Dear Residents,

This past year has been one of profound uncertainty in terms of how we conduct business, socialize with loved ones and educate our children. Nearly every aspect of our lives has changed in ways we never imagined. Sadly, many of our residents have been severely affected by COVID-19 and unfortunately the pandemic continues to

delay our return to normalcy. My sincere hope is that we can get through this latest challenge just as we did in 2020, and continue to work together to keep each other safe and healthy.

On a more positive note, despite the challenges of the pandemic, Green Township has seen a remarkable number of both residential and business developments in 2021. We anticipate this trend will continue due in large part to strategic investments our Township has made to position us as a leader in the region for job growth, investments, and quality of life for our residents.

Quality of life in a community depends heavily on available parks and recreation in order to provide ample opportunity for both active and passive recreation. In 2020, at the height of the pandemic, we witnessed unprecedented use of our playgrounds, trails, and recreational areas. It was abundantly clear that our residents wanted more space to recreate safely in the outdoors. Because of this insight, we know our residents are looking forward to the Kuliga Park renovations being completed this fall. These renovations include a nearly one-mile Kuliga Park loop trail, pavilion/stage, restrooms, shelter, four pickleball courts and resurfaced tennis courts. Also coming in late 2021 is the one-third mile trail spur connecting Nathanael Greene Lodge to the Veterans Park trail, extending the loop by almost one mile.

Did you know that Green Township is now the second largest township in the State of Ohio? The 2020 census revealed Green Township's population grew by more than 3.5 percent to more than 60,000 residents, increasing our statewide ranking to second largest township in Ohio! Thanks to all of you, Green Township remains a great place to live and work.

In today's booming real estate market where demand is high and inventory is low, it's no surprise that Green Township homes are red hot, selling quickly and often above list price. We are fortunate that there are several new subdivisions

either under construction or in the planning stage that will provide new housing for families, empty-nesters and young professionals. The Shadow Hawk subdivision off Wilmer Road will be a new \$38 million upscale community with an average home value of over \$575,000. The lvy Rose subdivision will be built off Boomer Road offering 40 new homes starting in the \$550,000 range. Recently, a new mixeduse community known as Trailside Village was approved and will include almost 200 new homes and nearly double the existing length of the hike/bike trail from Hutchinson to Oakdale Elementary.

For the first time ever, Green Township was named a "Top 50" community in the Cincy Magazine Summer 2021 "Best of the Burbs" issue. Many new businesses chose Green Township as their preferred location in 2021. A new 96-unit Hampton Inn & Suites is under construction and will be completed in 2022. A new Sonic and Menards were also approved to locate on Harrison Avenue and will be under construction in 2022.

Finally, as with every great community, Green Township is fortunate to have a very strong and dedicated Police and Fire Department. Your Green Township Trustees continue to invest in their people and equipment in order to maintain some of the best safety services in the region. Green Township has increased its number of full-time Fire and EMS personnel by over 22 percent in the last two years. As of 2021, the Sheriff's Department no longer patrols Green Township resulting in the need to increase our sworn officers from 39 in 2017 to 53 as of September 2021. This investment is paying off as Green Township was named the third safest large city in Ohio by insurance research firm AdvisorSmith. I commend our first responders for this achievement; your dedication and service to Green Township are appreciated.

As you can see, despite unique challenges and uncertain times, we have experienced much success. We will continue to strive to increase economic development and quality of life and ensure the safety of our community while also maintaining one of the lowest tax rates in Hamilton County.

I wish you and your family health and happiness in the coming year.

GREEN TOWNSHIP RANKED AMONG THE SAFEST IN OHIO!

Green Township was recently ranked Ohio's third safest community according to insurance research group AdvisorSmith. The impressive ranking resulted from an in-depth analysis of crime statistics, and comes as no surprise to Green Township Police Chief James Vetter:

Per Chief Vetter, when crime statistics are

compared between Green Township and similarly sized communities, we always fare very well. It's especially true in the area of violent crime. "For a community as large as Green Township, violent criminal offenses are very rare," says Chief Vetter. Although there has been a significant uptick in violence across the United States in the past year,

Green Township actually saw a decrease in assaults, robberies and domestic violence, bucking the trend seen in many other communities.

The decrease can be attributed in part to:

- An increase in the number of police officers patrolling the streets, and
- The formation of a police impact unit to address crime hot spots as they arise

"The safety and well-being of our community has always been a top priority for us," says Tony Rosiello, Vice Chairman of the Trustees. "We understand it's a key factor for families and businesses who consider moving to Green Township. Being ranked the third safest community in Ohio is evidence that steps we have taken to remain safe are working."

KULIGA PARK

NOT JUST A SPORT PARK, NOW A REGIONAL ATTRACTION FOR ALL AGES

Kuliga Park wasn't always the popular recreation spot that it is today. It had a difficult beginning! The property was once a dump site following the devastation from tornadoes that hit the area in 1974. Three years later, in 1977, it opened as a park.

Not long after that, Green Township purchased the Bridgetown Road property and built what is now known as Kuliga Park. Exceeding 37 acres, Kuliga Park has become a regional recreational complex for youth sporting events in Western Hamilton County. In 2018, the Trustees acquired an additional seven acres that became Phase I of the Kuliga loop trail. The trail also serves as a secondary means of entering and exiting during large events which improves safety for event attendees.

The newly renovated Kuliga Park officially opens in fall 2021 and represents the first renovation and expansion of the park.

When completed the park will include:

- Loop walking trail
- Pavilion/stage for outdoor events
- Spacious shelter house available for rent
- Grills, water fountains
- Four pickleball courts
- Resurfaced tennis courts
- Playgrounds
- Baseball fields
- Soccer/football fields

POLICE AND RESIDENTS PARTNER TO ASSIST OUR COMMUNITY

The Green Township Police Department has partnered with township residents to give back to the community.

The Green Township Police Citizens Academy Alumni Association is a group of residents who have graduated from the Police Citizen Academy and who remain involved in community events to raise funds for the police department and help citizens in need. Most recently the alumni association provided care packages for every township police cruiser. These packages include sanitary items, dry clothes, bottled water and a healthy snack. Officers provide these packages to people who are experiencing hard times or going through a crisis.

A RECAP OF NUISANCES AND PROPERTY MAINTENANCE CODE VIOLATIONS

The Public Services Department is responsible for addressing complaints about properties that are considered a nuisance or are in violation of Green Township's Property Maintenance Code.

Nuisance complaints typically concern issues like high grass and weeds, garbage, junk and debris, and yard waste. Most of these complaints are resolved by the property owner. But when that is not the case, the Township will hire a contractor to resolve the issue and the cost is assessed to the owner of the property.

Violations to the Property Maintenance Code generally refer to poor building conditions such as missing shutters, paint, roofs, doors and windows, as well as fencing, sheds and other accessory structures. Such violations are addressed by either a citation or, as a last resort, Hamilton County Housing Court. The majority of cases are taken care of by the property owners before a penalty is assessed.

GREEN TOWNSHIP JOINT ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT DISTRICTS

A Joint Economic Development District (JEDD) is a powerful tool because it generates revenue to pay for the costs of safety services in Green Township. The JEDD imposes an income tax on personnel working within the JEDD District and a business profits tax. These JEDD's are created pursuant to Ohio Revised Code Sections 715.70 through 715.83. There are numerous legal requirements that must be satisfied in order to create a JEDD.

A JEDD is a special purpose district that is created by a contract between a municipal corporation and a Township. The JEDD's in Green Township are in cooperation with the City of Cheviot. JEDD's allow for the levying of a district wide income tax in the JEDD. JEDD's assist in paying for certain services (i.e. police, fire & EMS) by imposing an income tax for the employees and businesses within the JEDD District. Tax dollars received by the various Green Township JEDD's will be split between Green Township and the City of Cheviot. The terms of the JEDD's vary, but basically call for a 90% - 10% or 80% - 20% split between Green Township and the City of Cheviot.

Currently, there are seven JEDD's created in Green Township. The newest one is a JEDD with the Hampton Inn on Harrison Avenue once it gets up and operating.

For the year ending December 31, 2020, the six operating JEDD's

produced \$1,823,724 in revenue for Green Township. A breakdown for each JEDD follows:

The purpose of these JEDD's is to facilitate economic development, create or preserve jobs and employment opportunities, and to improve the economic welfare of the residents of Green Township. Each JEDD has its own Board of Directors. Residential property may not be included within a JEDD district.

LEARNING – AND FUN – NEVER STOP FOR OUR SENIORS

Green Township Senior Center reopened for activities in early March. We're so glad to be back in-person, enjoying time with friends for classes and other scheduled activities.

Although transportation restrictions have kept us from day trips this year, that hasn't stopped our seniors from having fun. Our outdoor concerts begun last fall were so popular, they've continued in 2021. We especially enjoyed being entertained by Squeeze Play, the largest accordion band in the region, along with food provided by a local sponsor.

Our popular computer classes resumed in early October. Classes will meet every Wednesday in October and November at 1:30 pm.

We're all looking forward to the upcoming Halloween Dance on Saturday, October 30 which includes entertainment by the Golden Eagles. Doors open at 6:30 pm. Make plans to join the fun from 7-10:30 pm. Tickets will be available at the door for \$8.

The Senior Center also offers a wide range of educational programs.

The Ohio Senior Health Insurance Information Program (OSHIIP) is providing "one on one" appointments across the state to assist people in making educated and unbiased choices for their 2022 health and prescription benefits. OSHIIP has scheduled appointments in Green Township on Wednesday, October 27 starting at 10 am at the Green Township Senior Center.

This fall we are working with the University of Cincinnati Medical Center to bring their popular "Stepping On" falls prevention program to the Senior Center. This small-group workshop is for people who are: I) at risk of falling, 2) have a fear of falling, or 3) have fallen one or more times. The workshop is held for two hours a week for seven weeks. Guest speakers include physical therapists, optometrists, pharmacists and community law enforcement personnel. They will teach us helpful balance and strength exercises, and explain the role that vision, medication, and footwear play in falls. Participants will learn strategies for avoiding or eliminating fall hazards to better navigate inside and outside the home.

REPAIRING AND MAINTAINING OUR STREETS

The 520 residential streets that make up Green Township amount to 115 miles of roadway. In 2021 our Public Services Department targeted 3.119 lane miles for repair at a cost of \$1.7 million. This included:

In addition, the following streets were repaved using funds from a Community Development Block Grant. Total cost for repaving the .824 lane miles was \$150,000.

The reconstruction of Harrison Avenue, from Lee Court to Wesselman Road, is scheduled for completion in the fall of 2021. This major construction project includes the





installation of a center turn lane, wider lanes throughout the project, and improved sidewalk access for the corridor.

"Paying attention to the condition of our 115 miles of roadway, and making the necessary investment in repairs, goes a long way toward maintaining our property values," says Trustee Dave Linnenberg. "We are grateful to our Public Services personnel for their dedication to safety, and to our residents for their patience as we all navigate these important road construction projects and invest in our future."

A MESSAGE FROM HEALTH COMMISSIONER GREG KESTERMAN

Just a few short months ago, we saw declining COVID cases and the resulting decrease in hospitalizations and deaths

Unfortunately, COVID-19 is doing exactly what viruses do – mutate while trying to figure out ways around some of the protective barriers we've put in place to prevent its spread. Viruses, by nature, evolve as they spread more efficiently and effectively to find the "hosts" they need to survive. Those "hosts" are us – humans that provide a place for these viruses to live and replicate.

The good news is that we have a way out of this pandemic – vaccination. There are now three vaccines, all of which have been approved for emergency use while one – Pfizer BioNTech -- has been fully approved by the FDA. In order to gain FDA approval manufacturers must show that their products have been meticulously tested to be safe and effective. That is the case for each of the vaccines available in the US – Pfizer, Moderna and J&J.

Let's talk quickly about the myths being perpetuated about the COVID vaccines:

Can the COVID vaccine make me sick with COVID?

No -- None of the authorized COVID-19 vaccines in the United States contain the live virus that causes COVID-19. This means that a COVID-19 vaccine cannot make you sick with COVID-19.

Were there enough clinical trials to ensure vaccine safety?

The authorized COVID-19 vaccines enrolled tens of thousands of participants. They were followed for two months after receiving the second dose, which is common with vaccine trials.

These are just a couple of the vaccine misconceptions we in public health hear daily. Your best source for information is a trusted medical practitioner such as your physician, or other trusted health professional.

If you need vaccination or would like more information on the vaccines, you can begin on our website – www.hcph.org or review the Ohio Department of Health (https://coronavirus.ohio.gov/wps/portal/gov/covid-19/home) as a great resource as well.



If you haven't already done so, please consider taking a vaccine. This is the surest way to a return to our pre-pandemic way of life.
