3 PRESIDENT OAKES: Good evening,
4 everyone. Welcome to our May 12, 2025 Regular
5 Council Meeting. Thank you, everyone, for
6 coming.

7 Ms. Denne, would you please call the
8 roll.

9 MS. DENNE: Mr. Consolmagno?

10 MR. CONSOLMAGNO: Here.

11 MS. DENNE: Ms. Kamenicky?

14 PRESIDENT OAKES: Here.

3 PRESIDENT OAKES: Eight members
4 present.

5 Could we now please stand for the
6 Pledge of Allegiance.

8 (Whereupon, the Pledge of Allegiance
9 was recited.)

10 PRESIDENT OAKES: Two quick things,
11 first, under Chair Announcements.

12 There be will be no Library
13 Director's Report this evening. Stay tuned
14 for next month's public meeting for an update.

15 Second, we had our major storm event
16 on April 29th. And all of us here couldn't be
17 more thankful and proud of our Public Works,
18 our Police, our Fire, our EMS, and all the
19 volunteers that helped with the major storm
20 event. Very, very thankful. Thank you,
21 everyone, very much.

22 And that's all I have under Chair
23 Announcements.

24 I'm going to move now to Shade Tree
25 Commission Appointment and Parks and

1 Recreation Board Appointments; and
2 Mr. Consolmagno.

3 MR. CONSOLMAGNO: I move to
4 appointment Lindsey Boyko to the Shade Tree
5 Commission with a term to expire 12/31/2030.

6 MR. JANOSIK: Second.

7 PRESIDENT OAKES: I have a motion
8 from Mr. Consolmagno, a second from
9 Mr. Janosik that we appoint Lindsey Boyko to
10 the Shade Tree Commission with a term to
11 expire 12/31/2030.

12 Any questions or comments?

13 (No response.)

14 PRESIDENT OAKES: Ms. Denne, would
15 you please call the roll.

13 the Parks and Recreation Board with a term to
14 expire 12/31/2028.

15 MR. ESPINAR: Second.

16 PRESIDENT OAKES: I have a motion
17 from Mr. Consolmagno and a second from
18 Mr. Espinar that we move to appoint Jennifer
19 Mills to the Parks and Rec Board with a term
20 to expire 12/31/2028.

21 Any questions or comments on this
22 item?

23 (No response.)

24 PRESIDENT OAKES: Ms. Denne, would
25 you please call the roll.

17 PRESIDENT OAKES: Motion carries 8
18 to 0.

19 We now would like to turn to the
20 Reports of the Officials, and the Police
21 Chief's Report; Chief Arnold.

22 CHIEF ARNOLD: Good evening,
23 everyone.

24 This week is National Police Week.
25 It's a time to give special recognition in

1 honor of those police officers who have lost
2 their lives in the line of duty.

3 In 2024, there were 148 officers in
4 the United States who paid the ultimate
5 sacrifice. Please keep those officers and
6 their families in your thoughts and prayers
7 this week. And we truly appreciate the
8 support that we receive from our residents.

9 Moving along, I'd like to bring
10 attention to some fraud and scam reports we
11 have received over the past few weeks. We've
12 had several residents report they fell victim
13 to a scam and lost significant amounts of
14 money. We also had a report of a scammer who
15 was able to spoof the Police Department's
16 phone number.

17 So here are some tips to help avoid
18 from being victimized: Do not offer any
19 personal information or payments over the
20 phone; call back to a number that you know is
21 legitimate or go in person; the Police
22 Department will never ask you for money and
23 no legitimate business will require payment
24 over the phone; use caution when interacting
25 with anyone that you do not know on social

1 media; never pay a company or a person who is
2 requesting money from an unusual payment
3 method such as gift cards, crypto currency,
4 wire transfers or money apps; shred important
5 documents; and lock credit cards that are
6 rarely used, lock them up; never click on a
7 link that is sent to you or give someone
8 control or remote access to your computer or
9 mobile devices; monitor bank accounts, medical
10 statements, and your credit report for any
11 unusual activity.

12 Some upcoming events that we have.
13 First Responder Bike Rodeo, on Saturday,
14 June 7th, from 10:00 a.m. to 1:00 p.m. It's
15 going to be at the deck hockey parking lot in
16 the county park, right there along Corrigan
17 Drive. Registration info can be found on the
18 LifeBuilders website and on our social media
19 pages. There will be food, music, bike safety
20 checks, and a safety course.

21 Emergency vehicles will be on
22 display. And every child will receive a new
23 bike helmet. We are also looking for
24 donations of new and gently used bicycles so
25 that we do not have to turn anyone away who

1 does not have their own bicycle. Information
2 on bike donations can be found on our social
3 media pages as well.

4 That's all I have for tonight.

5 PRESIDENT OAKES: Thank you, Chief.
6 Any questions or comments?

7 (No response.)

8 PRESIDENT OAKES: Okay. Hearing
9 none, can we now change to the Fire Chief's
10 Report; and Assistant Chief Uselman.

11 MR. USELMAN: Thank you.

12 Good evening, Council, residents of
13 Bethel Park. My name is Rob Uselman. I am
14 the Assistant Chief of the Bethel Park
15 Volunteer Fire Company.

16 Tonight, I'm going to give you the
17 April rundown for the Chief's Report for April
18 2025.

19 We actually had a lot of calls this
20 past month, obviously due to the storm-related
21 incident that we had on April 29th. And we'll
22 get into that in a few seconds here.

23 But we had 110 total incidents, which
24 is normally about double what we run in a
25 current month. Some big ones was, we had

1 eight structure fires, two cooking fires, two
2 vehicle fires, four hazardous conditions, gas
3 leaks, one residential lockout, three good
4 intent calls, one smoke scare, and 33 fire
5 alarms and CO alarms. Those were our basic
6 calls.

7 And then on, obviously, April 29th,
8 as Council noted, that there was a significant
9 weather event that came through Bethel Park.
10 We actually had 57 incidents between 5:20 that
11 night and 7:00 a.m. on Wednesday morning.
12 That's normally what we run in a month on
13 average.

14 So, it was a very significant weather
15 event. The unofficial wind speed that I saw
16 measured at Allegheny County Airport in West
17 Mifflin was around 70 miles an hour. Just to
18 put that in perspective, a small tornado, an
19 EF0 tornado is rated between 65 and 85 miles
20 an hour.

21 So the wind that came through Bethel
22 Park and the South Hills was basically a small
23 tornado. And it was like a straight line of
24 wind. So, it was a very significant weather
25 event.

1 Luckily, we are glad to report, and
2 I haven't spoke with the Chief, but the
3 incidents that we were on, there was no
4 injuries. There was some pretty significant
5 damage to some homes, though, where trees fell
6 on some houses. And, like I said, it's --
7 luckily, nobody injured that event.

8 We would like to thank the residents
9 of Bethel Park who were out to support us.
10 They were very cooperative. We didn't have
11 any major issues. And they heeded the
12 warnings that we were given and told to them.

13 One thing I will say is one of those
14 calls was we had 26 wires down, power lines
15 down. If you ever see a wire down, treat it
16 as if it's an active live wire. Electricity
17 is very dangerous.

18 So, we always say don't approach a
19 wire if it's down. Call the base, call the
20 dispatch, we'll come down and verify that it's
21 down. We have special equipment that will let
22 us know if it's energized or not. But we
23 don't even go near them. We actually call the
24 power company and let them handle it. So,
25 that's one big thing that we talk about.

1 We're actually very proud of our
2 responding members that answered the call that
3 night. We sent out a page about 5:00 p.m. to
4 start a stand-by as we saw the weather event
5 coming and we knew it was going to be
6 significant. Our first dispatch was at 5:20.
7 In between 5:20 and 11:00 p.m., we answered 55
8 incidents.

9 So, we were very busy that night.
10 And meaning that we're busy, we have 57 active
11 members. 40 of the members that are currently
12 active were actually out that night and around
13 the community.

14 So, we pretty much had the whole
15 department out there active. So, I can't say
16 enough about our membership. Very proud of
17 the personnel that we have. We try and
18 provide the best training for our members so
19 we can provide the best service for the
20 community of Bethel Park. So, very proud of
21 how we did that night.

22 With that being said, we are
23 100 percent volunteer. We need help. I'm not
24 going to lie. I've been doing this 25 years.
25 This is the lowest our manpower has been in

1 those 25 years.

2 So, anybody that would like to join,
3 membership's great. We got a gym down at the
4 fire hall that's free. You just have to join.
5 Okay? So, there's lots of things you can do.
6 We're always looking for help. And there's
7 always something to do down at the fire
8 company.

9 So, if you're interested, you can go
10 onto our website bethelparkvfc.org. There's
11 an application there. Or if you want to stop
12 down, most Mondays we're there, training. Or
13 we have a meeting tonight, so we're there.

14 The other thing is is being that
15 we're 100 percent volunteer, we do require
16 donations from the Municipal- -- or not from
17 the Municipality, but from the residents. We
18 do receive tax dollars from the Municipality,
19 but that pays for our buildings.

20 All the other equipment that we
21 purchase, the apparatus, the radios, the gear,
22 that's a significant expense. So we do
23 require donations from the Municipality and
24 the residents. We do send out three mailers a
25 year. You should receive an envelope in the

1 mail.

2 That is, right now, the only way we
3 solicit. So, if you receive a phone call from
4 us, we do not solicit by phone, per Chief
5 Arnold's message. If you have a question or
6 concern that it may be a scam, please call the
7 fire company and leave us a message and
8 someone will get back to you and confirm that
9 we are not trying to scam you.

10 But it is important that we receive
11 donations. And we appreciate the donations
12 that we receive. There's other ways you can
13 donate. You can go out to our website
14 bethelparkvfc.com, and there's information out
15 there that you can pay as well.

16 Once again, we thank the community.
17 We thank Council. We thank everybody for
18 support, Public Works and the Police desk --
19 you know, police officers. It's -- it's a
20 great community to be a part of.

21 And that's all we have.

22 PRESIDENT OAKES: Thank you very
23 much.

24 (Applause.)

25 PRESIDENT OAKES: Any questions or

1 comments?

2 (No response.)

3 PRESIDENT OAKES: Okay. Hearing
4 none, I'd like to turn now to the Manager's
5 Report; and Ms. Denne.

6 MS. DENNE: Yes. Just a couple
7 things going on in the community. I'm not
8 going to take away the Mayor's thunder,
9 because he's going to talk about Memorial Day.

10 But we do have our Touch-A-Truck
11 coming this Sunday. And if someone has not
12 been to our Touch-A-Truck event, it is a
13 wonderful event. And anybody who is
14 interested in any type of vehicle, not just
15 Public Works vehicles, please attend. It is
16 from 12:00 to 3:00 on Slater Road at our
17 Public Works facility.

18 It is truly a great event. And I've
19 been in municipal government for 25 years, and
20 can say this is the best Touch-A-Truck there
21 is anywhere in the State of Pennsylvania.

22 Our Farmers' Market started last
23 week. And even though we did have that storm,
24 you know, kind of still brewing, it was a
25 great turnout.

1 We started a couple weeks early this
2 year. We're going to end a couple weeks
3 later. A lot of the regulars were back for
4 the Farmers' Market. I was glad to see them
5 after the hiatus over the winter.

6 I'm very fortunate in that -- the
7 Chief touched on May 15th, J.F.K. had resolved
8 that to be Peace Officer Day in the United
9 States of America. Next week, May 18th to
10 May 24th is National Pubic Works Week.

11 All of our employees do a lot for
12 our communities. I am very fortunate to have
13 a really great Police Department and an
14 absolutely wonderful Public Works Department,
15 who make my job every -- really, really easy
16 and help me to look good every day.

17 I think they do a lot more for the
18 community than people can understand. They
19 are selfless, and sacrifice a lot of time away
20 from their families and their friends,
21 available pretty much 24 hours a day.

22 You know, when the rest of us are
23 ducking away from bad weather, they're the
24 ones who going out in it. There's no real
25 thought of, you know, "This is going to be --

1 you know, I'm going home." Because at any
2 second, they could be called back out. The
3 police are 24 hours, seven days a week.
4 Again, if the weather's bad, they don't get to
5 say, "I'm not going in today." They're going
6 out no matter what.

7 So, I'm going to begin with a quote
8 and end with a quote that really sums up what
9 all of the men and women on both of these
10 departments. We have 39 officers within the
11 Police Department. We have 20 individuals
12 that work in our Public Works Department, and
13 they all the truly do serve this community.

14 To describe what probably all of them
15 go through every day is, "I'm a citizen
16 temporarily, but I'm just working in public
17 service for now," and that was Ronald Regan.

18 Again, that is selfless. It doesn't
19 matter the time of day, the holiday, the
20 weather, or if it's a weekend, they're
21 required to serve. And people don't see that,
22 you know, how hard that can be on an
23 individual and also their families.

24 So I don't only thank you for your
25 service, I thank your families allowing us to

1 have you for that service because it is
2 weighing on them.

3 I am so fortunate -- and the Fire
4 Department talked about the collaboration.
5 You know, there was a major storm that came
6 through this area a couple weeks ago, and the
7 amount of collaboration between the
8 departments was amazing.

9 You know, there was live wires.
10 There was trees everywhere. There was a lot
11 of dangerous situations. There was never a
12 thought in my head that night that it wasn't
13 being taken care of. And that's because all
14 of these people over the years have learned
15 how to work together and handle emergency
16 situations.

17 It really -- I'm never prouder here
18 than the day after a big emergency of how well
19 things have been taken care of. And it's only
20 because of these people here.

21 It's not me, by any means. I'm in
22 the background running phone calls and sending
23 emails and taking notes. It's these people on
24 the ground that make it work and keep
25 everybody in this community safe.

1 So, the last thing that I'd like,
2 really, for people to remember when they think
3 about public servants, they're humans at the
4 end of the day. They're somebody's mom.
5 There's somebody's dad. They're somebody's
6 brother. They're just humans.

7 And they're put into situations where
8 they oftentimes don't have all the tools they
9 need to get things done, but they make it safe
10 and they keep it going.

11 And this is a quote from Jesse
12 Jackson, "We may have to be judged by the work
13 we try to do. It's public service, not
14 perfect service."

15 And I wish that everybody would just
16 take a step back when they are annoyed because
17 the street is closed off, when they're mad
18 because they see a police officer who is going
19 to put them on a detour. They're not doing
20 that because they're bored. They're doing it
21 because they're trying to keep you safe, and
22 they want you to get home in one piece.

23 Think of that the next time you feel
24 inconvenienced by a detour, somebody flagging
25 you in another direction, someone asking you

1 not to speed, request to get your cars off the
2 street during inclement weather so the plow
3 truck can get through. Just keep that in
4 mind.

5 But I thank you all of you. And I
6 thank, you know, all of you that are here
7 tonight. You guys really -- you serve this
8 community, and you make us all very proud.
9 And thank you for your service.

10 PRESIDENT OAKES: Thank you very
11 much.

12 Okay. Thank you, Ms. Denne.

13 Now I'd like to bring up Mayor Allen
14 for the Mayor's Report.

15 MAYOR ALLEN: That was very good,
16 Ms. Denne.

17 MS. DENNE: Yeah, but you get the
18 nice plaque. So I got -- just got to do, you
19 know, the wordsmithing.

20 MAYOR ALLEN: Well, it seems like
21 every- -- everyone's celebrated in the same
22 month of the year.

23 So, I have, actually, three
24 proclamations this evening. The first one,
25 we've had a couple people. The Police Chief

1 and Ms. Denne talked about National Police
2 Memorial Week, which is this week.

3 So, Chief, if you could come up.
4 I'll read the end of the -- the bottom part of
5 the proclamation.

6 It's a proclamation for National
7 Police Memorial Week, May 11th to the 17th.
8 Whereas, in appreciation of the outstanding
9 efforts of our Bethel Park Law Enforcements,
10 it's appropriate to recognize the value and
11 accomplishments of the Bethel Park Police
12 Department by designating National Police
13 Memorial Week.

14 And, therefore, I, Mayor Jack Allen,
15 do hereby proclaim the week of May 11th to the
16 17th, 2025 is National Police Memorial Week.
17 That the Council of the Municipality of Bethel
18 Park wishes to specifically recognize the
19 Police Department during National Police
20 Memorial Week for its superior service to
21 Bethel Park.

22 And I encourage the community to
23 observe this week with appropriate programs,
24 ceremonies and activities. And it has my
25 signature on it.

1 So, Chief, congratulations.

2 CHIEF ARNOLD: Thank you, sir.

3 (Appause.)

4 MAYOR ALLEN: If he didn't have his
5 own report, I'm sure he would have said
6 something.

7 Okay. That's this week. Now, next
8 week is National EMS Week. So, our people
9 from EMS, if you could come up, please.

10 Welcome. And thanks for all you do.
11 Again, it's National EMS Week May 18th to the
12 24th.

13 Okay. Proclamation finishes up,
14 whereas, it is appropriate to recognize the
15 value and accomplishments of emergency medical
16 service providers and, in particular,
17 Tri-Community South's dedication and highly
18 skilled team by designating Emergency Medical
19 Service Week.

20 Now, therefore, I, Mayor Jack Allen,
21 as the Mayor of Bethel Park, do hereby
22 proclaim the week of May 18th through the 24th
23 as Emergency Medical Service Week, with the
24 theme -- and they have theme every year -- "We
25 Care For Everyone."

1 The community is encouraged to
2 recognize the value and accomplishments of all
3 those involved in the emergency medical
4 services as a vital public service. And the
5 Council of the Municipality of Bethel Park
6 wishes to specifically recognize Tri-Community
7 South EMS for its superior service to Bethel
8 Park and the entire South Hills.

9 And, again, I encourage the community
10 to observe this week with appropriate
11 programs, ceremonies and activities, signed
12 Mayor Jack Allen.

13 (Applause.)

14 MAYOR ALLEN: Nobody?

15 UNIDENTIFIED PERSON: No, I'm good.
16 Thank you very much.

17 MAYOR ALLEN: I don't know if anyone
18 remembers when Nora was here, we had to put a
19 ten-minute time limit on her.

20 So, well, thank you very much for
21 your service to the community.

22 UNIDENTIFIED PERSON: Thank you.

23 (Applause.)

24 MAYOR ALLEN: And finally, Public
25 Works, do you want to come up? See how many

1 do.

2 MS. DENNE: We got the whole crew
3 here tonight, so...

4 MAYOR ALLEN: All right.

5 MR. JANOSIK: All 20.

6 MAYOR ALLEN: All 20.

7 This gentleman I see every day, but
8 I've never seen him in street clothes.

9 Okay. This is Public Works Week is
10 May 18th to the 24th. And whereas, the year
11 2025 marks the 65th Annual National Public
12 Works Week sponsored by the American Public
13 Works Association and Canadian Public Works
14 Association, resolved, I, Mayor Jack Allen, as
15 the Mayor of the Municipality of Bethel Park
16 do hereby designate the week of May 18th to
17 the 24th, 2025 as National Public Works Week.

18 I urge all citizens to join with
19 representatives of the American Public Works
20 Association and government agencies in
21 recognizing our Public Works professionals,
22 engineers, managers, and employees, and to
23 recognize substantial contributions they make
24 to protecting the health, safety, and quality
25 of life for all Municipality of Bethel Park.

1 And that the Council of the
2 Municipality of Bethel Park wishes to
3 specifically recognize Bethel Park Public
4 Works for its superior service to Bethel Park.

5 And I encourage the community again
6 to observe this week in appropriate programs,
7 ceremonies and activities, and signed Mayor
8 Allen.

9 I'll give that to you.

10 And I also want to --

11 (Applause.)

12 MAYOR ALLEN: So, normally the only
13 time you see these men and Susie is when it's
14 snowing. So, we get more accolades in Bethel
15 Park than anybody. Anyone will tell you the
16 roads are fine here. When they leave Bethel,
17 then they're taking their chance, whether it's
18 to the south, the east, it doesn't make any
19 difference.

20 So, thank you for all you do. And
21 thanks for keeping those roads clean.

22 (Applause.)

23 MR. CONSOLMAGNO: Are you done, Jack?

24 MAYOR ALLEN: Nope. I have the next
25 half hour.

1 And finally, I want to recognize a
2 group. What we've been doing all year,
3 recognizing volunteer organization that helps
4 the community. This month, May, we're
5 recognizing the Blackhawk Family Relief Fund.

6 So, if you guys would come up here.

7 (Applause.)

8 MAYOR ALLEN: Guys and girls. And
9 before I present this to them, I just want to
10 mention that when we had that storm in -- was
11 it 2018, I think? 2018?

12 They were out there. We were working
13 on streets cleaning basements out, whatever we
14 could do. This is the organization that only,
15 you know, helped. They supplied the families
16 with monetary gifts, food. And especially
17 Chris leading the organization.

18 So, the plaque that I have is the
19 year 2025 Year of Community Involvement. In
20 recognition of all your contributions making a
21 difference in Bethel Park, awarded for
22 exemplary service and commitment to excellence
23 to the Blackhawk Family Relief Fund, May 12,
24 2025.

25 (Applause.)

1 MAYOR ALLEN: Now, Chris is -- he's
2 not one to shy from the microphone, so...

3 MR. VAN DYKE: I'll just say it's a
4 privilege helping the citizens of Bethel Park.
5 We all love Bethel Park, speaking on behalf of
6 all our board members. And we just -- we
7 enjoy it. You know, it's very heartwarming to
8 take care of people. But, thank you.

9 MAYOR ALLEN: And thank you very much
10 for all you do for the community.

11 (Applause.)

12 MAYOR ALLEN: And, Mr. President,
13 that's my report.

14 PRESIDENT OAKES: I was running away.

15 MAYOR ALLEN: Well, you can run away.

16 PRESIDENT OAKES: Thank you, Mayor.

17 Now I'd like to turn to Resident
18 Comments for non-agenda items only.

19 Does anyone want to speak for
20 non-agenda items only?

21 Please state your name and address
22 for the record. There will be one -- three
23 minutes to speak.

24 MR. MOURY: Start the clock. Hi.
25 I'm Tim Moury, 108 Heather Drive.

1 I was hoping I'd never have to be
2 here. But being told and watching what
3 happened at last month's meeting, I think it's
4 very important to clarify, not only to
5 everybody here, but the residents of the
6 community about our recreation.

7 There was a few members that spoke.
8 And I'll address one particular comment at the
9 end. But number one is, more than 25 years
10 ago we had problem with fields and scheduling.
11 And it was all done by the recreation
12 director. And it seemed like if you knew an
13 elected official, you could get the premium
14 time and you could get what you wanted.

15 What we did at that time was start
16 the Sports Coalition. The Sports Coalition
17 was, really, all the organizations that used
18 the field sports. They would meet in January
19 or February of each year. The Recreation
20 Director would give them all the field time
21 that was available, and it was up to each
22 organization to work out amongst themselves to
23 figure out, you know, who going to be using
24 what fields.

25 And for 25 years, it's worked rather

1 well. About six or seven years ago, there was
2 an issue initially. The Municipality took
3 care of the fields. They made the
4 determination whether they're open or closed.
5 As it evolved, the groups ended up taking it
6 over.

7 And probably six or seven years ago,
8 it was decided that the Municipality was going
9 to take it back because of the complaints we
10 got from the organizations and we got from the
11 community about the conditions of our fields.

12 We invested a lot of money at that
13 time in equipment and training for our people.
14 And the buy-in from the sports groups were we
15 were going to be able to make some of the
16 decisions on whether the fields were open or
17 closed.

18 For the most part, that worked really
19 well. I'm sure there were bumps in the road.
20 But, unfortunately, at last month's meeting --
21 I'm going to quote the one letter. I won't
22 say the person's name, but the letter's signed
23 "Bethel Park vice president, Baseball vice
24 president, Bethel Park High School counselor,
25 Foundation for PennWest California

1 vice president."

2 The safety issue that was addressed.
3 Understand, the insurance company always told
4 us that if you had a safety concern, the field
5 should be closed, or whatever it was, and be
6 rectified or there's liability.

7 This isn't a staff decision. This
8 was a policy decision by Council with the
9 direction of the insurance carrier. It wasn't
10 a one Public Works person that was
11 responsible.

12 The second one was, the person wanted
13 to meet with the Public Works director
14 regarding the fields. As I said earlier, when
15 we created the coalition, each organization
16 had one person that was to be the communicator
17 to the Public Works. If not, early on, we had
18 20, 30 people coming. And it wasn't what's
19 best for the organization. It was what's best
20 for the person who called.

21 So it was decided at that time, and
22 everybody agreed, that that information --
23 that was going to be one person. In January
24 of this year -- excuse me. In February, I
25 believe, they had a coalition meeting. They

1 reviewed the field policy that you're going to
2 be voting on tonight -- the updated policy.
3 And any problems, issues with the fields,
4 that's when these things should have been
5 addressed. Because you have a capital budget
6 to do, you need to plan ahead.

7 There's also the Challenge Grant
8 program. Each group or organization, if they
9 define things that they need to be fixed,
10 there's a Challenge Grant up to \$25,000 that
11 the Municipality would be more than willing to
12 share with.

13 At those meetings, this person, the
14 Bethel Park High School counselor attended,
15 not one thing was brought up.

16 Speaking of the lights, and it says
17 in here at Simmons, there was more than --

18 PRESIDENT OAKES: Please conclude
19 your comments.

20 MR. MOURY: There was only about 30.

21 I guess the whole moral of the story
22 is, policies are decisions made by you. I'm
23 disappointed there's a member of Council that
24 has went to these people to encourage them to
25 come to the microphone.

1 That's not the way good government
2 should work. And if you have a personal
3 vendetta, you should leave it at the door.
4 And it's unfortunate this person came to the
5 microphone and said these things. I don't
6 think it represents the School District very
7 well.

8 Thank you.

9 PRESIDENT OAKES: Thank you.

10 Anybody else who would like to speak
11 on non-agenda items, you can come to the
12 microphone for non-agenda items.

13 (No response.)

14 PRESIDENT OAKES: Hearing none, we're
15 now going to change to the Consent Agenda.
16 The Consent Agenda, there won't be really any
17 deliberation.

18 But I would like to mention that
19 Bills and Payrolls, the number one
20 overwhelming thing on this month's Bills and
21 Payrolls was our payment to Waste Management.
22 So that's why it's a little bit over our
23 normal average because of that garbage
24 payment.

25 So, Mr. Consolmagno, would you go

1 ahead with the Consent Agenda.

2 MR. CONSOLMAGNO: There's six items
3 on the Consent Agenda: Bills and Payrolls,
4 Approval of Minutes, Bethel Park Elementary
5 School Development Bond Reduction Request
6 No. 1, Bethel Trails Residential Development
7 Bond Reduction Request No. 1, 2025 Road Paving
8 Project, and the Route 88 and Milford Signal
9 Upgrades Pay Application No. 1.

10 PRESIDENT OAKES: Do I have a second?

11 MR. JANOSIK: Second.

12 CHAIRMAN OAKES: I have a -- I have
13 a motion from Mr. Consolmagno and a second
14 from Mr. Janosik that we approve the Consent
15 Agenda of item A, Bills and Payrolls; B,
16 Approval of Minutes; C, Elementary School Bond
17 Reduction; D, Bethel Trails Bond Reduction;
18 2025 Road Paving Project, E; and F, Route 88
19 and Milford Signal Upgrades.

20 Ms. Denne, would you please call the
21 roll.

22 MS. DENNE: Mr. Consolmagno?

23 MR. CONSOLMAGNO: Yes.

24 MS. DENNE: Ms. Kamenicky?

25 MS. KAMENICKY: Yes.

1 MS. DENNE: Mr. Oakes?

2 PRESIDENT OAKES: Yes.

3 MS. DENNE: Mr. Cenci?

4 (No response.)

5 MS. DENNE: Mr. Janosik?

6 MR. JANOSIK: Yes.

7 MS. DENNE: Mr. Jenkins?

8 MR. JENKINS: Yes.

9 MS. DENNE: Mr. Espinar?

10 MR. ESPINAR: Yes.

11 MS. DENNE: Ms. Garis?

12 MS. GARIS: Yes.

13 MS. DENNE: Ms. Flinn?

14 MS. FLINN: Yes.

15 PRESIDENT OAKES: Motion carries 8

16 to 0.

17 Mr. Consolmagno?

18 MR. CONSOLMAGNO: That's all.

19 PRESIDENT OAKES: Okay. Now I'd like
20 to turn to Citizens Comments for General
21 Policy and Finance. And we have one person
22 signed up to speak.

23 Would you please come to the
24 microphone and state your name and address for
25 the record. You'll have three minutes to

1 speak.

2 MR. LORENZI: John Lorenzi, 1636
3 Holly Hill Drive.

4 I just wanted to come out today to
5 address the Field Coalition Policy that I
6 think is going to be voted on here today. But
7 before I do, I want to say that, you know,
8 hearing some of the comments before, I'll
9 leave those at the door.

10 But since my appearance here and
11 Baseball's appearance as a whole and
12 Softball's appearance as whole, the situations
13 at the field has -- have drastically improved.
14 The lights are on, the kids are playing, the
15 families are getting to enjoy their kids
16 playing sports.

17 And, again, that is the purpose,
18 right? That's what we all strive for. And so
19 I just wanted to say thank you to the various
20 entities that helped to make that happen and
21 helped to make a change.

22 As for the Field Coalition document,
23 which you're likely, on the agenda, about to
24 vote on, I just would like to encourage the
25 opportunity for feedback, yes, which we were

1 provided, but also the opportunity to -- when
2 meaningful feedback is provided, to actually
3 make changes in that document.

4 It was referenced that we have these
5 meetings every January and February. And we
6 do, but no changes are made. No changes were
7 made based on our comments. And if this
8 document is the same that you saw in the
9 caucus room, then no changes have been made
10 based on our comments or Softball's, who
11 received this document on Friday before
12 Mother's Day.

13 And also, just referencing the -- the
14 Challenge Grant. The person who wrote that
15 letter, myself, actually did attend the Rec
16 Board meeting in which sheds were discussed.
17 We asked for money for the sheds. The
18 Recreational Board was in our favor in
19 advocating for us, and those were turned down,
20 and some policy was used there.

21 So, some inaccuracies in that
22 statement. But, you know, I just wanted to
23 address that in particular.

24 So, thank you for your time. And,
25 again, thank you for helping the kids get on

1 the fields. Thank you.

2 PRESIDENT OAKES: Thank you very
3 much.

4 (Applause.)

5 PRESIDENT OAKES: Okay. Now I'd like
6 to turn to General Policy and Finance; and
7 Ms. Kamenicky.

8 MS. KAMENICKY: Thank you,
9 Mr. President.

10 I have two items tonight. The first
11 one is the Field Coalition and Athletic Field
12 Use Policy.

13 I move to approve the Field Coalition
14 and Athletic Field Use policies.

15 MR. JANOSIK: Second.

16 CHAIRMAN OAKES: I have a motion
17 from Ms. Kamenicky and a second from
18 Mr. Janosik to approve the Field Coalition and
19 Athletic Field Use policies.

20 Any questions or comments on this
21 item?

22 MR. JENKINS: Mr. President?

23 PRESIDENT OAKES: Mr. Jenkins.

24 MR. JENKINS: We've discussed it a
25 little bit in the back. I just want to say

1 one more time, I think that the addition to
2 this policy, the page titled Athletic Field
3 Use, was rushed through.

4 The bylaws of Parks and Rec say that
5 it's supposed to go to Parks and Rec first.
6 And they're supposed to then make a
7 recommendation to Council.

8 We saw it on the 28th of April and
9 rushed it through, and said we'd vote on it
10 now, tonight. The Parks and Rec had it on
11 their agenda on May 7th. So I just want to
12 express that I really feel that this was done
13 backwards.

14 PRESIDENT OAKES: Thank you very
15 much, Mr. Jenkins.

16 Any other questions or comments?

17 (No response.)

18 PRESIDENT OAKES: Okay. Very
19 quickly. I don't want to really belabor it.
20 But this Board really creates and adjusts
21 policies, is what we're supposed to do. We're
22 legislatures.

23 Our Rec Director made really good
24 changes to this policy. And there's a
25 difference, I think, in the policies and some

1 of the side things, grants, a number of
2 things. There's policies and then there's
3 other things that are included with that.
4 These are just the policies, understand, for
5 this.

6 We did a workshop meeting, a
7 committee meeting. No input was given from
8 Council. We had people that came up to the
9 microphone. No input was given during that
10 committee meeting from any member of public or
11 any of the Field Coalition, anybody that was
12 in attendance at our public -- at our public
13 committee meeting last month.

14 The Parks and Rec Board did review
15 this. And we're okay with everything that's
16 on it with no issues.

17 So, that being said, if there's no
18 other questions or comments, Ms. Denne, would
19 you please call the roll.

20 MS. DENNE: Mr. Consolmagno?

21 MR. CONSOLMAGNO: No.

22 MS. DENNE: Ms. Kamenicky?

23 MS. KAMENICKY: Yes.

24 MS. DENNE: Mr. Oakes?

25 PRESIDENT OAKES: Yes.

1 MS. DENNE: Mr. Janosik?

2 MR. JANOSIK: Yes.

3 MS. DENNE: Mr. Jenkins?

4 MR. JENKINS: No.

5 MS. DENNE: Mr. Espinar?

6 MR. ESPINAR: No.

7 MS. DENNE: Ms. Garis?

8 MS. GARIS: Yes.

9 MS. DENNE: Ms. Flinn?

10 MS. FLINN: Yes.

11 PRESIDENT OAKES: Motion carries 5
12 to 3.

13 Ms. Kamenicky?

14 MS. KAMENICKY: I have one other item
15 this evening. The 2025 IT RFP Vendor
16 Selection.

17 I move to approve Jenlor as the new
18 IT MSP for \$9,049 per month for 24 months,
19 with the moneys coming from the General Fund
20 IT Contract Services Budget, line item 418526.

21 MR. JANOSIK: Second.

22 PRESIDENT OAKES: I have a motion
23 from Ms. Kamenicky, a second from Mr. Janosik
24 that we approve Jenlor as the new IT MSP for
25 \$9,049 per month for 24 months, with moneys

1 coming from the General Fund IT Contract
2 Services Budget, line item 418526.

3 Any questions or comments on this
4 item?

5 MS. KAMENICKY: Yes. Mr. President?

6 MR. CONSOLMAGNO: Go ahead.

7 MS. KAMENICKY: I just want to say
8 this contract was up, so the staff recommended
9 and met with many different IT providers and
10 unanimously decided that this was the way to
11 go.

12 Their proximity to our Municipal
13 office would allow them to respond to
14 emergencies a little more quickly, so we
15 decided to go with the staff recommendation of
16 Jenlor.

17 PRESIDENT OAKES: Thank you very
18 much.

19 Any other questions or comments?

20 MR. CONSOLMAGNO: Mr. Oakes.

21 PRESIDENT OAKES: Mr. Consolmagno.

22 MR. CONSOLMAGNO: I will not be
23 voting on this. I will be abstaining due to
24 the fact that an individual in my family works
25 for one of the companies. Thank you.

1 PRESIDENT OAKES: Thank you very
2 much, Mr. Consolmagno.

3 Any other questions or comments?

4 (No response.)

5 PRESIDENT OAKES: Ms. Denne, would
6 you please call the roll.

7 MS. DENNE: Mr. Consolmagno --

8 MR. CONSOLMAGNO: Abstain.

9 MS. DENNE: -- has abstained.

10 Ms. Kamenicky?

11 MS. KAMENICKY: Yes.

12 MS. DENNE: Mr. Oakes?

13 PRESIDENT OAKES: Yes.

14 MS. DENNE: Mr. Janosik?

15 MR. JANOSIK: Yes.

16 MS. DENNE: Mr. Jenkins?

17 MR. JENKINS: Yes.

18 MS. DENNE: Mr. Espinar?

19 MR. ESPINAR: Yes.

20 MS. DENNE: Ms. Garis?

21 MS. GARIS: Yes.

22 MS. DENNE: Ms. Flinn?

23 MS. FLINN: Yes.

24 PRESIDENT OAKES: Motion carries; 7
25 yeses, one abstention.

1 Ms. Kamenicky?

2 MS. KAMENICKY: I have no other items
3 tonight. Thank you.

4 PRESIDENT OAKES: Okay. Any comments
5 for Health, Safety and Welfare? Citizens
6 comments for Health, Safety and Welfare?

7 (No response.)

8 PRESIDENT OAKES: Hearing none, I
9 would like to now change to Mr. Janosik in
10 Health, Safety and Welfare.

11 MR. JANOSIK: Thank you, President
12 Oakes.

13 Four items for Health, Safety and
14 Welfare this evening.

15 Item No. 1 is the Allegheny Arms
16 Weapons Trade In.

17 I move to approve the sale of eight
18 retired less lethal Mossberg 500 18-inch
19 barreled shotguns to Allegheny Arms at \$100
20 each, for \$800 total. This money will be
21 applied to the General Fund's Ammunition
22 Budget, line item 4106390000.

23 MR. JENKINS: Second.

24 PRESIDENT OAKES: Okay. I have a
25 motion from Mr. Janosik, a second from

1 Mr. Jenkins that we approve the sale of eight
2 retired less lethal Mossberg 500 18-inch
3 barreled shotguns to Allegheny Arms at \$100
4 each, for \$800 total. This money will be
5 applied to the General Fund's Ammunition

14 including placing a stop sign at Summit Street
15 and Driftwood Drive.

16 MR. CONSOLMAGNO: Second.

17 PRESIDENT OAKES: Okay. I have a
18 motion from Mr. Janosik, a second from
19 Mr. Consolmagno that we approve Ordinance
20 05-12-25A, an update to Ordinance 65.24.1,
21 Stop Signs, to including placing a stop sign
22 at Summit Street and Driftwood Drive.

23 Any questions or comments on this
24 item?

25 MR. JANOSIK: President Oakes?

1 PRESIDENT OAKES: Mr. Janosik.

2 MR. JANOSIK: Yeah, real quick. This
3 is right down the road here. It's a T where
4 Summit meets Driftwood. And there's currently
5 no stop signs there, so people kind of move
6 freely through that little section.

7 I travel it all the time on my way to
8 the high school to pick up the boys and drop
9 them off. So this is a much needed safety
10 precaution.

11 I appreciate it, Chief. That's all.

12 PRESIDENT OAKES: Any other questions
13 or comments?

14 (No response.)

15 PRESIDENT OAKES: Ms. Denne, would
16 you please call the roll.

17 MS. DENNE: Mr. Consolmagno?

18 MR. CONSOLMAGNO: Yes.

14 Ordinance No. 1-13-92C and Ordinance
15 No. 1-13-92D to have the no parking signs
16 align with the proper time periods for no
17 parking and to be more -- and to add more
18 specific and sufficient signage to those
19 locations.

20 MR. CONSOLMAGNO: Second.

21 PRESIDENT OAKES: I have a -- I have
22 a motion from Mr. Janosik, a second from
23 Mr. Consolmagno that we approve Ordinance
24 05-12-25B, an update to Ordinance 1-13-92C,
25 Ordinance No. 1-13-92D to have the no parking

1 signs align with the proper time periods for
2 no parking and add more specific and
3 sufficient signage to those locations.

4 Any questions or comments on those
5 items?

6 (No response.)

7 MR. JANOSIK: President Oakes?

8 PRESIDENT OAKES: Mr. Janosik.

9 MR. JANOSIK: Yeah, real quick. This
10 affects Murray and Boyer roads, which are off
11 of Berryman, going down Route 88 towards the
12 south of the community. I just wanted to make
13 sure I mentioned the roads that this was
14 affecting.

15 Thank you.

16 PRESIDENT OAKES: Thank you very
17 much.

18 Any other questions or comments?

19 (No response.)

20 PRESIDENT OAKES: Hearing none,
21 Ms. Denne, would you please call the roll.

22 MS. DENNE: Mr. Consolmagno?

21 additional year, to be effective July 2025 to
22 July 2026.

23 MR. ESPINAR: Second.

24 PRESIDENT OAKES: I have a -- I have
25 a motion by Mr. Janosik, a second from

1 Mr. Espinar that we approve the Civil Service
2 listing of new hire candidates for an
3 additional year to be effective July 2025 to
4 July 2026.

5 Any questions or comments on this
6 item?

7 MR. JANOSIK: Yeah, real quick. This
8 came at the recommendation of Chief Arnold.
9 This is the list we use to update and to
10 hire -- bring on new hires for the Police
11 Department when it's needed. And so we're
12 just extending this for when the time comes,
13 if it comes.

14 PRESIDENT OAKES: Perfect.

15 Any other questions or comments?

16 (No response.)

17 PRESIDENT OAKES: Ms. Denne, would
18 you please call the roll.

19 MS. DENNE: Mr. Consolmagno?

20 MR. CONSOLMAGNO: Yes.

22 nothing on the agenda tonight.

23 PRESIDENT OAKES: Okay. Thank you
24 very much.

25 Under Public Works and Maintenance,

1 we have no citizens signed up to speak.

2 So I'll now turn to Ms. Flinn with
3 Public Works and Maintenance.

4 MS. FLINN: President Oakes, we have
5 three items tonight under Public Works and
6 Maintenance.

7 The first one is the 2024 Storm

9 Application.

16 PRESIDENT OAKES: I have a motion

20 This is to be charged to MS4 Capital Projects
21 Budget, line item 06-430-753-0000.

22 Any questions or comments on this
23 item?

24 (No response.)

25 PRESIDENT OAKES: Hearing none,

1 Ms. Denne, would you please call the roll.

2 MS. DENNE: Mr. Consolmagno?

3 MR. CONSOLMAGNO: Yes.

14 at 8:21 p.m.)

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
