A great year for the City of Sturgis

Hello everyone! Hope your holiday seasons are going great.

All is well here at the City of Sturgis. In fact, as 2004 comes to a close, we have much for which to be thankful.

For one, airport renovations were recently completed. The project allowed for a newly rebuilt main runway among other improvements, and the good news is, the \$2.4 million state funded project required only a 2.5 percent match from the City.

With the recent demolition of the former Sturgis Newport building, plans are underway for a Neighborhood Enterprise Zone on the property and on that of the former Paramount building. Plans include the construction of up to 19 homes on the properties. Home owners will pay a special NEZ tax which is about half of the state-wide average. What a deal!

Thanks to assistance from state funding sources, a storm water diversion project was also recently completed. The work should greatly assist the City with former flooding problems at the intersection of Centerville Road and U.S. 12. Again, great news!

Renovations at Sturgis Hospital are also currently underway. The \$10 million project includes a new surgery area and new birthing center. Coupled with recent improvements at Sturgis Public Schools, including the opening of the new middle school, things are really looking up in Sturgis.

As we at the City of Sturgis wrap up another successful year, there is much planned for 2005. Sturges-Young Auditorium will celebrate its 50th anniversary in May, Plans will also be finalized for a major renovation project on U.S. 12 in the downtown area. The project is scheduled for early 2006.

As we move into a new year, it is with some changes in city leadership. Much thanks to former mayor Cindy Sunday-Horstman, the city's first female mayor, for your hard work and dedication, and to newly named mayor Joseph Haas for taking on the challenge. Congratulations to Rob Sisson on being named vice-mayor and to Michael Brew for taking over in the

city's second precinct.

I'm wishing you all a great holiday season and a happy new year, I'll see you all again in March.

Winter Tips from the Public Services Department

With winter right around the corner, snow will soon be falling and could make for some dangerous situations. Here are some tips to help make this winter a safe one:

Snow Plowing: Department of Public Services (DPS) crews begin removing snow once we have received approximately two inches of accumulation. Crews use four dump trucks, plow trucks, graders and loaders. This equipment is large and well lit. While you are driving, don't follow too closely behind the trucks. If you can't see their mirrors, they can't see you. If possible, give the operator the right of way, It will make their job easier and allow him to make the roadway as safe as possible as quickly as possible for all drivers.

Satting: City crews apply salt to the roadway when it becomes slippery. They will first apply salt to state highways within the City limits and all City intersections. City streets could be slippery between intersections, so if it is snowing, slow down and give yourself plenty of room to stop.

Sidewalks: Please shovel your sidewalks as soon as possible after a snowfall. This keeps people (especially school children) on the sidewalks and out of the street.

Parked Cars: Please remove any parked automobiles from the street as soon as possible after a snowfall. This helps crews get the street cleaned from curb to curb.

Driveways and Sidewalks: When clearing your driveways and sidewalks, please don't push or pile the snow onto the roadway. Drivers hitting a pile of snow could lose control of their vehicle. Also, dropping temperatures may cause the snow pile to freeze resulting in damage to the truck during plowing operations.

Snow Emergencies: During a snow emergency, only emergency vehicles (Police, Fire, DPS) should be on the road. Traffic other than emergency vehicles increases the driving hazards and slows down cleanup operations. So please, if you don't have to be out during a major snowstorm, stay home. It's not only safer, but also makes the DPS's job easier and gets you back on the roads faster.

Work Zone Safety: DPS crews frequently have to work directly in the street. They may be doing leaf or brush pick up, street surface repair, repairing or replacing broken water pipes, or cleaning or repairing sanitary and storm sewer lines. Whenever possible, they set up signs or cones directing traffic around their work area. They also wear bright, reflective clothing. When you see DPS workers, please slow down. They are working for you to maintain City infrastructure and roadways.


Center 2004-2005 budget contains 0 tax dollars from the city's general fund. Membership fees have been restructured and a non-resident fee will no longer be charged.
