So, when a solicitor is issued a permit, they come to the Police Department, they get the permit. They are also given a copy of the No Knock List, which has every house in Bethel Park that has been put on the They're handed a list for that.

There is also access to the list on our Municipal web page. So they can go every day before they go out to their neighborhoods, they could check the list to see if there's any updates.

Now, our staff tries to keep up with that as quickly as possible. But it's -- you know, sometimes it takes a few days to get houses that come in for registration onto the list. But we try our best to keep it as current as possible.

So, if a solicitor comes to your door and you are on the No Knock List, you are to advise them that you are on the No Knock List and you do not want to be bothered at your house. You are then to call the Bethel Park Police Department and advise them that a

1 solicitor was at your house and you're on the 2 No Knock List.

2.3

That way our officers can do an investigation into it to see if the solicitor came to your house with you being on the No Knock List. And if they find that this is true, they can be cited or their permit could be revoked.

So it's very important that you notify us if somebody comes to your house as a solicitor and you're on the No Knock List.

Finally, anybody that wants to be on the No Knock List can go to the Bethel Park web page. And if you follow the "Connect" tab at the top, then go to the "Citizen action line," and then "Police," and then "Do Not Knock List."

Also tonight, I'd like to recognize one of our officers. He's unable to be here tonight. But I felt it was important that we recognize him.

For the past several years Detective

Gorman has served as a Community Resource

Officer for the department. In that position,

he has been responsible for coordinating many

events and groups. And he has been the liaison between the Police Department and the community.

Due to changes with the position,

Detective Gorman has decided to transfer to

the Patrol Division. It was not a decision he
took lightly. And he leaves behind some big
shoes to fill.

He will be sorely missed. But we thank him and wish him well as he transitions back to the Patrol Division.

In the coming week, we will be appointing a new Crime Prevention Community Resource Officer. And we look forward to them jumping in and carrying on the legacy that Detective Gorman has built here. And we really want to thank him.

And those of you that are worried, he's not going to another department. He's going to the Patrol Division. So you'll see him in the police car, out driving around, around town. So you'll not -- you'll not miss him that way. If anything, you might see him a little bit more driving around the neighborhoods.

1 please. 2 MR. MARK: Good evening, everyone. My name is John Mark, Second Captain of the 3 4 Bethel Park Volunteer Fire Company. 5 For the month of May, we ran one structure fire, two vehicle fires, one 6 7 tractor fire, one brush fire, assisted the police two times, responded to two vehicle 8 9 accidents, six electrical conditions, 12 gas 10 leaks, two smoke investigations, ten good intent calls, 23 fire alarms, six CO alarms, 11 12 and one weather condition, which I believe was 13 the tornado that touched down in Finleyville, 14 totaling 64 calls. 15 Recently, we've had a lot more CO 16 calls. A lot of people tend to think that CO 17 calls typically only happen in the wintertime -- or more often in the wintertime. 18 19 But it's important to have a CO 20 detector always functioning in your house. 21

Check the -- test it every month. Change the batteries every time you change the clocks back.

We have several full- and part-time positions available at the Municipality.

Anyone who is interested, several of these positions are actually management-level positions. It is available on our website.

If you go under "Apply for a job," and you are able to apply for the those positions.

We have the starting of -- the pickleball courts started last week. But one thing we want to remind people, five of the courts are able to be booked in advance by a reservation system on RecDesk.

That did start this week. So, five courts are able to be reserved. And the other five courts are for open play, first come first served. But, essentially, you know, you will be standing in line for those.

So, if you want to ensure a certain time that you want to be there and utilize the courts, the RecDesk is where you can do that.

And that is 18 19 Saturday, June 15th from 8:00 in the morning 20 till 2:00 in the afternoon. So you can bring 21 up all your, you know, branches, whatever you 22 have, they'll take it on June 15th. 2.3 June 27th, towards the end of the 24 month, we have three things going on. From 25 6:00 to 8:00, on June 27th, we have our

Concert Series in the Park. And that's at 1 Millennium Park. And the band this month, 2 3 it's called Smells Like '90s. I don't know 4 what that means. But it's Smells Like '90s. 5 The second thing I was going to mention is, the 28th, the movie. And I tried 6 7 to find out what the movie was, and they 8 wouldn't tell me. But now, thanks to Christine, now we know what the movie is. 9 10 that's on the 28th. 11 And then our big event of the summer 12 is our fireworks. And that's on June 29th, 13 Summer Spectacular, 9:40. That's at Millennium Park. The lots open at 7:00. And 14 15 there will be food vendors or snack vendors at 16 Cool Springs, Lincoln School, St. Germaine, 17 and Hamilton Presbyterian. 18 So, that's all the fun stuff for 19 this month. One of the other things that we're not able to celebrate for Memorial Day was an update to the veterans showcase right outside this Chamber. There's a glass box out there that we change periodically.

And not too long ago, about a month ago, we got a call -- I got a call I was honored to take from a resident. His name's Brian Kelly. I've gotten to know him over the years through various things we've done.

And I didn't know this. His brother,
Leo, was killed in Vietnam in 1967, May 19th,
in fact. So, about a couple weeks ago we had
the anniversary of that date.

And so, anyway, he said that he had some artifacts from Leo. He went by Jackie, so I'll call him Jackie. He had some artifacts from Jackie that he wanted to give to the Library or somewhere that we can preserve them.

And I told him about the veterans room we have at the Historical Society where we keep those thing. He thought it was a good idea.

I reached out to president -- former

1 Council President Moury, who's the president of the Historical Society. And we met with 2 3 Brian and went through some of the things, 4 and it was just so impressive and so 5 emotional. His mother kept a binder meticulously 6 7 of every letter that she got from her son, all the correspondence back-and-forth. She has 8 9 the letter from General Westmoreland about the 10 Bronze Star and the Purple Heart, and all that 11 stuff. 12 There's letters from his girlfriend. 13 There's letters -- you know, being a mother, 14 she wanted to know exactly happened to her son 15 in his final moments. And there are letters 16 from the chaplain who performed the last rites 17 on him. 18 And I just -- I couldn't believe the 19 effect it had on me, you know, going through 20 this stuff. 21 Mayor Allen, I know you're a veteran. 22 You can appreciate all that very much. 2.3 So, anyways, I just wanted to let 24 everyone know about Jackie Kelly and his

story. We have all these artifacts here.

25

They're on loan from the Kelly Family 1 2 currently. Eventually they're going to find a final home with the Historical Society over 3 4 time. 5 And I just wanted to read real quick. "Second Lieutenant John Kelly, born in Bethel 6 7 Park, Pennsylvania, served with honor in the United States Marine Corps during the Vietnam 8 War. On May 19, 1967, he was declared a 9 10 casualty of war, having been killed in action 11 near Con Thien, Quang Tri, South Vietnam 12 during Operation Hickory. His bravery and sacrifice are remembered by the people of 13 Pennsylvania, and may his positive example 14 15 continue to inspire us." 16 And so I thank you for the time to 17 help to let me share that with you and with 18 the community. If you're ever in the Municipal 19 20 Building, stop by and see it. It's a great 21 showcase we have there. 22 And thank you, Mr. Oakes. 2.3 With that, I move to adjourn. 24 PRESIDENT OAKES: Thank you very 25 much, Mr. Janosik. I appreciate that.
