WILDLAND FUELS REDUCTION PROGRAM

GENERAL:

- Completed over 28 acres of fuels reduction projects on Town owned properties near residential areas.
- Conducted numerous public education efforts aimed at wildfire risk reduction.
- ✓ Completed a wildfire risk assessment for 12 priority neighborhoods.
- Completed work on the Community Wildfire Protection Plan.

BRUSH REMOVAL PROJECT:

- Supported brush disposal pits where property owners deposited over 6,000 loads of vegetation free of charge.
- Three (3) 40-ton (capacity) dumpsters were filled with brush through the neighborhood brush-removal project.

HAZARD TREE PROGRAM:

- ✓ Hazard trees in Payson 251
- ✓ Trees already removed by property owner 67
- ✓ Trees removed by program 38
- Trees remaining 146

COMMUNITY EMERGENCY RESPONSE TEAM (C.E.R.T.)

- Completed first full year of service.
- ✓ C.E.R.T. *trainers* increased from three to seven.
- √ Four classes were graduated with a total of 70 citizens trained in C.E.R.T. related emergency response.
- √ Two disaster drills were held.
- ✓ Participated in the Town of Payson's disaster drill.

SUPPORT REHAB

- ✓ Responds to significant incidents and provides nutritional support and the monitoring of fire fighter vital signs.
- ✓ Sets up each year at the Aero-Fair held at the Payson Airport and provides public education.
- ✓ Sells T-shirts and refreshments at local events to raise money to purchase Guardian Angels.
- A Guardian Angel is a two-piece automatic phone dialer. The user need only push a button on their necklace and the base unit automatically dials a preprogrammed phone number to summon help.
- ✓ This year we were able to purchased 125 new Guardian Angels units.
- ✓ In cooperation with the Payson Police Volunteers, installed 50 Guardian Angel units.
- √ Support Rehab currently has 12 members.

INTERNATIONAL ASSOCIATION OF FIREFIGHTERS (IAFF) LOCAL 4135

- Sent one of our members to the annual Professional Firefighters of Arizona convention in Tucson, AZ.
- ✓ On September 3rd, our annual *Fill-the-Boot* event collected over \$300.00 for the Muscular Dystrophy Association.
- Our second annual highway trash clean-up, between mileposts 240 and 241 on Highway 87 south of Town, netted 22 large bags of garbage, one car hood and lots of tires.
- On December 4th our second annual Tamales for Toys resulted in almost 300 new toys.
- √ The toys were delivered on December 23rd by fire fighters and police officers.






Many programs are conducted throughout the year in order to educate the public (all ages) about Department services. Some of this year's highlights include:




