Detective Lacey Retires



After 27 years of service to Goshen Township, Detective Jeff Lacey entered retirement on August 10, 2011.

Lacey began his law enforcement career when he accepted a part-time police officer position with Goshen PD on May 16, 1983.

He was promoted to full-time on September 24, 1987.

During his career he received many commendations including a Police Appreciation and Achievement Award in 1987 and he was recognized as the Top Cop in Clermont County in 1997.

Detective Lacey had the first police canine in Goshen Police Department history when his canine partner Baron entered service in 1993. The two are credited with many criminal apprehensions and drug arrests. Baron died in 1996.

Detective Lacey served as a field training officer and took part in training many rookie police officers.

Lacey was promoted to Detective in 2002. He worked many high profile cases and contributed to solving several homicides.

Detective Lacey's strong work ethic and friendly demeanor have made him respected by people in the community and his co-workers. We wish him well.

Citizens Police Academy - Session 3 Graduates

After ten weeks of training, including tours of the jail, 911 center, and fire department, the nineteen members of CPA 3 graduated on October 20th. The class and their families enjoyed a graduation dinner prepared by the Goshen Township Citizens Police Academy Alumni Association.





On October 17th Officer Travis Blanton was sworn in as an Auxiliary Police Officer.

A Few Significant Incidents

- On July 16th officers were dispatched to Seven Hills Vet Clinic for a burglar alarm, Officer McFarland arrived and arrested a woman fleeing from the back door.

- On September 30th Detective Penn and Sergeant Robinson obtained a confession from a 23 year old man who raped his 11 year old niece.

- On October 12th Sgt. Robinson charged two 13 year olds, two 12 year olds, and one 11 year old with six counts of burglary for daytime residential burglaries primarily in the Four Seasons subdivision. The juveniles would enter homes through unlocked doors and windows to steal cash, cigarettes, and jewelry. Additional charges on two adults are pending.

- On October 17th Officer McFarland and Detective Penn investigated a stabbing on Oakland Road. It was determined that the victims wounds were self inflicted.

Goshen Police Aggressively Target Drugs

Since his assignment to drug interdiction in March and with assistance from the rest of our department and others, Sergeant Ron Robinson has charged more than 70 people with drug trafficking.

Additionally, working together, Goshen Officer's have aggressively targeted drug offenses, charging 6

people with possession of cocaine, 25 with possession of heroin, 7 with possession of methamphetamine, 51 with possession of marijuana, and 33 with illegal possession of prescription pills.

On October 29th, Goshen Police hosted a prescription drug take-back day sponsored by the

DEA. Officer Jason Moermond facilitated the event and collected twenty-one pounds of prescription pills.



Officer Taylor Receives Prestigious Award

Erwin Walker, Art Snider, Captain Bob Rose, and Officer James Taylor were nominated as 2011 Public Servant of the Year candidates by members of the Goshen Chamber of Commerce.

On October 22nd at the annual Goshen Gala, Officer Taylor was



awarded the 2011 Goshen Township Public Servant of the Year for his contributions to helping improve the Goshen community with special emphasis on the children.



On November 19th members of the Goshen CPAAA joined forces with the Goshen Lions Club to host a pancake breakfast. The breakfast raised more than \$600 which was donated to local food pantries.

A Few Significant Incidents Cont.

- On November 6th, Sergeant Robinson assisted by Detective Penn, charged four adults with felony child endangering after a hospitalized two year old behaving abnormally tested positive for marijuana.

- On November 9th, two adults were indicted for trafficking in heroin, tampering with evidence, and involuntary manslaughter following an investigation into a heroin overdose death that occurred in July. Investigating Officers included Sgt. Robinson and Sgt. Holland.

- On November 15th, Nathaniel Parsons was arrested and charged with aggravated robbery and the aggravated murder of his father. Detective Penn, Sgt. Holland, BCI Agent Kidd, and Coroner Investigator Hawkins processed the crime scene while Chief Snyder, Sgt. Robinson, and Ohio State Hwy. Patrol Lt. Landis interviewed the suspect who confessed.

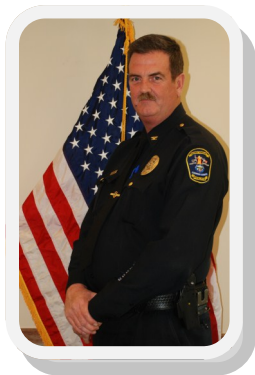
