#### II. FOLLOW UP

<u>Mike Stead Property Donation</u>. Survey is complete. Will forward to Town Attorney and request that he create a General Warranty Deed for the property. Once complete, Deed and plat will be sent to Stead for endorsement and notarization, and then back to the Town for recordation.

<u>LLCA/LLCEF</u>. Charlie Ellis stated in a phone call last week that with the exception of a few "Scrivener's errors" as detected by LLCEF officials, the documents as prepared by William Morgan, Esq. are acceptable to the LLCEF. Ellis is to forward those corrections and recordation of those documents will begin.

<u>Duck Cove Properties (Hodge Property)</u> – Burton and Town Attorney William Morgan are appearing in Rutherford County Superior Court on February 11, 2019 to bring Plaintiff's Motion for Default Judgment for hearing.

NC Court of Appeals 17-934 Eisenbrown v. Town of Lake Lure. Non-Compliant Commercial Lighting Amortization Ordinance —Burton presented commercial lighting inventory to the Zoning and Planning Board on November 20, 2018. The Zoning and Planning Board by motion recommend Council consider a 10 year amortization program to bring non-compliant fixtures into compliance. It is anticipated that this will be brought to Council in March, 2019.

<u>Telecommunication Support Facility Regulations Amendments</u>—A contemporary wireless telecommunication Facility ordinance, as recommended by the Zoning and Planning Board for approval, will be brought to Town Council on February 12, 2019 for a public hearing.

<u>Rezoning of Parcel 1647424: "The Accretion Island"</u> – This rezoning was approved by Town Council at their January, 2019 meeting.

<u>Spruce Hill LMI Housing Project</u>— An additional property owner on Spruce Hill has recently emerged indicating an interest in donating their property to the Town. Their parcel is one of the larger tracts on Spruce Hill and might be the deciding factor in consideration of a LMI Housing Project in this area. Burton will be bring this information to Zoning and Planning Board in 2019.

<u>Commercial Center Redevelopment</u>—Council Workshop held on January 29, 2019, with directions for the Community Development Director to: 1) Go ahead and send out RFP's for the project 2) Consult with local commercial realtors as to their opinions of the "as is" value of the building and property 3) Examine the viability of Town-owned property on NC 9 across from Ingles as an ABC store site.

<u>Farmer's Market</u>—Burton has had extensive email correspondence with a party interested in setting-up a weekly farmers market on town property, and has provided that party a list of "next steps" necessary to get the matter before Council.

<u>Data Requests</u>—Burton is working on data requests/compilations for the Mayor and to supplement upcoming operational budget submittal.

<u>Hiring Process</u>—Community Development Director is in the hiring process (once again) to replace Garrett Murphy, who will be transferring to Lake Operations/Parks and Recreation.

I am diligently continuing to strive to provide excellent customer service while attempting to re-staff the department and get that new-hire trained and up-to-speed as soon as possible.

#### **Meet Scout McCormick**

Scout grew up in Athens, GA. He is the eldest of three boys in his family. Pictured here from left to right are his younger brothers, Alex and C J. Scout is pictured on the far right and he and his brothers are surrounding their mother, Susan. Scout graduated from high school in Athens, GA and moved to upstate New York where he worked and resided in Ithaca, NY for several years. He moved back to the south in 2011 and settled in the Hickory Nut Gorge area to be near family and the beautiful mountains. Scout loves this area and the people. He enjoys reading and playing his guitar when he is not working.



While living in Hickory Nut Gorge, Scout had his first personal experience with a major fire during the historic drought of 2016. Sadly, he was evicted from his home during the Party Rock Fire that occurred that year. He was deeply moved by the experience and volunteered to help support the firefighters during the event. He helped make sandwiches and serve those who were out fighting the fire. Although he knew his efforts were appreciated, he longed to do more. He knew he was capable of contributing more significantly.

This experience inspired Scout to want to become a volunteer firefighter. He felt like he could make a difference in this role so he applied and was accepted at the Chimney Rock Fire Department, an all volunteer fire station. Chris Melton, the Fire Chief at the Chimney Rock Fire Department, not only served as Scout's Chief, but as his mentor. Becoming a NC Firefighter takes endurance, strength, determination, and most of all, heart. Chris Melton stated, "Scout definitely has a heart for service." Training goes far beyond the initial schooling required for new recruits; they are required by law to further their education in every aspect of service every year. Chief Melton stated he saw something in Scout when he signed up to become a volunteer. He added, "there is a unique quality that certain people have that make them ideal for this career field. It's a combination of compassion, dedication and hard work that Scout brings to his work that makes him ideal for the role of a firefighter."



Scout began taking classes and became invested in training to become a full time firefighter. He enrolled to take NC Ffrefighter certification classes. While working on his certification, a full-time firefighter position became open at the Lake Lure Fire Department. Chief Melton and others encouraged Scout to apply for the job. He recalls the day that Lake Lure Fire Chief, Dustin Waycaster, came to tell him he was selected for the job. He was thrilled and began his full time service at the Lake Lure Fire Department in October 2018. Scout is continuing his firefighter certification by taking the Technical Rescuer classes as well as Emergency Medical Technician (EMT) classes because these skill sets are important for the Town's needs for fire and rescue.

It is obvious to see how proud Scout is to be serving as a member of the Lake Lure Fire Department. He loves his job, but more importantly, he loves the service he provides to his community. Scout bought a home in Lake Lure and not only works at the Lake Lure Fire Department, he continues to volunteer back at Chimney Rock. Fire Chief Waycaster stated, "Scout is an asset to our team and he is working hard to gain the knowledge and skills to better serve the citizens of Lake Lure with pride."

We had a total of 471 hours of training for the Month of January.

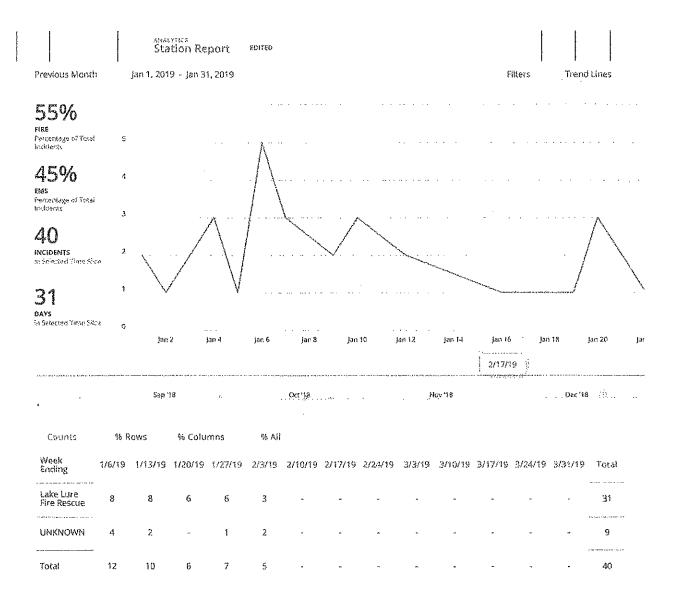

BRIEF SUMMARY: The current regulations concerning Telecommunications Facilities and Antennae, also contemporarily known as Wireless Telecommunications Facilities, were initially adopted in 2003. The regulations brought to the Council for review reflect new Federal and State mandated changes to local telecommunications regulations, and also reflect contemporary advances in facility siting and technology specific to the telecommunications industry.

#### **ORDINANCE NUMBER 19-02-12**

AN ORDINANCE AMENDING THE ZONING REGULATIONS OF THE TOWN OF LAKE LURE; AMENDING § 92.042, "SPECIAL REQUIREMENTS FOR CERTAIN USES."

WHEREAS, N.C.G.S. 160A-381 authorizes municipalities to adopt zoning ordinances regulating, among other things, "the location and use of buildings, structures, and land;" and,

WHEREAS, N.C.G.S. 160A-174 authorizes municipalities to define, prohibit, regulate, or abate acts, omissions, or conditions, detrimental to the health, safety, or welfare of its citizens and the peace and dignity of the city; and,

WHEREAS, the Town's zoning regulations require certain uses to have special requirements,

WHEREAS, the Town recognizes that some uses are substantially unique and have potential impacts or other hazards, difficulties or impacts that are, in the appropriate circumstances, more efficiently considered and reviewed in a quasi-judicial format; and,

WHEREAS, "Telecommunication Tower[s]" standards and requirements, last amended in 2003, are located in § 92.062(C)(7) of the table of uses for the R-1 zoning district and require a conditional use permit with additional standards as enumerated therein; and,

WHEREAS, the Town zoning regulations when describing zoning districts R-1, R-1A, R-1B, R-1C, R-2, R-3, CG, M-1, and S-1 within their respective table of uses repeatedly list "Telecommunications Towers" as requiring a conditional use permit by directly referencing the statement "All conditional uses listed in the R-1 Residential District"; and,

WHEREAS, the Town Council feels that such standards and requirements could be accessed easier and more efficiently as a standalone section located in § 92.042 of the zoning regulations; and,

WHEREAS, as previously stated standards and regulations concerning telecommunication facilities and antennae have not been amended in 16 years; and,

WHEREAS, the Town is desirous of contemporizing these regulations concerning Telecommunications Support facilities and Antennae to comply with current Federal and State law, to reflect dynamic changes in telecommunications technology since the regulations were originally drafted, and to provide the Zoning Administrator the option of administrative or quasi-judicial review, as appropriate, of an application for Telecommunications Support facilities and Antennae; and,

WHEREAS, Town Council further finds that this Ordinance amending the Special

Requirements for Certain Uses which by adoption also would amend the Wireless Telecommunications Support Facilities and Antennae regulations is not inconsistent with any goals, objectives or policies of the 2007-2027 Town of Lake Lure Comprehensive Plan; and,

WHEREAS, the Zoning and Planning Board has recommended certain modifications to the Zoning Regulations of the Town of Lake Lure as noted in the title of this Ordinance; and

WHEREAS, the Lake Lure Town Council, after due notice, conducted a public hearing on the 12th day of February, 2019, upon the question of amending the Zoning Regulations in this respect.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE TOWN COUNCIL OF THE TOWN OF LAKE LURE, NORTH CAROLINA, MEETING IN REGULAR SESSION AND WITH A MAJORITY OF THE COUNCIL MEMBERS VOTING IN THE AFFIRMATIVE:

**SECTION ONE.** Authority; Title. This Ordinance is enacted pursuant to the grants of authority contained in Sections 160A-174 and 160A-381 of the North Carolina General Statutes. It shall be known and may be referred to as the "Ordinance Amending Special Requirements for Certain Uses."

**SECTION TWO.** Section 92.042 of the Zoning Regulations of the Town of Lake Lure, is hereby amended as follows:

§92.042 Special Requirements for Certain Uses.

The special requirements contained in this section apply to the named uses whenever they are identified as conditional uses or as permitted uses subject to special requirements.

Notwithstanding any other provisions of this chapter, whenever these regulations provide that a use in a nonresidential zone or a nonconforming use in a residential zone is permissible with a zoning permit, a conditional-use permit (see § 92.046) shall nevertheless be required if the administrator finds that the proposed use would have an extraordinary impact on neighboring properties or the general public. In making this determination, the administrator shall consider, among other factors, whether the use is proposed for an undeveloped or previously developed lot, whether the proposed use constitutes a change from one principal use classification to another, whether the use is proposed for a site that poses peculiar traffic or other hazards or difficulties, and whether the proposed use is substantially unique or is likely to have impacts that differ substantially from those presented by other uses that are permissible in the zoning district in question. (Amended 10-14-14) (Amended XX-XX-XX)

(A) <u>Residential Vacation Rentals.</u> Residential vacation rentals are hereby recognized as a use within the planning jurisdiction of the Town of Lake Lure. Except as provided herein, on and

after 1 January 2010, it shall be a violation of these Zoning Regulations to operate a residential vacation rental without a vacation rental operating permit from the Town. (Adopted 10-13-09, Effective 01-01-10; Amended 02-28-12, 10-14-14) (Amended 03-13-18)

- (1) Exceptions. The following activities and / or uses shall not be deemed residential vacation rentals and the requirements of this section shall not apply to them. (Adopted 10-13-09, Effective 01-01-10; Amended 02-28-12) (Amended 03-13-18)
  - (a) Incidental residential vacation rentals, defined to mean no more than two such rentals in any calendar year where the total annual rental period for both rentals does not exceed two weeks.
  - (b) Rentals of property in any hotel, lodge, motel, bed & breakfast establishment, or boarding & rooming house, with a valid certificate of zoning compliance. For purposes of this Regulation, the term does not include multi-family dwellings nor does it apply to duplexes other than those situated within the R-1, R-1A, R-1B, R-1C, R-1D, R-2 andM-1 zoning districts. (Amended 03-13-18)
- Vacation Rental Operating Permits. Every residential vacation rental not excepted as above shall require a vacation rental operating permit issued pursuant to the regulations contained herein. The vacation rental operating permit may also function as a certificate of zoning compliance for a residential vacation rental. Any Vacation Rental Operating Permit issued prior to 28 February 2012 is recognized as having a vested status to operate under the ordinance as amended on 28 February 2012. Additionally, anyone that can establish via Tourism and Development Authority tax records or other suitable proof that they were engaged in vacation rental activity at their home prior to January 1, 2010 (the effective date of the ordinance) would also have vested status. Any future revisions and amendments to this Ordinance shall not apply to those vested residences. This status is transferable; although, a new vacation rental operating permit must be obtained in the name of the new owner. This status is forfeited if there is no vacation rental activity at the home for a period of five years. (Adopted 10-13-09, Effective 01-01-10; Amended 02-28-12)
  - (a) Application. In order to obtain a Vacation Rental Operating Permit the owner or the operator shall submit an application for each such residential vacation rental which complies with the requirements of the Town's zoning regulations and the additional requirements as found in § 92.042(A)(3), below, and shall

- pay all applicable fees in accordance with the Town's adopted fee schedule (Amended 03-13-18)
- (b) Procedure. From and after the effective date of this Ordinance, applications for a Residential Vacation Rental use shall submit an application for a Vacation Rental Operating Permit, to be processed as a Certificate of Zoning Compliance application with all additional supporting documentation as per § 92.042(A)(3) (Amended 03-13-18)
- (3) <u>Contents of Application:</u> The application for a vacation rental operating permit shall contain the following information. (Adopted 10-13-09, Effective 01-01-10 (Amended 02-28-12)(Amended 03-13-18)
  - (a) The address of the property.
  - (b) Name and contact information for the owner of the property.
  - (c) Name and contact information for the operator if other than the owner.
  - (d) A site plan showing the off-street parking area(s) for the property. One (1) parking space for every two rental bedrooms shall be required. Parking areas shall not encroach into any road right-of-ways or neighboring private properties. (Amended 03-13-18)
  - (e) The number of bedrooms on the property intended to be used for occupancy.
  - (f) A copy of the Rutherford County Revenue Department "Property Information Card" for the subject property. (Amended 03-13-18)
  - (g) If the property is served by the Town's sewer system, a certificate from a qualified licensed professional that the connection to the Town's system is operational and free of detectable leaks.
  - (h) If the residential vacation rental includes the use of a boat on Lake Lure, proof of a valid Town commercial boat license.
  - (i) Proof that the property is registered with the Rutherford County Tourism Development Authority.
  - (j) A copy of the standard rental agreement used for the residential vacation rental which contains information required by this section.

- (k) An acknowledgment that the applicant is aware of the occupancy restrictions on the use of the property as a residential vacation rental and the applicant's agreement to abide thereby.
- (1) A statement by the operator, under oath, that the information in the application is correct. (Amended 2-28-12)
- (4) <u>Inspections:</u> In conjunction with an application for a vacation rental operating permit, the Town shall conduct an initial inspection to confirm compliance with the requirements of this section. (Adopted 10-13-09, Effective 01-01-10)
- (5) Operational Requirements: The following operational requirements shall apply to all residential vacation rentals. (Adopted 10-13-09, Effective 01-01-10)(Amended 03-13-18)
  - (a) Occupancy Limits. On those occasions when the property is being utilized for vacation rental activity, the overnight occupancy shall not exceed two persons per bedroom plus four additional persons. For any permits issued subsequent to 28 February 2012, occupancy shall be the lesser of the total determined by the foregoing formula or twelve persons. Bedrooms used in calculating occupancy limits shall be taken from the application as affirmed by the owner/manager and shall be the same as the number of bedrooms as listed on the Rutherford County Revenue Department's Property Information Card to also assure the sufficiency of the wastewater system on site. (Amended 2-28-12)(Amended 03-13-18)
  - (b) Signs. In the R-1, R-1A, R-1B, R-1C, R-1D and M-1 zoning districts, residential vacation rental properties shall not have any signs visible from the exterior of the premises which advertise the use of the property as a residential vacation rental, other than as required by this section. In the remaining zoning districts, residential vacation rental properties may have signage as authorized by Article 10 of these regulations.
  - (c) Display of Contact Information. Residential vacation rental operators shall prominently display on the exterior of the residential vacation rental property the name and 24-hour per day, 365 days-per-year telephone number for the residential vacation rental operator who will take and resolve complaints regarding operation of the residential vacation rental property and its occupants and guests. The Town will prescribe the form of this display which shall also include a telephone number to report violations of this section to the Zoning Administrator.

- (d) Parking. Occupants or guests of any residential vacation rental property shall not park vehicles on the property other than within parking area(s) designated on the application for the residential vacation rental. Vehicles parked in undesignated areas, or in the street so as to violate the town's street ordinances, shall be subject to towing at the vehicle owner's expense. (Amended 2-28-12)
- (e) Trash Disposal. Household trash must be bagged and disposed of in trash receptacles. Trash receptacles shall be the size and number authorized by existing refuse contracts and shall be animal resistant. (Amended 2-28-12)
- (6) <u>Contract Addendum:</u> Every residential vacation rental contract shall contain an addendum, in a form prepared by the Town, setting forth the requirements of this section and other applicable provisions of law. The operator shall obtain a signed acknowledgment from the renter(s) that they have received such addendum prior to delivering possession of the residential vacation rental property. This requirement shall be deemed satisfied if the provisions of the addendum are included as part of the rental contract. (Adopted 10-13-09, Effective 01-01-10; Amended 2-28-12)
- (7) <u>Duties of the Operator to Respond to Complaints:</u> To assure prompt response to complaints and issues concerning a residential vacation rental, the operator shall comply with the following: (Adopted 10-13-09, Effective 01-01-10)
  - (a) Maintain a call center that is staffed by a live person and fully responsive at any time that the property is used as a Residential Vacation Rental. (Amended 2-28-12)
  - (c) Continuously maintain on file with the Town the operator's current address, telephone number, and facsimile number and/or email address.
- (8) Non-Compliance with Vacation Rental Operating Permit/Residential Vacation Rental Regulations (Amended 03-13-18)
  - (a) Failure to comply with the standards and regulations as found in this section shall be enforced by the remedies and penalties as provided in Chapter 10 of the Code of Ordinances of the Town of Lake Lure and Chapters 5 and 13 of the Town of Lake Lure Zoning Regulations, as applicable. (Amended 03-13-18)

- (9) Notification to Contiguous Property Owners of the issuance of a Vacation Rental Operating Permit (Amended 03-13-2018)
  - (a) Upon issuance of the permit, the zoning official shall, by First Class US Mail, notify all contiguous property owners of the decision to allow the use of the property as a Residential Vacation Rental. (Amended 03-13-18)
- (B) <u>Breweries, Distilleries and Wineries</u>. An applicant seeking authorization to develop and/or operate a brewery, brewpub, distillery, micro-brewery, micro-distillery, micro-winery, nanobrewery or winery shall obtain a sewer use permit for the facility prior to issuance of such authorization, whether it be a certificate of zoning compliance or a conditional use permit. (Adopted 10-14-14)
- (C) <u>Campgrounds</u> shall comply with the general standards and procedures for conditional uses contained in Section 92.045, below, as well as the specific standards and procedures contained herein. (Adopted 7-14-15)
  - (1) Campground standards for all campgrounds. The following standards shall apply to all campgrounds containing two or more campsites or camp lots, including sites for tents, accommodations for backpackers and recreational vehicles (RVs).
    - (a) Size. All proposed campgrounds shall be a minimum of three acres in size.
    - (b) Certificate of compliance required. Any proposed campground shall not be allowed to open until such campground has met all planning and building requirements of this ordinance for the Town of Lake Lure and the State of North Carolina.
    - (c) Fire prevention and protection. The application for a conditional use permit shall include a plan for fire prevention and protection to be reviewed by the fire marshal. The applicant shall be provided with a copy of the fire marshal's comments and recommendations and shall address those at the hearing on the conditional use permit application.
    - (d) Other permanent structures. Permanent structures other than camp platforms and recreational support and sanitary facilities shall be prohibited unless the developer or owner can demonstrate the necessity or desirability for such a structure. Structures commonly deemed necessary or desirable include a gatehouse, office, laundry area, video/amusement area, common area shelters, picnic table shelters for campsites, and camping cabins.

- (e) Storage of RVs. Storage of all types of recreational vehicles within campgrounds shall be limited to no more than one stored RV per ten RV sites. Such storage area shall be buffered and screened, preferably by vegetation, from the campground or outside areas.
- (g) Number of days permitted to camp. With the exception of campers who work for the campground, camping shall be restricted to a period of no more than 90 consecutive days within any one-year period. Tent camping shall be limited to a period of 30 consecutive days within a 60-day period.
- (h) Access to water for all campsites/RV utility islands. Each campground shall have reasonable access to a source of potable water approved by the applicable health authority and building codes.
- (i) Road circulation pattern. The road circulation pattern should be a one-way paved or gravel reinforced system attached to a main two-way circular thoroughfare. If a loop system is used, it shall contain a pull-through site arrangement or back-in site ranging from a 45- to a 90-degree angle. Parking on all access roads to the entire campground area shall be prohibited. A turning radius for all emergency vehicles shall be required as approved by the fire department. The turning radius in loops and turns shall not be less than those required by the fire department, including those for parking spurs at individual RV sites.
  - (i) Road width/slope in campground—Road widths on the one-way loop shall be at least 15 feet wide. Double lane roads shall have a minimum width of 20 feet. The circulation system shall parallel existing contours as closely as possible, and shall not exceed a 16-percent slope.
  - (ii) Land disturbance—A soil and erosion sedimentation plan shall be filed and approved by the Town prior to any construction.
- (j) Campfires shall be contained and controlled. Campfires are permitted only within fire rings, which shall not be placed within ten feet of a bottled gas container or other combustible source of fuel. The campground management shall require that no open fire is left unattended.
- (k) Refuse disposal. All campgrounds shall provide fly-proof, watertight, containers for the disposal of refuse. These containers shall also be constructed and located such that they are not subject to rodent infestation or dog and bear invasion. Containers shall be provided in sufficient number and

- capacity to properly store all refuse. Refuse for camping areas shall be collected at least once a day.
- (l) Overflow parking area. All campsites shall be limited to a total of one non-RV parking space. An additional area for parking of such vehicles shall be provided equal to one parking place for every ten campsites. Such parking area can be surfaced with gravel. At no time shall parking be permitted on access roads to the campground.
- (m) Insect control. Owners of such parks shall be responsible for adequate insect control in the camping area such as the periodic spraying for mosquitoes.
- (n) Lighting. Cut-off, overnight lighting for all bathhouses and centralized water sources shall be required. Reflectors denoting paths to above mentioned structures are recommended. Other minimal lighting should be installed as needed for the safety and comfort of campground residents.
- (o) Flood plains. Campgrounds proposed to be developed in whole or in part in flood plains shall demonstrate compliance with the Flood Damage Prevention Regulations contained in Section 95.001, et seq., of the Town Code.
- (p) Emergency Evacuation. The application for a conditional use permit shall contain an emergency evacuation plan which is adequate to protect the safety of those utilizing the campground.
- (2) Campsites for accommodation of independent RVs.
  - (a) RVs shall not be permitted to hook up to electricity or water for occupation on individual camp lots unless as part of an approved campground.
  - (b) Density of sites. To prevent intensive site use, and to maintain an aesthetic camping atmosphere, density shall not exceed 15 sites per acre.
  - (c) RV parking sites material/slope. Each recreational vehicle site with individual parking shall contain at least five inches of crushed gravel leveled to not more than three percent slope.
  - (d) RV utility islands. Each RV site shall contain, within the utility island, hookups to water, sewer, and electrical service.
  - (e) RV utility islands water/sewer plumbing requirements. Campgrounds with access to a sewage system shall provide that each campsite contain a sewer connection with suitable fittings to permit a watertight junction with the RV

outlet. Each sewer connection shall be constructed so that it can be closed, and when not in use shall be capped to prevent escape of odors. All water taps or outlets serving RV campsites shall be of a type compatible with garden hose connections. Sewer and water piping and installation shall be constructed as specified in the North Carolina Building Code.

- (f) Electrical outlets. Each RV site shall have access to electrical power. All electrical outlets shall be located in a properly constructed utility island.
- (g) Parking dimensions RV sites. A parking plan shall be submitted which is adequate to accommodate the campground's expected clientele. Parking spurs shall be located so that trailer doors face away from interior roads and into the site. Parking for all recreational vehicles and any additional vehicle shall be of a minimum five-inch gravel base.
- (h) RV campsite spacing. RV parking sites shall be at least 20 feet apart (this 20-foot area will include any yard, cooking areas, dining areas, and utility island for next RV site), edge-to-edge, and the center of all camping units should be at least ten feet from the edge of the campground road.
- (i) RV dump station. A sanitary dump station built to the requirements of the local health department shall be provided at the entrance to the campground or other location convenient to all campsites. The dump station shall be located so that the left rear of vehicles will slope slightly toward the dump station when connected for emptying.
- (3) Sanitary facilities for accommodation of dependent RVs and tent campsites.
  - (a) All campgrounds for the accommodation of dependent RVs and tents shall provide sanitary facilities connected to a sewerage system. Whenever possible, these facilities shall be connected to a public sewerage system.
  - (b) Toilets, lavatories, and bathing facilities shall be as provided under North Carolina State Building Code Volumes 1C and 2.
  - (c) Toilet facilities shall be plainly marked, separate for each sex, lighted at night, and shall be located no farther than 200 feet from any camp pad.
  - (d) Toilet facilities may be located in a central building or in two or more buildings according to the size of the campground and location of the campsites in relation to the facilities.

- (e) Adequate provisions shall be made for the disposal of dishwater according to the size of the campground. A suggested ratio is one disposal unit per ten campsites.
- (4) Campsites for tents. Construction of tent pads is not required for pup tents or other small shelters used by backpackers. Provisions for walk-in campgrounds are contained below.
  - (a) Each tent site should contain a minimum space of 30 x 30 feet. Density shall not exceed 15 sites per acre. Tent sites with individual parking arrangements shall contain one automobile parking space at least 18 feet x 9 feet.
  - (b) Each site should contain a reinforced, fairly level tent pad. The pads shall be approximately 16 x 16 feet to provide maximum flexibility of use, but shall not contain less than an area of 12 x 12 feet. The tent pad shall be a minimum of six inches high and constructed of gravel, crushed aggregate, or equivalent material that will allow run-off from precipitation to flow through the pad. Pads constructed of tamped earth, asphalt or other impervious materials are prohibited. Tent pads in excess of ten percent slope should be leveled. A three-percent slope is preferable.
  - (c) Provisions for sanitary facilities are the same as for dependent RVs set out hereinabove.
- (5) Walk-in campgrounds.
  - (a) Camping is prohibited in areas where a source of potable water and access to sanitary facilities is not provided.
  - (b) Walk-in campgrounds shall have access to potable water within 75 feet of all sleeping areas. In locations where a water supply system is not possible, potable water may be supplied by an approved well with a hand pump or by water from pickup stations.
  - (c) All walk-in campgrounds shall have access to the use of a toilet facility to be located within 300 feet of each camping space.
- (6) Campsites for mixed uses. Campgrounds may be developed to provide more than one type of camping site in the same area. When uses are mixed, the highest, or most strict, standards shall apply to development of the entire campground with the exception of walk-in camping areas in a campground designed for mixed uses. In such a development, walk-in camping shall be separated from other types of

campsites so that campfire smoke or noise will not constitute a nuisance to other campers.

- (7) Campground design. The campground shall be designed in a manner which is compatible with the natural features and topography of the tract undergoing development, and in a manner which provides safe, healthful and convenient camping facilities for campground users consistent with minimum land disturbance.
  - (a) A complete master plan of any new, expanded or altered park shall be submitted to the Town of Lake Lure for approval before construction in accordance with the checklist for campgrounds found in the appendices.
  - (b) All campgrounds containing two or more campsites or camp lots, including sites for tents, accommodations for backpackers and RVs require a conditional use permit.
  - (c) Density shall not exceed 15 sites per acre.
  - (d) Campgrounds shall be developed to minimize noise, campfire smoke, or trespassing so as not to create a nuisance to abutting properties.
  - (e) Sanitary and bathing facilities shall be provided per the state building code. Sanitary dump stations built to the requirements of the local health department shall be provided at the entrance to the campground or other location convenient to all campsites. The dump station shall be located so that the left rear of vehicles will slope slightly toward the dump station when connected for emptying.
  - (f) All campsites shall be limited to a total of one non-RV parking space per site or RV parking space. An additional area for parking of such vehicles shall be provided equal to one parking place for every ten campsites in a common location or spread throughout the campground.

## § 92.042(D) <u>Telecommunication</u> <u>Support Facilities and Antennae</u>

## Section 1. Purpose and Intent

The Town of Lake Lure desires to encourage the orderly development of wireless communication technologies for the benefit of the Town and its citizens. The Town also recognizes the need to protect the character and appearance of its community. As a matter of public policy, the Town desires to encourage the delivery of new wireless technologies

throughout the Town while controlling the proliferation of communication towers. Such development activities will promote and protect the health, safety, prosperity and general welfare of persons living in Lake Lure. Unless superseded by Session Law 2013-185, the Cell Tower Deployment Act, or Session Law 2017-159, Wireless Communication Infrastructure Siting, both of which shall control, the following provisions shall apply to the erection or replacement or modification of a wireless facility. (Amended XX-XX-XX)

#### Section 2. Severability

- 1. If any word, phrase, sentence, part, section, subsection, or other portion of this Section or any application thereof to any person or circumstance is declared void, unconstitutional, or invalid for any reason, then such word, phrase, sentence, part, section, subsection, or other portion, or the proscribed Application thereof, shall be severable, and the remaining provisions of this Section, and all applications thereof, not having been declared void, unconstitutional, or invalid, shall remain in full force and effect.
- 2. Any Zoning Permit issued pursuant to this Section shall be comprehensive and not severable. If part of a permit is deemed or ruled to be invalid or unenforceable in any material respect, by a competent authority, or is overturned by a competent authority, the permit shall be void in total, upon determination by the Town.

#### Section 3. Definitions

For purposes of this Section, and where not inconsistent with the context of a particular section, the defined terms, phrases, words, abbreviations, and their derivations shall have the meaning given in this section. When not inconsistent with the context, words in the present tense include the future tense, words used in the plural number include words in the singular number and words in the singular number include the plural number. The word "shall" is always mandatory, and not merely directory.

- 1. "Accessory Facility or Structure" means an accessory facility or structure serving or being used in conjunction with Wireless Telecommunications Facilities or Complexes, including but not limited to utility or transmission equipment storage sheds or cabinets.
- 2. "Amend", "Amendment" and "Amended" mean and shall relate to any change, addition, correction, deletion, replacement or substitution, other than typographical changes of no effect.

- 3. "Applicant" means any Wireless service provider submitting an Application for a Zoning Permit for Wireless Telecommunications Facilities.
- 4. "Application" means all necessary and required documentation that an Applicant submits in order to receive a Zoning permit and building permit if applicable for Wireless Telecommunications Facilities.
- 5. "Antenna" means a system of electrical conductors that transmit or receive electromagnetic waves or radio frequency or other wireless signals.
- 6. "Council" means the Town Council of the Town of Lake Lure.
- 7. "Certificate of Completion" or "COC" means a required document issued by the Town that confirms that all work represented in the application i) was properly permitted; ii) was done in compliance with and fulfilled all conditions of all permits, including any final completion deadline; iii) was fully constructed as approved and permitted; and iv) a final inspection was requested, conducted and the Facility or Complex passed the final inspection.
- 8. "Town" means the Town of Lake Lure, North Carolina
- 9. "Co-location" means the use of an approved telecommunications structure to support Antenna for the provision of wireless services.
- 10. "Commercial Impracticability" or "Commercially Impracticable" means the inability to perform an act on terms that are reasonable in commerce, the cause or occurrence of which could not have been reasonably anticipated or foreseen and that jeopardizes the financial efficacy of the project. The inability to achieve a satisfactory financial return on investment or profit, standing alone and for a single site, shall not deem a situation to be "commercially impracticable" and shall not render an act or the terms of an agreement "commercially impracticable".
- 11. "Completed Application" means an Application that contains all necessary and required information and/or data as set forth in this Ordinance and that is necessary to enable an informed decision to be made with respect to an Application and action on the Application.

- 12. "Complex" means the entire site or Facility, including all structures and equipment located at the site.
- 13. "DAS" or "Distributive Access System" means a technology using antenna combining technology allowing for multiple carriers or Wireless Service Providers to use the same set of antennas, cabling or fiber optics.
- 14. "Eligible Facility" means an existing wireless tower or base station that involves collocation of new transmission equipment or the replacement of transmission equipment that does not constitute a Substantial modification. An Eligible Facility Application shall be acted upon administratively and shall not require a Special Use Permit, but shall require Staff Administrative Approval.
- 15. "Expert Assistance Fee" means a set fee intended to prevent taxpayer subsidization for the Town's review of an application for Telecommunication Support Facilities, WTF's, DAS systems, or Antennae.
- 16. "FAA" means the Federal Aviation Administration, or its duly designated and authorized successor agency.
- 17. "Facility" means a set of wireless transmitting and/or receiving equipment, including any associated electronics and electronics shelter or cabinet and generator.
- 18. "FCC" means the Federal Communications Commission, or its duly designated and authorized successor agency.
- 19. "Height" means, the distance measured from the pre-existing grade level to the highest point on the Tower or support structure, even if said highest point is an Antenna or lightening protection device. As regards increasing the height of an existing structure, Height means the height above the top of the structure prior to any work related to a wireless Facility.
- 20. "In-Kind Replacement" means replacing a component(s) that is malfunctioning with a properly functioning component of the same weight and dimensions and that does not enable an increase in revenue for the service provider or increase the compensation paid to the owner or manager of the support structure.

- 21. "Maintenance" means plumbing, electrical, carpentry or mechanical work that may or may not require a Zoning permit and building permit if applicable, but that does not constitute a Modification of the WTF.
- 22. "Modification" or "Modify" means, the addition, removal or change of any of the physical and visually discernable components or aspects of a wireless Facility or Complex with identical components, including but not limited to antennas, cabling, equipment shelters, landscaping, fencing, utility feeds, changing the color or materials of any visually discernable components, vehicular access, parking and/or an upgrade or change-out of equipment for better or more modern equipment. Adding a new wireless carrier or service provider to an existing support structure or Tower as a co-location is a Modification, unless the height, profile or size of the compound is increased, in which case it is not a Modification.
- 23. "Necessary" or "Necessity" or "Need" means what is technologically required for the equipment to function as designed by the manufacturer and that anything less will result in the effect of prohibiting the provision of service as intended and described in the narrative of the Application. Necessary, Necessity or Need does not mean what may be desired, preferred or the most cost-efficient approach and is not related to an Applicant's specific chosen design standards.
- 24. "NIER" means Non-Ionizing Electromagnetic Radiation.
- 25. "Person" means any individual, corporation, estate, trust, partnership, joint stock company, association of two (2) or more persons having a joint common interest, or any other entity.
- 26. "Personal Wireless Facility" See definition for 'Wireless Telecommunications Facilities'.
- 27. "Personal Wireless Services" or "PWS" or "Personal Telecommunications Service" or "PTS" shall have the same meaning as defined and used in the 1996 Telecommunications Act.
- 28. "Repairs and Maintenance" means the replacement or repair of any components of a wireless Facility or Complex where the replacement is identical to the component being replaced, or for any matters that involve the normal repair and maintenance of a wireless Facility or Complex without the addition, removal or change of any of the physical or visually discernable components or aspects of a wireless Facility or Complex that will impose new

- visible burdens of the Facility or Complex as originally permitted. Any work that changes the services provided to or from the Facility, or the equipment, is not Repairs or Maintenance.
- 29. "Stealth" or "Stealth Siting Technique" means a design or treatment that minimizes adverse aesthetic and visual impacts on the land, property, buildings, and other facilities adjacent to, surrounding, and in generally the same area as the requested location of such Wireless Telecommunications Facilities, which shall mean building the least visually and physically intrusive facility and Complex that is not technologically or commercially impracticable under the facts and circumstances. Stealth technique includes such techniques as i) DAS or its functional equivalent; or ii) camouflage where the Tower is disguised to make it less visually obtrusive and not recognizable to the average person as a Wireless Facility or Complex.
- 30. "State" means the State of North Carolina.
- 31. "Structural Capability" or "Structural Capacity" or "Structural Integrity" means, notwithstanding anything to the contrary in any other standard, code, regulation or law, up to and not exceeding a literal 100% of the designed loading and stress capability of the support structure.
- 32. "Substantial Modification" means a change or Modification that
  - a. increases the existing vertical height of the structure by the greater of (a) more than ten percent (10%) or (b) the height of one additional antenna array with separation from the nearest existing antenna not to exceed 20 feet; or
  - b. except where necessary to shelter the antenna from inclement weather or to connect the antenna to the tower via cable, adding an appurtenance to the body of a wireless support structure that protrudes horizontally from the edge of the wireless support structure the greater of (i) more than 20 feet or (ii) more than the width of the wireless support structure at the level of the appurtenance; or increases the square footage of the existing equipment compound by more than 2,500 square feet.
- 33. "Telecommunications" means the transmission and/or reception of audio, video, data, and other information by wire, radio frequency, light, and other electronic or electromagnetic systems.
- 34. "Telecommunications Site" See definition for Wireless Telecommunications Facilities.

- 35. "Telecommunications Structure" means a structure used primarily to support equipment used to provide wireless communications or was originally constructed primarily for such purpose.
- 36. "Temporary" means not permanent in relation to all aspects and components of this Section and that will exist for fewer than ninety (90) calendar days.
- 37. <u>"Tower" means any structure designed primarily to support an antenna and/or other equipment for receiving and/or transmitting a wireless signal and is the lesser of i) more than ten feet (10') taller than the adjacent buildings or trees; or ii) taller than forty feet (40').</u>
- 38. "Wireless Telecommunications Facility or Facilities (WTF or WTFs)", "Facility", "Site", "Complex", "Telecommunications Site" and "Personal Wireless Facility Site" all mean a specific location at which a structure that is designed or intended to be used to house, support or accommodate antennas or other transmitting or receiving equipment is located. This includes without limit, Towers and support structures of all types and kinds, including but not limited to buildings, church steeples, silos, water Towers, signs or other any other structure that is used or is proposed to be used as a support structure for Antennas or the functional equivalent of such. It expressly includes all related facilities and equipment such as cabling, radios and other electronic equipment, equipment shelters and enclosures, cabinets and other structures associated with the Complex used to provide, though not limited to, radio, television, cellular, SMR, paging, 911, Personal Communications Services (PCS), commercial satellite services, microwave services, Internet access service and any commercial wireless telecommunication service whether or not licensed by the FCC.
- 39. "Zoning Permit" means a permit denoting compliance with this ordinance and other applicable zoning requirements and standards that must be granted as a prerequisite to applying for and being granted any other required permit. AMENDED XX-XX-XXX
  - Section 4. General Policies and Procedures for Applications under this Section
- (1) It shall be unlawful for any person, corporation, partnership or other entity to erect any wireless facility without first obtaining a zoning permit from the Administrator. A permit shall also be required for the erection of a replacement wireless support structure or the modification of an existing wireless support structure.

- a. Existing wireless support structures owned by government agencies and designed for non-commercial emergency communications may be replaced with a wireless support structure equal in height to the existing wireless support structure; however, all other ordinance provisions are applicable.
- b. The placement or collocation of wireless facilities on existing structures, including electrical transmission towers, water towers, buildings, and other structures capable of structurally supporting the attachment of wireless facilities requires a zoning permit in compliance with requirements of this ordinance.
- c. Wireless support structures are allowed, with standards as in this article, in all zoning districts.
- (2) The Administrator or Board of Adjustment, shall approve or disapprove the zoning permit based upon the receipt of a completed site plan as required above and the following provisions:
  - (a) The wireless facility design plan was prepared by a professional engineer registered in the state of North Carolina, including engineer's signature, seal and address.
  - (b) The site plan shall illustrate, with details, the foundation and base of the wireless support structure, the foundation for all the guy line anchors and support structures, all proposed buildings, and any other proposed improvements including access roads and utility connections within and to the proposed site.
  - (c) In addition to any other materials required for a standard permit under this section or any other ordinance of the Town of Lake Lure, all applicants for permits to construct a telecommunications support facility or antenna shall submit visual impact demonstrations using

photo or similar graphic simulations of the proposed facility as it would be seen from residential areas, public rights of way, and public parks and other sites.

- (d) Location requirements:
  - i. The applicant shall identify all possible alternatives considered within the service area for the proposed wireless facility location and explain why the proposed wireless facility is necessary and why existing wireless facilities or other structures cannot accommodate the proposed antenna(s).
- (3) Wireless support structure height, operational limitations/requirements, and access infrastructure (for traditional wireless support facilities).
  - (a) A wireless support structure shall not exceed an overall height (OAH) of 200 feet including the height of all antennae and lightning rods.
  - (b) A wireless support structure located on any major mountain ridge shall be monopole and no taller than 30 feet higher than the vegetative canopies immediately surrounding the base of the tower.
  - (c) The proposed wireless support structure shall be designed and constructed for collocation of at least three additional telecommunication antenna systems. The wireless facility area shall be of sufficient size to accommodate the accessory equipment for at least three additional telecommunication providers.
  - (d) Contingent upon space available, the wireless facility operator shall also be equitable to allowing government emergency service communications to collocate on their facility at a reduced industry standard price.
  - (e) The wireless facility access road must be a minimum of 12 feet in width accommodating, to the satisfaction of the Town Fire Marshal, all emergency equipment and vehicles; and, if gated, shall employ a Siren Operated Sensor access system.
- (4) The applicant shall be required to provide written documentation certifying

- compliance or when appropriate, exemption from all applicable federal and state regulations.
- (5) The applicant shall present to the Administrator or Board of Adjustment, if applicable, proof of either fee simple ownership, an option to purchase or lease, a recorded leasehold interest, or an easement, from the record owner of all property involved and any necessary rights-of-way to the wireless facility site.
- (6) Signage shall be limited to a sign identifying the owner(s) and operator(s) of the tower, an emergency telephone number and any other signage as required by any government agency. Signage shall be placed in a clearly visible location on the premises of the tower.
- (7) <u>Setback requirements (traditional facilities).</u>
  - (a) A tower shall be separated from other on-site and off-site towers and supporting structures such that one tower will not strike another tower or its support structure if it falls. Towers shall be set back from property lines in accordance with the twice the setback requirements for the district or 110 percent of the tower height, whichever is greater. Additionally, telecommunications towers must set back from any residential districts or uses a distance equivalent to the fall radius of the tower being erected times ten percent.
  - (b) <u>Wireless facilities located within transmission line easements</u> are not required to meet (a) above.
  - (c) There shall be no setback requirement from structures located on the same parcel as the proposed wireless facility as long as a professional engineer, registered in the State of North Carolina, certifies that the fall zone of the wireless support structure is designed to avoid said structures and the owner of the structures in question records a legally valid Hold Harmless agreement, indemnifying the Town of Lake Lure from all liability and claims for damages arising from the performance of the telecommunications facility designer,

### contractor and installer; including any subcontractors or consultants associated with the project.

- (8) The wireless support facility shall be constructed to the Electronics Industries

  Association/Telecommunications Industries Association 222 Revision F

  Standard entitled "Structural Standards for Steel Antenna Towers and Antenna
  Support Structures," as the same may be amended from time to time. Any tower
  shall also comply with the requirements of the North Carolina Building Code,
  National Electrical Code, Uniform Plumbing Code, and Uniform Mechanical
  Code. The wireless support structure shall be designed to meet the
  ANSI/EIA/TIA-222-G (as minimum) one-half inch of solid radial ice standard.
- (9) The wireless facility and any guy wires shall be surrounded by a commercial grade chain link secure fence at least eight feet in height, which may include no more than two feet of barbed or razor wire.
- (10) <u>Lighting on wireless support structures shall not be permitted except as required by federal and state regulations.</u>
- Wireless support structures shall be light gray except when specific colors and color patterns are required by federal or state regulations or a different natural color, as approved by the administrator, which would make the tower blend into its natural surroundings more readily.
- (12) All wireless facilities shall be landscaped by semi-opaque vegetative screening on all sides. All plants and trees shall be indigenous to western North Carolina and shall be drought resistant.
- (13) Stealth wireless facility.
  - a) Antennas must be enclosed, camouflaged, screened, obscured or otherwise not readily apparent to a casual observer.
  - b) The structure utilized to support the antennas must be allowed within the underlying zoning district. Structures may include, but are not limited to flagpoles, bell towers, clock towers, crosses, monuments, parapets, and steeples.

- (14) A DAS system that is owned or operated by a commercial carrier and is part of a commercial wireless system, or are used for commercial purposes, is expressly included in the context of this Section, regardless of the location or whether the Facility or any of its components is located inside or outside a structure or building.
- (14) Wireless facilities shall comply with all other applicable regulations of this ordinance, and, where applicable, shall meet the requirements for a conditional use permit.
- The applicant shall provide the Administrator with a certificate of general liability insurance in the minimum amount of \$1,000,000. The certificate shall contain a requirement that the insurance company notify the Town 30 days prior to cancellation, modification or failure to renew the insurance coverage required.
- (16) The co-location of facilities and/or stealth technology shall be considered a mitigating factor to a variance request and may be justification for the request.
- Any tower constructed under a permit pursuant to this ordinance shall be removed within 180 days of the date which it ceases to be in active use, or upon notice from the ordinance Administrator, whichever is more favorable to the owner.
- (18) Collocation of Small Wireless Facilities
  - a) Pursuant to guidance as provided by North Carolina General Statute 160A-400.54, the town shall allow collocation of small wireless facilities on eligible facilities pursuant to the following guidelines:
    - i. A zoning compliance permit is required
    - ii. All ground support equipment shall require semi-opaque

vegetative landscape screening on any sides visible to the motoring public such as can be accomplished without compromising underground utilities, and while maintaining a 12' x 25' sight triangle from intersections, and 15' of clear area along perpendicular streets culminating at a corner lot.

- iii. Each new facility in the right-of-way shall not extend more than 10 feet above the utility pole, city utility pole, or wireless support structure on which it is collocated. Extensions proposed higher than 10 feet shall require a variance from the Board of Adjustment.
- iv. Each new utility pole and each modified or replacement utility pole or city utility pole installed in the right-of-way shall not exceed 50 feet above ground level. In residentially zoned areas, the height limit for new pole installation shall be forty feet unless granted a variance by the Board of Adjustment.
- v. Wireless providers are responsible for damages due to their activities to Town rights-of-way while occupying, installing, repairing or maintaining wireless facilities, wireless support structures, city-owned or other utility poles.
- vi. Collocations on private support structures shall require a letter of consent from the owner of the structure (Adopted XX-XX-XX)

### Section 6. Fees

Subject to the provisions of North Carolina General Statutes 160A-400.54(e), 160A-54(f), 160A-296(a)(6) and 160A-206(b) all fees and charges, including but not limited to Application fees, Inspection fees and Permit fees, shall be as set forth in the Town's Schedule of Fees and Charges. For new towers, support structures, or substantial modifications, an Expert Assistance Fee shall be established in advance to prevent taxpayer subsidization of the Applicant. This fee shall be \$5000.00, and shall be tendered in cash or a certified cashier's check upon submittal of the Telecommunications Support Facility application. It shall be held

by the Town's Finance Officer in an escrow account, whereby it may be drawn upon as necessary for payment of professional services related to the Town's review of the application. (Adopted XX-XX-XX)

SECTION THREE. In administering this Ordinance, the Town shall have all the remedies and enforcement powers contained in Chapter 10 of the Town Code of Ordinances and Chapters 5 and 13 of the Zoning Regulations, as supplemented herein, and as provided by the General Statutes.

SECTION FOUR. All Ordinances or parts of Ordinances in conflict with this ordinance are hereby repealed to the extent of such conflict.

**SECTION FIVE.** If any Section, subsection, paragraph, sentence, clause, phrase or portion of this Ordinance is for any reason held invalid or unconstitutional by any court of competent jurisdiction, such portion shall be deemed severable and such holding shall not affect the validity of the remaining portions hereof.

**SECTION SIX.** The enactment of this Ordinance shall in no way affect the running of any amortization provisions or enforcement actions, or otherwise cure any existing zoning violations.

**SECTION SEVEN.** This Ordinance shall be in full force and effect from and after the date of enactment.

### I. CALL TO ORDER

Mayor Kevin Cooley called the meeting to order at 1:30 p.m. and gave the invocation. Council members led the pledge of allegiance.

### II. APPROVE THE AGENDA

Commissioner Bob Cameron made a motion to approve the Town Council Special Joint Workshop Meeting Agenda as presented. Mayor Pro Tem John Moore seconded and the motion carried 4-0.

### IV. NEW PARKS AND RECREATION DIRECTOR POSITION DICUSSION

The Board held a special joint workshop meeting with the Parks and Recreation Board (PRB) in regards to the new Parks and Recreation Director position.

### a) Review Comprehensive Plan Vision Statement

Mayor Cooley read the Town's Vision Statement. Mr. Czajkoski stated that he feels that PRB does a good job fulfilling this mission.

### b) Review Short List of Town Facilities

The Town Council and PRB reviewed the list of Town Facilities. Mr. Czajkoski pointed out that Buffalo Creek Park and Weed Patch Mountain Trail are not primarily used for tourists but are also used by tax payers and voters.

### c) Review List of Recreation Facilities

The Town Council and PRB reviewed the list of Recreation Facilities. Commissioner Webber pointed out that the Lake Lure Flowering Bridge and Luremont Properties should also be listed with Recreation Facilities.

### d) Discuss Management of Recreation Facilities

Mayor Cooley pointed out that the recreation facilities are operated and maintained by town staff, volunteers, or private entities with oversight by the Town. Mr. Czajkoski stated that parks and recreation assets are complex and deserve a dedicated resource, which is why the PRB applauded the idea of a new Parks and Recreation Director position. He stated that in terms of leadership and management he sees the need for someone who understands the operation and management of the parks, trails, and land based recreational facilities and felt it would be best served as a separate position from one also overseeing lake events.

### e) Coordinator Versus Director: Why One or the Other?

Mr. Czajkoski conducted a presentation on the TOLL Parks & Recreation Director Positon and its importance to the Town to benefit the citizenry and the TOLL. (Presentation attached) He stated that the PRB feels strongly that tangible skills are needed for the Parks & Recreation Director position in order to maintain the existing parks and recreation assets, develop and grow additional parks and recreation assets, develop and grow outdoor recreation opportunities and economic impact opportunities by maximizing town parks and recreation assets, cultivate partnerships and collaborate with external organizations. Mr. Czajkoski noted that the PRB is not asking for more money than what was already approved by Council. He submitted that the parks and recreation assets are as essential as any other town assets and should be treated as such, noting that they will provide opportunities for the Town year-round.

Mayor Cooley stated that the Town needs leadership, management and a full-time focus beyond the volunteer leadership that the PRB provides the Town. Commissioner Webber mentioned that

there is a lot of press going around for the Town parks which will help to bring in visitors each year. Mr. Czajkoski added that if the Town could get someone to reach out to those groups, such as Conserving Carolina, it would help to create economic impact, noting that town parks enhance property values. Mr. Dittmer pointed out that a lot of the visitors to the Town do not come to use the lake, but come to use the hiking trails, adding that the PRB feels a Parks and Recreation Director position is necessary. Mayor Cooley explained that the Town Manager recommended adding a full-time coordinator position to help with both parks and recreation and lake operations and to put this position under the Lake Operations Director. This position would also co-work with the PRB to combine the functionality of the lake and land based assets. He noted that Lake Lure is a small town with extraordinary assets and facilities with limitations on what can legitimately be done well, stating that the Town must manage the critical infrastructure needs first. Town Council and the PRB ensued in further discussion on this matter.

Commissioner Webber felt that the position description was sufficient enough for what is needed for parks and recreation and felt that the biggest issue the PRB has is that the position is only 75% Parks and Recreation. Mr. Czajkoski pointed out that the Parks and Recreation Coordinator position description did not entail everything that the original description for the Parks and Recreation Director position did and stated he was not in favor of the coordinator job description as presented as he did not see it as an active leadership role, noting that the business aspect was not incorporated into the coordinator position. Mr. Baldwin mentioned that the presented position description was not a derivative of the previous director position description. He noted that the 75% Parks and Recreation, 25% Lake Operations, was just an expression of what he expects the person in this position to give in order to assist in both departments.

Mayor Pro Tem John Moore stated that the coordinator position helps to accomplish having a backup for the Lake Operations Director as there is currently no backup for that position. He pointed out that this position would be an addition to help manage parks and recreation that is currently not in place now. Mayor Cooley explained that linking the two positions together would help them learn off of one another, stating that the focus will be mainly towards parks and recreation.

Mr. Czajkoski felt that there are things in the position description that needs revised and the Mr. Baldwin agreed. He requested that the PRB be involved with updating the position description. Mr. Baldwin asked that all board members review the position description and provide him with any suggestions in order to help him revise the position description. Commissioner Cameron suggested that the Town Council, Mayor, and Town Manager get together every couple of months to review the person in this position to oversee that things are being done as expected. Mr. Baldwin suggested that this meeting be to discuss progress and goals. Commissioner Cameron suggested the PRB create a list milestones, priorities, and dates for this position and provide it to the Town Manager and Town Council. Commissioner Webber suggested that either the Lake Operations Director or the Parks and Recreation Coordinator attend the Lake Advisory Board and PRB meetings each month. Mr. Czajkoski stated that the PRB will need to hold a workshop to discuss

milestones. Mr. Baldwin mentioned that the PRB may want to wait until this position is filled until a work plan is discussed. Mr. Massey felt that we are moving in the right direction and this would be a great step forward in our Town. Mr. Minick pointed out that Communications Specialist Laura Krejci would be helping with the management and coordination of events which would help the person in this new position.

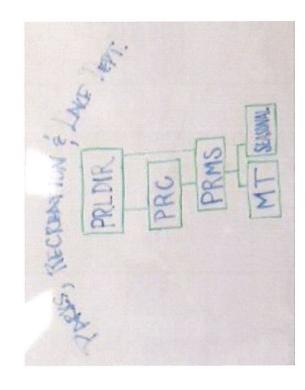

- PRL Director would work directly with Lake Advisory Board and report directly to Town Manager
- Add a new Parks and Recreation position: Parks and Recreation Coordinator (PRC) with duties & responsibilities at 75% Parks and Recreation and 25% Lake Operations

- PRC would report to PRL Director and work directly with the Parks and Recreation Board in all things
- Assign Maintenance Staff (Melodie Potter, Carl Landrum and Seasonal Position) to Department
- Change Melodie Potter's title to Parks and Recreation Maintenance Supervisor
- Potter would supervise Carl Landrum and reoccurring seasonal position
- Potter would report to PRC and continue to work with PRB
- After extreme weather events, all hands on deck (all department personnel) for lake clean-up
- PRC would be trained on the lake and prepared to take place of PRL Director upon retirement
- Laura Krejci (Communications Specialist) would coordinate community events working closely with the PRB as she is already doing



Director Dean Givens. Sha'Linda Pruitt would no longer clerk the PRB. All of this will be implemented after we hire the PRC. Below are charts 've committed to having a person in the PRC position at the very beginning of 2019. Also, I assigned Kat Canant as the new clerk for the Lake activities/services with Parks and Recreation and Lake Operations. This decision was made in coordination with Chief Humphries and PRL Advisory Board <u>and</u> Parks and Recreation Board. This will ensure that the Police Department will closely coordinate all public safety for our consideration as we discuss matters.

### Parks and Recreation Coordinator

### Primary Reason Why Classification Exists

To manage, direct, supervise, and coordinate various recreation programs for the Community including the maintenance of parks and related facilities.

### Distinguishing Features of the Class

An employee in this class plans, directs, and supervises the work of full and part-time staff; provides staff support to Parks and Recreation Board and Lake Advisory Board; facilitates use of all Town resources to community and visitors; coordinates assigned activities with other Town Departments, outside organizations, and the general public; provides highly-responsible and complex administrative support to the Parks, Recreation and Lake Director. Work is performed under the general direction of the Parks, Recreation and Lake Director. This position also coordinates plans, projects, and activities with the Park and Recreation Board, while exercising supervision directly over the Parks and Recreation Maintenance Supervisor.

### **Illustrative Examples of Work**

- Assumes management responsibility for all services and activities of the Parks and Recreation facilities and programs.
- Responsible for the maintenance of all parks and related facilities.
- Participates in the negotiation, development, planning, design and implementation of related Town Capital Improvement Projects, as well as improvements to existing facilities.

- Coordinates Departmental activities with Town recreation organizations, associations, clubs and other Town departments.
- Responds to and resolves sensitive and difficult public inquiries and complaints.
- Develops, negotiates, and supervises Town's recreation facilities under contractual uses;
   monitors contracts for compliance.
- Works closely with the Communication Specialist to coordinate, promote, implement, and
  evaluate various recreational programs for children and adults including but limited to the
  annual 4th of July Fireworks Display, Bike Races, Olympiad, and specialized one-day sports
  events and programs.

- Develops, prepares, and administers Department budget, including preparing cost estimates and justifications for budget recommendations, researching and recommending Capital Improvement Projects, and monitoring and controlling expenditures.
- Develops and implements Department policies, procedures, and fee schedules; evaluates

  recommendations as needed.

- Ability to select, supervise, train and evaluate staff.
- Ability to provide administrative support and professional leadership and direction of the Parks, Recreation and Lake Recreation Department.
- Ability to perform responsible and difficult work involving the use of independent judgment and personal initiative.
- Ability to interpret and apply Federal, State, County, and Town laws, codes, regulations, and guidelines affecting recreation programs and activities.

- Ability to communicate clearly, concisely, and effectively, both orally and in writing.

### **Lake Operations Director**

### Primary Reason Why Classification Exists

To perform complex work in managing the town-owned 728 acre recreation lake including enforcement, permitting, lake inspection and controls, water sampling and testing programs, annual and emergency dredging operations, fisheries and lake activities.

### **Distinguishing Features of the Class**

An employee in this class must be a sworn law enforcement officer that supervises and provides public safety for all lake operations. This employee plans, organizes and directs the work of employees engaged in varied lake operations and services. Work involves extensive project management for the varied services including lake enforcement, dredging, permitting, coordination of lake activities and fisheries management. The employee provides lake advice and assistance to the town manager and provides staff support to the police department, fire department, marine commission, lake advisory committee and lake structures appeals board. Work also includes coordination of lake activities during emergencies, use and management of town owned boat fleet, and launch ramp management program; personnel management functions as needed; maintenance of records, maps and logs. This employee maintains the budget and personnel administration of the department and serves as supervisor to environmental management and reserve lake patrol officers. The employee represents the town with citizens and coordinates with the marine commission, lake advisory board, and the lake structures appeals board. Sound judgment, initiative and courtesy is required in performance of duties. Work is performed independently and in coordination with the Town Manager. The employee is subject to working in inside and outside environmental conditions, severe storms, floods, noise, vibration, hazards associated with lake work, fumes, odors, dusts, mists, gases, and oils. Work is performed under the general direction of the Town Manager as to matters of policy, budget, long range plans, and personnel matters. Work is reviewed through reports, conferences, acceptance of the community, and compliance with required laws and regulations.

### **Illustrative Examples of Work**

- Researches and develops recommendations for lake operational changes, improvements and expansion in conjunction with division supervisors and presents to the manager.
- Develops and recommends goals, policies and procedures for various lake services.
- Oversees day-to-day operations and personnel functions; ensures department operates
  efficiently, that directed projects and work is completed, that public complaints are addressed,
  and that qualified personnel are hired, retained and evaluated.
- Performs selection, promotion, training, coaching and disciplining of department personnel

- Performs varied lake tasks in varied service functions on a daily basis.

- Thorough knowledge of related Town policies, state and federal laws and regulations regulating public services functions.

#### CALL TO ORDER

Mayor Kevin Cooley called the meeting to order at 5:01 p.m. and gave the invocation. Council members led the pledge of allegiance.

#### APPROVE THE AGENDA

Mayor Cooley proposed amending the Agenda to include approval of the Town Manager's contract on the "Consent Agenda." He stated that a representative from Carolina Climbers Coalition requested the campgrounds ordinance be suspended for the Carolina Climbers Coalition event on February 15<sup>th</sup>-17<sup>th</sup> in the Town Meadows and proposed adding this to "New Business" noting that this request has been approved in past years. Attorney William Morgan also proposed adding approval of Closed Session Minutes from the last Town Council Meeting and Mayor Cooley suggested to be placed on the "Consent Agenda."

Mayor Pro Tem John Moore made a motion to approve the Agenda, as amended. Commissioner Bob Cameron seconded and the motion carried 4-0.

# A. RESOLUTION NO. 19-01-08 DECLARING THE BADGE AND SERVICE WEAPON CARRIED BY ALAN GREENE SURPLUS AND AWARDING THEM TO HIM UPON HIS RETIREMENT

Chief Sean Humphries recognized Officer Alan Greene and thanked him for his service.

Mayor Kevin Cooley read Resolution 19-01-08 and presenting a copy of the Resolution to Officer Greene.

Commissioner Stephen Webber made a motion to adopt Resolution 19-01-08 declaring the badge and service weapon carried by Alan Greene surplus and awarding them to him upon his retirement. - **NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED** by the Town Council of the Town of Lake Lure, North Carolina that in accordance with the provisions of G.S. 20-187.2 the badge and service weapon, a Glock 19, 9 millimeter caliber, serial number SAP992, carried by Alan Greene

during his service with the Lake Lure Police Department be declared surplus and awarded to him upon the occasion of his retirement.

**BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED** that appreciation be expressed to Alan Greene for the service rendered by him during his employment with the Town of Lake Lure.

This Resolution adopted this 8<sup>th</sup> day of January, 2019.

## TOWN MANAGER COMMUNICATIONS

- Jeffrey Brown, Brown Consultants, presented the revised Engineering Report. Mr. Brown provided an update on the sewer system replacement stating that a workshop will be held on January 16<sup>th</sup> to include a representative from the State and from NCDEQ, noting that one discussion will be on sewer plant flow numbers. Mr. Baldwin added that the workshop on January 16<sup>th</sup> will be held at 10:00 a.m. and would include representatives from Chimney Rock in regards to the sewer system replacement that extends into Chimney Rock Village. Mayor Cooley explained that the Town's sewer collection system services the Town as well as some areas outside the Town's jurisdiction. Commissioner Webber noted that the meeting is open to the public.
- Mr. Baldwin reported that he is proposing a workshop meeting to discuss the Commercial Center on January 16<sup>th</sup>. Commissioner Bob Cameron pointed out that he would out of town until the 18<sup>th</sup> and Mr. Baldwin stated that he would consider other dates and send to Council for approval of a meeting date.
- Public Works Director David Arrowood stated that work is still proceeding with the small generator. He reported that John Wilson, Wilson Mechanical, estimated that the small generator would be completed and put together in about six weeks.
- Mr. Arrowood explained that the Town Manager approved the purchase of a mini trackhoe excavator with the surplus money left over from the purchase of a bucket truck. He stated that he found and purchased a new Yanmar excavator with a four year/4,000 hour warranty for \$29,222 that includes a hydraulic thumb, 18" and 24" bucket, and a tilt blade. He stated this excavator will be a great help with lake debris cleanup from the boom.
- Mr. Arrowood reported that applications were received for the two vacant Dam Operator positions and mentioned that he has two applicants in mind to fill both positions.
- Mr. Arrowood provided an update on the geo-tube installation at the Waste Water Treatment Plant noting that the best option is the geo-tubes only pad, which would save the Town money. He stated that he would start grading the pad in the morning.
- Mr. Arrowood then updated the Board on the paving schedule. He stated that Labella Associates was contracted by the Town to conduct an assessment of town streets. Labella Associates assessed the streets and recommended that more money be dedicated towards street repairs every year and the Town agreed and budgeted additional money for street repairs this year. He stated that Justice Drive was the worst rated street in the Town and needs a full replacement, mentioning that the first half of the street will be replaced this year. He stated that he would

- like to also maintain the streets that are in decent shape now in order to keep them from needing full replacements. Commissioner Cameron asked that the ditches and culverts stay maintained as well.
- Lake Operations Director Dean Givens provided an update on dredging. He reported that the contractor, Tim Edwards, has removed around 15,000 cubic yards and is doing a phenomenal job. Mr. Givens stated that he has created maps on all the areas that were requested to be dredged and will provide that next month. Mayor Cooley noted that Tim Edwards' contract for the year ends at 30,000 cubic yards; however, he stated that Tim Edwards has agreed to continue dredging even after the 30,000 cubic yards has been dredged with no additional expense to the Town. Commissioner Webber mentioned that in the past the Town discussed using dredging reserve money to dredge areas towards Firefly Cove, an area outside of the contract. Mr. Baldwin stated this matter would be looked into further, noting that a possible addendum to the contract may be needed.
- Mr. Givens provided an update on the Boys Camp Road property, stating that Brown Engineering is almost complete with the permit process. A meeting with Chimney Rock Village will take place on January 17<sup>th</sup> in order to start the permitting process with them. He stated that once that meeting has taken place the PARTF grant can be signed and the materials recovery facility can be engineered.
- Mr. Givens provided an update on the event space in Morse Park. He stated that the spoils pit in Morse Parks will be removed and the material will be used to fill in the event space at Morse Park, consistent with the Comprehensive Plan. He explained that additional drains will be added to help with areas prone to flooding.
- Mr. Givens provided an update on the boardwalk replacement mentioning that he is in the process of getting cost estimates to replace the current boardwalk with a floating boardwalk. He explained that the project has had to be scaled back due to a higher cost than was expected. He stated he hopes to have cost estimates from the contractors ready to present to Council in February.
- Mr. Givens reported that Bill Ashman, along with Lake Lure Tours, is working with a boat club in NC, with over 200 members, who are wanting to hold a classic boat and car show on Mother's Day weekend. He mentioned that the main event will include them bringing in a boat called Miss America IX, which he explained may need a waiver of the boat length limit restriction and a waiver of the noise ordinance. He pointed out that this event will also include a boat parade, but stated this event is still in the planning stages and details are being worked out in order to bring a request back to Council at an upcoming meeting. Mayor Cooley noted that the Blue Ridge Chapter of the National Association of Classic and Antique Boats will be holding this event. He stated that this group has discussed holding this event annually and also holding another event in the fall.

#### **PUBLIC HEARING:**

A. PROPOSED AMENDMENT TO THE ZONING MAP OF THE TOWN OF LAKE LURE BY REZONING ONE PARCEL FROM R-2, TO GU, AS REQUESTED BY REZONING PETITION RZ-2019001

Mayor Kevin Cooley opened the public hearing concerning proposed Ordinance No. 19-01-08, an Amendment to the Zoning Map of the Town of Lake Lure by Rezoning One Parcel from R-2, to GU, as Requested by Rezoning Petition RZ-2019001, and invited the audience to speak.

Commissioner Bob Cameron made a motion to enter into a Public Hearing concerning proposed Ordinance No. 19-01-08, an Amendment to the Zoning Map of the Town of Lake Lure by Rezoning One Parcel from R-2, to GU, as Requested by Rezoning Petition RZ-2019001. Commissioner Stephen Webber seconded and the motion carried 4-0.

Commissioner Stephen Webber clarified that the property is Happy Hollow Lane, which is the spoils pit across the river, not Sleepy Hollow Road as noted on the application. Development and Environmental Review Specialist Garrett Murphy presented the request. Mr. Murphy stated that due to many decades of ongoing continued use of this area to address the maintenance and upkeep of the Town's biggest asset, it is reasonable and in the best public interest to rezone this parcel to Government Use (GU), which would allow any lawful governmental activity to be permitted in these districts. He noted that this rezoning request is a change that is consistent with the 2007-2027 Comprehensive Plan and consistent with current and future planned public land use for this parcel. Commissioner Stephen Webber pointed out that this change will not affect any property owners facing Boys Camp Road; it will only affect Town property.

Mayor Cooley noted that no members of the public requested to speak on this matter.

Commissioner Bob Cameron made a motion to close the Public Hearing. Commissioner Stephen Webber seconded and the motion carried 4-0.

### **COUNCIL LIAISON REPORTS & COMMENTS**

Commissioner Bob Cameron reported the activities of the Utilities Advisory Board. He noted that the UAB requested also inviting representatives from the Lake Lure Village Resort to attend the January 16<sup>th</sup> Special Town Council Meeting.

Commissioner John Kilby reported the activities of the ABC Board and the Lake Advisory Board.

Mayor Pro Tem John Moore reported the activities of the Zoning and Planning Board.

Commissioner Stephen Webber reported the activities of the Board of Adjustment and

the Parks and Recreation Board, and mentioned that the Lake Structures Appeals Board did not meet.

## **PUBLIC FORUM**

Mayor Kevin Cooley invited the audience to speak at this time.

Pat Buede, 2153 Memorial Hwy, commended the Town on their performance during the recent winter storm event but suggested improvements to better cell and electric services during storm events. She stated that trees lying on power lines are not being trimmed, causing numerous power outages, noting that she submitted a request to Duke Energy to trim trees throughout the entire Gorge. She asked that someone with the Town speak with a Duke Representative and request a public meeting to come and speak with town citizens. Ms. Buede also questioned the tax increase and if the TDA is working with the Town to help with infrastructure costs. She asked what a significant tax increase is considered and Mayor Cooley pointed out that the tax increase has already been incurred. He explained that the TDA can now use 30% of their total income from room tax revenue to help fund tourism infrastructure projects in Rutherford County. He stated that the Town would like to use the funds for the renovation of the Marina, Boardwalk and Beach areas, noting that \$50,000 is available from the TDA for help in funding this infrastructure project. Commissioner Cameron mentioned that the Town has looked into a tourist tax in the past, noting that it must be approved by the County and State first and stated that it could be looked into further. Mr. Baldwin stated that he would speak with someone from Duke Energy.

Nancy Nelson, Fisher Court, stated that she liked the idea of a tourist tax and questioned if the Town could start this process. Mr. Baldwin noted that there are only two possible options that the Town could possibly secure legislation to enact; an accommodation sales tax and a food and beverage tax. Commissioner Kilby felt a food and beverage tax is a good idea, noting that the Town faces the dilemma of being a tourist based economy and the Town's only income is through property taxes. Commissioner Bob Cameron stated that this could be looked into again. Commissioner Webber recalled that the State has a limit on tax rates noting that the Town could apply and start the process with the State.

### CONSENT AGENDA

Mayor Kevin Cooley presented the Consent Agenda and asked if any other items should be removed before calling for action.

Commissioner Stephen Webber made a motion to approve the Consent Agenda as amended. Commissioner Bob Cameron seconded. Therefore, the Consent Agenda incorporating the following items was unanimously approved and adopted:

A. Adopt the December 5, 2018 Special Town Council Workshop Minutes and the December 11, 2018 Special Meeting Minutes

- B. Budget Amendment 237 Fire Truck
- C. Budget Amendment 238 Police Separation Allowance for George Alan Greene
- D. Approval of the Addendum to the Town Manager's Contract
- E. Approval of the December 18, 2018 Closed Session Minutes

### **UNFINISHED BUSINESS:**

## A. LAKE LURE TOURS' CONCESSION AGREEMENT ADDENDUM

Lake Operations Director Dean Givens presented the Addendum and the changes that were proposed to the Lake Lure Tours' Concession Agreement. He stated that the changes include amendments to the terms, adding a viewing area, the addition of a floating dock, and reducing the monthly concession fee percentage of fuel sales from 15% to 5%. Commissioner Webber pointed out that there is no mention of the percentage of revenues to the Town generated from the floating dock. Mr. George Wittmer stated that 15% of any revenue generated from the floating docks would be paid to the Town. Commissioner Webber also proposed deleting the third paragraph on the second page regarding terms for the operation of the Beach, until it is discussed further. Mayor Cooley noted that he did not foresee any revenue being gained from the floating dock but felt it could be added.

Commissioner Stephen Webber made a motion to approve the Addendum, as amended, deleting the third paragraph on the second page and with the change to royalties paid to the Town for revenues generated from the floating docks. Commissioner Bob Cameron seconded and the motion carried 4-0.

#### **NEW BUSINESS:**

## A. ORDINANCE NO. 19-01-08 – AMENDING THE ZONING MAP OF THE TOWN OF LAKE LURE

Commissioner John Kilby made a motion to adopt Ordinance No. 19-01-08, amending the Zoning map of the Town of Lake Lure to rezone parcel # 1647424 from the R-2 General Residential zoning district to the GU Government Use zoning district, such act being consistent with the adopted Policy LU-1-1.2 and Figure 8, the Future Land Use Map, as included and also adopted in the Town of Lake Lure 2007-2027 Comprehensive Plan. Commissioner Stephen Webber seconded and the motion carried 4-0.

#### **ORDINANCE NUMBER 19-01-08**

AN ORDINANCE AMENDING THE ZONING MAP OF THE TOWN OF LAKE LURE BY REZONING ONE PARCEL FROM R-2, TO GU, AS REQUESTED BY REZONING PETITION RZ-2019001.

WHEREAS, The Town of Lake Lure is the owner of the parcel identified by tax Parcel Identification Numbers (PIN) 1647424, Map 100/Block 1/Lot 100A on the Rutherford County Tax Map; and,

WHEREAS, the current zoning of the above referenced parcel is R-2 General Residential District; and,

WHEREAS, The Town of Lake Lure has petitioned to have this parcel rezoned to GU Government Use, as described with petition numbers RZ-2019001; and,

WHEREAS, the Lake Lure Zoning and Planning Board, after due consideration on the 20th of November, 2018 found the request to be consistent with the Lake Lure 2007-2027 Comprehensive Plan and recommended approval of this petition; and,

WHEREAS, the Lake Lure Town Council, after due public notice, conducted a public hearing on the 8<sup>th</sup> day of January, 2019, on the question of amending the zoning map in this respect and, after further consideration, determined that the rezoning is in the best interests of the Town of Lake Lure;

NOW THEREFORE, be it ordained by the town council of the Town of Lake Lure, North Carolina, meeting in regular session and with a majority of councilmen voting in the affirmative:

**SECTION ONE:** The zoning map referenced in Chapter 92 of the Lake Lure Code of Ordinances is hereby amended to change the lot having County tax PIN 1647424, from R-2 General Residential District to GU, Government Use District.

**SECTION TWO:** The Zoning Administrator shall make all the necessary corrections to the zoning map so as to implement the provisions of this ordinance and shall henceforth enforce the zoning regulations as hereby amended.

**SECTION THREE:** This ordinance shall be effective upon its adoption.

Adopted this 8<sup>th</sup> day of January, 2019.

### **NEW BUSINESS:**

## B. REQUEST TO WAIVE THE 21' MAXIMUM BOAT LENGTH REGULATION FOR A COMMERCIAL BOAT PERMIT

Lake Operations Director Dean Givens explained that Greg Spinella with All Aspects Design & Construction Inc. is requesting to waive the 21' maximum boat length regulation to allow the purchase of a commercial boat permit. Mr. Greg Spinella owns a barge that is over 21' in length that he intends to use to complete pile driving work on a boathouse at 2037 Buffalo Shoals Road that he was contracted by the owner to do. The work will take approximately 30-90 days to complete. Mr. Givens explained that after the LAB reviewed the request, it was found that Mr. Spinella may not need a waiver for the barge being over 21' since it is non-motorized; only the push boat used to move the barge is motorized. Mr. Givens noted that there should be little to no impact on the lake, noting that no other contractor on the lake uses this method to pile drive posts into the lake. He pointed out that there is no language in the Lake Use Regulations regarding a commercial boat permit for a barge/boat used temporarily for commercial use or a classification for a push boat. He added that he would look into language that could be added into the Regulations, ask the LAB to review, and bring a recommendation back for approval. Mr. Givens also mentioned that the LAB also referred to Council to decide how to charge for this type of permit. He suggested a prorated boat permit rate for the 90 days that the permit will be valid, since it will not be used for recreational use and will not affect the commercial boat permit model.

Mayor Pro Tem John Moore made a motion to approve Mr. Spinella's request to allow the purchase of a commercial boat permit for a period of no longer than 90 consecutive days with a prorated fee of \$125 for the boat permit and \$45 for the commercial license fee. Commissioner Bob Cameron seconded and the motion carried 4-0.

#### **NEW BUSINESS:**

## C. SUSPENSION OF THE TOWN'S CAMPING ORDINANCE

Will Goodson, Treasurer of the Carolina Climbers Coalition, presented the request to utilize the Community Hall for a participant registration area and the Meadows area for an awards ceremony, meals, and vendor space at no cost. He noted that the Carolina Climbers Coalition owns a portion of the west side boulders at the Rumbling Bald access. He mentioned that this will be the fourth year that this event has taken place, noting that the bouldering competition takes place in the Chimney Rock State Park, Rumbling Bald access. Mr. Goodson also requested that Town Council waive the camping ordinance to allow overnight camping in the Meadows from 3:00 p.m. on Friday, February 15, 2019 through Sunday, February 17, 2019. He noted that last year the event brought in around 300 outside visitors to the Town and mentioned that this year a rope climbing portion will be added in addition to bouldering. Mr.

Goodson also requested a suspension of the Town's alcohol ordinance for the Meadows during this time. Chief Humphries noted that there have been no problems in the past in regards to alcohol use. He stated that in exchange for the Town waiving the fees for use of the facilities, Carolina Climbers Coalition will list the Town as a gold sponsor of the event, which costs \$600 for overhead and \$750 for retail/swag. He stated that they may sell raffle tickets and Commissioner Cameron noted that the Board would need to suspend the peddling ordinance to allow this. Commissioner Webber noted he had no problem with waiving the fees except for the dumpster fee of \$200, which the Town must pay to an outside company if a dumpster is used. Mayor Pro Tem John Moore suggested Mr. Goodson discuss trash removal with the Town Manager. Mr. Goodson stated that he would be willing to pay the security deposits and discuss trash removal with the Town Manager.

Commissioner Stephen Webber made a motion to approve the application as submitted with a waiver of the rental fees, a waiver of the peddling ordinance, the camping ordinance and the alcohol ordinance, and to work out the details of trash removal with the Town Manager. Commissioner Bob Cameron seconded and the motion carried 4-0.

#### ADJOURN THE MEETING

With no further business, Commissioner Bob Cameron made a motion to adjourn the

meeting at 7:21 p.m. Commissioner John	Kilby seconded and the motion carried 4-0.

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### I. CALL TO ORDER

Mayor Kevin Cooley called the meeting to order at 10:06 a.m. and gave the invocation. Council members led the pledge of allegiance.

#### II. APPROVE THE AGENDA

Commissioner Stephen Webber made a motion to approve the Agenda as presented. Mayor Pro Tem John Moore seconded and the motion carried 3-0.

#### IV. LOW PRESSURE SEWER SYSTEM DICUSSION

Mayor Cooley explained that the Town is in the midst of moving forward with a very critical infrastructure to replace the current sewer system and aging sewage treatment plant with a new low-pressure sewer collection system and a new sewage treatment plant, possibly at a new location. He mentioned that we are currently in the planning stage and have submitted the new set of engineering reports to NCDEQ for their review and comment. He noted that a number of issues have come to light that the Town needs to deal with; one being areas currently outside the Town's boundaries that collect and convey into the Town's sewage collection and treatment system. He stated that such a sewer system in Chimney Rock Village (CRV) serves both residential and commercial customers, noting that they are connected to the Town's system by a gravity collections systems which runs either along or in the Rocky Broad River. He noted that the Town's future sewage collections system will be a low-pressure sewer system will be a pressurized system, stating that we need to figure out how the connection of the CRV portion to the Town's new lowpressure system will be made. Mayor Cooley stated another issue is that there is a severe infiltration problem which originates from the system being submerged under the lake creating a tremendous amount of pressure. The line is a 92 year old line that leaks causing excess lake water into the Town's sewage. He explained that the Town's system has been deemed to be in violation with state standards and the Town must get that system out of the lake to resolve the infiltration problem and also to make sewer service available to more customers. He stated that the Town, CRV and the County can work together to see how the CRV portion of the system will connect to the Town's collection system. He mentioned that the County has taken responsibility for the section of sewer that serves CRV. Mayor Cooley provided a brief background stating that as CRV became incorporated, the customers who were in the incorporated area of the County became CRV customers of the Lake Lure system but continued to join the system via the gravity line that the County continued to maintain. He reported that there are some issues in the engineering design for the Town's system that can hopefully be discussed later in the meeting with NCDEQ in regards to estimating the volume of sewage that the Town will eventually have to collect and treat when the new pressurized system is put in and also reported that we need to find a way to realistically predict flows. He explained that we do have good existing customer records which will show how much

sewage is getting billed for based on water meter data; however, he added that there are quite a number of customers for whom we do not have water meter data.

Mr. Peter O'Leary clarified that there are no sewer lines in the river; they are either in the bank or up on piers. He noted that the lines were put in to serve County residents and businesses in the CRV area. He stated that property owners privately hooked up and the main line has been maintained by the County, noting that any line that runs off the main line is maintained by the customers.

Mr. Tim Heim questioned if smoke testing had ever been done in CRV. Mr. Jeffrey Brown stated that Brown Consultants has not done any smoke testing in CRV. Mr. Peter O'Leary reported that a previous Lake Lure Public Works Director, Tony Hennessee, conducted smoke testing in the 90's. Mr. Brown noted that Lake Lure does not own the line leading into CRV. He stated that manhole number 34 on the provided map (attached) is as far as Lake Lure lines go. Mayor Cooley expressed that it is the Town's intention to continue to serve the existing and new customers in CRV. Mr. Brown agreed that the plan is to serve CRV but mentioned that it is not certain who has oversight over that portion of the system. He mentioned that we also need to know the impact of the Infiltrations and Inflow (I&I) coming down that line as it will ultimately have impact on the new low-pressures sewer system. He stated that the new pump system will accept this new flow and will be metered. Commissioner Kilby pointed out that there are the Lake Lure Village Resort (LLVR), Rumbling Bald Resort (RBR), and Hummingbird Cove will be on the new system as well. Mr. Brown noted that CRV and RBR are the bigger entities that we are dealing with. Mr. Baldwin asked if the pump station would be metered so that the Town would know how much was flowing into the Town's sewer system. Mr. Brown stated "yes."

Mr. Steve Garrison stated that the County wants to gain understanding as to what the challenges are and would like to see a level of transparency as the challenges are worked through together, mentioning that the County wants to make sure that the businesses and homes have access to sewer to better serve them. He stated that the County has continued to provide maintenance of the line in CRV. Mr. Jeffrey Brown reported that currently the lines are not metered to show how much flow comes out of the CRV pipe into the Lake Lure system. Mayor Cooley provided a list of the CRV customers that are currently being billed by the Town, pointing out that there are twice as many commercial customers as there are residential customers. Mr. Keith Webb stated that guidance is needed on how the owner of the CRV sewer system will fund and build the changes to the infrastructure to tie into the new low-pressure system that Lake Lure is building and how the CRV section gets sized from the flows that are coming from CRV and the current and potential service area of the river. Mayor Cooley explained that customers who do not have metered water service are billed a flat rate for sewer service by the Town in comparison to a business similar in size, although there is no knowledge of how much flow data actually comes from these businesses.

Mr. Keith Webb felt it would be helpful if the Town could include the monies to make the improvements to the lines in the funding done by the Division of Water Infrastructure (DWI).

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Mayor Cooley clarified that the Town obtained State Revolving Fund (SRF) funding of around \$13 million for the original plan, the Greenline Project with a zero percent interest for a 30 year payback period and a \$0.5 million principal forgiveness to implement the project as planned. He explained that when the Greenline Project was decided to not be the right option the Town offered their new solution to NCDEQ, which would take care of the underlying problems with the treatment facility, and were approved for the same funding mechanism for the new system. He noted that the issue is that the funding entity will only fund assets that the Town owns and will not allow the Town to use the money for assets outside of the system. Ms. Anita Robinson, NCDEO, stated that they are willing to work with the Town on how to come up with an accurate flow number and are willing to allow the Town to design the system to handle the flow from CRV as well as RBR. She noted that CRV can apply for funding with the NCDEQ as well, noting that the owner of the infrastructure must be the one to apply. Mr. Keith Webb mentioned that once clarification is made on the ownership they could put together an application for funding. Mr. Keith Webb stated he worked for the County on the sewer repair in CRV after the '96 flood. Mayor Cooley questioned how sewer services in CRV would be paid noting that currently the customers on the system pay the Town since it is being treated by the Town. He mentioned that the County does not currently have an income source that supports the operation and maintenance of the system and stated that there has to be an income stream to pay for it.

Mayor Cooley mentioned that the majority of town properties are not currently on the sewer system noting that the Town would like to expand the customer base to have a lot less septic systems in areas particularly around the lake, which would be an economical and environmental benefit. Mr. Jeffrey Brown added that we have about a year to do this. Mayor Cooley reported that the proposed date for the revised engineering report approval letter agreed upon is May 1, 2019, submittal of the bid and design package is set for November 1, 2019, and the approval of the bid will be in March, 2020. The advertisement for bids is set for July 1, 2020 and execution of the construction contract is on August 3, 2020. Mr. Jeffrey Brown clarified that the November 1<sup>st</sup> date was moved to December.

Ms. Anita Robinson questioned if the Town has plans to apply for additional money from the NCDEQ or from other entities but added that the NCDEQ is okay with the pump stations being included in the loan for this project. She also pointed out that since the project has changed from the Greenline to a low-pressure sewer system, it may only qualify for a 20 year loan as opposed to the 30 year loan originally approved for the Greenline Project. Mr. Jeffrey Brown stated that he has never been told this and understood that the loan would still be the same 30 year loan term. He stated that he would need to follow up with this conversation at a later time. Mayor Cooley added that we should make a call to the Local Government Commission (LGC) and inquire about the Town's options with the funding term for the new system.

Mayor Cooley stated that upstream evaluations of the existing collection system needs to be done. Mr. Baldwin mentioned that CRV, the County, and McGill Associates should meet now to establish flows and discuss designing something for future flows. Mayor Cooley stated that a

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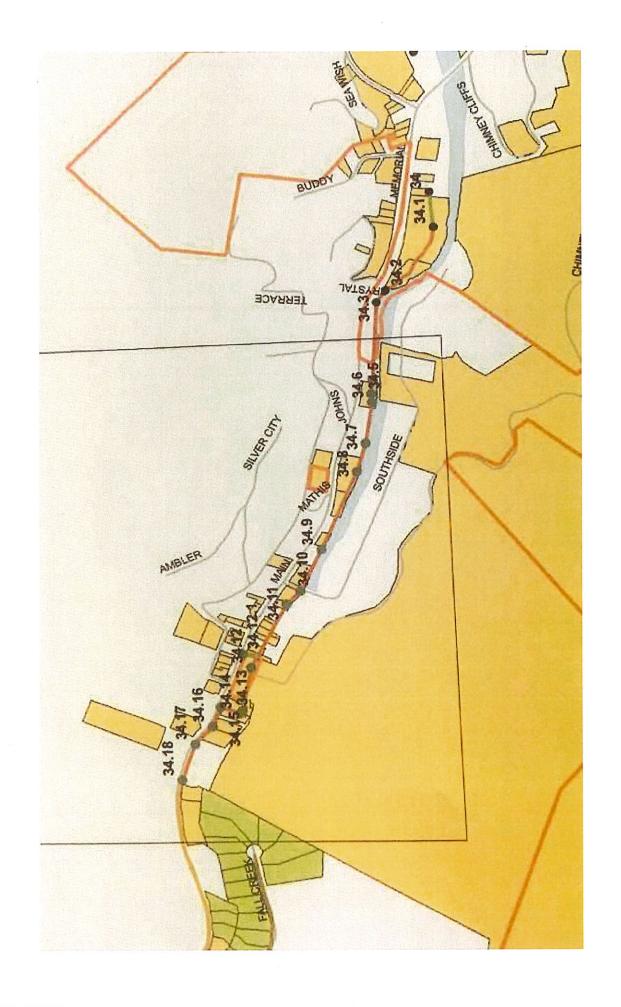
similar workshop will need to be held with Carolina Water Services, the private utility that services RBR, as well as NCDEQ.

Mr. Steve Duncan mentioned that smoke testing was done in '89 and there was a mechanism in place to measure flow at that time. He suggested someone try and make contact with Tony Hennessee regarding when the last time smoke testing was done and how the flow was measured below the Geneva Hotel. Commissioner Webber pointed out that Mark Pobanz, Water Supervisor, was also here during that time mentioning that he may have those records. Mayor Cooley reemphasized that the Town wants this to be a collaborative effort to get to the same result for a better sewer system for the Gorge.

### ADJOURN THE MEETING

With no further business, Commissioner Stephen Webber made a motion to adjourn the meeting at 11:34 a.m. Commissioner John Kilby seconded and the motion carried 3-0.

#### STAFF'S COMMENTS AND RECOMMENDATIONS:

As stated in the letter from Ms. Sharp, this request is coming from another governmental body and is within the purview of Town Council:

§ 92.154(B) Signs of a governmental body, including traffic warning or regulatory signs and devices. These signs shall also include other governmental signs including building identification, directional, information, and welcome signs. Signs of a governmental body other than the Town of Lake Lure require Town Council approval, regardless of the type of sign, unless otherwise exempted by federal or state law. Although exempt from sign regulations, specific governmental signs like building identification, directional, information, and welcome signs must be reviewed by the Planning Board and approved by Town Council. However, traffic control signs, traffic warning signs, public notices, or signs of a similar nature need only Town Manager approval. (Amended 5-13-14, 9-13-16)

The "Community Banner Program," while arguably temporary signage, is not addressed in the Town's sign regulations. The frequency and duration for allowing banners to occupy the four locations in Town has apparently always been an administrative decision with regulatory guidance provided only on the Town's website at: http://www.townoflakelure.com/banner-program-faqs.php as follows:

### How long can my banner(s) remain posted?

Eligible organizations are allowed to post their banners up to two times in a calendar year, for a period of 15 days. Some event organizers choose to utilize those two times back to back. In that instance the banners could be displayed up to 30 days.

Town Council has full latitude and authority, especially in the case of approving signage from another governmental body, to amend the above administrative guidelines for the Community Banner Program.

The Community Banner Calendar is free for the dates requested.

BRIEF SUMMARY: Lake Lure Tours, Inc. will be hosting a Spring Classic Boat and Auto Show May 10-11, 2019 with the support of the Blue Ridge Chapter of the Antique and Classic Boat Society and the Greater Smoky Mountains Region of the Antique Automobile Club of America. The events are sponsored by Larkin's on the Lake, Lake Lure Inn and Spa, and the Town of Lake Lure. The Hickory Nut Gorge Chamber and the Hickory Nut Gorge Outreach are also supporting the event. This event will begin with the launch of a boat parade featuring the Miss America IX boat, the first boat ever to exceed 100 MPH. The boat exceeds the 21' maximum boat length regulation and will be in violation of the Town's Noise Ordinance.

## ADDENDUM TO CONCESSION AGREEMENT

This Addendum to the Concession Agreement entered this the 8th day of January 2019 by and between the Town of Lake Lure (hereinafter "the Town") and Lake Lure Tours, Inc. (hereinafter "LLT"):

WHEREAS, the Town and LLT entered into a "Concession Agreement for the Town of Lake Lure Beach, Marina and Tour Boats" (hereinafter the "concession agreement") dated February 15, 2018, which agreement is incorporated herein by reference; and,

WHEREAS, the Concession Agreement, in section thirty-three, provides in part:

LLT shall pay the Town fifteen percent (15%) of monthly gross receipts of Marina, Beach and Tour Boat Operations. Excepting, that (1) the Town shall receive 95% of all non-commercial boat permits sold to third parties at the Marina, and (2) the Town shall receive the full \$50 hourly rate for the rental fee charged at the beach. The Town shall receive no discount on fuel purchased by the Town at the Marina; and,

WHEREAS, the Town and LLT have agreed to reduce the concession fee for monthly gross receipts of retail marine fuel sales at the Marina; and,

WHEREAS, the Town has agreed to dedicate a section of the Town's floating dock and ramp; and,

WHEREAS, the Town and LLT have agreed to a pedestrian viewing area at Lake Lure Beach; and,

WHEREAS, the Concession Agreement, in section thirty-two, provides in part:

Agreement to operate Beach. The term of this Agreement shall be for an initial five (5) year term beginning February 15, 2018 through February 14, 2023. Upon successful completion of the fourth year of the initial five-year term, the Town and LLT shall timely and fully, during the fourth year of the five-year term, cooperatively discuss the Town's options regarding any extension, modification, or termination of this Agreement. Any extension, modification or termination of this Agreement will be at the sole discretion of the Town.

NOW, THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, in consideration of the Concession Agreement, and other good and valuable consideration, the sufficiency of which is hereby acknowledged by the parties, the Town and LLT agree as follows:

The Concession Agreement is amended to provide that LLT shall pay the Town five percent (5%) of monthly gross receipts of retail marine fuel sales at the Marina; and,

The Concession Agreement is amended to provide that the Town shall allow a 200' section of floating dock and a 21' section of 4'-wide aluminum, hand-railed ramp owned by the Town to be re-situated East-to-West from the Northerly point of the Pool Creek peninsula, running approximately where the current Beach swimming area demarcation line resides, at LLT's sole expense; and,

The Concession Agreement is amended to provide that LLT shall pay the Town fifteen percent (15%) of monthly revenue of the Viewfinder<sup>TM</sup> and shall provide that LLT will design, supply materials for, and construct a year-round, free-access, pedestrian Viewing Area at the Town Beach at Lake Lure central crosswalk of Memorial Highway, at LLT's sole expense. The Viewing Area will be located at one of the most popular "photograph" areas of the Beach; although the Viewing Area will not facilitate access to the Beach, it will provide seating and rotatable Viewfinder<sup>TM</sup> amenities for Town visitors. Securing any applicable permits for the construction of the Viewing Area shall be the responsibility of LLT, with such permitting not being unreasonably withheld by the Town. The Viewing Area structure, once completed, will become an asset of the Town; although the housekeeping of and minor repairs to the structure, along with ownership of and the servicing and "robbing" of the coin-operated Viewfinder<sup>TM</sup> shall remain the responsibility of LLT.

The Concession Agreement is amended to provide that the term of the Agreement to operate the Beach shall be for an initial five (5) year term beginning February 15, 2018 through February 14, 2023, at which date, upon successful completion of the five-year term, the Town shall renew the Beach Concession Agreement for an additional five year period, commending February 15, 2023 through and ending February 14, 2028.

Except as expressly amended herein, the Concession Agreement dated February 15, 2018, shall remain in full force and effect.

The Board extensively reviewed the draft report provided by Mr. Ellis and discussed recommendations to be added. Mr. Bell inquired about town property located across the highway from the Ingles grocery store mentioning that it is a prime piece of property and suggested the idea of a dog park there. Mr. Ellis noted that he included an option for a dog park under the "Golf Course Area." He stated that the NC 9 area was omitted from his report and the Board agreed to rename "Golf Course Area" to "NC 9/Golf Course Area." The Board discussed ideas for the golf course property and efficient utilization of that land and suggested recommending that Town Council task the Parks and Recreation Board to look into the golf course area to determine the highest and best use of that property. Ms. Turner suggested changing the language from "Golf course unprofitable as currently configured and managed" to "Golf course historically unprofitable as currently conceived and configured."

Mr. Wald suggested the Town publicize and promote that the Beach is accessible after hours and in the off-season. Mr. Bell made a suggestion to add a new bullet point under "Town Center" to include coordination with NCDOT or State Parks for the new entrance to the Chimney Rock State Park. Council Liaison John Moore provided an update on the ABC Store relocation. The Board ensued in discussion regarding the old Lakeview Store property. Mr. Wald suggested encouraging Council to develop the current spoils pit into an event space.

Mr. Holden made a motion to accept this draft report with the recommendations made during discussion. Ms. Turner seconded and the motion carried 5-0.

The Board felt it would be a good idea to recommend that the Zoning and Planning Board review this report from time to time and recommend updates to Council as needed.

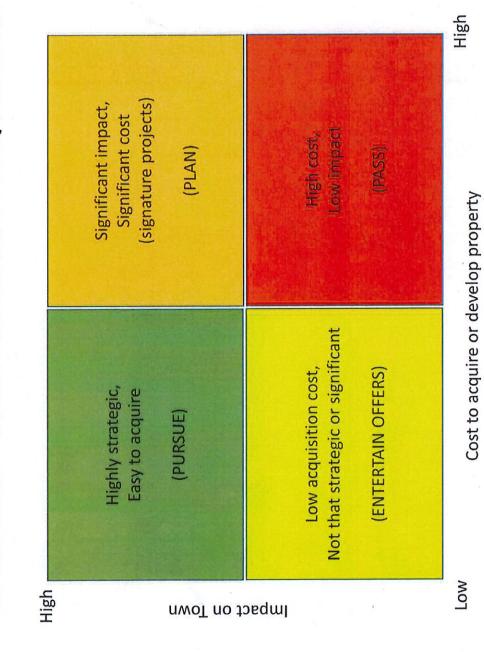

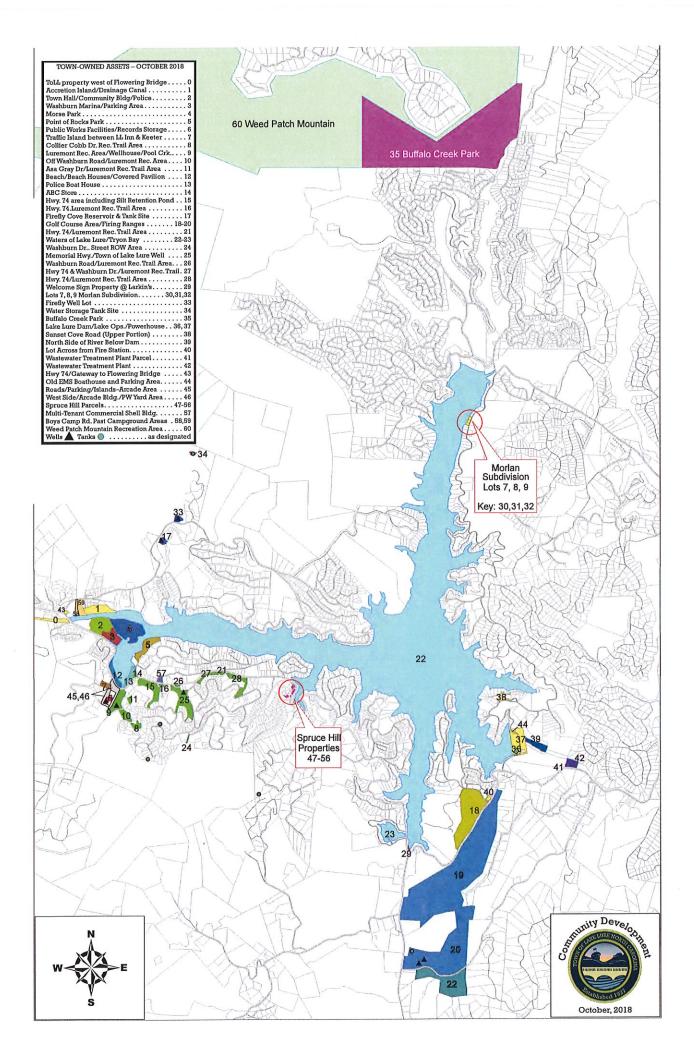

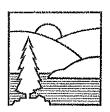

#### CALL TO ORDER

Mayor Doyle called the meeting to order at approximately 7:30 p.m.

#### INVOCATION

Tom Hord, Town Manager, gave the invocation.

#### APPROVAL OF MINUTES

Commissioner Lehner moved, seconded by Commissioner Bush, to approve the minutes, as presented, of the Tuesday, December 15, 1992 Regular Council meeting and the minutes of the Tuesday, January 5, 1993 Recessed

Council meeting. The vote of approval was unanimous.

#### AUDIENCE OF CITIZENS

John Kilby, resident of 13 Neighborly Drive, requested that the level of the lake be lowered to approximately 4 to 4-1/2 feet. Mr. Hord assured Mr. Kilby that the intentions are to lower the lake to the level requested. However, the weather has delayed the process.

Michael Banks, owner of Necro Designs Tattoo Parlor, discussed with Council his concern of the proposed commercial regulations which were to be formally presented to Council. Council informed Mr. Banks that if they adopted the proposed commercial regulations in its present format, as an existing use this business would be allowed to continue by grandfathering.

# REQUEST FOR POSSIBLE CHANGES OR AMENDMENTS TO SIGN ORDINANCE CONCERNING OFF PREMISE ADVERTISING

Mr. Jack Stanier came before Council and requested that <u>Section 1310</u> <u>Signs Prohibited - (5) Off-Premise signs along public thoroughfares</u> of the Sign Ordinance be amended by stating off-premise signs are allowed if in accordance and/or compliance with state and/or federal regulations.

Mr. Stanier stated that if his request is approved, the Lodge on Lake Lure would like to pursue leasing land from the Town on the Northwest corner of Highway 74 and Charlotte Drive to erect a sign.

Mr. Stanier emphasized that, if approved, they would work with the proper Town officials as far as size, appearance, construction, etc.

Council pointed out that Section 1403 of the Lake Lure Sign Ordinance reads that before taking any action on a proposed amendment to the

ordinance, the Town Council shall consider the Zoning and Planning Board's recommendations on each proposed amendment. The Zoning and Planning Board shall have thirty-five (35) days after the first consideration of the application within which to submit its recommendations to the Town Council. Failure of the Zoning and Planning Board to submit recommendations within the thirty-five (35) day period shall constitute a favorable recommendation.

Therefore, it was the consensus of Council that Mr. Stanier should go before the Zoning and Planning Board with his request.

#### REQUEST FOR BOATHOUSE VARIANCE

Mrs. Donna Sams came before Council requesting a variance to continue the construction of her boathouse.

Mrs. Sams was granted permission at the August 25, 1992 Regular Council Meeting to continue construction of her boathouse, according to the plans submitted, if in accordance with all the existing zoning provisions.

The construction of the boathouse, however, was stopped due to height restriction on October 2, 1992. During inspection, it was determined that Mrs. Sam's boathouse was not only out of compliance with height, but was also out of compliance with the sides.

Dr. Metcalf, neighbor of the Sams, spoke to Council regarding the boathouse as it is currently constructed. Dr. Metcalf stated that the boathouse has hidden his view of the lake.

Commissioner Karr moved, seconded by Commissioner Bush, to table this item until they could review the matter more thoroughly. The vote of approval was unanimous.

#### **BRIEF SUMMARY:**

The attached "Town of Lake Lure Organizational Chart" reflects previously discussed and agreed upon positions and associated restructuring.

The Town will soon have three full-time Dam Operators, assuming the last one clears all administrative requirements. These positions report directly to the Public Works Director.

"Lake Operations Director" title has become the "Parks, Recreation & Lake Director" and the position will have responsibility for parks, recreation and lake. However, a Parks and Recreation Coordinator position has been added to give focused attention to parks and recreation under the direct supervision of the Parks and Recreation & Lake Director.

The "Parks & Recreation Supervisor" title has now become the "Parks & Recreation Maintenance Supervisor." Duties for the position will remain the same, but the position now reports to the Parks and Recreation Coordinator.

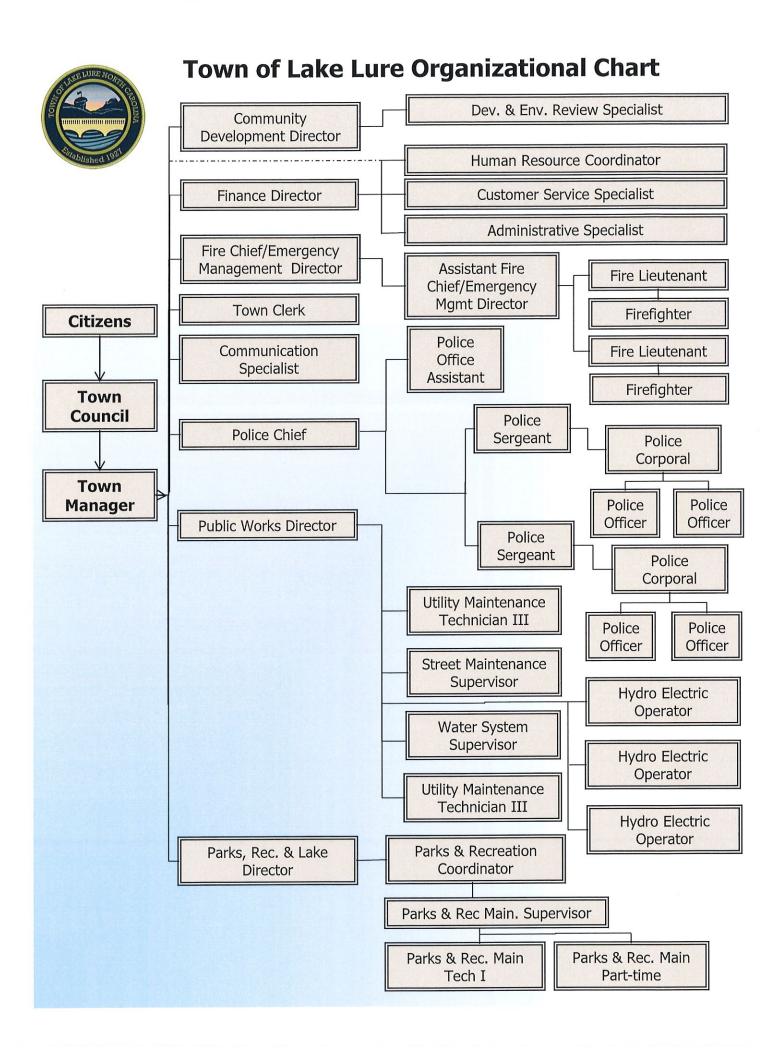
Front administrative staff positions such as the "Administrative Specialist", "Customer Service Specialist" and "Human Resource Coordinator" now have a direct report to the Finance Director. However, the Town Manager works closely with the Human Resource Coordinator as has direct communication with this position day to day.

BRIEF SUMMARY: At your meeting on February 12th, staff will present a draft of the 2019-2024 Capital Improvement Plan (CIP). As a reminder, the CIP is a financial planning tool that looks into the future to forecast the Town's equipment, building and infrastructure needs. Generally speaking, an item is included in the Town's CIP if it has a life expectancy of greater than one year and a value of greater than \$5,000.

# CLOSED SESSION MINUTES POLICY

- "(1) Full and accurate written minutes and a written general account shall be kept of each closed session in such form that a person not in attendance would have a reasonable understanding of what transpired. The written minutes and general account of closed sessions may be combined into one record called 'minutes.'
- "(2) The minutes shall be taken by the Town Clerk. In the absence of the Town Clerk, the minutes shall be taken by the Town Attorney. Draft minutes may be made available only to the Town Clerk, Town Manager, Assistant Town Manager, Town Attorney and Town Council Members.
- "(3) Closed session minutes shall be approved by the town council during a subsequent closed session or in Open Session as part of the Consent Agenda. In either case, each Board member shall initial his/her copy and all copies shall be retrieved by the Town Clerk or Town Attorney.
- "(4) All minutes of closed sessions shall be sealed, unless sealing is not legally permissible.
- "(5) The Town Attorney, Town Manager, and Town Clerk are authorized and directed to review periodically (no less than annually and preferably every six months) each set of closed session minutes created since the previous such review, and earlier sets that remained sealed following previous reviews, to determine if their disclosure would no longer frustrate the purpose for which the closed session was held.
- "(6) Minutes pertaining to the attorney-client privilege shall be brought by the Town Clerk or Town Attorney to the Town Council for unsealing, unless said minutes pertain to lawsuits or legal issues that have been fully and finally resolved or otherwise definitively mooted. Other minutes

may be brought to the town council by the Town clerk or Town Attorney for unsealing or may be

unsealed as provided below.

"(7) If minutes are not required to be brought to the Town Council for unsealing, the Town Council

authorizes the Town Attorney to unseal the minutes (with redactions as appropriate) if the Town

Attorney finds that disclosing the closed session minutes (or some redacted part of them) would

not frustrate the purpose for which the closed session was held and is not otherwise precluded by

state or federal law. No further council action is necessary to unseal closed session minutes

pursuant to this paragraph.

"(8) Following the unsealing of closed session minutes by the Town Attorney or Town Council,

the unsealed minutes shall be returned to the Town Clerk, maintained in a separate volume of

unsealed minutes (whether in hard copy or electronic form) and made available for public

inspection upon request."

(9) This policy shall become effective upon adoption. It is intended that this policy be applied

retroactively to all closed session minutes since the Town's incorporation. If specific closed

session minutes are requested which were created prior to the adoption of this policy, said minutes

shall be examined as set forth in paragraph 5 above.
