So I was with 26 other women -regional women leaders who served their
communities, their corporations, and the
government, and was so incredibly honored.

And I've got my parents here tonight.

My mom and dad, who are both heavily involved in the American Legion Bethel Park Post 760.

My dad was the adjutant, also serves on the Honor Guard. My mom's in the Women's Auxiliary.

And so our deep love of community -- and they live in South Park. Don't tell anybody.

But my deep love of community and helping through service through my work, because I do consulting and serve my clients, and service to my community, have been

MAYOR ALLEN: Also, I want to mention that -- of course, Rachel did -- but Rachel's dad, Tom Aul (phonetic), he was actually up here probably eight years ago because he's a great part of the Honor Guard that does ceremonies at the cemeteries for any veterans.

And they've done hundreds and hundreds since you were here last time. So thank you again for doing that.

The next thing I have -- this came across my desk. And I said, rather than me trying to figure out exactly what it is, I would bring up Lindsey Sibert, who's in charge of the Farmers' Market.

Tell us a little bit of what's going on at the Farmers' Market, plus you have a new program, and that's why we brought you here.

So thank you for coming.

MS. SIBERT: Hi, everybody.

So I took over as the coordinator for the Farmers' Market last season. And far and away, the number one question that I got was "Does the Farmers' Market accept SNAP benefits?" At the time, we didn't. But it was something that was really important to me to figure out because it was really important for the community.

So over the winter I set to work to figure out exactly how to make that happen.

Which I'm happy to say that I did. And in a series of happy accidents, I found out about the FAM Program. So this originally started at the Bellevue Farmers' Market during COVID as a response to their community's need.

But, basically, what the FAM Program does is it is a one-to-one match for all SNAP and EBT benefits used at the Farmers' Market.

So thanks to a donation from

St. Clair Hospital, the Bethel Park Farmers'

Market is now able to accept SNAP benefits

and, in participation with the FAM Program,

provide a one-to-one match.

So one anyone who comes to shop at the market using their benefits can go shop

with vendors, and their SNAP card will essentially be charged for half of their total purchase. And the FAM Program will reimburse the vendors the other half.
```

It makes it more accessible for those who are on a fixed income. It makes the Farmers' Market accessible to everybody.

And we just found out that the FAM

Program will also match the Farmers' Market

nutrition checks that are provided to seniors

as well. So, overall, it's just a really

great program and something we're really

excited to introduce to the market this

season.

Is there -- is there any -- can I just put on the record, is there any status update for the Sheetz at the -- at South Park and McMurray?

Has there been any subdivisions of the land? Have there been any development applications? And has there been any necessary permits filed yet? That's the only questions I have.

I just -- I mean, because the way the process went tonight was totally different than the process when this all started. So I just want to see if there has been any updates, because we're not getting any.

You know, so I was just curious whether or not the property has been sold or whether or not -- I see stuff happening there, so something's going to happen.

But, you know, has the property been subdivided? And has there been any kind of permits filed or anything like that yet?

PRESIDENT MOURY: This is normally a Public Comment session, but I will respond.

 $$\operatorname{MR.}$$ HENSLER: I just wanted to put it on the record.

1 PRESIDENT MOURY: No, no, no. 2 We have followed the same process for 3 that property, as well as the one we had 4 tonight. We had a Public Hearing for the 5 rezoning. I believe there may have been a traffic study for a Sheetz at the intersection 6 submitted to PennDOT. 7 But, to the best of my knowledge, no 8 9 other permits, nothing's been decided. To the 10 best of my knowledge, the property hasn't changed hands. They have not filed any type 11 12 of plans over there other than submitted to --13 a traffic study to PennDOT. And I believe we 14 were having our traffic consultant review it. 15

So that's the first step in the process. We have not received any other information --

MR. CREEHAN: Okay. Mike Creehan, 364 Southridge Drive, Pittsburgh, PA, 15241.

So, I'm no stranger to Bethel Park.

I grew up in Bethel Park, right in Oakhurst,

Carlton Road, right down from Bob Purkey

Memorial Home. And so I spent my first 30

years in Bethel. I bought a house in Bethel

right close to Evey Hardware, and then spent

the next 25 years on Southridge Drive.

And so I had no idea, I guess, that

John Murphy was excavating that property that

-- from the Bethel Park/Upper St. Clair line,

which is in our back yards, basically. But no

notice was given, and it should have been.

My issue, I guess, is with the Sheetz. So, nobody -- nobody really wants a Sheetz in their back yard.

I mean, you guys, if you lived on Southridge Drive, you would feel the same way, I'm sure.

Criminal activity, on March 3, 2023,

someone was shot and killed at a Sheetz in southeastern Columbus. It brings in a bad element. A lot of bad things happen at night at a Sheetz. We all know that.

And I don't know if the Bethel Park Police Department, you know, feels that -- they're going to spend how much time -- how many nights a week during there down at that location.

Noise, okay, of course, is another thing. Gas stations, vehicles, always cause a lot of noise pollution. Light pollution is going to be terrible. This basically is in my backyard, shining into my bedroom, in the living room.

Air pollution is probably the worst, besides the criminal activity. Air pollution's caused by solid and liquid particles. Gas station toxic fume emissions are ten times higher than previously thought.

Researchers at Columbia University,

Johns Hopkins University, and Erich Technology

studied pipe emissions of benzene from storage

tanks at gas stations. The study found that

gas evaporated seven gallons a day.

So that benzene, of course, causes cancer. And I don't know that there's -- we've got an explosion of lot of kids on Southridge Drive as well, young kids. Now, I don't think their parents want them to get cancer. Nobody wants cancer.

Also, the fueling from underground storage tanks causes adverse effects; nausea, cancer, anemia, and low birthrate.

So, I guess, you know, in closing -and I gave you the same addendum that I'm
going to submit of my notes, okay, to Upper
St. Clair Township. I saw each of the
Councilmembers read it, so I know it was read.

We won that decision in Upper St.

Clair from Commercial to Residential. But it didn't -- it wasn't easy. It was very hard, and it was emotional.

So just in closing, the developer has only information for the initial phase of commercial buildings. This is only the tip of the iceberg. What else goes in besides a Sheetz?

I would hope everyone on this side of the bench is a "no" vote for any zoning

There's probably a myriad of explanations for why, but there is no excuse.

According to Robert's Rule of Order, procedure calls for those -- for that information to be available to those in attendance in a timely manner. Now, in 1847,

when Robert's Rule of Order was first
introduced, a timely manner could mean a
couple of months. The Pony Express didn't run
all that fast.

In today's world of technology every word that I am speaking here now can be transcribed even as I speak to any forum of media.

I'm fully aware that Bethel Park and, up until recently, the neighboring township has a procedure where everybody sitting at the big table gets to read the minutes before they are approved at the next meeting so to ensure that they are not misquoted.

One of the things they've done through their whole evaluation process of what to do in building the new K through 5 Center

was what to do with the five buildings that currently exist once the new K-5 Center is open.

Our Recreation Department actually did a review. A lot of our programs are very much -- whether it's the building or fields, is dependent upon School District facilities.

And we have a great working relationship with the District. And we're going to continue it even through the building process.

But what we identified early on is, if we are to go to -- going to one school, there probably is some facilities and particular fields that they're going to impact our Recreation Department and all the residents of Bethel Park.

So, what we did in January of this year, we approached the School District, the School Board, making the request as they embarked on their process to evaluate the buildings once they're closed. They were very transparent.

And what they did, as far as they don't want the buildings to sit vacant, and

potentially the fall of 2026 when they're open, then we have some code enforcement issues. It's a blight on our community. So they're giving us the ability to work together and work early on what to do with the facilities.

2.3

I can tell you at this point, when we do receive these, we don't have -- I've been through this before, by the way. Our intent is to rip the buildings down. The problems -- the liabilities with the buildings as they exist today aren't going to go away by transferring ownership.

The goal by ratifying this agreement tonight will give this Municipality, this Council, the community an opportunity to really study the buildings -- or excuse me -- the facilities and come up with a plan on where we want to go and what we want to do.

It all costs money. It's not going to be simple. But this will give us three years to go out and source grant, private funding, and really give us a jump start on moving forward with expanding the recreation facilities within the community.

And we, as I sit here for many years, never see -- or very rarely see someone who owns commercial property, because of the value of that property money-wise, to ask for a rezoning to Residential. It's a downgrade.

So this is something that's not particularly what we always see going from Residential to higher classes, like, maybe Townhomes or Commercial property.

I get it. That's why we as a Council over the years, when Mr. Moury's leadership on these schools were -- he was just telling me the other day, you know, in this long time how much green space that we actually saved in our -- in a lot of years. And these schools now add to that green space.

But we don't have a right to tell

people how to develop their property, if they
wish if they own it. And, I'm sorry, but this

Manufacturing Light Industrial, which I

Well, here we are 40 years later that we have an opportunity, at least on the corner piece, to downgrade the zoning. I know there was discussion years ago about putting an ice cream stand up at the corner because of the Neighborhood Commercial. And, you know, that's not the best for the area.

Residential is always the least impact. And, you know, for what Mr. O'Brien said, when we're down- -- downgrading the zoning from a Commercial, you're going to minimize the impact.

A lot of the concerns that you have for water and all that, that's all going to be identified, if this is approved, from the land development process.

The developer, I know, has met with the Montour Trail. They have some things that they want to see. The developer has shown a willingness through the Planning Commission to

do what they have to do to help buffer some of the area. There's probably going to be property there that's undevelopable.

The sanitary sewers 20 years ago, you're right, there was no flow. But with technology today, it's going to allow them, if they choose to invest in it, to create a private system to pump the sewage into the Bethel Park sewer system.

So, having said all that, you know, maybe 40 years ago, when it was rezoned MLI or Commercial, it wasn't a big of a deal. We get it's an impact. But two-thirds of the property today could be -- you could have single-family homes on it.

And what they're trying to do is to downgrade some of the zoning to make it a little better for the area and a little bit more accessible.

We're supposed to get an update every July. And because of the situation with the Municipal Manager and the Planner, we really haven't had that. So I'm going to just list off a few things, keeping it under three minutes.

And if anyone on the dais, if I miss anything in your Ward or anything that you-all want to add that we've accomplished or have going for the Blueprint, please chime in afterwards.

So, one of the big things I wanted to mention right away was the Tree City U.S.A. designation that we got. That goes with some of the trees that we've been planting. We've had multiple tree plantings; Miner's Park, Millennium Park.

I know that the Shade Tree Commission did some with the schools at Independence and Neil Armstrong. We had some residents and staff take the tree tenders, which I think helped that designation along. So really appreciate all the conservation activities

1 here.

2.3

We completed the work at Pine Tree Park in Georgetown neighborhood for Ward 4.

We're going to pick that up in earnest now that Mr. Harbison's onboard.

And, by the way, I just want to say

Mr. Harbison has been doing a great job to

date. I just wanted to mention that.

We've continued our efforts to mitigate the stormwater by checking and lining our sewers when needed and continuing -- continuing to improve where we can by stopping the inflow and infiltration.

I know the Thunderwood project in Ms. Flinn's Ward was taken care of. And we're constantly working to make sure we never have a repeat of 2018.

There's been significant progress

now, as was evidenced tonight by the

appointment of the Steering Committee, towards

forming an Economic Development Authority.

Our work around addressing tax delinquent, abandoned, and blighted properties over the last few months, you know, taking

ownership of them, is working hand-in-hand with that effort.

2.3

Our Farmers' Market's been a rousing success. It gets better and better every year. As you saw, we're going to start offering SNAP benefits -- or accepting SNAP benefits to the people who come there. And I just think that's fantastic.

What else? Oh, we had a successful Deer Management Program that was implemented this year. And we're glad that that happened.

We have -- anyone who drives by the Park Avenue/South Park corner there sees the Splash Park is being done in earnest.

We're working to add some additional parking in that neighborhood to help accommodate the splash park and the football and some of activities over there.

And that goes hand-in-hand with the Blueprint and all the essential Bethel Park stuff that we're trying to do.

I also want to mention the pickleball courts, we approved for -- for construction last month or the month before. That's going to be coming to Millennium Park, with the

lighting that we got for from another grant.

So that was a combined effort to make something better overall.

2.3

We're also in the final stages of getting everything in place to move forward with the Drake Trail, which I know Mr. Moury is close to.

And I'd like to expand on that a little bit more, if I could. You know, we talked a lot about sidewalks in Bethel Park and how important it was with the Blueprint BP. And so we want to be smart about it. We want to do it where it makes sense and where it's affordable.

And when we looked at this Drake

Trail, we saw where it ended there down on -
at the end of Church Road, down by the

Dorchester Apartments.

We looked at it, and we saw that -you know, Church Road connects up to Bethel
Church. And from there, there's actually a
sidewalk that runs from the Administration
Building all the way down past the high school
to Peter Page Park.

So if we can somehow do something to

connect that Drake Trail up Church Road to Bethel Church, you know, get it across the Admin Building and down to Peter Page Park, we're a stone's throw from the Industrial Park.

2.3

And that, you know, when you're talking about talking about long term, you're talking about the roundabout from the Montour Trail getting to the Industrial Park, all of a sudden we have some real connections going on there.

So, I just wanted to mention that.

We're also trying to finalize the requests for funding for the Peter Page Park dam that has been in process for a couple years now. We're going to try and get that going.

And then tonight, you saw, you know, the agreement with the School District, something that we're going to be able to help with our recreation and development efforts here in the community.

I went through that all very quickly. And I'm sorry if I missed anything important for anyone up here. If you have anything you want to add, you certainly can now.

PRESIDENT MOURY: No, I just want to thank Mr. Janosik for putting this together.

2.3

And thank everybody up here, boards, and commissions.

Many times we move forward with projects. We get them down and move on and don't really acknowledge.

Like the School District, Mr.

Christenson said they have a long-range plan.

We have aligned together. This -- in all my

tenure, as you learned tonight, I've been on

here longer than Tom Duerr's been alive. I'll

note that for the record for him.

But a lot of times you spend a lot of money to develop a plan, and then you don't do anything with it. It sits on a shelf.

This Council made a commitment, when we adopted it, that -- the previous Council, this Council's followed it on -- we want to make sure that we don't leave it sit on a shelf.

We want to work with the District and have a joint vision.

As a good example, the approval of the K through 5 Center sidewalks, Kings School Road intersection upgrades, this is all

important to all of us. And we're working jointly with the District to make sure that it happens. And it's -- it's really a lot.

2.3

We challenge our staff, Mr. Harbison, who's our new Planner. I think he did say all those ordinances are going to be done by the end of the year, I thought.

MR. JANOSIK: Yeah, we got a commitment out of him at last week's meeting.

PRESIDENT MOURY: But we continue to move forward. We kind of look over some of the things and the job we've done.

But there's a lot of stuff that comes through this table that our staff is definitely responsible for. They've done a great job in working with the District. It's been great.

So thanks, everybody. Here's to a lot more things going on between now and the end of the year.

MR. JANOSIK: Yeah, we'll be picking up the budget process here soon. We'll be talking about next year's capital projects, some of the park improvements, and some of the other things we're going to start getting
