

Service and Devotion Memorial Coming to Plymouth Township

Through the efforts and inspiration of local veteran, George Gunning, Jr., Plymouth Township is pleased to announce that a Service and Devotion monument will be built in Community Center Park, at the corner of Germantown Pike and Walton Road.

"Always in my heart, I felt that this township should have something to recognize the very good people who devoted their time and efforts, and even their lives, for our country," Gunning said. Plymouth Council embraced the idea. The project is being designed by a local architect, Richard Powers, from the Norristown-based firm Seiler & Drury Architecture.

The monument will feature eight distinctive pillars honoring the Army, Navy, Marines, Air Force, Coast Guard, Law Enforcement, Fire and Ambulance. A special area will be dedicated to fallen officer, Brad Fox. Individual memorializations and tributes can be displayed through plaques, bricks and pavers adding to the site's aesthetic appeal. The site will also include benches, landscaping and solar-powered lighting.

"I think the mantra which is incorporated into the monument site tells the story of what the project is trying to achieve: 'We honor the past, present and future citizens of this Township for their tireless dedication and devotion to making Plymouth Township a premier place to live, work and play." Powers said.

Funding efforts have begun and donations are being accepted from local businesses, corporations and residents. "Hopefully our residents will get behind it and support this" said Chairman Sheldon Simpson. "It's a great cause, not just for our military, but for our volunteers and paid staff at the police, ambulance and fire departments who dedicate themselves every day to the residents of the Township."



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

Calling 9-1-1 from A Cell Phone

The Montgomery County Department of Public Safety asks that anyone who calls 9-1-1 from a cellular phone in communities near the County border immediately state that "I'm calling from Montgomery County" when the

If the nearest cell tower to where the call is placed is across the border in a neighboring county, the call will be routed to the 9-1-1 centers in Philadelphia, Bucks, Berks, Chester or Delaware counties, depending on where the tower is

The neighboring 9-1-1 centers will transfer the call to Montgomery County, but the time it takes to figure the actual location out, transfer the call and then supply the information about the incident again could make a difference in saving someone's life.

Stating "I'm calling from Montgomery County" at the outset will greatly reduce any delay in getting people the help they need.

Using a landline to call 9-1-1 will result in the call automatically being routed to the proper call center.



Governor Tom Corbett ceremoniously signed the Brad Fox Law in Plymouth Township on January 11, 2013. The new law is an amendment to Title 18, Crimes and Offenses of the Pennsylvania Consolidated Statutes, and imposes a mandatory minimum five year sentence for a second offense when a legitimate gun buyer sells firearms to someone who is not allowed to own or possess a gun. A second or subsequent violation of the Sale or Transfer of firearms laws is a felony of the second degree.

"State and Federal laws are very plain: Convicted felons are forbidden from owning firearms, and those who knowingly provide firearms to felons are themselves criminals and worthy of being locked up," Governor Corbett said.

"It's a good bill to keep Brad's memory alive." said Kathy Fox, Brad's mother.

Being a volunteer organization we are always in need of new members. If firefighting is not for you, we are in need of Fire Police Officers and Administrative Officers too.

Anyone interested in joining a great volunteer organization, please stop by either one of our stations during the day Monday through Friday or any Monday night, which is our training night, and someone will be glad to assist you.

In July our annual fund drive mailing will go out to all residents and businesses. We thank those of you who have supported us with your annual donation in the past. For those who have not donated in the past, please reconsider and help support our volunteer Fire Company.

We responded to over 550 Emergency calls for services last year. Every year the Fire Company is involved in numerous events in Plymouth Township. Harper has been working with the Fire Company to get Aqua Water to drop the \$200.00 monthly fee the Fire Company pays to Aqua for the sprinkler system at the firehouse.

- When a holiday falls on your recycle day during the week, recycling will be picked up on Wednesday of that week. Your trash will be picked up on your next scheduled trash day.


TRASH COLLECTION

- Place trash at curb no later than 6:00 A.M. on the day of collection, but no earlier than 7:00 P.M. on the prior evening.
- Store in water-tight containers with handles and loose fitting lids. Do not place trash in paper bags, plastic bags or cardboard boxes.
- If the trash men spill trash, they will pick it up; if an improper container breaks or an animal tears up the trash, it is the property owner's responsibility to clean up.
- The trash men will not collect more than four containers. Trash containers should be no larger than 30 gallons nor weigh more than 50 pounds.
- Unacceptable items include: Refuse from the construction of buildings such as sand, earth, lumber, brick, stone, mortar, plaster, roofing materials, plumbing fixtures, etc.; and auto parts, hazardous wastes, household appliances, and yard waste.
- Large items such as furniture will be picked up on your second regular trash day of the week.
- Household appliances and scrap metal are collected separately from regular trash, on the third Wednesday of the month. Residents must call 610-277-4103 by the second Friday of the month to get the appropriate sticker and be placed on the list. Appliances with Freon or other gasses that need to be removed, such as freezers, refrigerators and air conditioners, require a green sticker that costs \$10. Washing machines, dryers, stoves and metal furniture require an orange sticker which is free. Items without stickers will not be collected. Please remove doors from refrigerators and freezers.

RECYCLING

- Recyclables are collected once a week on your designated recycling day.
- Place items in the blue recycling container and leave it at the curb no later than 6:00 A.M.; Additional containers may be used, but must be marked for recycling. Recycle stickers are available at the Township Building at no charge.
- Large cardboard items may be placed next to the containers.
- **Damaged containers** can be exchanged at no cost; lost containers will be replaced at \$25.00 per container.

- ✓ Paper and cardboard
- ✓ Aluminum and Bimetal Cans
- ✓ Plastic (#1 thru #7)

ELECTRONIC RECYCLING

Effective immediately: In accordance with Pennsylvania's Covered Device Recycling Act (Act 108) of 2010, Plymouth Township will no longer accept any Covered Device in its trash collection. As defined in the CDRA covered devices include: desktop computers, laptop computers, computer monitors, computer peripherals and televisions.

Plymouth Township currently has an electronic drop-off for such items at the Township Building. Please contact our office at 610-277-4103 for more details or stop by the Public Works office with electronic items during normal business hours and we will direct you to the drop-off location. Items can be dropped-off Monday through Friday 8:30am-4:30pm.



YARD WASTE

- Yard waste is collected every Wednesday, except when a holiday falls within the week.
- Yard waste should be put out before 6:00 a.m. on Wednesdays.
- Yard waste consists of grass clippings, twigs/shrub trimmings and pruning, leaves, and garden waste (pinecones, weeds, dead plants). Rocks, dirt and logs are not considered yard waste.
- Place in biodegradable brown paper bags or in a designated Yard Waste container (trash can). Please, no plastic bags. Brown bags can be purchased at Home Depot, Lowes and some grocery stores.
- Yard waste will not be collected in the blue recycling containers.

Note: All recyclables and yard waste are collected in a designated trash truck as part of our single stream recycling. So rest assured that although all recycle materials will be collected with a trash truck, they are still being recycled to protect our earth and reduce disposal costs.

BRANCH AND CHIP PROGRAM COLLECTION

- The Township runs two Branch and Chip Collection Programs during the year.
 - ✓ **Spring** March 11 through April 12, 2013
 - ✓ Fall September 3 through October 4, 2013
- Residents must call the Public Works Department prior to NOON Wednesday of the week to schedule their pick up.
- Branches will be collected on Thursday and Friday, weather permitting.
- Collection may be delayed until Monday or Tuesday of the following week.
- Residents should comply with the following:
 - ✓ Leave the branches as long as possible, a minimum of five feet in length.
 - ✓ Nothing over five inches in diameter can be chipped.
 - ✓ Branches should be placed at the curb in an orderly pile.
 - ✓ Branches with thorns will not be collected.

MULCH DELIVERIES

For a charge of \$30.00 the Public Works Dept. will deliver up to 1 dump truck load (approx. 5 yards) to your household. There is a 1 yard minimum.

Each year over 1,000 tons of yard waste is collected. This material is stockpiled so it will break down at the public works yard. This material along with composted leaves is processed by our tub grinder to make mulch. The processed material is a makeup of about 75% woody material and 25% broken down composted leafy material. Together it makes mulch to place around trees and flower gardens. This material holds moisture for

your trees and gardens and amends the soil with additional nutrients.

Deliveries are every Friday throughout the year from March to November. Anyone who would like a mulch delivery must come to the Public Works office in person to sign a release of liability and pay the \$30.00 delivery charge. If you would like delivery on Friday you need to pay and sign the waiver before Wednesday at 4:00 PM the week of delivery.

STORM WATER REGULATIONS

New federal storm water regulations require Plymouth Township, as well as most other municipalities in "urbanized areas" across Pennsylvania, to comply with the Environmental Protection Agency's new storm water management program. One of the many requirements of the program is to obtain a National Pollutant Discharge Elimination System (NPDES) permit. The program in Pennsylvania is administered by the Pennsylvania Department of Environmental Protection (DEP). Plymouth received its permit on January 15, 2004. The Township is in the process of implementing the storm water management protocols developed by the DEP.

Under the DEP program, Plymouth Township will implement the six required Best Management Practice (BMP) control measures, including Public Education, Public Participation, Illicit Discharge Detection and Elimination, Construction Site Run-off Control, Post Construction Storm water Management and Pollution Prevention and Good Housekeeping for Municipal Maintenance.

An important part of the Township's compliance plan is to educate the public regarding the environmental impact of storm water run-off. The PA DEP maintains a website with comprehensive information on storm water education (www.dep.state.pa.us). The Plymouth Township website (www.plymouthtownship.org) also has information and links to other websites.

We also ask that residents report any suspected pollution incidents to the Township at 610-277-4103. This includes the dumping of wastewater, illicit liquids or solids into streams or storm sewers.

WHERE DOES YOUR SUMP PUMP FLOW?


Are you aware that it is illegal to have your sump pump connected to the sanitary sewer system? Illegal sump pump connections put unnecessary rain water into the Township's sanitary sewer system. The Township pays to have this water treated. This results in higher sewer rates for everyone. In addition, it can overload pump stations and other facilities. This leads to sewer overflows, which can cause environmental, and other health hazards, as well as costly property damage. It can also lead to expensive facility upgrades, which result in higher sewer rates and taxes.

What can you do to help? Make sure you sump pump is not connected to the sanitary sewer system. Sump pumps should be connected to a pipe so it can discharge to a lawn area where it can infiltrate back into the ground. Keeping rain water out of the sanitary sewer system will help keep rates from rising unnecessarily.





Township Manager

Last year was a sad and difficult year for all of Plymouth Township, especially for the Township staff and Council, as we untimely lost two active employees. As you may know, police officer Brad Fox was ambushed and tragically killed on September 13th. Brad was a true American hero having served our Country in the Marine Corps and having served the residents of our Township since 2007. We also lost Ed Slanker, our Public Works Foreman, who faithfully served the Township for over 24 years. Ed spent many years as the Plumbing Inspector and was in charge of sewerage maintenance as well. Both of these gentlemen are dearly missed by all who knew them.

Council adopted several new ordinances throughout the year, among them a Sewer District ordinance whereby sewer rents are being adjusted to match the sewer rent charged by the treatment plant where a particular property's sewage is treated. Another ordinance that was adopted is the Off-Site Outdoor Advertising Sign ordinance to regulate the placement, size, number and height of billboards. The Transportation Impact Fee ordinance was updated with new projects and the cost per trip that the Township can charge developers for the additional vehicle trips associated with their developments. And finally, the 2013 Budget ordinance held the millage rate to 1.6 mills where it has been since being lowered to that rate in 1996.

A few infrastructure projects that are progressing through the design stages, include the Sandy Hill and Belvoir Roads intersection improvement project, the removal of the jug handle at the intersection of Ridge Pike and Alan Wood Road, and the upgrade to the Plymouth Road Sewage Interceptor. Major projects in the Township by others include the Lafayette Street project and the widening of the Northeast Extension of the Pennsylvania Turnpike.

The large capital projects for 2012 included an expansion of the Greater Plymouth Community Center fitness center, a new trail to Community Center Park, paving in East Plymouth Valley Park, a much needed roof repair for the Township Administration Building, renovations to the Public Works garage, upgrades to our computer systems, and annual street paving including the reconstruction of the Township owned portion of Township Line Road.

Public Works

The Public Works Department continued its efforts to upgrade, maintain and expand the Township's roadways, storm sewers, ADA handicap ramps and other infrastructure throughout the year. Ongoing efforts to reduce Inflow and Infiltration in the sanitary sewer system continued.

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Major projects during the year include the lining of approximately 2,000 linear feet of sanitary sewer in the Curren Terrace section of the Township as part our annual sanitary sewer rehab. The Annual Street Paving program included the following streets: Harmon Road, Kirk Street, Keys Street, Progress Drive, Township Line Road, Old Elm Street, Fulton Street, Light Street, the Publics Works Drive and East Plymouth Valley Park Driveway.

The Public Works Department's efforts were enhanced by major equipment upgrades, a Tink Claw for the Highway Department and a Trash Truck for the Sanitation Dept.

Street name signs are still in the process of being replaced throughout the Township. The new signs will be a different color (green), larger and will have a high intensity reflectivity for better visibility. All other signs will be replaced as well with high reflectivity materials.

Many water mains throughout the Township were replaced in 2012 and will continue in 2013 as part of Aqua PA's infrastructure improvements.

Electronics collection drop-off continues to grow in Plymouth Township. This new program collects electronics, computers, small appliances and rechargeable batteries to name a few.

Single Stream Recycling and the Yard Waste programs continue to improve. In recognition of this standout recycling program, Plymouth Township received a 2012 PA Waste Watchers Award for the fourth year in a row. Only 120 awards were given State-wide to municipalities, counties, private businesses, individuals, and community organizations for going above and beyond what is mandated under Act 101. Yard waste has exceeded the 1,000 ton mark for the fourth straight year.

Development & Zoning

In 2012, there were four land developments and one subdivision filed within the Township. The new land developments included Brandywine Operating Partnership, at 134 Plymouth Road, for 398 mid-rise apartment units; Phase 2 for Cold Point Village consisting of 12 new townhomes at the corner of Plymouth Road and Butler Pike; The Proving Grounds, at 725 Conshohocken Road, for recreational and athletic fields; and Conicelli Automobile Sales, at 1010 Ridge Pike, for a new automobile sales facility.

The subdivision consisted of the creation of a new parcel from the Plymouth Industrial Center, Inc. at 725 Conshohocken Road.

2012 also featured the beginning of construction for Vist Bank, at the corner of Ridge Pike and Harmon Road, as well as three residential units, constructed by Robert Ratoskey, on Light Street.

There were 1,777 building permits, 206 Use and Occupancy

permits, and 22 Zoning Use and Occupancy permits issued. The Zoning Hearing Board heard 25 appeals.

Police Department

Members of the Plymouth Township Police Department continue to heal from the murder of Officer Brad Fox on September 13th. Chief Lawrence extends his sincere appreciation for the outpouring of support from the community and from our brother officers throughout the County.

The Police Department has remained busy, and several noteworthy arrests were made. Over the course of a two month period beginning in August, a Montgomery County woman committed eighty eight (88) counts of prescription fraud in Plymouth Township and the surrounding area. Through the hard work of our detectives, and members of our Special Investigations Unit, the woman was arrested and charged with eighty eight (88) felony counts. In October, Plymouth Police responded to a bank robbery at TD Bank on Ridge Pike. The suspect, who was positively identified as the same person who committed a bank robbery two days prior in Lower Merion, escaped. Plymouth detectives aggressively investigated the bank robbery, and within three days had identified, located and arrested the suspect for both crimes. In December, police investigated the theft of over \$80,000 worth of assorted metals from a business on Conshohocken Road. The weight of the metals stolen ranged from 400 pounds to 3000 pounds, and would have entailed the use of an overhead crane to commit the thefts. Through an intensive month long investigation, police were able to trace the actions of the suspects and arrest three men for the high priced theft.

Parks and Recreation



The Plymouth Township Parks and Recreation Department kept busy throughout the year with various programs, promotions and projects.

BMI Busters, a program designed to fight childhood obesity, received the Excellence in Programming award from The Pennsylvania Parks and Recreation Society, Inc. The Award was presented at the 65th Annual PRPS State Conference. This popular program continues to run and is helping kids lose weight and gain confidence.

In July, the Fitness Center was revamped, nearly doubling in size. The project went smoothly and only required a complete shutdown of the fitness area for two days. By adding treadmills, ellipticals, bikes, and a rowing machine our cardio equipment has more than doubled. In addition, we added 5 new plate loaded machines, dumbbells, stability and medicine balls, various training aids and associated amenities. We held promotions in the spring and fall where discounts were offered on memberships, lowered our babysitting rates, included land aerobics in our pass price and adjusted procedures. We have already seen an increase in pass holders and are confident and excited to provide more health oriented options for 2013.

The Conservation and Management Plan for Harriet Wetherill Park was awarded to LandConcepts Group in Blue Bell, PA and is expected to be completed by June 2013. This Plan was funded with a matching grant from DCNR and will provide a guide for maintaining the park in a sustainable manner. The HWP Conservation and Management Plan Steering Committee, formed in 2012, is assisting in compiling information and ideas. Once the plan is completed and approved by Council, we will be busy searching for grant opportunities and moving forward according to the Plan's recommendations.

Park improvements were made this summer including a trail at Jolly Road that runs along the parking lot and leads to the GPCC Park. Also, the parking lot at East Plymouth Valley was resurfaced. With a Grant from PECO and assistance from Scout Troops 216 and 71944 working on an Eagle Scout project, improvements were made to East Plymouth Valley Park's pond to balance the habitat for fish and plant life. Additional improvements were also made, including trash/recycling receptacles to protect the pond from litter, benches for viewing and signage designed to educate visitors regarding water quality, pond life and catch-and-release fishing.

The Parks and Recreation Department wishes to thank our volunteers and sponsors for their time and services to our programs and parks. Thank you to our employees for their creativity, hard work and dedication. We could not succeed without you.
