The Obesity Crisis



Reopening Information

Now that Allegheny County has moved into the green phase, the Library will be open to the public for limited hours.

Hours of Operation:

Monday - Thursday from 10 a.m. - 6 p.m. Friday & Saturday from 10 a.m. - 2 p.m.

Masks are required to enter the Municipal Building and while in the Library. Children under the age of 2 and those with a valid medical condition are exempt. High touch areas such as counters and tabletops are disinfected daily. Hand sanitizer is available throughout the Library for you to use.

Public computers, which have been socially distanced, will be available for use but are limited to one hour per day to accommodate as many people as possible. Toys and games have been removed from the Family Place area and furniture has been reconfigured to maintain social distancing practices. Study rooms are limited to two people.

As we are under a limited capacity order, we are asking all patrons who visit to conduct their transactions and not linger in the Library so that we may accommodate as many people as possible during our operating hours.

You may return library materials in the outside book drops at any time. All returned materials are quarantined for at least 72 hours before being checked in. You will still notice them on your account during the quarantine phase. No fines will be charged during that time.

YOUR EMS SERVICE NEEDS YOUR SUPPORT

In 2020, EMS is at the forefront in the effort to reduce sickness as death from the global coronavirus pandemic. In Pennsylvania, prudent isolation measures have so far reduced the severity of the outbreak, and health care facilities have not become overwhelmed. In fact, EMS call volumes declined as much as 35% from mid-March to mid-June. On the other hand, call severities have increased.

Too many people are waiting too long to call for an ambulance when they are seriously ill. In some cases, people have expressed fear of contracting COVID-19 in an ambulance. This is a baseless fear.

At Tri-Community South EMS, and at EMS agencies across Allegheny County, rigorous cleaning procedures are in place to ensure that an ambulance is safe for all patients. In addition, all patients transported by Tri-Community South are required to wear surgical masks throughout the time they are in the ambulance.

Tri-Community South EMS workers are expected to encounter the virus as a normal part of daily operations, and to protect themselves and their patients accordingly. Providers need to wear cumbersome and uncomfortable protective equipment on all calls, and decontaminate ambulances and equipment after every call, prolonging turnaround times. EMS systems are suffering financially because of the combined effects of increased costs associated with pandemic preparedness and decreased incomes because of the decreased call volumes.

Right now, Tri-Community South needs your help, so it can continue to be there to help you when you need it most.

EMS WORKERS: UNSUNG HEROES By John Bower, Tri-Community South EMS

A recent study has shown EMS is the 9th most stressful career. And, it isn't surprising considering that EMTs and Paramedics get exposed to trauma, violence and death on a routine basis.

EMS workers are frequently confronted with life-threatening calls like cardiac, respiratory or diabetic emergencies, as well as behavioral or mental health emergencies, trauma, allergic reactions, suspected poisonings and childbirth.

EMS is generally the forgotten part of public safety and the catch-all when a person needs help and does not know where to

turn. EMS deals not only with emergencies, but also with the toothaches and everything in between.

Now, adding to the stress, is the COVID-19 pandemic and the recent

After the calls are over, EMTs and Paramedics have to deal with work-related stressors like shift work, long hours, overtime, scheduling demands, and stressors with peers and superiors. The daily stress sometimes continues long after the shift ends, depending on the calls they had that day.

One tool EMS uses is Critical Incident Stress Management

(CISM) after major or stressful incidents. This is used to deescalate and defuse emotions before the stress can affect the worker. The



In the fall, the Municipality will send letters to property owners individually asking them to clear areas of concern. However, now is a great time to take care of this while the sun is shining and the weather is warm.



A MESSAGE FROM THE FIRE CHIEF:

Dave Gerber

I hope everyone has stayed safe this summer. The FIre Company has made many changes to protect our firefighters and community members and to ensure that we're able to continue delivering the fire protection and all-hazards response that you have grown to expect from us.

We would like to thank you all for doing your part to keep the community and yourselves safe as well. I wanted to share some safety tips on ways to prevent fires and hazards in our local area. Each of these issues has caused numerous fires in Bethel Park. I invite each of you to please become educated on ways to keep both yourself and your family safe.

GET TO KNOW YOUR MEMBE

Below is some information about a few of our members. We would like to point out that many did not have any experience in public safety before joining. Many joined at different ages and from different backgrounds. These are your neighbors who volunteer their time to serve and safeguard the community of Bethel Park.

Steve McGough

Steve joined three years ago at the age of 39. He is currently our President and responds out of Brightwood Station for fire calls. Since joining, he's obtained his National Firefighter 1 and 2 certification as well as vehicle rescue, driver/operator and Hazmat training. Steve had no training or formal experience prior to training but was very interested in firefighting in his youth. Steve had several childhood friends whose dads were firefighters and friends who became junior firefighters in high school. He was unable to go through required training with them because he had enrolled in summer pre-college programs for music. During college, Steve spent a lot of time in the firehouse in Bellevue, PA

with a friend who was a career firefighter.

Steve earned a master's degree from Carnegie Mellon University in music performance with a PA teaching certification.

He is currently a trumpet player and vocalist with the River City Brass, and an orchestra director for grades 4-12 in the Peters Township School District. When he isn't playing music or fighting fires, he



likes to work on home improvement projects.

Steve said his reason for joining was his wife seeing him watch out the window at the BPVFC rigs driving by. She said "you should join," so he did with her full support.

His favorite part of being a fire fighter is knowing that people are looking to you for help when they need it most.

Hoarding is defined as collecting or keeping large amounts of various items in the home due to strong urges to save them or distress experienced when discarding them. Sometimes many rooms in the home are so filled with possessions that residents can no longer use the room as designed. The home can also become so overloaded with things that everyday living is compromised. Many fire departments are experiencing serious fires, injuries, and deaths as the result of compulsive hoarding behavior. Many occupants die in fires in these homes. Often, blocked exits prevent escape from the home. In addition, many people who are hoarding are injured when they trip over things or when materials fall on them. Responding emergency personnel are also put at risk due to obstructed exits, falling objects and excessive fire loading that can lead to collapse. Hoarding makes fighting fires and searching for occupants far more difficult. Those living next to one of these houses can also be quickly affected when a fire occurs, due to excessive smoke and fire conditions.

Hoarding is a mental disorder that can be genetic in nature, triggered by traumatic events, or a symptom of another disorder. If you or someone you know needs assistance to overcome a hoarding disorder, we ask that you please visit

www.Hoardingcleanup.com/pennsylvania for more information on how to get help.

Cooking brings family and friends together, provides an outlet for creativity and can be relaxing. But did you know that cooking fires are the number one cause of home fires and home injuries? When cooking, you need to cook with caution!

If you are sleepy or have consumed alcohol, don't use the stove or stovetop. Stay in the kitchen while frying, grilling or broiling food. If you leave the kitchen even for a short period of time, turn off the stove. If you are simmering, baking, roasting, or broiling food, check it regularly, remain in the home while food is cooking, and use a timer to remind you that you are cooking. Keep anything that can catch fire - oven mitts, wooden utensils, food packaging, towels or curtains - away from your stovetop. Remember also to check your

oven for anything stored inside before you turn it on to warm up.
If you do have a cooking fire just get out! When you leave, close the door behind you to help contain the fire. Call 412-833-2000 or 911 after you leave.

Keep a lid nearby when you're cooking to smother small grease fires. Smother the fire by sliding the lid over the pan and turn off the stovetop. Leave the pan covered until it is completely cooled. For an oven fire turn off the heat and keep the door closed.

Electricity is what makes our lives easier. However, we need to be cautious and keep safety in mind! Be sure to have all electrical work done by a qualified electrician. Only plug one heat-producing appliance (such as a coffee maker, toaster, space heater, etc.) into a receptacle outlet at a time. Major appliances should be plugged directly into a wall receptacle outlet. Extension cords and power strips should not be used. Check electrical cords to make sure they are not running across doorways or under carpets. Extension cords are intended for temporary use. Have a qualified electrician add more receptacle outlets so you don't have to use extension cords. Use light bulbs that match the recommended wattage on the lamp or fixture. There should be a sticker that indicates the maximum wattage light bulb to use.

Joe has an associate's degree in specialized business and has numerous public safety certifications including Emergency Medical Technician, Firefighter 2, and Vehicle Rescue

Joe also serves as a part-time EMT/FF for North Strabane Fire Department and is a member of the Bettis Fire Department and Technical Rescue Team where he is employed.

He grew up around EMS, police and the fire service and it has always been a childhood dream to be involved. His favorite part about being a member is "Hoping to be the difference in someone's life."

When not at work or a fire station, Joe enjoys kayaking, swimming, hunting, and fishing. He is supported at home by his beautiful wife Diane.



Dave joined at age 30 and has been with us for 17 years now. He's held various line officer positions since joining and is currently our Chief, having served this position for the last nine years.

As Chief, Dave will respond directly to the scene for calls, but prior to this, his primary response station was Station 3 on Clifton Road.

He joined with seven years of prior experience from Library Fire Company where he held positions of Lieutenant, Captain and Assistant Chief. Dave graduated from BPHS in 1990 and went on to earn an associate's degree from the Pittsburgh Institute of Aeronautics. He also studied criminal justice at CCAC and earned his Act 120 certification from the Beaver County Police Academy. He's spent the last 25 years working as a Shop Mechanic for the Port Authority of Allegheny County at the South Hills Village Rail Center.

During his fire career Dave has completed numerous certifications including Fire Fighter 1 and 2, Fire Instructor 1, Fire Officer 1 and 2, Fire Inspector 1, and Emergency Medical Technician.

Without all of these people, the BPVFC would not be where it is today and we would not be able to provide the superior fire and rescue service that we do."





GENERAL Community Center Protocols

- Hand sanitizer dispensers are located on the walls near both the front and back entrances.

- Plexiglass shields have been installed at the front desk.

SPECIAL NOTICE

The Department of Recreation and Leisure Services reserves the right to cancel, combine or divide classes, or to make other changes that become necessary and to do so without incurring obligations. Adjustments of fees will be made when classes are cancelled by the Department.

WHEN PROGRAMS BEGIN

In almost all instances, each activity will have a schedule with a beginning date. In those cases where time or day is not available, interested individuals should call the Recreation Office.

WHEN FEES ARE DUE

All fees must be paid at the time of registration unless special arrangements have been made at the Recreation Office. If registration is made by mail, be sure to include the activity fee and all information as required.

INSURANCE INFORMATION

The Recreation Board does not carry health insurance to cover injuries incurred while participating in any activity. In most cases, hospitalization carried through your employer will cover these types of injuries. Participants are also responsible for their personal property. Valuables should never be left unattended.

RETURNED CHECKS

Any check that is returned to the Recreation Office as "NSF" will be subject to a \$30.00 replacement fee. All "NSF" checks MUST be replaced within ten (10) working days or the person will be withdrawn from the roster.

RESIDENCY INFORMATION

All Bethel Park residents are given preference in registering for programs offered in this leaflet. Classes that have a limited enrollment will be open to non-residents only if space permits. The Recreation Board reserves the right to refuse admission to any person who misrepresents residency, and will not give refunds to those individuals. Non-resident fees are set for each activity and should be paid accordingly upon registration.

REFUNDS: Please read...

Refunds will only be given upon written request, received in the Recreation Office, prior to the beginning of the second class or practice session. 



UNION RATIFY CONTRACT

At its May 19, 2020 Regular Voting Meeting, the Bethel Park Board of School Directors approved a collective bargaining agreement with the Bethel Park Transportation Department District Council 84 AFSCME.

The new agreement is five years in

length and in effect from July 1, 2020 through June 30, 2025. The agreement covers 60 drivers, 16 aides and 4 mechanic<u>s</u>.

By the end of the contract starting salaries for drivers will rise to \$22 per hour, with drivers at the top of the scale making \$23 by the end of the contract.

The contract will continue to provide both full-time and part-time employees with school-district subsidized health care insurance coverage through the Allegheny County Schools Health Insurance Consortium, with employees continuing to pay 10% of their premium.

"We are pleased to be able to settle this contract without a stoppage of work," said Interim Superintendent Dr. Joseph C. Dimperio. "Our transportation employees play a vital role in the success of our district, and we look forward to the day when they will be able to transport our students safely to and from school.

FCS TEACHER NAMED TO FCCLA STATE BOARD



Independence Middle School Family Consumer Science Teacher **Heather Fontana** was elected to the Pennsylvania Family Career and Community Leaders of America (FCCLA) Board of Directors.

As a member of the FCCLA State Board, she will represent middle school educators and students across the state.

Mrs. Fontana has been teaching at Independence Middle School for seven years and has been sponsoring the IMS FCCLA Club for the past six years. Her students have gone on to win numerous state and national awards at FCCLA competitions. In 2019, IMS received the FCCLA Chapter Award for having the largest percentage increase in membership at the Middle School level throughout the state.

BP ONLINE ACADEMY

The Bethel Park Online Academy, (BPOA), is a fully online program offering a variety of curriculums designed for students who seek an alternative to brick and mortar education. The BP Online Academy offers both core and elective courses for students in grades K-12.

Students can enroll full-time or part-time, called a hybrid program. The flexible scheduling enables students to spend a portion of their day physically attending classes inside the school building and also completing cyber classes online through BPOA.

Students in the Bethel Park Online Academy are held to the same high standards set in the regular classroom and must meet the same graduation requirements as students who attend the Bethel Park brick-and-mortar schools. Complete graduation requirements can be found in the high school student

BPOA students have access to the same resources as traditional students. They may attend athletic and social events, compete in athletics, and participate in school clubs and activities offered at the middle and high schools.

Bethel Park Online Academy students graduate from Bethel Park as traditional students, participate in commencement and receive a Bethel Park School District diploma.

Bethel Park students interested in enrolling in BPOA should speak to their guidance counselor. Building Principal approval is required to attend BPOA. For more information about BPOA, please contact **Mr.** Lenosky at 412-854-8521 or lenosky.brian@bphawks.org.



ALL SCHOOL DISTRICT VOLUNTEERS MUST HAVE CLEARANCES

The Bethel Park School District encourages the involvement of parents and guardians as volunteers in our schools. Pennsylvania state law now requires every volunteer who has direct contact with students to have the necessary clearances on file with the School District, which need to be renewed every five years.

This means that any non-school district employee who volunteers to chaperone events/activities such as--but not limited to--field trips, classroom parties, book fairs, band trips and scholastic club competitions/music trips, etc. **MUST have current clearances** in order to do

The following three clearances are required:

Pennsylvania Child Abuse History Clearance (Act 151)
Pennsylvania State Police Criminal Record Check (Act 34)
FBI Federal Criminal History Record (Act 114)
The PA clearances are free to volunteers but the FBI Criminal History Record costs \$22.60. However; if you have lived for ALL of the past 10 years in Pennsylvania and have pover been convicted of a Disqualifying Offense. in Pennsylvania and have never been convicted of a Disqualifying Offense (listed on-line at www.bpsd.org/VolunteerInformation.aspx) you may request a Waiver of the FBI Fingerprint Clearance.

To learn how to apply for these clearances and what to do to obtain a Qualified Volunteer ID Card that **MUST** be worn every time when volunteering in our schools, please go to www.bpsd.org/VolunteerInformation.aspx.

Current volunteers whose clearances are expiring/about to expire are encouraged to update their clearances as soon as possible. No one will be permitted to volunteer with any of their clearances expired.

The Bethel Park School District uses the School Messenger

Notification System to communicate via telephone, email and texts with parents and employees throughout the school year.

The primary two uses of School Messenger will be to call parents and employees as soon as a decision is made on days with inclement weather, to notify them of a delay or cancellation, and to email parents the school district's weekly E-Mail Newsletter and monthly Good News Gazette.

The District will use the texting option only to communicate in

emergency situations.

The contact data that is used in School Messenger is uploaded from what is in the eSchoolPlus Student Data Base. Should your phone number or email change during the school year, please notify the school secretary at all of your children's schools of the changes and she will update the system with the correct information or you can change it yourself in the HAC.

In addition to the E-Newsletters, parents who have an email address in the student data base will also receive school-specific emails that do not come from the Public Relations Department.

The Bethel Park School District is pleased to be able to continue communicating with parents using School Messenger to deliver real time information about all of the important things that are happening in Bethel Park.


PENN STAFF DRIVE AROUND **TO SAY GOODBYE**

Congratulations to all of the students who showed commitment and discipline to complete the task they started at school--and that's to run 26 miles--the equivalent of a Marathon!


All Bethel Park elementary schools have similar running groups who train together at school and complete the Kids Marathon with all of the other Pittsburgh area students.

This year's event was held via video conference with the eight teams of students from six area high schools, their teachers, their University of Pittsburgh Project Mentors, representatives from Pittsburgh Data Works, the University of Pittsburgh's Cyber Institute and Allegheny County Executive Rich Fitzgerald.

All eight projects were highlighted by the Pitt Project Mentors, who also shared the judges' comments with the participants. The judges called the Bethel Park project "impressive" and noted that this was a "tedious project with data visualizations that were organized in a way that answered their initial question," which was "How does receiving a degree in a field of work from a more or less expensive university affect one's starting and average pay during their career?

Their project board showed the challenges they faced, data sources, data set examples, visualizations and a summary, which concluded that the correlation between majors and salary early and midcareer varied.

The annual Big Data Jam showcases the projects from all the schools. The event is designed to encourage students to conduct "Big Data" projects and learn how

Big Data drives informed decisions in various fields, as well as to consider pursuing a career as a data scientist.

The students worked on this project as part of their Big Data Analytics class at Bethel Park High School. They are taught by Bethel Park High School Teachers Lee Cristofano and Emily Smoller.

Cody was one of 350 students selected nationwide to receive a stipend to live with a German host family in the Federal Republic of Germany and attend a German "Gymnasium," which is a secondary school for college-bound students.

His travel and study will be jointly funded by the United States and German governments. Due to the current global situation, the duration of his experience living and studying abroad may have to be shortened, with a possible departure delayed until January 2021.

German National Honor Society

Nineteen Bethel Park High School German students have qualified for induction into the BPHS chapter of the Delta Epsilon Phi German National Honor Society and will be inducted in the fall when it is safe to resume school.


This year the Exams were administered via an online platform, which had students taking the tests at home.






