Just a quick quest- -- or comment on the agenda. For those of you that are here tonight, Item F, the 2023 Salary Ordinance under General Policy and Finance has been removed from the agenda.

At this time, I would like to turn to Chair Announcements.

Executive Session of Council was held on October 24, 2022 for property acquisition and personnel issues; and tonight, before we came out, November 14, 2022, discussed personnel issues.

At this time, could I turn to the Reports of the Officials; and the Library Director's Report.

MS. McINTOSH: Good evening. My name's Christine. I'm the Director of your

1 Public Library, where we provide opportunities to inform -- excuse me.

Okay. Sorry.

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So this time of year library programs and classes are slowing down, winding down for the year. In fact, Storytime is on hiatus until December. So I thought I'd take a moment to brag about your Library and tell you some of our accomplishments.

The Bethel Park Public Library is a Pennsylvania Library Association Gold Star Library. The Pennsylvania Library Association's 21st Century Literacies Initiative called PA Forward encourages Libraries across the Commonwealth to provide classes and programs for youth and adults based on five key literacies: So it's Basic, Information, Civic, Health, and Financial Literacy.

To become a PA Forward Star Library, a library's required to submit documentation of incorporating these five key literacies into their programming and communication, and then that's reviewed and verified by a committee of peer librarians.

The PA Forward Star Library program awards a Bronze, Silver, and Gold Star to a library as it adapts and integrates the initiative's core values.

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So Bethel Park Public Library achieved Gold Star status at the end of 2017, and has offered classes and programs each year to retain this status.

The Bethel Park Public Library is a Family Place Library. Family Place Libraries are a network of children's librarians nationwide who believe that literacy begins at birth, and that libraries can help build healthy communities by nourishing healthy families.

The Family Place Libraries network currently includes 250 library sites in 25 states, and continues to grow every year.

A proven change agent, Family Place
Libraries transforms libraries into community
centers for early literacy and learning,
parent education and engagement, family
support, and community connectivity, helping
to ensure all children enter school ready and
able to learn.

To become a certified Family Place
Library, the children's librarian and the
library director must attend a week-long
intensive training program, and then implement
and maintain early literacy classes, programs,
and provide a play environment.

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We welcome you to come into the Library and explore our play space. We have blocks, puzzles, puppets, dress-up clothes and more for children to learn through imaginative play, as well as early literacy classes and early intervention resources.

Bethel Park Public Library has been a Family Place Library since 2011.

Bethel Park Library is an Inquire
Within Library. Inquire Within is an exciting
collaboration between WQED and neighborhood
libraries. It's an impactful out-of-school
program which is designed to encourage family
engagement and a love of learning through
hands-on, family-centered activities.

Libraries participating in the Inquire Within have PBS-themed programs that support 21st century learners by building a community that leads and sustains a new

approach to educational media.

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Young learners will gain STEM and early literacy skills through Inquire Within classes and programs for ages 3 through 11.

Bethel Park Public Library has been an Inquire Within Library since 2016.

And then finally, our Library is the 2022 Pennsylvania Library Association recipient of the Trustee of the Year Award.

This award has been given out since 1986. And it's presented to a public library trustee in recognition of outstanding leadership and service to library development at the local system district and/or the state level.

In September, our Library Board

Trustee, Andy Amrhein, received this

prestigious award. In 36 years of this award,

only one other winner was from Allegheny

County, and that was in 2006. So not is it a

big -- only a big win for the Library, but for

the county as well.

So, that's my moment of bragging.

And just an announcement, the Library will close at 5:00 p.m. on Wednesday, November 23rd, and will be closed on Thursday,

Russ Beeson, Deputy Fire Chief, here on behalf of Dave Gerber to give you the October summary.

For the month of October, we had seven structure fires, two vehicle fires, one mulch fire, three gas leaks, one oil leak, one electrical condition, one call-out for traffic control, six good intent calls, one smoke investigation, 17 fire alarms, and five CO alarms, for a total of 45 calls for the month of October.

So we are remaining around 45 to 50 calls every month for your 100 percent volunteer fire company, so...

Going into the holidays, like Chief said -- we don't have anything as fun and exciting as he had -- but a couple things to keep in mind.

With Thanksgiving coming, if you're going to deep fry your turkey, make sure the deep fryer is out far enough away from the house, on a stable platform, and you follow all the safety precautions. I can't tell you how many house fires we've had due to turkey

fryer incidents.

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With the weather and everybody
wanting to decorate, if you're getting a live
tree, make sure that you're keeping it
watered, make sure that you're checking all
your lights, make sure that there's no frays,
nicks, marks or anything in your lighting.
Believe it or not, that causes a lot of fires.

And the last one was candle safety.

You know, it's that time of year, we all like that nice, warm glow of a candle. If you're going to have a candle, I encourage you to try to use it if you're --- if you're using it in your decorations, try to use an artificial one.

The fake ones with batteries, they work, they last, and they're safe. If you're using a real one, never leave it unattended, keep it out of the reach of kids and pets.

Just have a safe holiday.

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The lows can be associated with the ever-increasing cost of supplies and materials, and the continued frustration with supply chain management, and noticeable absence of labor.

our neighborhood parks.

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As we emerge into 2023, the challenges we face will require a balance between fiscal restraint and responsibility.

To achieve that balance we must maintain the level of service and amenities that Bethel Park has become known for while ensuring we obtain the best value with taxpayer dollars.

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To facilitate this, the Municipality may need to pause key Capital Projects until this time of uncertainty has passed.

What we're going to go over here is a General Overview, and then the major funds that we have within the Budget. So we'll get right to it.

The Municipality is committed to providing a level of service and amenities to the residents of Bethel Park while maintaining accountability through fiscal responsibility.

In 2023, we will maintain the current millage rate of 2.4 mills for municipal purposes and .34 mills for the Bethel Park Volunteer Fire Company on each dollar of assessed value. We are also happy to report that there will be no increase of utilization fees in the Sewage Fund.

The total Municipal Budget this year, including carry forward, is \$71,712,597. The General Fund consists of 47 percent of that

budget. The Sewage Fund consists of 32

percent of that budget. Capital Projects is

18 percent. The Fire Department is 2 percent.

And Liquid Fuels is less than 1 percent of the overall budget.

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Some of the adjustments that have been made since the Public Hearing held on October 24th are under the General Fund. We added an additional Public Works employee wages and benefit.

We updated a Public Safety Contract
Services budget for Deer Management. And we
updated the Recreation Special Project
Challenge Grant Budget.

In association with that, we made changes to the Capital Projects Fund to remove the cost of subcontracting Storm Sewer CCTV, removing the cost of outsourcing municipal sidewalks, and we adjusted the Industrial Park Loop from the 2023 Capital Budget to the 2024 Capital Budget.

There are no changes to the Sewer Fund, the Fire Department Fund or Liquid Fuels.

Okay. This is a slide that shows the

General Fund Revenues. There's a slight increase of 1.4 percent due to real -- due to the increased assessed values of the real estate, and also an increase in grant funding for the Act 205 pension from the state based on eligible employees.

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The largest revenue categories are Enabling Tax, which consists of earned income tax, deed transfer tax, and sales tax.

The overall expenses increased approximately 1.7 percent due to contractual obligations in the Collective Bargaining Agreements and the realignment of items based on historical data and renegotiation of lease items.

You could see that Public Safety is our largest singular department for 31 cents per dollar spent on that department. Then we have 20 cents due to -- an Inter-Fund Transfer per dollar due to Capital Projects. And this number could vary due to grant funding and adjustment of projects as we move through the year.

Public Works is at 13 cents per dollar. And all other departments run between

- 7 and 8 cents per dollar. Last, we have Debt 2 Service that is about 3 cents per dollar.
- And insurance costs are about 2 cents per dollar.

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This just is a major category

breakdown, where we're showing that Salary and

Wages are approximately 40.9 percent of the

Total Budget; General Expenses, which consists

of supplies, postage, training, dues are 21.7

percent; Employee Benefits are about 18.1

percent; Utilities are about 13.5 percent, and

Debt Service and Insurance; Debt Service is

3.4 percent and Insurance are 2.4 percent of

the Overall Budget.

This slide simply shows that during the -- this budget period we are increasing or have increased our personnel by five employees. These departments are Public Works, Recreation, Public Safety, and Cable Access TV.

The Sewer Fund Budget has an increase of less than 1 percent based on no utilization fees. And the expenses are increasing about 3.2 percent. And that is primarily associated with contractual obligations and debt service.

The next fund we have are Capital Projects. This is probably the fund that everybody is most interested in. The most anticipated Capital Project for 2023 is the Splash Pad project.

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With the combination of grants, fundraising, and allocated reserve funds, the Municipality is excited to get this project under way. We are looking at about 40 percent cost in infrastructure, 38 percent cost in parks, which includes splash pad and pickleball courts, buildings and grounds is about 9 percent.

And other programs are -- all programs in the Capital Projects are road programs, stormwater compliance, police vehicles, and Public Works equipment.

The next slide is a breakdown of where the source of funds to fund all these projects. You can see that we have some carry forward from the 2022 Budget.

And then we have General Fund transfers and different funds; American Rescue Funds, Liquid Fuels, Sewage Funds that also fund these Capital Projects.

In summary, we anticipate that our fund balances -- I'm sorry. We anticipate that our Fund Balance in the General Fund will be about 13 percent, which this is subject to change based on grant funding and Capital Projects.

We will maintain a Sewage Fund balance of 94 percent as compared to annual expenses. And we are required under the Home Rule Charter to allocate .34 mills to the Fire Tax Fund.

This fund is slightly higher in 2020-- we anticipate it being slightly higher in
2023 due to the fact that we had the Capital
Renovation of the Clifton Road Fire Station
that we were unable to accomplish due to the
rising costs of labor and materials in 2022.

Liquid Fuels and -- Liquid Fuels

does not maintain a fund balance. This

allocation by the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania
is used for the Municipality to fund street

lighting and signals, winter maintenance,

commodities, and the purchase of Public Works

vehicles.

The last slide is just a comparison

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of our Neighboring Communities. As you can

see, we are not -- we actually are the lowest

millage rate-wise. But as far as the cost per

resident, we are not the lowest as the cost

per resident, but we are right down at the

bottom. So this is just a comparison to show

how we compare to the neighboring communities.
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In closing, the information contained in the presentation was prepared and based on actual expenditures and historical data. This is an estimated spending plan for the upcoming year with accountability through fiscal responsibility.

As stated previously, there will be no increase in the Municipal millage rate and no increase in utilization fees in the Sewage Fund.

The 2023 Adopted Budget will be available for public view on the Municipality's website at www.bethelpark.net/finance.

And every fall since then, they charge -- the U.S. Department of Education charges the Secretaries of Education from across all 50 states to nominate schools to be awarded the Blue Ribbon.

There are two criteria that they're looking for. The first is exemplary performance or exemplary closing of the achievement gap.

And the schools then complete a thorough vetting and analysis process, and complete a very detailed application to share with the secretaries our credentials, our qualifications that distinguish us for the award. And the U.S. Department of Education selects the awards based on your submissions.

So on November 4th, the celebration was held in Washington, D.C. The Secretary of Education presented to Bethel Park. This is

just the 37th high school in Pennsylvania.

After you do the math, that's 40 years of awards. Bethel Park High School is just the 37th high school in Pennsylvania to win the National Blue Ribbon award for high achievement.

The high school was there among 297 schools from 45 states across the country.

And I should add at this point, too, this was not our first. This is actually the third Blue Ribbon award that Bethel Park has earned. Independence Middle School has won the award twice previously.

So as Superintendent, I recognize and respect the old saying that it takes a village to raise a child. And so I believe this award is shared with all of Bethel Park, that whole village that we call Bethel Park:

The exemplary academic performance of students year after year, the exemplary performance of teachers still doing their thing or have long since retired, the exemplary performance of elected officials in positions of authority like you, Council, or our school directors, the exemplary

performance of parents for raising these amazing children, and, of course, exemplary performance of an awesome administrative team.

So I come here tonight to share the honor with you and thank you for supporting the hard work of raising children in the 21st century of Bethel Park. It's through your work of thorough deliberations, thoughtful deliberations, many actions to improve the Municipality, our village, that we can accept this Blue Ribbon for all of Bethel Park.

I also want to say that we've come to trust, support and really value the wayfinding that the Municipality has provided to me and my team as we've taken over the school district, and we really appreciate that strong collegial relationship that's been developed.

So from a proud and grateful Superintendent, thank you.

The 2023 Budget's been the result of many, many months of preparation, extensive work. And as Lisa alluded to a little bit here ago, I'm quite pleased to mention that we don't -- don't -- we have a budget that's neutral.

We're not going to have to increase taxes in 2023. There will be no increases in the sewage rates either. And the Budget of the Municipality includes a wide variety, as we saw, of vibrant capital projects and community service endeavors.

We're even expanding, like, some of our parks programs, some our parks work, roadwork refinishing projects, yet we're still able to maintain a very healthy and robust fund balance and capital reserve.

We're seeing some of the fruits of our investment in infrastructure, for instance, in our IT program. So we're really

grateful for Drew's efforts with that, and the modernization of it, and more effective use of our Municipal employees.

2.3

For instance, previously we'd have to outsource projects like sidewalk repair, construction, or video camera'ing of our sanitary lines. We have Municipal employees who are trained in that and skilled in that, so why not keep that in the house? It just makes it so -- so much more sense. We can do it better and do it cheaper.

So I wish to thank our Finance
Director Lisa Lapalagia for all of her great
efforts. I want to thank all our Municipal
administration, Laurence Christian and his
admin team. I would really thank also the
director heads and the employees who had a lot
of input into the planning of this Budget.

It's huge. We heard it, it's 7.19 million dollars. That's huge. You know, that's -- that's a priceless thing that we really need to manage responsibly and effectively and efficiently.

And I also want to thank the Municipal Council. I put them through a lot
