3 PRESIDENT JANOSIK: Okay. Calling
4 the June 8, 2026 Regular Council Meeting to
5 order.

6 Can I have the roll call, please.

7 MS. DENNE: Ms. Ford?

8 (No response.)

9 MS. DENNE: Ms. Kamenicky?

10 MS. KAMENICKY: Here.

11 MS. DENNE: Mr. Oakes?

16 PRESIDENT JANOSIK: Here.

19 MS. DENNE: Mrs. Kautzman?

21 MS. DENNE: Ms. Garis?

22 MS. GARIS: Here.

23 MS. DENNE: Mrs. Piccolino?

24 MRS. PICCOLINO: Here.

25 PRESIDENT JANOSIK: Eight in

1 attendance.

2 Please stand for the Pledge of
3 Allegiance.

4 - - -

5 (Whereupon, the Pledge of Allegiance
6 was recited.)

7 PRESIDENT JANOSIK: Thank you,
8 everyone.

9 Chair Announcements. We had an
10 Executive Session tonight, June 8th, at 6:25.

11 Moving on to the Reports of the
12 Officials; and the Library Director.

13 MS. McINTOSH: Good evening,
14 everybody. My name is Christine. I'm the
15 Director of your Public Library, where we
16 provide opportunities to explore, learn,
17 create, and connect.

18 I just have a few items tonight.
19 First is the school ornament sales. Since
20 last fall the Bethel Park Fantastic Four
21 Charities have been selling metal ornaments
22 commemorating the Bethel Park Elementary
23 Schools that have now closed.

24 Each ornament is 4 inches by 2 1/2
25 inches, and has a photo of each of the

1 Elementary Schools on the front and the name
2 and dates of operation on the back. There's
3 an ornament for each Elementary School as well
4 as for Neil Armstrong.

5 Our volunteers attended each of the
6 last bell events at the schools. And our
7 sales were very brisk. So this should just me
8 telling you, if you're interested in a school
9 ornament, we have very limited stock. And we
10 will not be placing another order. So when
11 they're gone, they're gone.

12 The ornaments are \$25 each, and are
13 available at Evey True Value Hardware or
14 through the Library's website.

15 It is Summer Learning for youth. And
16 this year's theme is Unearth A Story. It's
17 for children, birth through high school. We
18 have a lot of programs planned pertaining to
19 dinosaurs, archeology, geology and the like.

20 So stop in and register for Summer
21 Learning. Go pick up a folder. Inside is a
22 bingo card with a list of activities that you
23 can do to win some prizes.

24 And we don't forgot about the adults.
25 We have Summer Reading for adults. Come to

1 the Library and register. For each book that
2 you read or you listen to, you can submit an
3 entry for a weekly drawing in person, or you
4 could do that online as well.

5 And for eight weeks, there will be a
6 winner drawn weekly for a \$25 gift card. And
7 all entries received by July 26th will be
8 entered into a grand prize drawing for your
9 choice of one our three American 250 prints
10 that we are, of course, selling.

11 Proceeds benefit the Bethel Park
12 Fantastic Four, which are the Community
13 Foundation, Education Foundation, the
14 Historical Society, and the Library.

15 And, finally, just a reminder that
16 the Library is closed on Sundays throughout
17 the summer. But the pickup lockers are always
18 available at the top of our ramp. And as
19 our e-books and other electronic resources
20 through the Library's website at
21 bethelparklibrary.org.

22 And that is all I have.

23 PRESIDENT JANOSIK: Thank you,
24 Ms. McIntosh.

25 MS. McINTOSH: Thank you.

1 PRESIDENT JANOSIK: Next up is the
2 Police Chief's Report; and Chief Arnold.

3 CHIEF ARNOLD: Good evening,
4 everyone.

5 Tonight I have a special recognition
6 that I want to give. He's not able to be here
7 tonight. But I want to recognize Sergeant
8 Keith Jones, who retired earlier this month.

9 Sergeant Jones served the Bethel Park
10 community for 26 years, and was assigned to
11 numerous roles within the Police Department;
12 as a patrolman, a detective, a traffic
13 officer, a bike patrol officer, and most
14 recently as a Sergeant.

15 During his tenure, Sergeant Jones
16 became a fixture not only within the Police
17 Department but within the community as well.
18 We often joke that he was the Mayor --

19 Sorry, Mayor.

20 -- due to him knowing -- knowing
21 everyone and everyone knowing him.

22 Sergeant Jones was always quick to
23 help someone in need, whether it was a
24 resident or a fellow officer. His leadership
25 provided a strong foundation for the

1 department and our officers to grow on. And
2 he was a mentor to so many.

3 Although he is leaving us, we are
4 fortunate that he is not going far away.
5 Sergeant Jones was hired as the newest Bethel
6 Park School District Police Officer, which
7 will allow us to continue to work closely with
8 their department and continue the strong
9 partnership that already exists.

10 On behalf of the Bethel Park Police
11 Department, I want to congratulate Sergeant
12 Jones and his family and wish them a happy
13 retirement, and best of luck to him and them
14 on his new chapter in his life.

15 Moving on. The Paul Miller Law,
16 which is aimed at combatting distractive
17 driving, took effect this past week on June 6.

18 Officers are now able to pull cars
19 over and issue citations to drivers who are
20 holding and using a cellular device while
21 operating their vehicle.

22 This includes drivers stopped at a
23 red light, stop sign, or other traffic
24 condition. There are exempt- -- a few
25 exceptions to the law. If drivers are using

1 their phone in a hands-free capacity to make
2 phone calls and use GPS through their
3 vehicle's infotainment system or if drivers
4 are using their phone to call law enforcement
5 or emergency services to prevent injury to
6 persons or property.

7 So please don't hold and utilize
8 your cellphone while you're driving unless
9 it's an emergency. If you can use it in a
10 hands-free manner -- if you can't use it in a
11 hands-free manner, please pull over to a safe
12 location and make your phone call then.

13 We don't want to have to issue
14 citations, but we will do so because we want
15 to make sure that distracted drivers are not
16 using their cellphones and potentially causing
17 a crash on our roadways.

18 Moving on to e-bikes. Again, we
19 continue to get complaints about kids riding
20 e-bikes erratically.

21 We are asking parents to please
22 prohibit kids who are under 16 from riding
23 them. Not only can their kid -- their child
24 be cited, but the parents could be cited --
25 can be cited as well. Parents are also liable

1 for any damages that their kids cause if they
2 are illegally riding an e-bike.

3 Lastly, for Crime Watch, we will be
4 holding our last Crime Watch meeting before
5 the summer break on Monday, June 15th, at
6 6:00 p.m. at the Community Center.

7 We want to thank everyone in the
8 Crime Watch for their support this past year.
9 And we look forward to seeing everyone in the
10 fall.

11 That's all I have for tonight.

12 PRESIDENT JANOSIK: Thanks, Chief
13 Arnold.

14 Moving on to the Fire Chief's Report.

15 MR. MCGOUGH: Good evening, Council.
16 My name's Steve McGough. I'm First Lieutenant
17 for the Bethel Park Volunteer Fire Company.
18 I'm here to share the Fire Chief's Report for
19 the month of April 2026.

20 For the month, we had 22 fire alarms,
21 nine calls for service assist, seven
22 electrical situations, three elevator rescues,
23 one explosion, seven gas leaks, four smoke
24 investigations, five structure fires, one bomb
25 threat, nine motor vehicle crashes, and four

1 brush fires; for a total of 72 calls for the
2 month.

3 So, it's a busy month. And our total
4 calls for 2026 through April so far are up to
5 365 calls, which is well ahead of the previous
6 year, which was our former record number of
7 calls per year.

8 Total man hours for the month of
9 April, we had 216 man hours responding, with
10 an average of 6.2 personnel per call; we had
11 148 man hours of training both in-house and at
12 the Fire Academy; we had 236 hours of
13 community service: For a total of 600 man
14 hours.

15 I'd like to recognize the top five
16 responders each month. And for the month of
17 May: Brad Lynch, Jr., Brad Floom, Corey
18 Gerber, Jeff Ferencic, and Captain Michael
19 Innocenti were the top responders. And the
20 top responding Fire Police Officer was Joey
21 Heyl.

22 Now I'd like to read a message from
23 our Fire Chief Russ Beeson, A message to the
24 community.

25 We'd like to start off by thanking

1 the Members of Council, Municipal leadership,
2 and members of the community for the continued
3 support of our 100 percent Volunteer Fire
4 Company for the past 99 years.

5 From the fundraising mailers the
6 community is generously responding to, which
7 allow us to purchase or replace equipment we
8 use daily to the incredible fleet of fire
9 apparatus used to provide the protection we do
10 to this community, we wanted to say thank you.
11 Thank you for your valued donations. And if
12 you haven't donated yet, please consider doing
13 so.

14 We had another great month of
15 training for our members both in-house and at
16 the Fire Academy. We had two members who
17 started various rope rescue training classes,
18 which includes things from basic ropes and
19 knots to rigging for rescue situations.

20 Two members also recertified to the
21 Hazmat Technician level. Our monthly training
22 in-house included high-rise operations, large
23 area search, and firefighter survival for all
24 our crew.

25 We're rapidly approaching our 100th

1 Anniversary, which we'll be celebrating with
2 different events in 2027. Stay tuned for
3 further information regarding how we're going
4 to celebrate our 100 years of 100 percent
5 volunteer service to our community.

6 Follow both our Facebook page and our
7 website for more information on coming events,
8 including our inaugural citizens fire academy.
9 Sign-ups are now under way.

10 Know that the dedicated men and women
11 at your Fire Company stand at the ready to
12 protect you, your family, your property, our
13 community, and guests 24/7, 365.

14 Thank you.

15 PRESIDENT JANOSIK: Thank you, First
16 Lieutenant McGough.

17 Moving on to the Manager's Report;
18 and Ms. Denne.

19 MS. DENNE: Yes. I apologize. I've
20 lost my voice. But, I think, for probably
21 everybody here, that's a welcome change.

22 One item that I would like to request
23 of Council is if we could waive the agenda
24 this evening under Public Safety to allow for
25 the appointment of a new police sergeant.

1 I also wanted to alert everybody, at
2 the end of July, on July 25th, we will again
3 have -- I believe this is the third annual
4 Arts and Music Festival here in Bethel Park,
5 at the Community Center, all along Park
6 Avenue.

7 We have over 85 vendors and artists
8 in the area that day. We are looking for
9 another very successful event this year.

10 And also this week will be the first
11 of the Splash Park cinemas that will be taking
12 place, where we will have movies at the Slash
13 Park. This is a new initiative that the
14 Recreation Department has started. And that
15 will be at 8:30, and it will be the first
16 Friday of each month.

17 And that's all I have for tonight.
18 Thank you.

19 PRESIDENT JANOSIK: Thank you,
20 Ms. Denne. I hope you're feeling better.

21 MS. DENNE: Thank you.

22 PRESIDENT JANOSIK: Next up, Mayor --
23 the Mayor's Report; and Mayor Allen.

24 MAYOR ALLEN: Thank you. I have a
25 few things this evening.

1 The first one is a certificate. This
2 is for Chela Miller. She's a 19-year-old
3 Bethel Park resident.

4 She was the first Bethel Park high --
5 in high school history to be a cheerleader and
6 majorette simultaneously.

7 So, in high school, she was a
8 cheerleader and a cheer captain for all four
9 years. So, she broke the boundaries and
10 tradition by also being a majorette for three
11 of those four years.

12 So it had to be interesting on Friday
13 nights to do both of those jobs.

14 Did you have to change uniforms
15 and...

16 Oh, you're back there? Okay.

17 Did you have to change uniforms?

18 MS. MILLER: Yes.

19 MAYOR ALLEN: That had to be the
20 toughest part.

21 Since she had a strong background and
22 proper training in both activities since
23 elementary school, Chela paved the way for her
24 younger sister Lila and other athletes to do
25 the same opportunity.

1 This past year, Chela, a freshman at
2 Long Island University, achieved her ultimate
3 goal in the cheer world by winning the
4 national championship in Division One Open
5 Spirit Game Day Division.

6 Chela continues to be a positive
7 influence on children in the Bethel Park
8 community by speaking about struggling,
9 learning abilities, and suffering anxiety and
10 depression. She wants children to know that
11 they aren't earn alone, and they can achieve
12 their goals despite their challenges.

13 So, if you would please come forward.

14 (Applause.)

15 MAYOR ALLEN: So, I have a
16 Certificate of Recognition, Chela Miller, for
17 your athletic and personal acknowledgements
18 and willingness to help others, awarded this
19 8th day of June, presented by myself.

20 So, congratulations. I know your
21 grandfather's probably watching on TV.

22 MS. MILLER: Yeah.

23 MAYOR ALLEN: I would have picked him
24 up, but he's not allowed out.

25 So, I want to give you that. Thank

1 you very much.

2 And you need to say a few words.

3 (Applause.)

4 MS. MILLER: I just want to say
5 thank you. And thanks for everyone for
6 believing in me with the cheer and majorettes.

7 I just want to help other people
8 understand that your dreams aren't impossible.
9 You can do whatever you want, like, if you put
10 your mind to it, and even if that means you're
11 the first one to try it.

12 Thank you.

13 MAYOR ALLEN: Okay.

14 (Applause.)

15 - - -

16 (Brief pause for taking pictures.)

17 MAYOR ALLEN: Okay. Thank you very
18 much.

19 A couple other things that I wanted
20 to mention. I do that show on BPTV, it's
21 called Jack of All Trades. You know, you
22 either watch it or you don't.

23 But I suggest that the last two
24 episodes that we did, which was three weeks
25 ago with Rick Sebak. And then we did one last

1 week with the Clemente Museum. So, if you
2 get a chance, watch the one, especially the
3 Clemente Museum, because it is amazing.

4 I also want to do a shout out for the
5 90 Plus Club that we have here. If you know
6 anybody that's 90 years and older, if they can
7 call the Municipality, join our club.

8 We have a luncheon every day -- or
9 every year, thanks to the Council. And we
10 also do Christmas cards, birthday cards. And
11 it's the most eventful thing that I do.

12 Waste drop-off at the Public Works is
13 6/20. We had one last month. And that's from
14 8:00 to 2:00.

15 And in a few weeks, we have our
16 Summer Spectacular with fireworks. It's at
17 Millennium Park. The park's closed, but you
18 can have parking at the churches. There will
19 be food trucks. And that is from 7:00 to
20 10:30. So, it's a nice event if you get a
21 chance to do it.

22 Now, the bad news is, once a year,
23 in June, I have to do the State of the
24 Municipality reports. And it lasts 10, 15
25 minutes; that's the bad news. The good news

1 is, we recorded it last week, and you can
2 watch it right after this Council meeting.

3 So, thank you very much.

4 (Applause.)

5 PRESIDENT JANOSIK: Thank you, Mayor
6 Allen.

7 Next up on the agenda is Residents'
8 Comments for Non-Agenda items.

9 And I'll just remind you that there's
10 a 3-minute limit to keep your comments to.

11 First up is Sue Means.

12 MS. MEANS: Hi. I'm Sue Means. I
13 live at 3485 South Park Road.

14 I was pretty surprised last week when
15 people attended -- and I attended the
16 beginning, but I wasn't able to stay until the
17 end -- the committee meeting. And there I
18 heard the Manager told everyone that the only
19 nonprofits that are still using this building
20 are the two political parties, the Democrats
21 and the Republicans.

22 Well, this evening, I talked to the
23 president of the Friends of the Montour Trail,
24 and they're still meeting in this building.

25 So I'm wondering why, why is the

1 Manager telling you-all things that aren't
2 true?

3 One, that this building isn't safe.
4 It's the safest building in Bethel Park. And
5 now she's told you that the only nonprofit
6 still using the building are the political
7 parties. So I'm asking myself why.

8 And then when I was at the beginning
9 of the meeting, I also was wondering why the
10 developer at the Crown Plaza was giving the
11 Administration and the Manager high praises
12 for working with her, to work to be able to
13 put the apartments inside the Crown Plaza.

14 And I was wondering, who voted? Who
15 voted for that?

16 I mean, there's something called the
17 Sunshine Act, and you're supposed to do
18 everything in public so we can see.

19 So, my advice to you-all on Council,
20 is to ask a lot of questions. I learned when
21 I served on County Council that the
22 administration and other people don't always
23 tell you everything you need to make an
24 educated decision.

25 You have to read/read, study/study,

1 and ask a lot of questions, because they will
2 tell you not all of the information. So ask
3 yourself, what aren't they telling you.
4 They'll tell you what they want you to know so
5 that you make the decision that they want you
6 to make.

7 So this is serious stuff. Do your
8 homework, study, because 33,000 people depend
9 on you to keep us safe.

10 Thank you very much.

11 (Applause.)

12 PRESIDENT JANOSIK: Thank you,
13 Ms. Means.

14 Next up is Scarlett Stockhausen.

15 MS. STOCKHAUSEN: Good evening. My
16 name is Scarlett Stockhausen. I'm 16 years
17 old, and I go to Bethel Park High School.

18 I've lived on Fredericka Drive for
19 almost my entire life. And from the age of
20 seven, my mom would turn onto Willis Road at
21 the intersection of Broughton and tell me,
22 "Scarlett, when you start to drive, avoid this
23 intersection at all costs. I'm afraid for you
24 to drive here."

25 Well, now it's nine years later. I'm

1 16. I'm legally able to drive. Coming before
2 the Council with an issue that had been
3 ongoing before I was seven years old. That is
4 half of my entire life that my parents have
5 had to fear for mine and my family's safety in
6 that intersection.

7 I am well aware that there is a --
8 that was -- a no left turn sign, a speed
9 tracker, and other various warning signage
10 that were installed at the intersection of
11 Broughton and Willis Road. But that is simply
12 not enough to prevent the danger in that
13 intersection.

14 Because two weeks ago, a car was
15 found flipped over, seriously injuring two
16 people and sending them both to the hospital.
17 That is not the only accident, as there have
18 been 16 confirmed crashes on that intersection
19 since 2021 alone.

20 Just the other day a car was turning
21 onto Willis Road and it almost became a
22 pileup. CBS News interviewed my neighbor,
23 calling it one of Bethel Park's most dangerous
24 intersections.

25 This is clearly a safety hazard. And

1 the worst part of it all is that these
2 accidents are completely preventable. And
3 they will continue to happen unless the Bethel
4 Park Council and PennDOT work together to
5 provide a faster, safer solution.

6 I am well-aware that you've all been
7 in contact with the state and have conducted a
8 traffic study. But the pace of this project
9 is simply not fast enough, because the danger
10 it is now. And I refuse to wait another nine
11 years of my life while people, human lives are
12 at risk every single day.

13 I do not stand alone on this issue,
14 as in my right hand I have over 1,000
15 signatures from the people of Bethel Park who
16 want a stoplight. And in my left hand I have
17 over 100 signatures from students, young
18 drivers in Bethel Park who are in support of a
19 stoplight.

20 So here's where I ask the Council one
21 question. Will you protect the lives of
22 Bethel Park citizens, push for faster
23 solutions in meetings with PennDOT? Or will
24 you continue to ignore the issue, let this
25 continue to be a safety hazard, let PennDOT

1 take as many years as they want to not do
2 anything about this?

3 The choice is yours. But I stand
4 firm on my position because in the end I don't
5 want to die 15 yards from my house.

6 Thank you.

7 (Applause.)

8 PRESIDENT JANOSIK: Thank you,
9 Scarlett.

10 Moving on to Residents' Comments for
11 the Consent Agenda.

12 And we don't have anyone signed up.

13 MS. MCCARTHY: Members of Council,
14 I'm so sorry to interrupt. I didn't realize I
15 had to sign something to speak.

16 PRESIDENT JANOSIK: You can speak.

17 MS. MCCARTHY: Can I? It's a
18 Non-Agenda.

19 PRESIDENT JANOSIK: Sure. Just state
20 your name and your address, please.

21 MS. MCCARTHY: Will do. Again, sorry
22 for the interruption.

23 My name is Kathryn McCarthy, and I
24 live at 101 Jordan Street in Bethel Park.

25 I am here tonight because Jordan

1 Street has a very serious safety problem. And
2 while this may be the first time you're
3 hearing from me directly, I know it's not the
4 first time that this Council has heard
5 concerns about this street.

6 First years my husband and our
7 neighbors have raised concerns about drivers
8 speeding through Jordan Street. Many use it
9 as a cut-through to avoid nearby lights. They
10 ignore the 25 mile an hour speed limit and
11 drive 35, 40 miles an hour through a
12 neighborhood where children live, families,
13 and elderly residents live.

14 The danger is most obvious during
15 the afternoon rush hour when traffic backs up
16 all along Jordan as drivers wait to turn onto
17 Broughton. Drivers turn onto Jordan and
18 accelerate as if they are entering a highway.

19 Every time I look out -- back out of
20 my driveway, I think the same thing, "I hope
21 somebody doesn't come speeding up over that
22 hill and just can't stop."

23 In an effort to slow traffic, we
24 began parking our car along the street, and
25 continued to bring our concerns to Municipal

1 officials and police.

2 Then in September 2024, we woke up
3 to a crew installing four no parking signs,
4 including one directly in front of our house.
5 We were told the reason why was a traffic
6 study found that parked cars created
7 visibility issues for drivers.

8 But that response protected the
9 convenience of cut-through drivers, not the
10 safety of the people who live on Jordan
11 Street.

12 These signs are not a safety measure.
13 They are punishment for residents who are
14 speaking up. Instead of addressing speeding,
15 the Municipality restricted where residents
16 could park while the real problem remains.

17 And the sign in front of our house,
18 by the way, is leaning. It's like this
19 (indicating). If you come over and shake it,
20 it's going to fall down.

21 So I hope it doesn't fall down on me
22 or one of my kids one day or a driver. You
23 can't even put a sign in straight. It's like
24 this (indicating). It's another safety
25 hazard.

1 After the signs were installed, we
2 were told we could park on the other side of
3 the street. But last week, when we did
4 exactly that, an officer came by and told us
5 parking was not allowed there, either. That
6 kind of inconsistency only adds the
7 frustration that residents are already
8 feeling.

9 We've also been told that officers
10 cannot monitor speeding on our street because
11 of its layout. However, in the past police
12 did monitor traffic there, and pulled drivers
13 over for illegal turns from Broughton, which
14 is great. We have not seen that kind of
15 enforcement in over a year.

16 If regular speed enforcement is not
17 possible, then the Municipality needs to fund
18 a real traffic-calming solution, including
19 speed bumps and other physical measures that
20 will actually slow drivers down.

21 Jordan Street residents should not
22 be expected to live with this ongoing safety
23 risk simply because you've decided that
24 cut-through traffic is more important.

25 Bethel Park continues to grow with

1 new housing and development expanding across
2 this community. If you are so willing to
3 welcome that growth, then you must also be
4 equally willing to make the investments needed
5 to protect the people who already live here.

6 So I am asking you to stop treating
7 this as a minor inconvenience and treating it
8 like the safety issue that it is. Jordan
9 Street residents deserve more than signs that
10 are crooked, mixed messages, officers that
11 aren't all on board, and blatant inaction.

12 We deserve a clear plan, real traffic
13 calming, and a commitment to put residents'
14 safety first, not the people who use it as a
15 cut-through.

16 Please do not wait until --

17 PRESIDENT JANOSIK: Ms. McCarthy, can
18 you -- can you please --

19 MS. MCCARTHY: -- someone is
20 injured --

21 PRESIDENT JANOSIK: -- finish your
22 comments.

23 MS. MCCARTHY: -- to decide that this
24 matters. By then it will be too late. Please
25 act now to make Jordan Street safer.

1 Thank you.

2 (Applause.)

3 PRESIDENT JANOSIK: Thank you,

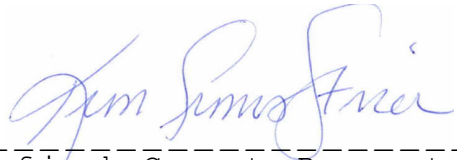
