#### **CALL TO ORDER**

Mayor Lehner called the meeting to order at approximately 7:30 p.m. Mayor Lehner requested the Clerk to note that a quorum was present.

Town Manager Hord gave the invocation.

# APPROVAL OF MINUTES

Commissioner Bush moved, seconded by Commissioner Schichtel, to approve the nine listed meetings as written with a correction to the motion of the minutes of the Tuesday, May 24, 1994 Regular Council Meeting to read as follows:

## PUBLIC HEARING - FISCAL YEAR 1994-95 TOWN BUDGET

Commissioner Schichtel moved, seconded by Commissioner Bush, to enter into the Public Hearing regarding the proposed Fiscal Year 1994-95 Town Budget. The vote of approval was unanimous.

Notice of the Public Hearing was duly given within the legal classified advertising section of the Tuesday, June 21, 1994 issue of the Daily Courier which is published by Forest City Publishing Company.

Council was presented with a copy of the Town Manager's Message and Budget Estimates for Fiscal Year 1994-95. Town Manager Hord read the report aloud and gave a summary. (Copy attached)

Sam Karr, Finance Director, prepared a Summary of Capital Expenditures for 1994-95, a Summary of Revenues showing the proposed budget, and a Summary of Expenditures showing the proposed budget. These hand-outs were made available to the public for review. Town Manager Hord briefly summarized the hand-outs. (Copies attached).

After much discussion within the Public Hearing, Commissioner Bush moved, seconded by Commissioner Church, to come out of the Public Hearing and re-enter the regular session of the meeting. The vote of approval was unanimous.

# ADOPTION OF THE BUDGET ORDINANCE 1994-1995 FISCAL YEAR

Council was presented with a proposed budget ordinance for the 1994-1995 fiscal year. Commissioner Bush moved, seconded by Commissioner Schichtel, to adopt the Budget Ordinance 1994-1995 Fiscal Year as presented by the Town Manager and Finance Director. The vote of approval was unanimous. (Copy attached).

# RESOLUTION ESTABLISHING 1994-1995 CAPITAL RESERVE FUND

Council was presented with a proposed resolution establishing a capital reserve fund for the Town of Lake Lure. Commissioner Schichtel moved, seconded by Commissioner Church, to approve the 1994-1995 Resolution Establishing a Capital Reserve Fund — Town of Lake Lure, as presented by the Town Manager. The vote of approval was unanimous. (Copy attached).

Mayor Lehner, on behalf of the Council, publicly thanked the Town Manager and Finance Director for their hard work during the preparation of the budget.

# **PAVILION DEDICATION**

Mrs Dian Emon requested that Council set aside \$500 for the planned dedication of a new gazebo on the Point in September.

Mayor Lehner thanked Mrs. Emon for her dedication and help with this event.

Mayor Lehner recommended that Council spend \$750 from the reserved contingency fund for the planned dedication of the new gazebo for the purpose of a family day celebration outing which will include such events as a brass band, softball games, and other activities.

Commissioner Bush moved, seconded by Commissioner Schichtel, to set aside \$750 from the 1993-1994 reserve contingency fund for the planned dedication of the new gazebo. The vote of approval was unanimous.

# RECOMMENDATION REGARDING BOAT STORAGE FACILITIES

Mary Lynne Ray, Deputy Zoning Administrator, read aloud a June 7, 1994 memo to Council from the Lake Lure Zoning and Planning Board with a recommendation regarding Boat Storage Facilities and a proposed amendment to the Zoning Ordinance to prohibit multi-level rack-type boat storage facilities.

Commissioner Bush moved, seconded by Commissioner Schichtel, to hold a public hearing at the next Regular Council Meeting, July 26, 1994, 7:30 p.m. to discuss the proposed amendment to the ordinance, Section 606. C-1 GENERAL COMMERCIAL DISTRICT. The last paragraph of subsection (2) would be amended to prohibit multi-level rack type boat storage. The amended paragraph would read as follows:

This ordinance specifically excludes those business requiring outside display of merchandise for sale or open storage vehicles,

motorized equipment, wrecked vehicles, inoperable vehicles, discarded tires, auto parts, and machinery and construction equipment; multi-level rack-type boat storage facilities; businesses which sell, rent, or display obscene materials as defined in the Town's Code of Ordinances; tattoo parlors; and manufacturing employing ten (10) or more persons.

The vote of approval was unanimous.

# PROPOSED AMENDMENTS TO <u>SECTION 801 STREETS AND ROADS</u> OF THE SUBDIVISION REGULATIONS

Mary Lynne Ray, Deputy Zoning Administrator, read aloud a June 21, 1994 memo to Council from the Lake Lure Zoning and Planning Board regarding the proposed amendments to Section 801 Street and Road of the Subdivision Regulations. The proposed amendment would affect SECTION 801. STREET AND ROADS of the subdivision regulations, and if adopted, would accomplish the following:

- 1. Indicate that with alternative drainage methods, it may be possible to grade streets to width less than 32 feet.
- 2. Allow a maximum slope of 15% rather than 12% for subdivision slopes with the possibility of an even greater slope if approved in a special review by the Zoning and Planning Board.
- 3. Eliminate one-way streets in future subdivisions due to safety concerns.

Commissioner Bush moved, seconded by Commissioner Schichtel, to hold a public hearing at the next Regular Council Meeting, July 26, 1994, 7:30 p.m. to discuss the proposed amendments to Section 801 Street and Road of the Subdivision Regulations as presented by the Lake Lure Zoning and Planning Board. The vote of approval was unanimous.

# LINE ITEM ADJUSTMENT -- RESERVE CONTINGENCY TO POLICE DEPARTMENT

Sam Karr, Finance Director, recommended the following budget adjustment:

The Police Department will have an overrun in their Operational Budget. The main cause of this overrun is not enough monies were allocated for holiday pay and overtime. Another \$10,000 should cover the last pay period which would include salaries, F.I.C.A., insurance, and other related items. There is \$17,808.87 in Reserve that could cover these additional expenses. If the amendment is acceptable, a motion to take \$10,000 from Reserve and allocate it to the Police Department to cover the last pay period would be proper.

Commissioner Schichtel moved, seconded by Commissioner Bush, to approve the recommendation of the Finance Director to transfer \$10,000 from Reserve and allocate it to the Police Department to cover the last pay period. The vote of approval was unanimous.

#### **OTHER NEW BUSINESS**

Town Manager Hord presented Council with a request from the Hickory Nut Gorge Chamber of Commerce regarding the preparation for a 4th of July Fireworks show to be held on Sunday, July 3rd at approximately 9:15 p.m. In preparation for this event, the Chamber requests the Town of Lake Lure's permission to use a small and isolated section of the Town Point property to launch the Fireworks. Arrangements for security, insurance, and safety have been made with the Lake Lure Volunteer Fire Department, the Lake Lure Police Department, the Rutherford County Fire Marshall and the Melrose Pyrotechnics Company. The Hickory Nut Chamber of Commerce requests the use of Town property as a launch site with the understanding that in no way can the Town of Lake Lure be held liable for any personal or property damage should any occur as a result of the fireworks.

Commissioner Bush moved, seconded by Commissioner Church, to grant permission to the Hickory Nut Gorge Chamber of Commerce based on the

information submitted; to use a small and isolated section of the Town Point Property Sunday, July 3, 1994 for the purpose of allowing a fireworks show. The vote of approval was unanimous.

Council agreed to table action on adopting the Ordinance to amend the construction and use of structures on Lake Lure Ordinance and setting the amount of Liability Insurance until the next Regular Council Meeting.

#### STAFF REPORTS

Finance Director Sam Karr reported that the tax collections for the fiscal year 1993-94 were currently at approximately 98%.

Town Manager Hord complimented Tax Collector Betty Hinson for a great job.

Mr. Hord reported that the two year landscape project on a traffic island at the intersection of Highway 9 and U.S. 64/74 has been completed.

Mr. Hord presented Council with a copy of his resignation which read as follows:

# HONORABLE MEMBERS OF LAKE LURE TOWN COUNCIL

It is with very mixed emotions that I hereby tender my resignation as Lake Lure Town Manager and Zoning Administrator to be effective on or about August 1, 1994. I have accepted an offer to become the next City Administrator of Sevierville, Tennessee.

It has been my privilege and honor to serve the Citizens of Lake Lure, the Elected Officials and Town Employees for the past-three-years. During these years many good things have happened in our community:

1. A professional, well equipped and dedicated Police Department is now in place to serve the Town.

- 2. Comprehensive studies of the water and sewer systems have been undertaken which should chart a course for the future of these utilities.
- 3. New regulations governing the construction and use of structures on the lake were adopted.
- 4. Major improvements and renovations at the Municipal Golf Course have been realized.
- 5. The Town purchased a dredge and developed dredging procedures and schedules.
- 6. Planning for a New Town Hall, Community Center and Police Department is well under way with construction to start in the near future.
- 7. A concept plan for the redevelopment of the Downtown area has been adopted and construction of the bandstand/gazebo is well underway.
- 8. Drug fighting efforts were intensified by helping to create and then participate in a County wide narcotics task force.
- 9. A capital budgeting process has been implemented that maintains a multi-year capital expenditure program that is updated annually.
- 10. A comprehensive personnel plan has been developed that includes classification and compensation schedules for the Town Employees.

These are by no means all of the good things that have happened during the past-three-years, but as illustrative of what positive things can be accomplished when Citizens, Elected Officials, and Town Employees all work together for the betterment of the community. My hope is that you all will

work even harder and pull together even more as a team to keep our Town a great place to live.

My wish and prayer is that God will bless each of you and grant you wisdom and courage to lead Lake Lure to her true greatness.

# MAYOR AND COUNCILMEN OF THE TOWN OF LAKE LURE

### TOWN MANAGER'S MESSAGE AND BUDGET ESTIMATES FISCAL YEAR 1994-1995

#### Submitted June 28, 1994

In accordance with the General Statutes of North Carolina Chapter 159, Article 3, the Budget Estimates for Fiscal Year 1994-1995 are herewith presented for your consideration.

Budgeting is more than a process of balancing revenues and expenditures. It is a plan of action by which various goals and objectives are to be obtained. A town budget serves three major functions. First, it is a policy statement by which the governing body of the Town sets out what it hopes to accomplish during the next fiscal year. Secondly, it is a financial plan in which the Town sets out how it is going to implement the various policy decisions which it has made, this includes the amount of money to be spent for various Town services and capital improvements and the means by which the necessary funds will be raised to pay for these services and improvements. Finally, the budget is an accounting document which is used as a basis for setting up the Town's books for the following fiscal year and is one of the source materials for the next Town audit.

It should be recognized by the decision makers that good government is not cheap government. Good government is efficient, it is flexible, it is cost conscious. In other words, good government is the application of sound management principles to the Town's business affairs. Good government should therefore, result in the cost efficient delivery of a predetermined desirable level of public services.

For every Town there is a level of public service and of public expenditure which for that Town and time, and for the specific circumstances, represents a fair and affordable program of services. Each Town must define for itself its own minimum standard of municipal service and then call for the financial support necessary to meet that standard. The budget being presented to you sets forth a financial support network and a reasonable program of services which results in only a modest increase in the total budget.

Total operating and capital budget estimates for fiscal year 1994-1995 equal \$2,459,085. This represents an actual increase of \$443,357 or 22 percent above the previous year budget. The increases in the budget result primarily from general inflationary trends in the cost of delivery of services, a modest pay raise for Town employees, the equivalent of two new staff positions, substantial investment in capital expenditures, and debt service of \$200,000 for the new community facilities complex.

The major areas of expenditures for the fiscal year beginning July 1, 1994 and ending June 30, 1995 are as follows:

Even though this proposed budget does not provide for all of the projects or programs we all had hoped for, it does provide for a continuance of basic urban services. In these economic times, this is a major accomplishment in itself. I think we can all hold our heads up high and be proud of this budget and by working and pulling together much can be accomplished.

Cooperation of departments, agencies, and administrative employees in formulating this budget has been outstanding and is gratefully acknowledged. I wish to particularly acknowledge the Town Council, the Finance Director, his staff, and other department heads of this Town for their conscientious and dedicated work in the preparation of the 1994-1995 Budget Estimate.

To achieve this budget program, the Town Council of the Town of Lake Lure, in accordance with G.S. 159-13 (c) sets the ad valorem tax rate at .26 per \$100 of property valuation.


