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

HARRIET WETHERILL PARK - MOVING TOWARD OUR GOALS

If you haven't visited Harriet Wetherill Park yet, autumn is the perfect time to bring the family and walk the trails, have a picnic, learn about nature, and join in the many programs being offered. Our nature-themed park consists 66 acres of picturesque landscape that is permanently protected to provide recreation and environmental education to people of all ages.

The Township has been very successful with past grants that assisted with the purchase, planning and development of the park. Currently the park offers trails, a picnic area, a butterfly garden, interpretive signage, family programs and much more. We are excited to be moving forward with additional improvements through our most recent Act 13 grant from the Commonwealth Financing Authority to include a new entrance to the park from Butler Pike which will allow easy access, additional parking for larger vehicles including buses, and additional trails to connect to the current trail system to areas closer to Butler Pike. Anticipated completion date is early next summer.

The Township is seeking additional funding through the Commonwealth Financing Authority and DCNR for outdoor restrooms, a pavilion, a nature themed playground and the initial phases of the environmental education center. Recent removal of the main house and carriage house, which were non-compliant for public use, will prepare us for this next phase. Applications have been submitted and we anticipate a decision by the end of the year. It is our hope that additional grant funding and our matching funds will enable the Township to gradually phase in a full Nature Center and bring environmental education to students and the community through various educational means, volunteerism and stewardship.

We are very pleased and honored with the amount of support we have received from legislators, local funding sources and Plymouth Township Council. This support helps to make our grant submissions attractive. We are fortunate to have received so much funding assistance.

FEASIBILITY STUDY FOR THE CROSS COUNTY TRAIL PUBLIC MEETING/WORKSHOP

Date: October 7, 2014 Time: 7:00 -9:00 p.m.

Location: Greater Plymouth Community Center, 2910 Jolly Road, Plymouth Meeting, PA - Room A

Local residents from Plymouth Township, Whitemarsh Township, and surrounding communities will have an opportunity on Tuesday evening, October 7, 2014 to learn more about the Cross County Trail Feasibility Study, a trail project to identify a multi-use pathway to fill a gap on the Cross County Trail between Germantown Pike and Joshua Road. The trail would ideally connect with the completed portion of the trail at Germantown Pike, and the planned portion of the trail extending eastwards from Joshua Road.

Area residents, bicyclists, walkers, nature lovers, and outdoor enthusiasts are invited to participate in an evening workshop and express their ideas for the project.

Plymouth Township joined with Montgomery County to conduct a study to determine the feasibility of continuing the Cross County Trail from its current end point at Germantown Pike and Chemical Road in Plymouth Township into Whitemarsh Township. With funding provided by a PECO Green Region grant and Township funds, Plymouth Township has contracted with Campbell Thomas & Company of



Philadelphia, PA to conduct the study. Traffic Planning and Design, Inc. is serving as part of the Campbell Thomas & Co. team.

Participants can stop in at any time during the workshop to share their ideas. Maps and a questionnaire will be provided to facilitate the process. Representatives of Montgomery County, Plymouth and Whitemarsh Townships, the Study Committee, and the Consulting Team will be available to receive your input and questions.

Harmonville Fire Company

Greetings from the officers and members of the Harmonville Fire Company No. 1. We have been proudly serving and protecting the Plymouth Township Community 24 hours a day, 7 days a week since 1924. We have two firehouses – the main station is located at 2100 Butler Pike and our substation is located at 904 Germantown Pike. We



are ready to respond at a moment's notice. Being a volunteer organization, we are always in need of

new members. If firefighting is not for you, we are also in need of fire police officers who provide traffic/scene control as well as administrative officers. Anyone interested in joining a great volunteer organization is encouraged to stop by either one of our stations during the day, Monday through Friday, or on any Monday night, which is our training night, and one of our members will be happy to assist you!

Our annual fund drive mailing went out to all residents and businesses in July. We thank those who supported us with an annual donation. For those who have not donated, please reconsider and help support our volunteer Fire Company.

For the first half of 2014, our members have responded to 271 emergency calls for service, attended 41 training sessions between our Monday night drills as well as at other locations and have attended 64 special services, including meetings, fundraisers and fire prevention activities.

Every year, the Fire Company is involved in numerous events in Plymouth Township. Some of the events are Plymouth Township Day, annual school drills during Fire Prevention Week, and fire prevention demonstrations at the summer camps.

The members also hold fundraisers throughout the year, such as our annual Easter flower sale, car washes & a flea market. Members will also hold a hoagie sale toward the end of September and our annual Christmas tree sale, which is scheduled to start on Saturday, November 29, 2014. Along with selling the trees, we will also sell freshly made wreaths and sprays.



FIRE MARSHAL'S OFFICE / EMERGENCY MGNT SECTION

FALL IS A GREAT TIME TO DE-CLUTTER YOUR HOUSE AND AVOID... FALLS!

We have frequently suggested for fire safety reasons that you should have two ways out of your home. Have you ever considered trying to escape your home in a smoke-filled haze to only realize that your home is filled with tripping hazards? Every year, hundreds of homeowners spend hours in the hospital due to falls. What can you do to prevent falls? Prepare a home checklist to see if your home is safe.

Below are some items of which you should be aware:

- Throw rugs are a major tripping hazard, especially to the elderly. Either remove the rugs or make sure they are secure with double –sided tape.
- Be careful when climbing ladders. To reach items inside, move the most used items to the shelves within easy reach. If you are using outside ladders, be sure the ladder is secure and make sure someone is holding the ladder for added safety.
- Do you have a clear path in your home? Or is it scattered with toys, papers, and other items? Clutter makes you an easy target for falling. It is also dangerous to firefighters as they enter a burning building and try to find their way around in already difficult circumstances.
- Walking up or down stairs can lead to falls if your hand rails are not secure. If they wobble or become loose, have them fixed!
- Are your home corridors well lit? Those late night bathroom runs could be dangerous! Be sure your path is well lit; consider night lights wherever you are unable to see clearly.

Falls are preventable! Just a few minutes to check your home could save you from falling!

Points to Remember:

- 1) *School's Open:* Please remember to drive safely and watch for children on their way to and from school. Obey the speed limits, especially in school zones. The school zone/speed zones are strictly enforced by the Police Department.
- 2) *Inclement Weather:* This is the time of the year for wet leaf covered roadways, snow and ice. Remember to leave plenty of space between your vehicle and the car ahead. Remember the law requires you to have your headlights on any time you have your windshield wipers on for inclement weather.
 - Roadways Roads become slippery when covered with snow, sleet and freezing rain. Allow extra distance (at least six to eight second following distances) between your car and the car ahead. Check your tires and winterize your car as soon as possible.
- 3) Holiday Safety: Take the time to safeguard your valuables during the busy holiday season. Guard your personal information and credit cards. Place holiday purchases and packages in the trunk of your vehicle and out of the sight of potential thieves. Always remember to lock you doors.






- 1) Don't send personal information or make purchases over a public computer.

PLYMOUTH TOWNSHIP NEW MAILBOX REPLACEMENT POLICY

Plymouth Township has many operations that require various types of vehicles and equipment to work along the street and curb line. Snow plowing in particular requires operations to get as close to the curb as possible so that mail can be delivered. The Highway Department takes great care not to damage any property within the right-of-way; however, mailboxes occasionally get damaged. Most damage occurs by the weight of the snow that rolls off the blade. Many times mailboxes are old and leaning or not installed properly. Due to the time and cost associated with these repairs and replacements, we have established a new policy for mailbox repairs and new mailbox installation.

THE POLICY

The Public Works Department will no longer repair or replace damaged mailboxes or support posts. Instead, when the following two (2) criteria are

met, it will provide reimbursement up to a maximum of \$100.00 (copies of receipts are needed):

- It is determined that the Township operator damaged the mailbox while operating a snow plow while plowing snow; and
- The mailbox had been properly installed (e.g., meeting USPS* installation guidelines) and maintained prior to the damage occurring.

If both criteria noted above are met, you may repair or replace the mailbox/post at your own cost, the Township will then reimburse you up to the maximum of \$100.00 (copies of receipts are needed). The Township will no longer repair or replace damaged mailboxes or supports.

PLYMOUTH TOWNSHIP ZONING & PLANNING SECTION

Anyone interested in constructing an "in-law suite" to their single-family dwelling must apply for a Zoning Use & Occupancy Permit with the Township as well as meet the following requirements:

- Immediate family members are limited to parents, grandparents, children, grandchildren, sisters, brothers, aunts, uncles, stepparents and stepchildren.
- 2. The principal dwelling unit shall be owner-occupied.
- 3. The additional living quarters shall be totally enclosed within the principal building.
- 4. An internal connection shall always be maintained as a means of access between the principal dwelling unit and the additional living quarters, such as a stairway or door. The additional living quarters shall not be located in a separate freestanding building joined to the dwelling by a corridor or breezeway.
- 5. The owner must agree to annually renew the permit by proving that the additional living quarters are still occupied by immediate family members of the owner and to make the property available for Township inspection, if requested by the Zoning Officer.
- If an on-lot septic system will be utilized, it shall be found adequate by the County Health Department for the expanded use.
- 7. Any exterior changes to the principal building to incorporate an

- attached additional living quarters shall not decrease its appearance as a single-family detached dwelling as viewed from a street or another property.
- Detached additional living quarters and additional dwelling units are specifically prohibited.
- The owner shall not lease or rent the additional living quarters as an apartment or separate dwelling unit.
- 10. The owner is required to remove the cooking facilities in the additional living quarters within six months after the living quarters are no longer occupied by a member(s) of the owner's immediate family.
- 11. The owner shall prepare and file with the Montgomery County Recorder of Deeds, a deed restriction in a form acceptable to the Township Solicitor, containing the conditions set forth in conditions 1 through 10 above, which shall reflect that the property is encumbered with those specific conditions. The deed restriction must run with the land.
 - a. A one-year renewable permit issued by the Township Zoning Officer shall be required to ensure compliance. The fee for this permit shall be established by resolution of Township Council.

Is Your Trash Can Too Big?

Over the past few years, more and more residents are using 60-90 gallon carts as their trash container. These carts are too large for our men to handle and are designed to be lifted mechanically. Trash cans should be no larger than 30 gallons and weigh no more than 50 pounds when loaded. An EMPTY 90 gallon cart weighs 40 pounds! As a guide, the round, blue recycle cans are approximately 30 gallon size. A trash can of this size is preferable. Trash will be left curbside and tagged if it is deemed to be too heavy.

Christmas Tree Recycling

Plymouth Township will start recycling Christmas Trees on Friday, January 2, 2015. Residents are asked to put their used Christmas trees out for collection on their regular recycling day during the month of January. The Public Works Department will collect the trees and chip them. For the safety of Township employees, residents must remove all ornaments, lights and stands. The wood chips are turned into mulch, which is free for the taking at the Public Works driveway, 700 Belvoir Road.

Snow Plowing

When it Snows...Our goal is to have all Township and State roads cleared within 15-20 hours after the snow has stopped falling. In order for this to occur, however, it takes your cooperation. The public works crew plows 48 miles of Township roads and 17 miles of State roads. This translates into over 150 lane miles to clear. As you can see, this is not an easy task.

If you have off-street parking such as a driveway, please use it. Please stack cars closely in your driveway and refrain from parking on the street. This will help our crew to better clear and negotiate your street. Please do not throw snow back into the street while shoveling or cleaning off cars. This slows and impedes our

operations and the plows will have to clear it again. This

also violates Ordinance #1540. This Ordinance prohibits throwing, shoveling, or plowing snow onto

highways, streets or roads in Plymouth Township.

Ideally, don't shovel the end of your driveway until the plows have finished with your street. Remember, all plows are angled to discharge snow to the curb on the right. It is impossible to plow the streets without the plow being angled.

The plowing priority will be as follows: Primary roads will be cleared first, followed by secondary streets and finally residential streets and cul-de-sacs.

Residential street plowing will not begin until the snow stops falling. The reason for this is because our main focus and priority is keeping the main roads passable and clear while the snow is falling. We cannot plow in the residential neighborhoods while the snow is falling because the main roads would become dangerous and potentially impassable.

Remember, the public works crew will put in long hard hours clearing the streets.....so please be patient and courteous.



It's Time to Get Ready for Winter

Residents are asked to remember the following to get through the winter season safely:

- * Use off-street parking when snow is predicted. When you park your car in the driveway, there's less snow to shovel.
- * On-street parking, where no off-street parking is available, is only permitted on one side of the street. In an odd year parking is only permitted on the odd numbered side of the street.
- * Don't park near storm drains, so crews can clear snow and ice to avoid flooding from the melting runoff.
- * When shoveling your driveway, pile snow to the right. This will prevent the plow from covering your driveway opening again.
- * Property owners are required to clear their sidewalks at least 30 inches wide within 36 hours after the snow stops.
- * Residents are reminded that it is unlawful to park or abandon a car on any street any time within twelve hours after a snowfall of three inches or more, where off-street parking exists. Vehicles parked otherwise are subject to removal at the owner's expense.

- * Any motor vehicle parked, stalled, incapable of moving under its own power, or left unattended upon any public street or highway in the Township at any time within twelve hours after a snowfall of three inches or more has occurred, may be removed or towed to another location by the Police Department.
- * Don't shovel or plow snow into the street. The plows will just move it back onto your driveway or sidewalk.
- * Think Safety! Never approach moving snow removal equipment. Just because you can see the driver doesn't mean he can see you. We try to keep our crews fresh and rested, but extended weather emergencies can mean long hours for Township employees. Please keep children and pets off the streets as much as possible.
- * If there's a fire hydrant by your home consider adopting it! You know where it is; if it's obscured by snow, fire companies responding to emergencies may not find it. Clearing the snow from the hydrant helps protect you and your neighbors.

- Store in water-tight containers with handles and loose fitting lids. Do not place trash in paper bags, plastic bags or cardboard boxes.
- If the trash men spill trash, they will pick it up; if an improper container breaks or an animal tears up the trash, it is the property owner's responsibility to clean up.
- The trash men will not collect more than four containers. Trash containers should be no larger than 30 gallons nor weigh more than 50 pounds.
- Unacceptable items include: Refuse from the construction of buildings such as sand, earth, lumber, brick, stone, mortar, plaster, roofing materials, plumbing fixtures, etc., auto parts, hazardous wastes, household appliances, and yard waste.
- Large items such as furniture will be picked up on your second regular trash day of the week.
- Household appliances and scrap metal are collected separately from regular trash.

RECYCLING

Recyclables are collected once a week on your designated recycling day.

- Place items in the blue recycling container no later than 6:00 a.m.; additional containers may be used, but must be marked for recycling. Recycle stickers are available at the Township Building at no charge.
- Large cardboard items may be placed next to the containers.
- Damaged containers can be exchanged at no cost; lost containers will be replaced at \$25.00 per container.

The following items are recyclable:

- Glass
- · Aluminum and Bimetal Cans
- Paper and cardboard
- Plastic (#1 thru #7); NO PLASTIC BAGS PLEASE

NEW WHITE GOODS COLLECTION FEE

HOUSEHOLD APPLIANCE & SCRAP METAL COLLECTION FEE: \$10

The Township has a separate collection for stoves, freezers, refrigerators, air conditioners, dehumidifiers, washing machines, dryers, metal cabinets and all metal furniture, because these items are not accepted at the trash-to-steam plant.

These items are picked up once a month on the third Wednesday of the month. Residents desiring to have an appliance removed must call the Public Works Department by the second Friday of the month at (610) 277-4103 to get the \$10 disposal sticker and to be placed on the list. Items without stickers will not be collected. Once stickers are purchased there are no refunds.

Dishwashers can be put out on your second regular trash day.

NEW TELEVISION COLLECTION FEE

ELECTRONICS AND UNIVERSAL WASTE DROP-OFF

Electronics are required by Law to be recycled under the Covered Device Recycling Act of 2010. They will not be accepted in regular trash.

The Township has an electronics (covered devices) and universal waste drop-off located at the Public Works Shed at no cost to Township residents.

Covered devices include: desktop computers, laptop computers, computer monitors, computer peripherals and televisions. Universal waste includes: rechargeable batteries, wire and small appliances with motors or plugs such as vacuum cleaners, blenders, and fans.

Televisions can either be dropped off at the Publics Works shed free of charge or for a \$10 service fee we will pick it up curbside on the third Wednesday of the month. Residents desiring to have a television removed must call the Public Works Department by the second Friday of the month at (610) 277-4103 to get the \$10 disposal sticker and to be placed on the list. Items without stickers will not be collected. A disposal sticker is required for the televisions-only curbside collection. Once stickers are purchased there are no refunds. All other covered devices must be brought to the Public Works shed, Monday through Friday, between 8 a.m. and 3:30 p.m. or taken to a Montgomery County sponsored Electronics Waste Collection site on a Saturday.

Call the Public Works Office 610-277-4103 for drop-off procedures, location information, or to get on the television disposal list.

YARD WASTE

- Yard waste is collected every Wednesday throughout the year.
- Yard waste consists of grass clippings, twigs/shrub trimmings and pruning, leaves, and garden waste (pinecones, weeds, dead plants). Rocks and logs are not considered yard waste.
- Place in biodegradable brown paper bags or in a designated Yard Waste container (trash can). Please, no plastic bags. Brown bags can be purchased at Home Depot, Lowes and some grocery stores.
- Yard waste will not be collected in the blue recycling containers.

NOTE: All recyclables and yard waste are collected in a designated trash truck as part of our single stream recycling. So rest assured that although all recycle materials will be collected with a trash truck, they are still being recycled to protect our earth and reduce disposal costs.

BRANCH AND CHIP PROGRAM COLLECTION

- The Township runs two Branch and Chip Collection Programs during the year.
 - Fall September 2 through October 10, 2014
 - **Spring** March 9 through April 10, 2015
- Residents must call the Public works Department prior to NOON Wednesday of the week to schedule their pick up.
- Branches will be collected on Thursday and Friday, weather permitting.
- Residents should comply with the following:
- Leave the branches as long as possible, a minimum of five feet in length.
- Nothing over five inches in diameter can be chipped.

MULCH DELIVERY

RESIDENTS NO LONGER HAVE TO FILL UP THEIR BUCKETS AND TRASH CANS WITH COMPOST/MULCH..... For a delivery charge of \$30.00 the Public Works Dept. will deliver up to one dump truck load (approx. five yards) to your household. There is a one yard minimum.

Annually, the Township collects over 1,000 tons of yard waste curbside from the residents of Plymouth Township. This material and composted leaves are processed by our tub grinder to make mulch to place around trees and flower gardens. Mulch holds moisture for your trees and gardens and amends the soil with additional nutrients.

Deliveries are every Friday throughout the year from March 1 to November 1. Anyone who would like a mulch delivery must come to the public works office in person to sign a release of liability and pay the \$30.00 delivery charge. If you would like delivery on Friday you need to pay and sign the waiver before Wednesday at 3:30 p.m. the week of delivery.

LEAF COLLECTION (Please refer to the map and tentative schedule)

- Curbside leaf piles may extend along the entire length of the property.
- DO NOT mix limbs, brush and other debris with leaf piles. Mixed Piles will not be collected.
- · Leaves will not be collected with your regular trash collection. Trash with leaves co-mingled will not be collected.
- Adverse weather conditions may cause delays in leaf collection dates.
- Once the leaf collection machine has passed it will not return until the next scheduled collection.
- Township employees and/or equipment are not permitted to enter private property to remove leaves.
- Property owners are encouraged to start their own compost piles.
- · Residents can opt to place bagged leaves at the curb for collection with their yard waste on Wednesdays.

WASTE WATCHERS RECYCLING AWARD

For the sixth consecutive year Plymouth Township Public Works Department has received the Pennsylvania Waste Watcher Award for outstanding recycling! These accomplishments are the result of great teamwork by Plymouth Council, Township Employees and Residents of Plymouth Township. Thank you for making Plymouth Township one of the best recyclers in Pennsylvania. Here is a narrative of the accomplishments in 2013.

PENNSYLVANIA WASTE WATCHER NARRATIVE 2013

Plymouth Township continues its recycling consistency, sustainability and pursuit to become a perennial recycling leader in Montgomery County and the State of Pennsylvania. Over the last 6 years Plymouth Township has proven outstanding recycling achievement in many categories, such as outstanding single stream recycling, composting, public education, special collection, reuse and waste reduction. Plymouth Township focuses and prides itself on tailoring multiple recycle programs that fit the needs of the community by which it serves. All of these recycling services, with the exception of Electronics Collection drop-off at our facility, are performed by Township employees.

2013 consistency and recycling success continues in Plymouth Township. Again through education in the newsletter, cable access channels and word of mouth, all of our recycling programs continue to gain popularity among our residents. Plymouth Township's recycling program is often used as a model for other municipalities to follow.

In 2013 the Single Stream recycle program collected 1,502 tons surpassing last year's total of 1,490 tons. Just a few years ago, this tonnage only topped out at 941 tons.

At the same time in 2013 Plymouth Township continues to have a separate collection for yard waste. This yard waste is collected every Wednesday curbside throughout the year. In 2013 Public Works Sanitation Dept. collected 1,128 tons of yard waste curbside. In years past, this material was generally thrown in the trash. This diversion is a reduction of \$65 per ton, saving the Township \$73,320.00 in potential trash disposal fees. This program is in addition to our fall curbside leaf collection totaling 1,338 tons and our 5-week spring and 5-week fall branch and chip program where we collected another 165 tons. All of this material is processed in our public works yard with our tub grinder that we share with Whitemarsh Township. This mulch is then given back to our residents for pick up at the Township Building at any time.

For a \$30 delivery charge, we will deliver up to 5 yards of processed mulch to any Plymouth Township resident. In 2013, 105 deliveries totaling 464 yards of mulch were given back to the residents of Plymouth Township. Hundreds of yards were picked up by residents at our community mulch pile.


We also have a white goods appliance and metal collection once a month. This collection added another 16.1 tons of material that was diverted from entering the trash stream.

Our new Electronics Recycling Program is gaining in popularity. Residents can simply drop-off all e-waste, rechargeable batteries, small appliances, wire, plastic, televisions, etc. to the Township for proper recycling, thus diverting this material from entering the trash stream. This e-waste is processed by an outside agency, Magnum Computer Recycling at no cost to the Township. Since 2012, the Township is now paid for this e-Waste. In 2013, the Township collected 13 tons of electronics from residents, 9 more tons than 2012.

All of the many recycle programs and information always appear in our Township Newsletter, Web site and Cable access channels. Residents are extremely pleased with the programs not only for the cost savings but also for the obvious environmental impact. All of this data is updated and goals stated in our newsletter annually so residents can follow their tremendous progress.

Ongoing and continuing improvements of our existing recycling programs and the implementation of our many new recycling programs over the last few years has resulted in a significant reduction in our trash disposal costs from 2007 to 2013. In 2007 our trash disposal costs were a staggering \$519,783.00. In 2008 those costs were only \$352,860.19 largely because of Single Stream Recycling and the inception of the Yard Waste Program. In 2013 trash disposal costs dropped to approximately \$302,000, a 42% decrease in disposal costs since 2007.

In 2013, Plymouth Township, through all of our programs, collected a total of 8,799 tons of solid waste. 4,163 tons of this solid waste (47.3%) is renewed and reused as recycled material. We will continue to update residents on their progress, adjust and change with the times for the better, and carry on to provide ways that recycling can be expanded and improved upon.

STORM WATER REGULATIONS

New federal storm water regulations require Plymouth Township, as well as most other municipalities in "urbanized areas" across Pennsylvania, to comply with the Environmental Protection Agency's storm water management program. One of the many requirements of the program is to obtain a National Pollutant Discharge Elimination System (NPDES) permit. The program in Pennsylvania is administered by the Pennsylvania Department of Environmental Protection (DEP). Plymouth received its permit on January 15, 2004. The Township is in the process of implementing the storm water management protocols developed by the DEP.

Under the DEP program, Plymouth Township will implement the six required Best Management Practice (BMP) control measures, including Public Education, Public Participation, Illicit Discharge Detection and Elimination, Construction Site Run-off Control, Post Construction Storm water Management and Pollution Prevention and Good Housekeeping for Municipal Maintenance.

An important part of the Township's compliance plan is to educate the public regarding the environmental impact of storm water run-off. The PA DEP maintains a website with comprehensive information on storm water education (www.dep.state.pa.us). The Plymouth Township website (www.plymouthtownship.org) also has information and links to other websites.

We also ask that residents report any suspected pollution incidents to the Township at 610-277-4103. This includes the dumping of wastewater, illicit liquids or solids into streams or storm sewers.

TOWNSHIP CONTINUES TO BATTLE SEWER INFLOW AND INFILTRATION



The Township is continuing its efforts to prevent unwanted stormwater water from entering the sanitary sewer system. We continue to inspect and repair manholes and sewer lines throughout the township in an effort to remove as much stormwater

Inflow and Infiltration (I&I) from the system as possible.

The Township pays to have this water treated, resulting in higher sewer rates for everyone. In addition, increased wet weather flows can overload pump stations and other facilities. This leads to sewer overflows, which can cause environmental and other health hazards, as well as costly property damage. It can also lead to expensive facility upgrades, which result in higher sewer rates.

Are you aware that it is illegal to have your sump pump connected to the sanitary sewer system? Illegal sump pump connections put unnecessary rain water into the Township's sanitary sewer system.

What can you do to help? Make sure you sump pump is not connected to the sanitary sewer system. Sump pumps should be connected to the storm sewer system, or direct discharge to a lawn area where they can flow to the street. Keeping rain water out of the sanitary sewer system will help keep rates from rising unnecessarily.

In addition, residents should check their sewer vents to make sure the vent cap is properly in place. The area around the vent should also be checked to ensure that it is graded to prevent runoff from entering the sanitary sewer system.

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
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
