

Seat Renovation Takes Place at **Sturges-Young Auditorium**

Sturges-Young Auditorium has newly-refurbished seats for its performances this year thanks to the successful "Best Seat in the House Campaign". The fundraiser, which included the sale of seat plagues and a golf tournament, helped pay for the refurbishment of the facility's 992 seats, including re-upholstery and re-padding of the fabric portions of the seat, repainting and staining of the metal and wood portions of chair, and any needed replacement and repair of hardware. Seat fabric and backing are now a dark blue, with the wood handles stained darker for an updated look. In addition to seat restoration, the auditorium floor and ceiling also received a new coat of paint while the seats were removed.

A gift to the community from residents Clara Sturges, Stella Sturges-Taylor, and Emma Young, the Sturges-Young Civic Center and Auditorium opened in 1955 and has been home to numerous amateur and professional performances from both local and nationally-known

campaign and corresponding refurbishment is the most recent, and one of the largest, of these efforts to date.

The fundraising campaign raised over \$123,000 to defray the cost of the work, and the campaign is still ongoing; seats are still available for "purchase" - for a sponsorship of \$300 for one or \$500 for three, individuals or groups receive a name plaque that will be placed on the newly refurbished seats. Donations of any size are accepted, however, and will be recognized with a donor plaque at the facility. Fundraising efforts will continue in order to meet the future repair and replacement needs of the facility.

Work at the Auditorium will be completed in September in time for the new season of performances presented by the Sturgis Council of the Arts and the other exciting fall events scheduled for the facility. SRF 2008 Project Begins Construction

The City of Sturgis' 2008 State Revolving Loan Fund (SRF) project has begun.

The 2008 SRF Project will see the installation of gravity sewer pipe from Fawn River north to the intersection of N. Centerville and W. Lafayette (near Abbott Nutrition). A new pump lift station will be created on Fawn River to replace four existing stations on Stockdale Road, Ohio Court, at the Gateway Apartment Complex, and on Cato Lane.

Additional gravity sewer will be installed on parts of Prairie Street, South Street, White Street, South Nottawa (near Fawn River Road), and Stockdale Road while force main will be installed from the new pump lift station to the waste water treatment plant and on parts of Surprise and W. Congress Streets. See the map on the left for locations that will be under construction.

Work in September will be primarily occurring on Fawn River Road; installation of this pipe will affect traffic in the area. Additional work not affecting traffic will include installation of the force main to the waste water treatment plant and installation of gravity sewer from the west side of the M-66 and Fawn River Road intersection north to US-12. Construction of the rest of the project is expected to begin in late March of 2009.

The City of Sturgis is offering several avenues for information updates on the project. An interactive map showing construction locations will be available online at www.ci.sturgis.mi.us throughout the project, along with general information on SRF 2008. A special weekly e-mail update on the project will also be available for residents and businesses to sign up for; see the website for details. Information on major changes in the project (road closings, detours, etc.) will also be posted in the Sturgis eWire and released to the local media (newspaper and radio). 
Burning Questions?

A small backyard fire can be a excellent way to spend a fall evening, but City residents may have questions on the regulations of their fire. The City does allow a campfire or recreational fire to take place without permit. Recreational fires are characterized as "an outdoor fire utilized to cook food for human consumption" and are different than a bonfire which is used "for ceremonial purposes"; you can contact the Sturgis Fire Department for guidelines on bonfires.

When burning, the Fire Department asks that first and foremost you be sensible about your fire. Keep it small, always attended, and contained by a ring or other appropriate container; make sure placement is away from homes, garages, or wooden fences and that you have a hose or bucket of water ready to extinguish it if necessary. Please also keep younger children away from an open fire and supervised at all times when they are near.

Often, fires can cause disputes among neighbors, so please be considerate of those with hanging clothes, open windows, or known medical conditions affected by smoke. Note that the City does allow the burning of household trash items Monday through Saturday, 7:00 a.m. to 7:00 p.m.; this includes ordinary paper and cardboard but NOT any type of plastic, diapers, food, or animal waste. Additionally, there is absolutely no burning of brush, grass, or leaves allowed in the City. DPS Fall Programs

Leaf Pickup: With the fall season here again, the Department of Public Services (DPS) will soon be starting its 19th year of leaf pick up and the community composting program. DPS crews will begin picking up leaves on Monday October 20th, starting north of Chicago Rd. and west of N. Nottawa working their way across the north side of town and then the south side. Pick up will resume each day where crews left off the day before. The DPS will continue pick up until the end of November, as weather permits. Residents are asked to please rake leaves onto the curbed pavement by 8:00 a.m. Monday during the pick up period.

Under our composting system, we prefer that you do not put leaves in bags. If you choose to bag your leaves, please call the DPS office at 651-2879 between 7:30 a.m. and 4:00 p.m. (Mon. - Fri.) to arrange pick up. Bagged leaves may also be taken to the compost site during open hours, however you must dump the leaves once there; bags are not accepted at the site. If you have any questions or comments on the leaf pickup please call the DPS office at 651-2879.

You can also use the compost site for disposal of your leaves, grass clippings and brush. Beginning October 1st the compost site will move to its fall hours: Monday and Thursday from noon to 6:00 p.m. and Saturdays from 9:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. The last day the compost site will be open is Monday, Nov. 19th unless the ground is covered with snow before then.
