The Fire Chief's Report.

MR. USELMAN: Good evening, Council, Mayor, residents of Bethel Park. My name is Rob Uselman. I'm the Assistant Chief with the Bethel Park Volunteer Fire Company. And I'm here with our October Fire Incident Report.

We had a total calls of 43 in the October, three structure fires, one brush fire, one vehicle accident, five gas leaks, and that's natural gas leaks, one CO incident, one electric -- electrical issue, six good intent calls, four smoke investigations, one hazardous material investigation, 17 fire alarms, and three CO alarms, and a partridge in a pear tree, in case anybody's asking.

You know, it was 43 calls for the month. Our call -- our call volume for the full year through October 31st is up to 497.

So, it's been a rather busy year for us.

Hopefully, it slows down over these next two months.

And speaking of the next two months, as we enter the holidays, we do ask people that they take extra caution, especially around Thanksgiving. Obviously, during Thanksgiving a lot of people are at home cooking. It's the peak day for home-cooking fires. And, actually, that's followed by Christmas Day and Christmas Eve. So please be careful around those holidays.

Keep anything that can catch fire such as ovens mitts, wood utensils, food packaging, towels, or curtains away from your stovetop or anything that you use to cook on.

If you do happen to have a small grease fire and decide to fight the fire, the best way to do that is get a lid and cover it, turn the burners off. If you have a fire in your oven, turn the heat off to the oven and leave the door closed.

And then we always ask, if you can exit the structure and then call 911 or the local emergency number. And in Bethel Park it's 833-2000. And that will get us coming

Also, as the Christmas season's coming up, we see a lot of great decorations out there. Please use UL, Underwriters
Laboratory, approved, and use of outdoor cord is being used for all outdoors. Make sure your electrical appliances are not overloading, your circuits aren't overloaded. That's the best way to prevent fires.

And obviously, it's a big season for candles. We ask that people never leave candles unattended when you're using them.

Please keep them a safe distance from materials that may catch on fire.

It's supposed to be a joyous time of year. We don't want to see tragedy such as a fire in your residence or any residence in the surrounding communities as well.

DR. CAMPBELL: President Moury?

PRESIDENT MOURY: Dr. Campbell.

DR. CAMPBELL: You know, Council votes tonight on the 2024 Municipal Real Estate, as well as Earned Income Taxes in our budget for 2024.

And I thank Council, I thank our Municipal Manager, Kristen Denne, I thank our Finance Director, Ms. Lapaglia, and all the department directors for the incredible amount of work that they put into this.

A year ago, I was pretty confident that I thought we could be able to maintain our tax rates pretty much what they've been

over the last five years. We haven't had to
have any increases in that period of time. I
thought there was a low -- very low
probability of us having increased taxes.

And, historically, Bethel Park has remained one of the most reasonable communities, the best return on investment, I would like to say, in the South Hills of Pennsylvania. We had some of the lowest tax rates for not only real estate, but also earned income in the area, certainly compared to a lot of our neighbors.

In the last nine months, we've witnessed some rather traumatic -- dramatic and significant compression of events that have transpired. We've seen double digit increases in inflation. That affects everything to our paper clips, to paper products, to grass seed, to salt trucks, to police vehicles.

It affects the cost of asphalt. It affects tremendously the things like utility bills that we've had to do, drywall, for goodness sake. We've also seen a 9.75 increase in a lot of our healthcare costs.

And that's only been manifested, really, in the last six months.

We were broadsided by a 56 percent increase in our Municipal garbage collection. That's 20 million dollars over the next five years. 20 million dollars over the next five years.

So, what's a responsible -- what's a reasonable thing to do? You know, we've cut every extraneous, extra superfluous expense we possibly could. We froze and we postponed a lot of the capital projects that we would have liked to have done.

Yet we still need to plow and pave the roads. We still need to keep the streetlights on. We still need to maintain the parks. We need to make sure that our emergency services, our police, our EMS, our fire are well taken care of. Because this is the kind of items that Bethel Parkers want and expect.

As such, I know that I can't write checks on my checking account on money I don't have. I can't spend money that I don't have. I don't expect my government to do the same.

As such, Council's felt the need to have an increase in our tax rates. And it's going to be .75 mils on our real estate, .1 percent on our enabling taxes.

And I've always been opposed to tax increases. Even the last tax increase we had, I voted against it because I was sure that, "Oh, this might be a temporary thing." I don't think anything is as temporary as a -- permanent change as a temporary tax increase.

But even with these -- the increases in the unexpected costs that we've had in the last six to nine months, I still feel that living in Bethel Park is absolutely the best and most affordable community in the South Hills area, if not Southwestern Pennsylvania, for our return on investment, for what we pay for taxes, for what get out of that taxes, and living in the community like we live in.

So, it is a -- it was a difficult, very difficult discussion and decision for this Council to come to any kind of terms. We never wanted to raise taxes on anybody. But, and, again, I feel that it was the responsible

1 and the reasonable thing to do.

2 And that's all I have, Mr. President.

We spent a lot of time going over the budget. Could we have made it a little less and cut services? Yeah, we probably could have. But we would only mortgaged our future. You know, it's unfortunate that we have to do this.

As Dr. Campbell said, the biggest impact, 56 percent, I believe, in the garbage collection, which equates to close to one and a half million dollars a year.

I've talked before about the property assessments, the common level ratio. We had a tax assessment appeal at South Hills Village, which is one of our largest taxing bodies, and we were forced to give them back about \$230,000 for the last four years.

And their new tax will be less than

it's been, their assessed value. But they're
also going to be paying a lower tax rate. It
went from an 82 percent to, I believe, mid 70s
to 55 percent.

So, what does that mean? It means our real estate taxes will be flat or declining over the next several years.

So, I don't think we -- any of us take this lightly. I'd like to thank staff, Council, our due diligence. We've had more budget meetings this year --
