This month's -- this is the Chief's Report for the month of January 2024. We had a total of 48 incidents last month: Three building fires, four cooking/vehicle fires, two overheat conditions, one vehicle accident with injuries, ten gas and CO leaks, one -- two -- two electrical conditions, two smoke conditions, one assist the police, nine good intent calls, and 14 fire alarms, for a total of 48 calls.

I will say this, we did have a rather large house fire a few weeks ago. We are thankful that nobody was hurt. The reason the residents were not hurt is they were woken up by their smoke detectors.

We talk about this a lot up here.

You'll hear us bring it up. Make sure your

batteries are up-to-date and changed. They do
save lives, and they work.

So, we take that very seriously in the Fire Department, especially for incidents like that. So, please check your smoke

1 detectors.

If you have any questions, call the Fire Department, leave a message, and someone will get in touch with you if you need some advice.

With that being said, our safety tips for the week -- for the month is: If you use extension cords for appliances or other things, please be careful. Make sure they're UL tested. If you have questions about that, call the Fire Company. We will advise you on that.

Also, keep extension cords away from water. Electricity and water do not mix. I shouldn't have to tell anybody that, but you never know.

Make sure your extension cord is plugged into a GFCI outlet. Basically, that's an outlet that will trip if it becomes overheated. It's important that you do that. If the extension cord becomes hot, hot to the touch, unplug it immediately.

And other than that, that is all I have for this month.

MR. HARTUNG: Yes, we -- there was a Facebook post put out. And my sister-in-law contacted me. She follows them religiously.

And she said, "Hey, listen, they're looking for a search dog to find a dog."

Belle has been training for a year now for humans. But she's never looked -- but I've never asked her to locate a dog before.

So, I'm, like, "Well, she is a trailing dog."

Which means she picks up on scent, and she follows that specific scent.

And so we went over to the resident in Upper St. Clair on a Saturday and got the scent off Nash, which was the dog that we were looking for, through his dog bed and through his collar -- another collar that he has, and Belle picked up on it immediately. And she

1 did amazing.

She followed the -- she followed that scent that day, on a Saturday, for about two and a half miles, all the way across Gilkinson, over to the Galleria, and through a number of drainage pipes in the process.

She only has a 50 -- I only had a 50-foot collar on her. So that's -- or, a 50-foot line. So that's as far as I was taking her.

MR. CONSOLMAGNO: I think she likes you, Jack.

MR. HARTUNG: She -- she's -- she loves attention.

But I did not know until actually later that day that Belle had -- Belle was on specific scent and specific line of Nash at a number of sites based on last -- based on last sightings.

And -- but then we went back the following day -- or, I'm sorry, a couple days later. And this is where it's a bittersweet and a -- we went back on the following Thursday, because it was going to get into the single digits just a few days later. And I

was really concerned about Nash being out in those elements.

And as a result of a last sighting, we went to a park. And she again went right on scent and she followed a trail, both through streets and through back yards. I was waiting for some residents of Upper St. Clair to come out and say, "What are you doing in my backyard?" But that's where Nash was, and so that's where she was.

And we did find Nash. Unfortunately, Nash had passed most likely the night before. And the dog had burrowed itself into -- the dog had burrowed into the side, and it knew that it was time to go.

But on the plus side, we were able to bring closure for Nash's family. And that was a pretty impressive -- a pretty special time for us.

I mean, why don't you come on up.

This is -- this is Melissa and her husband.

They're the ones that we went working for that day. And that's what she does, she -- she goes on scent and she finds things, so...

I do not pretend to know everything that went on that day. And I don't have any interest in assigning blame. That's what investigations are for.

What I do want to do is call to attention the issue of policing and managing the ongoing mental health crisis that we currently find ourselves here in America.

It's time for this Municipal Council -Municipal Council take the next step in supporting our police. You do this by stopping the reliance on them to be the mental health professionals.

It's estimated that at least 20 percent of police calls for service involve a mental health or substance abuse crisis, a number that, sadly, is only growing.

With all the other things we are asking of our police officers, is it fair to ask them to be mental health professionals as well? I don't think it is.

Departments across the country have instituted programs within our police

departments to deal with this crisis. Some of those programs go back as far as the late

1980s. And they have seen significant improvements in the outcomes of these

The program in Eugene, Oregon is working so well that the mental health team is only requesting police intervention about .6 percent of the time.

I'm asking this Council to add a social services coordinator position to the department, a position that can both give the mental health services support to our officers, that would be greatly beneficial to them, and give some peace of mind to the citizens of Bethel who are dealing with similar situations at home to the situation which led to the incident I previously mentioned.
