can go back to,  
19 potentially, the engineer or whoever did the  
20 study.

21 So I would be supporting this  
22 motion as amended.

23 Any other discussion?

24 MR. O'BRIEN: Mr. Chairman?

25 PRESIDENT MOURY: Mr. O'Brien.

1                   MR. O'BRIEN: I'd like to thank  
2     Council for the conversation and willingness  
3     to, you know, look beyond and understand the  
4     past and look to the future and try to come  
5     up with a -- I think this amendment does  
6     that. It accomplishes everything we've  
7     tried -- that we're trying to do here to  
8     allow the resident to get the wall and  
9     protect the residents down below, and take  
10    in consideration our engineer's concerns.

11                   That's all, Mr. President.

12                   PRESIDENT MOURY: Thank you,  
13    Mr. O'Brien.

14                   So at this point, can we vote on  
15    amending the motion as read by Mr. O'Brien.

16                   Mr. Christian, would you please  
17    call the roll.

18                   So this will be to amend it. And  
19    then we'll have to vote on the amended  
20    motion, if it passes.

21                   Mr. Christian, would you please  
22    call the roll.

23 conditions: That the owner agrees to  
24 indemnify the Municipality for any legal --  
25 for any liability resulting from issuance of

1 the permit, which agreement shall be  
2 recorded.

3 So if this is successful tonight,  
4 the Municipality would develop an agreement,  
5 and it would be included as part of the  
6 building permit process when the resident  
7 comes in to build the wall.

8 Is that correct, Mr. Solicitor?

9 SOLICITOR: A condition.

10 PRESIDENT MOURY: Okay. It will be  
11 a condition of getting the permit.

12 Okay. Any other discussion?

13 (No response.)

14 PRESIDENT MOURY: As Mr. O'Brien  
15 said, we wanted to do something to protect  
16 the neighbors up top and the ones below. We  
17 wanted to make it work. But we also wanted  
18 to make sure that if anything happens  
19 outside of what the engineer's report got,  
20 we wanted to make sure that we were just  
21 covered for everybody involved.

22 Mr. Christian, can you please call  
23 the roll on the motion as amended.

18 amended has been approved 9-nothing.

19 And for the resident, we will be  
20 drafting up the agreement over the next few  
21 days, so you can communicate with staff on  
22 getting your building permit. And they  
23 should have the agreement. But we just  
24 discussed it this evening, so it will take  
25 them a couple days to come up with the

1       agreement.

2                   Okay.   Mr. Consolmagno, you spent  
3       all our money, you amended a motion, what do  
4       you have left?

5                   MR. CONSOLMAGNO:   I have one -- I  
6       have no other items under Public Works and  
7       Maintenance.

8                   But I just want to congratulate our  
9       Public Works Department for doing an  
10      excellent job with the snow removal.   I know  
11      that sometimes when that snow comes, it's  
12      not at the best time and, you know, you guys  
13      are constantly on the job, you know, 10, 12,  
14      16 hours.

15                  And I want to officially say that  
16      winter is over, so you can, you know, park  
17      the trucks and start with the ball fields.  
18      But, thanks, you did a great job this year.

19                  PRESIDENT MOURY:   I just want the  
20      record to reflect if it snows again, it was  
21      Mr. Consolmagno --

22                  MR. CONSOLMAGNO:   No.   I officially  
23      said it's over.   So if it comes, it's on  
24      you.

25                  MR. O'BRIEN:   Mr. Chairman.

1 PRESIDENT MOURY: Mr. O' --

2 MR. CONSOLMAGNO: Thank you.

3 PRESIDENT MOURY: Mr. O'Brien.

4 MR. O'BRIEN: I have one. It's  
5 kind of an informational thing.

6 Some time ago in Bethel Park, in my  
7 ward, we had some landslides on private  
8 land. And it was difficult. We went to  
9 every coordinated effort, politician you  
10 want to call, and there just wasn't anything  
11 out there to help keep with landslides.

12 And people in the City of  
13 Pittsburgh and all over Pennsylvania are  
14 dealing with this due to many different  
15 items, maybe because of the rain, too much  
16 rain, saturation of properties.

17 I just want to give you some  
18 information. In that time period,  
19 Consolmagno -- Joe -- Council Consolmagno  
20 and I went to a conference in Harrisburg.  
21 And we made it our duty -- and then Tim  
22 Moury joined us the following day -- to  
23 reach out to as many state representatives  
24 that we could to -- and have other  
25 individuals from all over the state join our



1 concerns.

2 And I've been staying on track of  
3 it for a very long time. And there's been  
4 hardly any movement, but still some  
5 conversations.

6 So I'm glad to announce that the  
7 legislators in Harrisburg have listened.  
8 And I want to thank Natalie -- Natalie  
9 Mihalek for reaching back out to me.

10 There is a House Bill 1054 designed  
11 to establish special insurance to assist  
12 homeowners affected by landslides. Now,  
13 it's still just the bill's in the house, so  
14 I'm not sure exactly what's in it. But  
15 facing in Harrisburg as Councilmen from our  
16 lone Bethel Park, people do listen.

17 And I want to thank Mr. Moury and  
18 Mr. Consolmagno for joining me in that  
19 cause. So thank you.

20 That's all I have, Mr. Moury.

21 PRESIDENT MOURY: Thank you,  
22 Mr. O'Brien.


