I would like to turn to the Reports of the Officials; and the Library Director's Report.

MS. McINTOSH: Good evening. My name is Christine. I'm the director of your public library, where we provide opportunities to explore, learn, create, and connect.

Summer Reading is in full swing for both youth and adults. So if you haven't signed up, you still have a chance to do so. It will run through the end of July.

There's two library services I wanted to tell you about this evening. The first is the RAD Pass. The RAD Pass provides Allegheny County residents ages 18 and older with access to free -- or discounted passes to cultural

attractions in our region with a library card from any Allegheny County Library.

So you can access the website at Radpass.org; that's R-A-D-P-A-S-S dot org. So you'll log in with your library card number and your pin. You can browse for passes by date or by venue and then make a reservation. You can print or download your passes to your mobile device, and bring it with you to the venue.

Passes are not transferable. So the cardholder who made the reservation must be present to be admitted. If you need a library card, you can register online at the RAD Pass website or stop in at the Library.

So all four of the Carnegie museums are part of this and some of the Cultural Trust venues. You're not going to get tickets to Kinky Boots, but you might get tickets to the drum and fife corps.

And then Experience Kits, thanks for our partnership with the Heinz Center

Affiliates Program and other Allegheny County

Libraries were offering free admission for up

to four people to a number of museums and

1 historical sites around the Pittsburgh area.

So our kits this year include, for 2022, the Heinz History Center, Fort Pitt Museum, Meadowcroft Village, Duncan and Miller Glass Museum, Historic Fort Steuben, Merrick Art Gallery, Old Economy Village, Somerset Historical Center, and the West Overton Village and Museum.

And then each kit also comes with access to educational information, itinerary ideas, and other fun content through a virtual experience card.

So it's this size (indicating). It's the size of a piece of paper. It's laminated and has a barcode on it. You take it to the site. They'll scan it. They'll give it back to you. And then you return it to the Library.

They do go out for seven days. They cannot be reserved. So it's first-come, first-served. But you can call the Library ahead of time for availability. And then come visit us to find your next adventure.

And then finally, The Friends of the Library is rejuvenating. And so they're

having a Meet and Greet in the Library

Courtyard on Thursday, June 16th, at 6:00, and then again on Wednesday, June 22nd, from 10:30.

So The Friends are a volunteer organization that advocates and promotes the Library as a vital community asset. They host events, raise funds, and advocate for the Library at the local and state level, with the goal supporting the library services outside of what we're able to do with our regular operating budget.

Benefits of being a Friend include early notification and access to events, special Friends-only activities, and comradery as well.

If you can't make the June dates, I know they're planning on hosting another Meet and Greet in July. And then there's a membership form available from the Library's website.

MR. BEESON: Thank you.

Deputy Fire Chief for the Bethel Park

Volunteer Fire Company. I'm here to give you

the report and stats for the month of May.

My name's Russ Beeson. I'm the

In the month of May, we had two building fires, two vehicles fires, two brush fires, one assist EMS, one vehicle extrication, five gas leaks, two CO incidents,

five electrical equipment issues, one power
line down, two smoke investigations, three
assist the police, five good intent, two
hazmat investigations, 19 fire alarms, and two
CO alarms; totaling 54 calls for the month of
May.

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On June 6th, just last Monday, at 7:00 a.m., we received a call for a house on fire with possible entrapment, people on the roof. Police, Fire, and EMS all responded to the scene within minutes.

Police confirmed that there was a working fire and that there were people trapped on the front porch roof. A local neighbor brought a ladder. Two of our fine police officers climbed onto the roof of the porch.

One of residents that lived in the home was unconscious and still hanging out the window. Police officers pulled the unconscious person out of the window and onto the roof. The one conscious resident was assisted down the ladder. And the unconscious resident was carried down the ladder by Assistant Chief Rob Uselman, who's usually

1 here giving the report.

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The residents were passed off to Tri-Community South EMS, where they were transported to the hospital.

We're happy to report that we talked to friends of the -- the friends of the homeowners. The conscious victim was released last week. The unconscious victim is now awake at the hospital, still recovering.

It's important to know, and we would like to stress the importance of closing doors. Okay? When you go to bed at night in your room, close your doors. I know it traps air flow and everything else, but it is a lifesaving step that you take.

If you go out of a door in a fire, make sure you close the door behind you. What that does is stop the flow of air. It stops the fire from growing, okay, and it gives us more time to get there and do the things that we need to do.

The other important tip for this week

-- for this month is surge protectors. Watch

what you have plugged into them. You don't

want to plug appliances into them. Anything

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with a high-volt draw and anything with a
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     high-current draw, they need to be plugged
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     directly into the outlets, not surge
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     protectors and not extension cords. All
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     right?
               So if you have your appliances and

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     plugged into the house outlets that are

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I just want to bring up -- I'm not sure if anybody is aware that a business had purchased the house in our neighborhood,

Passavant Memorial Homes. And as one of the residents, we're just concerned if everything was done properly in the way they acquired the home.

Are they in the proper zone that they're supposed to be in? And I just want to see who all is aware of this. And -- just because this is a neighborhood where we're having a lot of turnover in a good way; a lot of families moving in, a lot of children moving in.

And the reason for that is it's a quiet neighborhood. And no one ever moves out of it because it's such a great neighborhood. So now the only reason for the turnover is due to age.

And now we have a business moving into the neighborhood that we're a little bit concerned about. There's some unknowns. And I just wanted to bring it to the attention of

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1 anybody.
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And if anybody has a comment back on this, I'd be glad to hear it. Thank you.

if the zoning is not applicable here, I would respect -- request respectfully that our elected officials enforce the zoning rules properly, because we have to follow those rules when we want to get a permit to build a shed or whatever.

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I'm also a realtor. I've sold homes in this direct neighborhood. I know that as of maybe six or seven months ago, I had the highest sale house in that neighborhood at 342,000 for a four-bedroom. So exactly my neighbor's comments. That house sold for 440,000 cash.

It was -- it was renovated and flipped. But that is a huge increase in the purchase. It was actually listed at 385. So they paid -- no, I'm not good at math on the spot. But that's a significant overpay for the house.

So I would like to know what single-family residential zoning means in our Municipality and if this applies.

I'm sorry. If you'd like to come and state your name and address for the record, please.

MS. CARPER: My name is Lisa Carper.

I live at 3315 Appel Road. And my initial meeting with Robert Hicks and Kirsten Primm was on Tuesday, May 3rd, at 10:00 a.m., to discuss Passavant Memorial Homes, 242 Lisa Drive.

Kirsten informed me that the township's rules would be to put out a bright-colored sign on the property, and those residents 500 feet away would be notified. The sign will be there for so many days, and then a board hearing -- meeting hearing will be scheduled for residents to attend.

On Friday, May 6th, I left a voice message on Kirsten's phone, asking for weekly updates regarding this situation. She never returned my call or -- or emailed me until June 2nd, when I asked for the zoning codes and regulations.

I said, "You never got back to me with any updates." She said there were no updates to give me.

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On Tuesday, June 7th, Kirsten Primm sent me an email at 10:44 a.m., "This will be a single-family dwelling that will be no more than three people living in the home, and, no" -- the word is no -- "full-time nursing care."

June 7th, at 12:30 p.m., the neighbor called employee Kelly, asking to remove the tree. It's now June 7th, at 3:07. I called employee Kelly. I asked what was going on at Lisa Drive. She said she had no knowledge what was going in there.

I called around and said, "You just spoke with the neighbor at 12:30, and you knew exactly what was going in there. So will this home will a 24/7 care home?" She answered, "Yes."

I immediately went back to Robert

Hicks in the hallway at the Municipal Building
to inform him this conversation. Vince Kelly
was there as a witness. I asked Robert if I

could make a three-way call so he could

listen. He said no. He said he would make
the call. I asked if I could be there on
three-way call, and he said no. He will call,
but not today. I asked if he would let me
know when he calls, and he said yes. This was
Wednesday, June 7th, and there was no phone
calls back.

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Attorney Andrea Parenti and others keep trying to bring up the Fair Housing Act.

Andrea reminded me that she is an attorney. I said, "Then you should know this is not a Fair Housing Act, but a zoning law issue."

Mayor Jack Allen told my son, Casey Carper, who resides on Lisa Drive, the R-2 zoning there will never change.

So I would like to address as well with Ms. Andrea, the attorney for Passavant, I made a phone call with her, and she also answered, "Yes, this will be a 24/7 facility."

The next day, on June 9th, I asked her another question. And she said she is now looking into this, and some of the homes are and some of the homes are not. And I said, "Well, that's funny because yesterday you told me yes, and so did your employee, Kelly,

state, yes, this will be a 24/7 facility." So according to Ms. Kirsten, she said this will not be a 24/7 facility.

Thank you.

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PRESIDENT MOURY: Thank you.

MS. TAGGART: My name is Mary Taggart. I live at 255 Lisa Drive.

My concern is for the children and grandchildren in the community. We're hearing that there's three grown men with behavior issues. We don't know because nobody's ever spoken to us. It's more -- it seems like it's just been a secret type of thing. And that was my concern.

The group home is going to be on the cul-de-sac where all the children play, where -- where the home is situated. So I'm concerned about that, what type of people are going in. I'm -- I'm worried about the safety.

1,500 feet away is an elementary

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school. Are we safe? Can you guarantee our safety? I don't know that you can. But that's -- that's my worry.
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Where are they from? What type of issues? How severe are the issues? That's -- that's my main concern.

I have a little granddaughter that I watch. And I just want to make sure it's safe for everybody because we do have a wonderful community that's safe. You can go out at any time. You can leave your windows open and your doors unlocked. But that's my -- my worry.

PRESIDENT MOURY: Thank you.

Are there any other residents that with like to speak?

(No response.)

PRESIDENT MOURY: Okay. Hearing none, I'll just ask our Solicitor if he'd like to comment.

You know, the Passavant Homes acquired this home. We were alerted over the last week or so, Council was. It's pretty much a normal process with staff.

I will say up front that we have at least six of these type homes in the community already that are -- that are operating. And the way we handle it -- and Bob will speak to the Fair Housing Act -- that we handle with the neighborhoods if there's issue through code enforcement, through police, if there's anything different that's going on, if there's any problems, for the most part, everything's been remedied.

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I think the first home that I'm aware of probably opened 15 years ago. And a lot of concerns, you know, that we all had, and we just continued to monitor them from a code enforcement and a police perspective.

We've had a couple parking issues, things like that, that have been remedied by the manager of the properties.

So, Bob, can you briefly talk about?

SOLICITOR McTIERNAN: Yeah. Just

briefly, I would like to say that this issue

has come up in Bethel Park a number of times.

And I faced it many times in my practice. I'm

actually briefing the issue for another

Municipality before the Commonwealth Court

now.

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And one thing I've learned is when people purchase their homes, their concern is their investment, and, as one of the residents mentioned, their children, their families.

These are natural concerns. And, you know, they're not taken lightly no what the level of the law is.

My understanding, and I can defer to the Planner, is that the current use with the three adults is a permitted use under the zoning law. But one of the things -- and this is always a little counterintuitive. It's been argued many times -- it doesn't matter who owns, even if it's a business or a nonprofit or a hospital.

The ownership of the facility is not important to the courts. It's the use. And the United States District Court, and the Circuit Courts, and the Supreme Court have held repeatedly that residents -- unrelated residents who are disabled, physically or mentally, have the right to live in an R-1, R-2 Residential zone in a typical -- as a family would live.

So even though they're not related, even though they might have some special needs, they do have that right. And the issue has been litigated over and over again. And it's simply the state of the law now.

I wrote my first opinion letter in

Bethel Park on this issue, I hate to say how

long ago. And, most recently, I wrote one in

2014. So this issue does come up.

As Mr. Moury said, the way it's been dealt with is -- I think one of the things that's been good is there's some communication between the residents and Passavant just to get a comfort level of what the use of the home will be.

I think staff will continue to monitor it. The mere fact that some services are provided does not necessarily make it a personal care home.

And, again, I've dealt with a lot of cases where we've made the argument that there were a lot of people who are moving in and out every two -- you know, in large groups or they have a hospital-like environment. That's not appropriate for an R-1.

But the mere fact that there might be a visiting nurse or a staff member come in is not significant to the courts any more than a visiting nurse visiting someone in your own home would necessarily remove it as being a residential use.

So the law is strict. One of the reasons we're careful and -- is because if you are subject to sue the United States District Court on one of these issues, Fair Housing Act, Americans With Disabilities Act, United States Rehabilitation Act, if the Municipality loses -- which when the law's well-established, we will lose. I hate to say that -- we're responsible for the plaintiff's attorney's fees. And I can tell you, once that matter goes to federal court, it will be 50,000 if it's a nickle.

So one of the things we try to avoid is just sort of fighting uses that are, you know, so well-established that a judge is going to look at us and say, "Don't you own any law books, Mr. McTiernan?"

You know, so the way we try to deal with it is, I think, communication with the

owner is very important. Communication with the public. Some of the issues that were raised are things that in the past have been dealt with very effectively by the Chief.

Just to make sure, you know, there's no disruptions.

In general, there haven't been problems. But where there are in other communities I've worked in, the police were able to deal with it very effectively.

If there's a code violation,

Passavant is every bit as responsible for

maintaining that property and making sure

everything is taken care of as much as you

are. And if you do take care of your

property, then they're going to be expected to

do it as well.

So that's essentially the state of the law. And so we can continue to communicate and monitor it. There might -- I don't know what the hearing you're referring to. There might be a variance here with respect to the number of residents in the house. But I think that's the current state of the law.

What was proposed is a 10-by-20-foot billboard, double-sided. It's electronic, not far off the road from that bend on 88 down by Sheetz.

And I felt that the Applicant -- they gave -- they submitted to us mock-ups of the size of the -- the size of the sign. And I felt that the mock-up they gave us was exceedingly disingenuous. Certainly, it did not seem to be proportional or fractionally proportional to the sign of the -- the size of the proposed sign of 10 by 20 foot.

I specifically asked also the Applicant at the time of the hearing to give me some sign -- comparably sign -- sized signs

that I can go visit in the area. It was suggested down in Castle Shannon that one of their billboards, near the intersection of Castle Shannon Road and 88, that that was one of their signs. When I went there, that sign was half the size of that of which was proposed.

Since then, the Applicant did not get back to me with any suggestions for other similarly sized signs. I've had no correspondence with them since then.

I, since then, drove every major road in Bethel Park, all the major arteries that transected Bethel. And the largest billboard I could find was a 5-by-10-foot sign, half that of the proposed sign. It was one-sided and not electronically illuminated. Nothing else is comparable. Nothing was as large in Bethel Park.

I think this would be, in my opinion, the proposed billboard is two-sided, at the bend of the road would very distracting, and not consistent with the demeanor, the culture, the vibe of Bethel Park. And as such, I will vote no for this.
