SIGNIFICANT ACTIVITY & EVENTS



- Officers handled approximately 22,136 service calls. (60 per day 2.5 per hour)
- Officers investigated 132 traffic crashes.
- Officers checked closed businesses and left 1,034 night time business check cards.
- Officers conducted approximately 248 hours of foot patrol.
- Officers patrolled for more than 18 hours on bicycles.
- Officers spent more than 27 hours visiting seniors.
- Corporal Robinson was recognized and presented a county award for "Top Cop" for his aggressive drug work throughout 2009.
- Corporal Robinson and Captain Rose received recognition by the Goshen Chamber of Commerce for being runners up for, "Public Servant of the Year".
- Officer Bucksath continues to represent our department as a member of the Clermont County Special Response Team.
- Seven new fully equipped first aid bags were added to the trunk of every marked patrol car.
- Six replacement mobile data computers for cruisers were purchased with 90% funding from grants in the amount of \$20,987.39.
- Seized and surplus vehicles were auctioned resulting in more than \$11,000 to the police department.
- Captain Rose applied for two grants: one for portable radios & batteries, and the second for a new marked patrol car; The grants total nearly \$44,000. We will learn if one or both are awarded in February 2011.
- The most notable arrest of the year involved the entire department working together to patrol for, identify, and arrest a serial burglar on SR132. During the course of just under a week, a 17 year old burglar broke into homes during the overnight hours while the homeowners were present, in one incident the burglar fought with an elderly couple and a shot was fired.
- We hosted our first ever National Night Out.
- We formed a Citizens Police Academy and a Citizens Police Academy Alumni Association.
- Officer Taylor hosted an anti-drug seminar at the Goshen High School.

STAFFING

We started the year short one full-time officer and without an assistant chief. In March, the department filled both positions by hiring Captain Bob Rose.

In June, Officer Jeff Wolf was hired as an auxiliary officer during field training. In October, he completed field training and was moved into a part-time position.

In September, Officer Joe Mullins resigned his part-time position due to unavailability.

As of year's end, the department is staffed with 12 full-time officers, 2 part-time officers, and 1 full-time civilian clerk.

TRAINING

The Goshen Township Police Department is committed to continual training to ensure officer competence, effectiveness, and reduced liability. In addition to outside advanced training, departmental personnel participated in four in-service training sessions in 2010. In-service training consisted of; community policing, self defense, stop sticks, pursuits, a department update, ethics, and CPR.

In 2010, a second range date was added to provide officers with tactical firearms training.



PUBLIC RELATIONS

In 2010, the department increased public relations activities with emphasis on community oriented policing; new programs implemented include:

BRIDGE (Building Reliance in Disseminating Gist Electronically): This is an e-mail notification system whereby the police department is able to send important notifications and other information to subscribers.

<u>Senior Visits</u>: This program is intended to provide another layer of protection and companionship for at risk seniors. The program involves on-duty officers stopping by seniors homes for short visits and safety inspections.

<u>Badge Stickers</u>: Stickers in a shape of a police badge that officers can give to young children. These badges serve as another tool to help build young children's trust in police officers.

Traffic Complaints Log: When a citizen expresses a concern of ongoing traffic violations occurring in a specific area, officers add the information into a log located in the police department. This log is reviewed by all officers and it helps to ensure that each is aware of the citizens concerns. Officers then target traffic enforcement efforts in those areas to address that citizens concern.



National Night Out:

This is a one night national event that is designed to heighten crime and drug prevention awareness, generate support for, and participation in, local anti-crime programs, strengthen community spirit and policecommunity partnerships, and send a message to criminals letting them know that neighborhoods are organized and fighting back.

Night Time Business Check Cards:

Although businesses, schools, and churches, are patrolled regularly during the overnight hours, the establishments' owners, managers, and staff may not know that. Several night time business check cards are completed each night and randomly placed in the front door to let the staff know that we were there and hand checked their closed establishment.

<u>Preventative Patrols</u>: When officers have time to pro-actively patrol, they may be patrolling the same streets and neighborhoods while others are inadvertently neglected. Preventative patrols are a structured system whereby individual officers are assigned to patrol specific streets and neighborhoods. This system ensures that all areas of Goshen Township receive police patrols.



<u>Citizens Police Academy</u>: This is a 10 week program intended to create a better public understanding of the police role in the community. Additionally, the program is designed to encourage partnerships between police and citizens. With better understanding it becomes easier for police and citizens to find realistic solutions to neighborhood problems.

POLICE•COMMUNITY PARTNERSHIPS





On August 3rd, the Goshen Township Police Department hosted our first ever, National Night Out event with the goal of further strengthening the communities bond with the officers who protect them. Officer Taylor took on the challenge & responsibility of organizing the event. What could best be described as a Goshen community festival took place behind Marr-Cook Elementary with booths, vendors, police & fire demonstrations, a live band, wrestling, and helicopter rides. There were approximately 2,000 people in attendance making the event a huge success. The department was recognized by National Night Out with one of nine "Rookie of the Year" awards.



GOSHEN TOWNSHIP CITIZENS POLICE ACADEMY

On October 28th 2010 the 20 members of the inaugural class of the Citizens Police Academy graduated after 11 weeks of instruction. Captain Rose served as the program coordinator and every Goshen Township Police Officer taught one or more topics. In addition to class lectures, there were hands on activities and tours of the Sheriff's Department, Jail, 911 Communications Center, and Goshen Fire & EMS. Upon graduation, the CPA members established an Alumni Association and they remain actively involved in the police department. Two more Citizens Police Academies are scheduled in 2011.





CRIME STATISTICS

Overall crime to persons was down in 2010. There were 25% fewer assaults reported, 4% fewer domestic violence reports, and a 42% decrease in rapes compared to 2009. Sex crimes did increase, however, there were still 26% fewer reported than in 2008. Crimes to property saw a significant spike in thefts with over 100 additional cases reported in 2010. Thefts have increased by 33% since 2008.












CRASHES







259 public roadway crashes occurred in Goshen (one every 33 hours).

34% (88) of all public roadway crashes occurred on State Route 28.

In addition to public roadway crashes, Goshen Township Officers investigated 38 private property crashes.



2011 GOALS

- While great strides in the area of community oriented policing occurred in 2010, we will strive to do more and we will fine tune our current programs
- Continue to seek out and apply for grant funding
- Replace at least one patrol car
- Replace all ballistic vests that expire in 2011
- Look for funding sources to return our part-time police officer positions
- Send officers to as many free training topics as possible
- Hold four in-service trainings throughout the year
- Send all officers to the firing range not less than twice
- Increase drug arrests by 10%
