PRESIDENT OAKES: Okay. Calling the Regular Council Meeting for January 12, 2026 to order.

Can we have the roll call, please.

MS. DENNE: Yes.

Ms. Ford?

MS. FORD: Here.

MS. DENNE: Ms. Kamenicky?

MS. KAMENICKY: Here.

MS. DENNE: Mr. Oakes?

MR. OAKES: Here.

MS. DENNE: Mr. Cenci?

MR. CENCI: Here.

MS. DENNE: Mr. Janosik?

PRESIDENT JANOSIK: Here.

MS. DENNE: Mr. Jenkins called in with an excused absence.

Ms. Kautzman?

MS. KAUTZMAN: Here.

MS. DENNE: Ms. Garis?

MS. GARIS: Here.

MS. DENNE: Mrs. Piccolino?

MRS. PICCOLINO: Here.

1 PRESIDENT OAKES: Please stand for
2 the Pledge of Allegiance.

4 (Whereupon, the Pledge of Allegiance
5 was recited.)

6 PRESIDENT OAKES: Chair
7 Announcements; and Ms. Kamenicky.

8 MS. KAMENICKY: Thank you, President
9 Janosik.

10 We have one item tonight, the
11 resignations from the Zoning Hearing Board.

12 I move to approve the resignations of
13 Charles Koch and Carol Stewart from the Zoning
14 Hearing Board effective January 12, 2026.

15 MR. OAKES: Second.

16 PRESIDENT OAKES: I have a motion
17 from Ms. Kamenicky and a second from
18 Mr. Oakes.

19 Any discussion on this item?

20 (No response.)

21 PRESIDENT OAKES: I would just say
22 I want to make a quick comment thanking
23 Mr. Koch and Ms. Stewart on the Zoning Hearing
24 Board.

25 I started my public service on the

1 Zoning Hearing Board, working with these guys.
2 And I really appreciate everything they've
3 done.

4 Mr. Koch is a former Council member
5 and a former member of the School Board. And
6 so I just wanted to say thank you.

7 Can we have a roll call?

8 MS. DENNE: Yes, sir.

9 Ms. Ford?

10 MS. FORD: Yes.

11 MS. DENNE: Ms. Kamenicky?

12 MS. KAMENICKY: Yes.

13 MS. DENNE: Mr. Oakes?

14 MR. OAKES: Yes.

15 MS. DENNE: Mr. Cenci?

16 MR. CENCI: Yes.

17 MS. DENNE: Mr. Janosik?

18 PRESIDENT JANOSIK: Yes.

19 MS. DENNE: Mrs. Kautzman?

20 MRS. KAUTZMAN: Yes.

21 MS. DENNE: Ms. Garis?

22 MS. GARIS: Yes.

23 MS. DENNE: Mrs. Piccolino?

24 MRS. PICCOLINO: Yes.

25 PRESIDENT OAKES: Vote is 8-0.

1 Moving on to Reports of Officials.

2 And the Library Director is not
3 available this evening.

4 So, moving on to the Police Chief;
5 Chief Arnold.

6 CHIEF ARNOLD: Good evening,
7 everyone.

8 Tonight, I have a couple special
9 people here with me tonight. Of course, all
10 you know our favorite officer, Amber --
11 Officer Carruba.

12 Then we'd also like to call up Riya
13 Spinda, if she's here.

14 Come on up, Riya.

15 So, I'm going to turn this over to
16 Officer Carruba. She has something to present
17 Riya with.

18 OFFICER CARRUBA: Thank you so much.

19 So, last year we decided to try
20 something a little different with our holiday
21 cards that we send out from our Department.
22 And we did a little competition with our
23 fourth grade class. We went to all the
24 elementary schools, and we asked them to give
25 us their best artwork.

1 And we had a fantastic turnout. We
2 had a whole stack of cards that we went
3 through, and they were all fantastic. One
4 stood out to us a little bit -- a little bit
5 more. Our little artist here, Riya, was the
6 winner of our competition.

7 Everyone had a great time with it.
8 So we're hoping that we do it every year.

9 But for her efforts here, we have her
10 -- the Christmas card and her fantastic art
11 framed.

12 You want to hold that? There you go.
13 You got it?

14 MS. SPINDA: Uh-huh.

15 OFFICER CARRUBA: Put that in your
16 room.

17 I also have a couple gifts here. We
18 got an art kit for you, and then a very
19 exclusive BPPD swag here. The first kid in
20 Bethel to get one of these, so it's very --
21 you can, you know, color it. And I'm sure
22 you're going to make it look beautiful.

23 So, you're an incredible artist. And
24 you should remember Officer Carruba gave you
25 these items. Can you remember that?

1 MS. SPINDA: Uh-huh.

2 OFFICER CARRUBA: Carruba, okay?

3 MS. SPINDA: Uh-huh.

4 OFFICER CARRUBA: All right. Thank
5 you so much for participating. You're
6 fantastic. Your art is wonderful. I was
7 actually not convinced that a fourth grader
8 actually drew this because it was so good.
9 But we confirmed that you're just a wonderful
10 little artist.

11 So, good luck. We're going to see
12 great things from you, right?

13 MS. SPINDA: Uh-huh.

14 OFFICER CARRUBA: All right.

15 (Applause.)

16 CHIEF ARNOLD: Yeah, we weren't sure
17 that this was actually from a fourth grader.
18 I want to be her manager when she gets the
19 contract from Hallmark.

20 Really quick, one other announcement
21 we have is, recently we've had two incidents
22 where cars were taken from parking lots that
23 were left running. So, please, please,
24 please, do not leave your car running when
25 you're running into a convenience store or

1 leaving it just for a brief moment of time.
2 Please lock your doors and turn them off while
3 you're running into a store.

4 And then lastly, we want to announce
5 that we have our Crime Watch meeting
6 February 2nd -- Monday, February 2nd,
7 7:00 p.m. at the Community Center.

8 That's all I have for tonight.

9 PRESIDENT JANOSIK: Thank you, Chief
10 Arnold.

11 Next up, we have the Fire Chief's
12 Report.

13 MR. USELMAN: Thank you. Good
14 evening, Council. Good evening, residents of
15 Bethel Park.

16 My name's Rob Uselman. I am actually
17 the Deputy Chief now of the Volunteer Fire
18 Company. And I'm here with the December
19 Chief's Report.

20 Each year, we have our annual
21 elections. We do it in the month of December.
22 That's why usually an officer isn't here to
23 present the Chief's Report for November.

24 For this year, we have a few changes
25 for our line officers. One is our past Chief,

1 Dave Gerber was -- actually lost in election.
2 He was Chief for 14 years. We really commend
3 Dave. He was a great leader for those 14
4 years.

5 But the Company decided to go a
6 different direction. And now our new Chief is
7 Russ Beeson. He will serve a two-year term.
8 So, if you see Chief Beeson out and about,
9 give him -- give him all the support.

10 Dave's still there. Chief Gerber is
11 still available and still going to make calls.
12 So, he's still a great assist to the Fire
13 Company. So, that's one big change.

14 Obviously, you just met me. I'm the
15 new Deputy Chief. The new Assistant Chief is
16 Tom Kelton. And then we have two new cap- --
17 well, Jon Mark is one captain and Mike
18 Innocenti is the another. And then Lieutenant
19 Steve McGough and Adam Betzler. You may see
20 some different officers from time to time
21 throughout the year.

22 Another big change that happened for
23 us was our -- we have a presidential election.
24 President Jim Thomas was our former President.
25 He decided not to run this year. So now we

1 have a new President, Jeff Pritchard. So you
2 may see him from time to time around.

3 So, those are the big changes that
4 happened.

5 Now for the incidents for the month.
6 We had a total of 63 calls, which was a rather
7 busy month. Nine -- nine fire incidents.
8 Nothing major in the community, though. Seven
9 accidents and a rescue, eight hazardous
10 conditions, seven CO calls, three electrical
11 issues, 15 good intent calls, two smoke
12 scares, and 12 fire alarms, for a total of 63
13 incidents.

14 So, it was a busy month. But nothing
15 we are not used to at this point in the time.

16 A big thing is, last year we had six
17 new members join. We are 100 percent
18 volunteer. We rely deeply on a lot of people
19 coming into the community who want to join and
20 help serve the community. It's one big thing
21 that we have.

22 So, six people is pretty good.
23 That's about our average. We average about
24 five to ten a year. Just to give you --
25 everybody here a heads-up, though. It usually

1 takes us, if they're brand-new to the fire
2 service, about a year and a half to get them
3 up to speed to where they're ready to be a
4 true firefighter for us.

5 So, it's important that we keep
6 people joining. And we're always looking for
7 new members. There's no cost to join. And we
8 have a gym that's free. So, you know, it's a
9 new year, if you want to get in shape and want
10 to help serve the community, come on down and
11 fill out an application.

12 Finally, a little fire safety. In
13 the next few months, as we know, it's going to
14 be cold nights. If you're utilizing space
15 heaters, please take care and ensure they're
16 plugged directly into the wall outlet, and at
17 least there's a 3 foot space around them.

18 It's very important, especially as
19 the nights get colder, that you don't have
20 anything that's combustible that could catch
21 on fire. We really don't want to come to your
22 house in the middle of the night. I really
23 like to sleep.

24 So, that's all I have for the report.

25 PRESIDENT JANOSIK: Thank you, Deputy

1 Chief Uselman.

2 And congratulations to Chief Beeson
3 and the rest of the line officers and the new
4 President there.

5 Moving on to the Manager's Report;
6 and Ms. Denne.

7 MS. DENNE: Yes. I will keep it
8 brief this morning, being that there's a very
9 special event going on later this evening.

10 I wanted to announce that the
11 Historical Society in collaboration with the
12 Community Foundation had drafted four artists
13 to do original artwork to celebrate America's
14 250.

15 They are going to be releasing these
16 on February 7th at an event at the Historical
17 Society from 9:00 a.m. to 2:00 p.m. And the
18 ceremony to unveil these items will be at
19 11:00 a.m.

20 So if anybody is interested in this,
21 there's a lot of thought that's gone into
22 this. All of the original artwork has a
23 Bethel Park theme to it. So, please feel free
24 to stop by.

25 And just one winter weather reminder,

1 to please remove your cars from the streets
2 when we do have winter weather. It is very
3 difficult for our plow trucks to be able to
4 get through the streets. And we may not be
5 able to treat your road if there are cars on
6 it.

7 So, please give these ladies and
8 gentlemen that are out there many hours a
9 little bit of a break, and remember to remove
10 your cars from the road.

11 That's all.

12 PRESIDENT OAKES: Thank you,
13 Ms. Denne.

14 Moving on to the Mayor's Report; and
15 Mayor Allen.

16 MAYOR ALLEN: Okay. Thank you,
17 Mr. President.

18 I have our annual lighting -- house
19 lighting awards for Christmas. I'll read the
20 award first. And I think there's a couple
21 families that are here.

22 The award -- this Award for
23 Excellence presented this 12th day of January,
24 2026 by the Municipality of Bethel Park to
25 the house that we're recognizing. In

1 acknowledgment of the outstanding 2025 holiday
2 season display of decorations at your
3 residence, you are hereby presented the
4 Mayor's Award For Excellence. This
5 recognition herein given to your home
6 signifies that your holiday decorations were
7 judged to be the best in your Ward. Bethel
8 Park appreciates your efforts to enhance our
9 community's image at this special time of
10 year. So congratulations and best wishes for
11 a bright 2026.

12 So, Ward 1 winner -- and she was
13 going to try to make it -- it's Karen Gordon.
14 Is she here?

15 Come on up. She wasn't sure she
16 could make it on time, but she did.

17 (Applause.)

18 MAYOR ALLEN: Here's your award.

19 MS. GORDON: Thank you so much.

20 MAYOR ALLEN: Do you want to say a
21 few words?

22 MS. GORDON: No. I just really
23 appreciate it. I know a lot of people go
24 above and beyond for each time, and it makes
25 it more appreciative for me.

1 MAYOR ALLEN: Okay.

2 MS. GORDON: There's my house.

3 MAYOR ALLEN: That's it.

4 PRESIDENT JANOSIK: There it is.

5 Thank you.

6 (Appause.)

7 MAYOR ALLEN: Ward 2 --

8 And, by the way, her house was at

9 5424 California Avenue.

10 Ward 2, Irene and Tom Sumansky, 6159

11 Boxer. I don't think they're here.

12 Ward 3, Leslie and Wayne Grant at 475

13 Parkridge Drive.

14 Ward 4, Carol and David Lucci at 6650

15 Chapel Drive -- or Chapel Drive.

16 Ward 5, is Crystal Gorman and Ronald

17 Perallo, 128 Old Connor Road.

18 Ward 6, Debra and Michael Fate, 5740

19 Scenic View.

20 Okay. Ward 7 is Lisa and Joseph

21 Keene, and that's at 206 Manor Court.

22 And we do have Ward 8 here. It's

23 Michon and Nathan Budziszewski, 2475 Driftwood

24 Drive.

25 (Appause.)

1 MS. KEENE: We're Ward 7.

2 MAYOR ALLEN: Pardon me?

3 MS. KEENE: We're Ward 7.

4 MAYOR ALLEN: Oh, okay.

5 Oh, so you're Lisa?

6 MS. KEENE: Yeah.

7 MAYOR ALLEN: Oh, okay.

8 And here's your award. If you'd like
9 to say a few words?

10 MS. KEENE: Yeah, sure.

11 MAYOR ALLEN: Okay.

12 MS. KEENE: We just wanted to thank
13 you very much. My husband was so excited. He
14 couldn't be here because of the Steelers game.
15 But you really made his day and year. So,
16 thank you so much.

17 (Applause.)

18 CHILD: Let's go Steelers.

19 MAYOR ALLEN: Yay.

20 (Applause.)

21 MAYOR ALLEN: That's what why we're
22 trying to get through this quickly.

23 Well, thank you very much.

24 MS. KEENE: Thank you very much.

25 MAYOR ALLEN: Okay. So, Ward 8 is

1 here. And they live at 2475 Driftwood, I
2 think I said.

3 And there's your award.

4 MR. BUDZISZEWSKI: Thank you.

5 MAYOR ALLEN: Do you want to say a
6 few words?

7 MR. BUDZISZEWSKI: Thanks for
8 recognizing us. And go Steelers.

9 MAYOR ALLEN: Who did all the work on
10 the house? You did it all?

11 MR. BUDZISZEWSKI: Team effort.

12 MAYOR ALLEN: Girls, you didn't help?

13 MS. BUDZISZEWSKI: They helped a
14 little bit.

15 MAYOR ALLEN: You helped. You
16 helped.

17 MR. BUDZISZEWSKI: They kept me
18 company.

19 MAYOR ALLEN: Yeah, okay. Thank you.

20 MR. BUDZISZEWSKI: Thank you.

21 MS. BUDZISZEWSKI: Thank you.

22 MAYOR ALLEN: Okay. And in Ward 9,
23 we have Ramona and Brian Harkins, 155 Opalwood
24 Court.

25 (Applause.)

1 MAYOR ALLEN: I'll give you your
2 award. And who's your spokesperson?

3 MR. HARKINS: I just want to say
4 thank you.

5 MAYOR ALLEN: You're anxious to get
6 to the game, too?

7 MR. HARKINS: Aren't you all?

8 MAYOR ALLEN: Okay. Thank you very
9 much.

10 MR. HARKINS: Thank you.

11 (Applause.)

12 MAYOR ALLEN: We also want to want to
13 give a special thanks to all the judges and
14 residents who took time to nominate the
15 houses. It's tough to get judges, but we
16 always get them. And like I said at the last
17 meeting, unfortunately, you can't win two
18 years in a row, so... But you'll be the judge
19 next year, so that will help.

20 And then finally, the only other
21 thing I have, and I don't think that he made
22 it, I have a Certificate of Recognition. And
23 this is to the Bethel Park Shop 'n Save for
24 their generous donations in assisting the
25 collection of food for the Municipality and

1 the Bethel Blackhawk Relief Family Fund food
2 collection event for Thanksgiving and
3 Christmas. So, they're awarded this the 12th
4 day of January 2026.

5 Now, we'll send that to him. But I
6 just want to, you know, put a big thank you
7 out there because they were tremendous. They
8 donated a lot of food while we had our
9 government shutdown. And then even after that
10 they called us and said, "Are you still coming
11 up for this food?" I said, "Well, if you have
12 it, we're coming." So, I want a special
13 thanks for Shop 'n Save.

14 And that's all my report.

15 PRESIDENT OAKES: Thank you, Mayor
16 Allen.

17 Next up, our Resident Comments for

15 Resident Comments for Public Works
16 and Maintenance.

17 No one was signed up.
