oncerned neighbors surrounding the JFK Park requested security lighting at the Jefferson Street parking lot. Plymouth Township investigated traditional electric parking lot lighting and because of the difficulty of extending the existing power supply and the costs associated with doing so, we decided to go with a solar alternative.

Plymouth Township purchased and installed a double cobra head fixture parking lot light. This unit has two LED light fixtures, solar panels and battery storage which operate off of a photo cell from dusk to a maximum of 7 hours. This light was purchased and installed for less than a traditional light fixture and offers an added benefit of no electric bills.

2011 Pennsylvania Narcotics Officers Association Outstanding Police Performance Award

On March 24, 2011, Plymouth Township Police Department's Special Investigations Unit Officers Christopher Schwartz and Doug Copestick received the 2011 Pennsylvania Narcotics Officers Association Outstanding Police Performance Award for their part in a 2010 investigation into the drug trafficking of an individual known as "Michaocano".

Officer Schwartz and Officer Copestick conducted the joint investigation with Detective Erick Echevarria of the Montgomery County Detective Bureau as well as Detectives from Berks County and Agents from the DEA and PA Attorney General's Office. The joint investigation resulted in eight wiretaps, the arrest of fifteen individuals from Pennsylvania, North Carolina and Nevada, the seizure of thirteen cars and one motorcycle, four pounds of marijuana, one pound of methamphetamine, six kilograms of cocaine and \$100,000.00 in US Currency.

Officer of the Year

On May 9, 2011 Officer Chad Robinson received the Officer of the Year Award for 2010. Officer Robinson performed diligently and faithfully the services that were required of him in the highest standards of our law enforcement profession. Subsequently, a vote was taken by the department's supervisory staff to recognize Officer Robinson for his efforts.

Officer Robinson has been with the department since 2004. We wish Officer Robinson continued success in his career.



National Take Back Drug Initiative

On Saturday, April 20th Plymouth Township Police Department partnered up with the Drug Enforcement Administration (DEA) for this year's Drug Take Back Initiative. We collected any and all unused/expired prescription drugs at the Plymouth Township Police Department, 700 Belvoir Rd, Plymouth Township.

Thanks to those efforts, over 83 pounds of unused/expired medications were collected; and thanks to the citizens in Montgomery County, we gathered the third largest volume of drugs in the entire States of Pennsylvania and Delaware.



Holiday Season Reminders

A s fall approaches and the leaves turn color and fall from the trees, the Plymouth Township Public Works Department schedules leaf collection for each and every public street in the Township. The Township Fire Marshal's Office therefore reminds you to obey the open burning ordinance and not burn any leaves, branches or other yard waste.

During the Holiday Season, the Fire Marshal's Office requests that you use candles with caution.

Candles are a leading cause of home fires and unattended candles even for a short time can cause burns to children and pets.

Keep them away from curtains and other combustibles and use candles that are in or on non-combustible containers if at all possible.

Limit the use of extension cords and use only UL approved electrical devices and decorations. Never run cords under rugs or furniture.

Enjoy your holidays with family and friends and remember to check your smoke detector batteries when you change your clocks back to Eastern Standard Time.



Is Your Trash Can Too Big?

Over the past few years, more and more residents are using 60-90 gallon carts as their trash container. These carts are too large for our men to handle and are designed to be lifted mechanically. Trash cans should be no larger than 30 gallons and weigh no more than 50 pounds when loaded. An EMPTY 90 gallon cart weighs 40 pounds! As a guide, the round, blue recycle cans are approximately 30 gallon size. A trash can of this size is preferable. Trash will be left curbside and tagged if it is deemed to be too heavy.

Christmas Tree Recycling

Plymouth Township will start recycling Christmas Trees on Monday, January 2, 2012. Residents are asked to put their used Christmas trees out for collection on their regular recycling day during the month of January. The Public Works Department will collect the trees and chip them. For the safety of Township employees, residents must remove all ornaments, lights and stands. The wood chips are turned into mulch, which is free for the taking at the Public Works driveway, 700 Belvoir Road.

Pennsylvania Recycling Waste Watchers Award

For the third year in a row, Plymouth Township is recognized by the Professional Recyclers of Pennsylvania (PROP) as one of the Top Recyclers in the State of Pennsylvania.

The Pennsylvania Waste Watchers program recognizes recycling, waste reduction, reuse, and composting programs in Pennsylvania that have exhibited exemplary performance. This year, over 120 municipalities, counties, private businesses, individuals, and community organizations from throughout

Yard Waste

- Yard waste is collected every Wednesday throughout the year except on holidays.
- Yard waste consists of grass clippings, twigs/shrub trimmings and pruning, leaves, and garden waste (pinecones, weeds, dead plants). Rocks and logs are not considered yard waste.
- Place in biodegradable brown paper bags or in a designated Yard

Pennsylvania are being recognized for going above and beyond what is mandated under Act 101 for their communities or programs.

A special thank you to the residents of Plymouth Township for their excellent job in recycling and for working together as a community, showing serious commitment, and as a result saving precious resources, money and energy for the environment.

Waste container (trash can). Please, no plastic bags. Brown bags can be purchased at Home Depot, Lowes and some grocery stores.

• Yard waste will not be collected in the blue recycling containers.

Note: All recyclables and yard waste are collected in a designated trash truck as part of our single stream recycling. So rest assured that although all recycle materials will be collected with a trash truck, they are still being recycled to protect our earth and reduce disposal costs.

2011-2012 Solid Waste Holiday Collection Schedule

- If a holiday falls on a Saturday or Sunday the holiday is observed on Monday.
- When a holiday falls on your recycle day during the week, recycling will be picked up on Wednesday of that week. Your trash will be picked up on your next scheduled trash day.

Snow Plowing

When it Snows...Our goal is to have all Township and State roads cleared within 15-20 hours after the snow has stopped falling. In order for this to occur, however, it takes your cooperation. The public works crews plow 48 miles of Township roads and 17 miles of State roads. This translates into over 150 lane miles to clear. As you can see this is not an easy task.

If you have off-street parking such as a driveway, please use it. Please stack cars closely in your driveway and refrain from parking on the street. This will help our crews better clear and negotiate your street.

Please do not throw snow back into the street while shoveling or cleaning off cars. This slows and impedes our operations and the plows will have to clear it again. This also violates Ordinance #1540. This Ordinance prohibits throwing, shoveling, or plowing snow onto highways, streets or roads in Plymouth Township.

Ideally, don't shovel the end of your driveway until the plows have finished with your street. Remember, all plows are angled to discharge snow to the curb on the right. It is impossible to plow the streets without the plow being angled.

The plowing priority will be as follows. Primary roads will be cleared first, followed by secondary streets and finally residential streets and cul-de-sacs. Residential street plowing will not begin until the snow stops falling. The reason for this is because our main focus and priority is keeping the main roads passable and clear while the snow is falling. We cannot concentrate our crews in the residential neighborhoods while the snow is falling because the main roads would become dangerous and potentially impassable.

Remember, the public works crews will put in long hard hours clearing the streets.....so please be patient and courteous.

It's Time to Get Ready for Winter

 $\mathbf{R}^{ ext{esidents}}$ are asked to remember the following to get through the winter season safely:

- Use off-street parking when snow is predicted. When you park your car in the driveway there's less snow to shovel.
- On-street parking, where no off-street parking is available, is only permitted on one side of the street. In an odd year parking is only permitted on the odd numbered side of the street.
- Don't park near storm drains, so crews can clear snow and ice to avoid flooding from the melting runoff.
- When shoveling your driveway, pile snow to the right. This will prevent the plow from covering your driveway opening again.
- Property owners are required to clear their sidewalks at least 30 inches wide within 36 hours after the snow stops.
- Residents are reminded that it is unlawful to park or abandon a car on any street any time within twelve hours after a snowfall of three inches or more, where off-street parking exists. Vehicles parked

Trash Collection

- Place trash at curb no later than 6:00 a.m. on the day of collection, but no earlier than 7:00 p.m. on the prior evening.
- Store in water-tight containers with handles and loose fitting lids. Do not place trash in paper bags, plastic bags or cardboard boxes.
- If the trash men spill trash, they will pick it up; if an improper container breaks or an animal tears up the trash, it is the property owner's responsibility to clean up.
- The trash men will not collect more than four containers. Trash containers should be no larger than 30 gallons nor weigh more than 50 pounds.
- Unacceptable items include: Refuse from the construction of buildings such as sand, earth, lumber, brick, stone, mortar, plaster, roofing materials, plumbing fixtures, etc.; and auto parts, hazardous

otherwise are subject to removal at the owner's expense.

 Any motor vehicle parked, stalled, incapable of moving under its own power, or left unattended upon any public street or highway in the Township at any time within twelve hours after a snowfall

- of three inches or more has occurred may be removed or towed to another location by the Police Department.
 - Don't shovel or plow snow into the street. The plows will just move it back onto your driveway or sidewalk.
 - Think Safety! Never approach moving snow removal equipment. Just because you can see the driver doesn't mean he can see you. We try to keep our crews fresh and rested, but extended weather emergencies can mean long hours for Township employees. Please keep children and pets off the streets as much as possible.

• If there's a fire hydrant by your home consider adopting it! You know where it is; if it's obscured by snow, fire companies responding to emergencies may not find it. Clearing the snow from

the hydrant helps protect you and your neighbors.

wastes, household appliances, and yard waste.

- Large items such as furniture will be picked up on your second regular trash day of the week.
- Household appliances and scrap metal are collected separately from regular trash, on the third Wednesday of the month. Residents must call 610-277-4103 by the second Friday of the month to get the appropriate sticker and be placed on the list. Appliances with Freon or other gasses that need to be removed, such as freezers, refrigerators and air conditioners, require a green sticker that costs \$10. Washing machines, dryers, stoves and metal furniture require an orange sticker which is free. Items without stickers will not be collected. Please remove doors from refrigerators and freezers.

Recycling

- Recyclables are collected once a week on your designated recycling day.
- Place items in the blue recycling container no later than 6:00 a.m.; additional containers may be used, but must be marked for recycling. Recycle stickers are available at the Township Building at no charge.
- Large cardboard items may be placed next to the containers.
- Damaged containers can be exchanged at no cost; lost containers will be replaced at \$25.00 per container.

Branch and Chip Program Collection

- The Township runs two Branch and Chip Collection Programs during the year.
 - Fall September 6 through October 7, 2011
 - Spring March 12 through April 13, 2012
- Residents must call the Public works Department prior to NOON Wednesday of the week to schedule their pick up.

- The following items are recyclable:
 - Glass Aluminum and Bimetal Cans
 - Papers Plastic (#1 thru #7)


Electronics and universal waste recycling

- Please call the Public Works office at 610-277-4103 or go to our website at www.plymouthtownship.org to get details on recycling electronics and small appliances with motors, such as vacuums and blenders.
- Branches will be collected on Thursday and Friday, weather permitting.
 - Residents should comply with the following:
 - Leave the branches as long as possible, a minimum of five feet in length.
 - Nothing over five inches in diameter can be chipped.

Leaf Collection

(There is a larger map on our website or call 610-277-4103 if you need assistance finding your section.)

- Curbside leaf piles may extend along the entire length of the property.
- DO NOT mix limbs, brush and other debris with leaf piles. Mixed piles will not be collected.
- Leaves will not be collected with your regular trash collection. Trash with leaves co-mingled will not be collected.
- Adverse weather conditions may cause delays in leaf collection dates.
- Once the leaf collection machine has passed it will not return until the next scheduled collection.
- Township employees and/or equipment are not permitted to enter private property to remove leaves.
- Property owners are encouraged to start their own compost piles.
- Residents can opt to place bagged leaves at the curb for collection with their yard waste on Wednesdays.







Grants help Plymouth Township Achieve Mission to Protect and Beautify its Parks

Plymouth Township Parks and Recreation (PTPRD) was very fortunate to receive four new grants. In the fall of 2010, we were awarded a \$45,000 matching grant for a Harriet Wetherill Park Conservation and Management Plan from DCNR. The two-part plan will help provide a guide to maintaining the park in a sustainable manner and will assist in the development of a Building Feasibility Study to manage and enhance recreational opportunities in relation to both the land and its buildings.



This year we were presented with a \$5,000 matching grant from PECO for the East Plymouth Valley Park Pond Enhancement project. The grant is part of PECO's Green Region municipal open space program. The project will oxygenate the pond to improve the habitat for both fish and plant life and add passive recreation amenities including benches for viewing, a trash/recycling receptacle to protect the pond from litter and signage designed to educate visitors regarding water quality, pond life and catch and release fishing.

The Philadelphia Zoo also chose PTPRD for a \$1,500 grant for a professionally designed self-guided map for Harriet Wetherill Park which will direct visitors to specific recreational and educational points of interest and guide them along trails. The print and electronic interpretive maps will be designed to bring the initial park visit to our future classroom settings and group presentations via our website.

Through funding from a PA Department of Environmental

Protection grant program, Natural Lands Trust prepared a Stewardship Assessment for Plymouth Township's Harriet Wetherill Park to encourage environmental stewardship practices. The Assessment, which includes many representative photos, serves as a guide to the natural areas on site, discusses conservation priorities, and highlights stewardship recommendations.

The PTPRD has been persistent in seeking out various grant opportunities and is proud of our accomplishments. These agencies assist the Township in providing the community with environmentally oriented parks and recreation projects. Look for updates in our future publications; and be sure to visit the parks to follow our progress.
