3 PRESIDENT JANOSIK: Calling the
4 February 9, 2026 Regular Council Meeting to
5 order.

6 Roll call, please.

7 That's okay.

8 MS. FORD: I'm here.

9 MS. DENNE: Just one second. I
10 apologize.

11 (Brief pause.)

12 MS. DENNE: Okay. Roll call.

13 Ms. Ford?

14 MS. FORD: Here.

15 MS. DENNE: Ms. Kamenicky?

17 MS. DENNE: Mr. Oakes?

18 MR. OAKES: Present.

13 PRESIDENT JANOSIK: All right. Thank
14 you.

15 Chair Announcements; there was an
16 executive session held tonight, February 9th,
17 at 6:45 to discuss legal matters.

18 Moving on to the next Chair
19 Announcement; and Ms. Kamenicky.

20 MS. KAMENICKY: Thank you,
21 Mr. President.

22 Boards and Commissions
23 Reappointments.

24 I move to reappoint the following

15 MR. OAKES: Second.

16 PRESIDENT JANOSIK: We have a motion
17 by Ms. Kamenicky and a second by Mr. Oakes.

18 Any discussion on this matter?

19 (No response.)

20 PRESIDENT JANOSIK: Please call the
21 roll.

22 MS. DENNE: Ms. Ford?

23 MS. FORD: Aye.

24 MS. DENNE: Ms. Kamenicky?

25 MS. KAMENICKY: Yes.

1 MS. DENNE: Mr. Oakes?

2 MR. OAKES: Yes.

3 MS. DENNE: Mr. Janosik?

4 PRESIDENT JANOSIK: Yes.

5 MS. DENNE: Mr. Jenkins?

6 MR. JENKINS: Yes.

7 MS. DENNE: Mrs. Kautzman?

8 MRS. KAUTZMAN: Yes.

9 MS. DENNE: Ms. Garis?

10 MS. GARIS: Yes.

11 MS. DENNE: Mrs. Piccolino?

12 MRS. PICCOLINO: Yes.

13 PRESIDENT JANOSIK: Motion passes 8
14 to 0.

15 Moving on to the Reports of
16 Officials; and the Library Director.

17 MS. McINTOSH: Good evening,
18 everybody. My name's Christine. I'm the
19 Director of your Public Library, where we
20 provide opportunities to explore, learn,
21 create, and connect.

22 I have some statistics from January.
23 We had 9,970 visitors to the Library during
24 the month of January. That is an average of
25 322 visitors per day. Those visitors borrowed

1 just under 20,000 physical items and just
2 under 8,500 electronic items borrowed. So
3 that's e-books, e-audio, e-video, and
4 e-magazine.

5 If those items had been purchased by
6 our patrons, it would have cost them \$738,000
7 for the month of January alone, based on
8 retail costs of \$26 per hardback book.

9 The Library also hosted 72 onsite and
10 an additional 48 outreach programs for youth
11 and adults, with 2,145 attendees.

12 We have a lot of programs going on
13 in February. Regular Story Time is on hiatus
14 during February. There's some special
15 programs going on. We have Big Science,
16 Little People STEM class for ages three to six
17 with a caregiver on Tuesday, February 24th at
18 10:30 in the morning.

19 And then for adults, we have Harness
20 the Power of AI: An Introduction, on Friday,
21 February 20th at 10:30 in the morning. And a
22 3D Printing and Tinkercad Software for adults
23 class on Thursday, February 26th at 6:30 in
24 the morning.

25 The Library has federal tax forms and

1 instruction booklets and a limited number of
2 state tax forms and instruction booklets, as
3 well as the Rent/Real Estate Tax Rebate
4 booklets. And when they're gone, they're
5 gone.

6 I just wanted to take a moment to
7 thank those that came to our America 250
8 program, our Art Reveal Ceremony this past
9 Saturday, February 7th.

10 We had a really great crowd. We had
11 Senator Robinson, Representative Mihalek. She
12 came a little later. County Executive Sara
13 Innamorato. We had County Council Person Dan
14 Grzybek, and some other fine dignitaries from
15 our community.

16 It was a really, really great event.
17 We unveiled our America 250 art. And we had
18 the artist there. We had four artists there.
19 It had great press coverage.

20 Thank you, Kristin, for sending out
21 that press release.

22 We had KDKA, the Trib, the
23 Post-Gazette, and the Almanac. We had Larry
24 Richard was our MC. So, it was really great.

25 The prints are on sale through -- we

1 have a QR code. Check our socials. Not only
2 ours, but the Historical Society's, the
3 Education Foundation, the Community
4 Foundation. And I know BPTV is going to do a
5 little segment for us as well, so...

6 And just an announcement. The
7 Library will be closed next Monday,
8 February 16th in honor of President's Day.

9 And that is all that I have this
10 evening.

11 Any questions?

12 (No response.)

13 MS. McINTOSH: Thank you.

14 PRESIDENT JANOSIK: Thank you,
15 Christine.

16 Moving on to the Police Chief's
17 Report; and Chief Arnold.

18 CHIEF ARNOLD: Good evening,
19 everyone.

20 Tonight, I'd like to discuss
21 crowdfunding scams. These scams occur when
22 criminals mislead people online in an attempt
23 to collect money for fake causes or a cause
24 they are not affiliated with.

25 They are often promoted by a post on

1 Facebook, and are unknowingly shared by people
2 we know and trust. These scams are easy to
3 fall victim to because they feed on our
4 emotional reactions and desire to help someone
5 in need.

6 While we should never be discouraged
7 from stepping up to support our neighbors,
8 there are some things you can do to help
9 ensure it's done safely.

10 You should always verify the person,
11 the story, and the crowdfunding platform to
12 confirm it is legitimate. After a
13 publicly-known incident such as a house fire
14 that makes the news or a natural disaster, it
15 is not uncommon to see multiple individuals
16 attempting to capitalize on the situation.

17 You should be cautious if multiple
18 people are requesting donations for the same
19 cause. You should double-check who created
20 the fundraiser. It should be a red flag if
21 the organizer does not have a clear connection
22 to the victim or is using an account with no
23 real identity.

24 If the fundraiser is legitimate, the
25 organizer should be traceable to a known

1 friend, family member, or organization.

2 Keep an eye out for AI-generated or
3 stolen photos. Scammers often use images
4 taken from news articles, social media
5 profiles, or old fundraisers. A quick reverse
6 image search can help determine if a photo
7 has been used elsewhere or from a different
8 story.

9 Only donate through official
10 crowdfunding platforms, and never send money
11 through Cash App, Venmo, gift cards or
12 cryptocurrency. Avoid unfamiliar platforms
13 that do not offer fraud reporting or the
14 ability to dispute transactions if a
15 fundraiser turns out to be fraudulent.

16 Be wary of fundraisers with large
17 goals but no clear breakdown of what the money
18 will be used for. Legitimate campaigns should
19 always include specific details about how the
20 funds will be spent, including what will
21 happen if donations exceed the goal.

22 When in doubt, donate to trusted
23 organizations. It's often safer to give to
24 verified nonprofits, official relief funds, or
25 local community organizations. If possible,

1 consider donating directly to the individual
2 or the family in need.

3 That's all I have for the
4 crowdfunding scams.

5 I have one announcement, and that's
6 for our Crime Watch meeting will be Monday,
7 March 2nd, 7:00 p.m. at the Community Center.

8 That's all I have tonight.

9 PRESIDENT JANOSIK: Thank you, Chief
10 Arnold.

11 Moving on to the Fire Chief's Report;
12 and First Captain Jon Mark.

13 MR. MARK: Good evening, everyone.

14 January 2026 was a very busy month
15 for us. I won't give you the normal breakdown
16 like I would normally because I'll be here
17 forever.

18 But we ran a total of 90 calls in the
19 month of January. To my understanding, that
20 is the second highest month of calls in Fire
21 Company history. I think the Snowmageddon
22 2010 was the only year that we had more calls
23 in a single month.

24 We had an average of 11 personnel per
25 call and 2.- -- 2.9 calls per day. Total man

1 hours for January 2026: Responding to calls
2 514 man hours, 264 man hours of training,
3 9 hours of external training, and 540 hours in
4 storm coverage. That's going to be set up,
5 tear down, you know, during the storm and
6 after. Total man hours for January would be
7 1,327.

8 The top responder for the month of
9 January was Dante Bongiorno with 57 calls.

10 The top responder for the first
11 quarter of the 2026 point year would be
12 Firefighter Brad Floom with 107.

13 And just so everybody's aware, our
14 point year starts in October, so that's why
15 we're at the first quarter already.

16 Tonight, one member is going to be
17 elevated from probationary status to "A"
18 Member. We congratulate Firefighter Don
19 Roose.

20 And one new member we'd like to
21 welcome is probationary Firefighter Corey
22 Gerber, who is the son of Past Chief Dave
23 Gerber.

24 A couple safety tips. We'll talk
25 about heater safety. Those should be away

1 from anything that can burn. The general rule
2 is about 3 feet. And those should be plugged
3 in directly into the wall outlet, not into an
4 extension cord or a surge protector, anything
5 of that type. Only into the wall.

6 And then, also, if you have a hydrant
7 in your neighborhood or on your property, dig
8 them out. A general rule for that is also
9 3 feet all the way around that. So, the life
10 you save may be your own.

11 That's all I have.

12 PRESIDENT JANOSIK: Thank you, First
13 Captain Mark.

14 And moving on to the Manager's
15 Report; and Ms. Denne.

16 MS. DENNE: Yes. I just wanted to
17 make an announcement. I know there's been
18 some concern in the community regarding sewage
19 bills.

20 There still are about 1,200 bills
21 that do need to reach the residences. They
22 should not be concerned. This is due to the
23 date that their bill usage was updated into
24 the system.

25 They will be receiving the bill

1 before the end of February. If they have any
2 questions, please feel free to call the
3 Municipal offices and ask for the Finance
4 Department.

5 It is anticipated that these bills
6 will reach their homes before the end of
7 February. There will be no form of finance
8 charges or interest charges. We are aware of
9 this situation and we are addressing it.

10 But please feel free to call up the
11 Finance Department if you are having
12 concerns.

13 I also wanted to bring up the America
14 250 event that we had this weekend. We had
15 guest performances by the Statue of Liberty
16 and Andrew Hamilton. It was a great event.

17 The artwork is absolutely beautiful.
18 And there is something that everyone can
19 afford to buy from the ornaments up to the
20 prints. And I can't even imagine what the
21 originals cost, and I don't want to know.

22 But thank you, everybody, involved in
23 that. It was well-attended.

24 The Municipal offices will also be
25 closed on President's Day.

1 There will be a Senior Assistance
2 Clinic on February 26th that is being hosted
3 by Representative Mihalek and Senator Robinson
4 at the Community Center. They will have the
5 ability to get your Connect Cards, Tax and
6 Rent Rebates, and information on unclaimed
7 property.

8 We will be having a free Job Fair
9 again this year on April 9th. And this is
10 free for both the job seekers and for the
11 interested hiring parties. Please go to our
12 website. There is a registration on there if
13 you are a local employer that would like to
14 participate at this event. It has been very
15 well-attended by both participants and
16 employers in the last couple years.

17 A final reminder is, on the 17th of
18 this month we will have an Indoor Market with
19 various vendors. We are also going to have a
20 partnership that the County Department of
21 Human Services will be there to work with the
22 public to let them know about these services
23 that the County does offer for Human Services.

24 And I think that's really it, I
25 promise.

1 PRESIDENT JANOSIK: Thank you,
2 Ms. Denne.

3 Moving on to the Mayor's Report; and
4 Mayor Allen.

5 MAYOR ALLEN: Thank you,
6 Mr. President.

7 I just have a few items. First, I
8 want to thank Public Works for the great job
9 that they did in this monstrous snowstorm
10 we've had over the last couple weeks. They
11 were out. They knew when to throw salt, when
12 not to throw salt, when to plow. So, just a
13 big thanks to Susie and her group.

14 The other thing, what the Captain
15 reminded me of is, if you have a house with
16 the sidewalk, you are responsible for cleaning
17 that sidewalk off. And just driving around
18 Bethel, most people have. It doesn't seem to
19 be a problem. There's a couple here and
20 there. But if you have a sidewalk, please
21 keep it clear.

22 And lastly, one thing that we've done
23 quite a few times in the last two months is we
24 send out SwiftReach messages right from here
25 at this office. People that I run into, "I

1 didn't get a message. I don't know how to get
2 a message."

3 It's very easy. You just go onto our
4 website www.bethelparkpa.gov and scroll all
5 the way to the bottom, and there's an
6 "emergency alert" icon down there. Hit that
7 icon, and it brings up a sheet which you fill
8 in with your phone number, address, whatever
9 you want to let us know, and we will add you
10 to the list.

11 But keep in mind that if you click
12 "mobile," you won't be able to click "home."
13 So you're going to have to make the choice
14 whether it's going to be your mobile phone or
15 your landline.

16 So, we want to get everyone involved.
17 You know, we'll let you know if a storm's
18 coming. If it's a bad snow, make sure your
19 car's not on the road. It really worked well
20 this time. We had very few problems like
21 we've had in the past.

22 So, if you're not on that program,
23 please go to our website and sign up for it,
24 and you'll be notified of any events that are
25 going on in Bethel, so...

1 And that's all I had.

2 PRESIDENT JANOSIK: Thank you, Mayor
3 Allen.

4 Next up is Residents' Comments for
5 Non-Agenda Items.

6 There was no one signed up. I don't
7 think there's anyone that's going to speak.

8 (No response.)

9 PRESIDENT JANOSIK: Okay. Moving on.

17 it. So if you can hear me, then you're --
18 that's -- that's -- I'm just repeating what
19 she said, so...
