Most of us use both our kitchen and our outdoor grill for preparing evening meals during the summer months. The National Fire Protection Agency recently released statistics that show home cooking fires are still the number one cause of residential fires. Following is information reprinted from the NFPA for your use.

Facts & Figures

- Did you know most cooking fires occur between the hours of 5:00 pm and 7:00 pm.
- Cooking fires are the #1 cause of home fires and home fire injuries. Nearly all cooking equipment fires start with the ignition of food, other cooking materials (grease, cooking oil), or other items normally found or installed in a kitchen (cabinets, wall coverings, paper or plastic bags, curtains).
- In 2005, U.S. fire departments responded to 146,400 home structure fires that involved cooking equipment. These fires caused 480 civilian fire deaths, 4,690 civilian fire injuries and \$876 million in direct property damage.
- Cooking equipment fires are the leading cause of home structure fires and associated civilian injuries. These fires accounted for 40% of all reported home structure fires in 2005 and 36% of home civilian injuries.
- Twelve percent of the fires occurred when something that could catch fire

was too close to the equipment.

- Thanksgiving is the peak day for home cooking fires.
- Three-fifths (59%) of reported home cooking fire injuries occurred when victims tried to fight the fire themselves.
- A CPSC study found that 83% of frying fires began in the first 15 minutes of cooking.

Here are some published safety tips for home cooking.

- Always use cooking equipment tested and approved by a recognized testing facility.
- Stay in the kitchen when you are frying, grilling or broiling food. If you leave the kitchen, even for a short time, turn off the stove.
- Keep anything that can catch fire – pot holders, towels or curtains – away from your stovetop.
- Have a "kid-free zone" of at least three feet around the stove and areas where hot food or drink is prepared or carried.
- Wear short, close fitting or tightly rolled sleeves when cooking. Loose clothing can dangle onto stove burners and catch fire.
- Never use a wet oven mitt, as it presents a scalding danger if the moisture in the mitt is heated.
- Always keep an oven mitt and lid near by when you're cooking. If a small grease fire starts in a pan, put on an oven mitt and smother the flames by carefully sliding the lid over the pan. Turn off the burner. Don't remove the lid until it is completely cool.
- If there is an oven fire, turn off the heat and keep the door closed to prevent flames from burning you and your clothing. Have the oven serviced

before you use it again.

There is nothing better than a cookout during the summer. Following these simple outdoor cooking tips can ensure a safe operation.

- Make sure that all combustible materials are kept at least five feet from the grilling surface. If a flare up or flame occurs simply lower the lid or place the grill lid back on top of the grilling surface. The by-products of food will eventually reduce and the flames will reduce in size.
- Always keep your flame low for cooking and food preparation. High flames will increase the chances of rapid heat buildup and a sudden increase in flame height. If this occurs when you are using a gas grill, simply turn off the gas and let the grill cool down before you start cooking again.
- A charcoal grill flame-up can be reduced by covering the cooking surface to reduce exposure to the rapid build up of heat and flames. Keep a pitcher of water or a garden hose near by to extinguish flames should covering up with the lid not work. Don't just throw the water on the fire. Splash small amounts of water onto the surface from a safe distance. Throwing or dumping a large amount may cause the flames to be pushed out and away from the grill. Standing back and splashing or applying a light water spray from a pitcher or garden hose will allow the fire to cool more effectively and keep things in check.

As anyone who is a parent or grandparent knows, keeping children safe is a full time job. We make sure they have the appropriate clothes on for the weather. We make sure they wear their helmets while they are riding their bikes. We teach them to look both ways before they cross the street. We even teach them to never accept rides from strangers. This goes a long way in keeping our children safe. What about the stuff we don't teach them? What about the things that scare us to the point where we don't want to talk about them with our kids?

In today's world, it takes a lot to keep our children safe. As uncomfortable as a subject as it may be, it is something that needs to be addressed. It is up to us as parents, grandparents, aunts, uncles or any other guardian to ensure our children have the knowledge that will help protect them when they step outside the door.

Knowledge equals power, even for our kids. If the subject matter is presented in the right way, our kids can help themselves to be their own protectors. These tips come from the National Center for Missing and Exploited Children.

- Teach your kids that they have the right to say "No" to an adult if they do something that makes your child feel uncomfortable.
- Teach your kids that an adult should NEVER ask a child for help. It doesn't matter if it is directions to the mall, help unloading a car, or even help finding a lost puppy. Adults should ALWAYS ask other adults for help.
- If an adult should approach your child and ask for help, teach your child to refuse the help. If need be, your child can turn and run.
- As your children grow, know where they are at all times and who they are with.
- Be involved in your children's activities. If you aren't there, someone else will be.
- Don't put your child's name on anything. It gives someone a chance to call them by their name creating a false sense of familiarity.
- When hiring a babysitter, check around for references and be sure to ask questions. If they are no longer working for someone, find out why.
- Find out information about a prospective child care center. Are they properly licensed? What about their background check policy?
- Feel free to drop in unannounced at your child care center or on your babysitter to see what is going on.
- Make sure to talk to your children on a regular basis. In today's hectic world, sometimes it seems as though kids' needs get lost in the shuffle. By communicating on a regular basis, your kids will be more likely to let you know when something is wrong.

As most anyone will tell you, there is nothing more precious than a child. Don't we owe it to them to do what we can to protect them? From making sure they are wearing the right clothes, to empowering them with knowledge, it only takes a few minutes of your time to ensure their safety. Aren't they worth those few minutes?



Our goal is to applaud the owners of properties who have taken extra measures to achieve noticeable improvements that have impacted our community and to develop better and stronger relationships with local government and its residents. Awards will be presented annually for Township properties based on the following:

CRITERIA

- ✓ exhibits pride in their home
- ✓ shows excellence in exterior home upkeep and maintenance
- ✓ shows creativeness in the exterior of the home in relation to the surrounding neighborhood

CATEGORIES

The Sycamore Township Beautification Awards will be given to 10 residential properties which beautify the Township.

JUDGING

All properties will be reviewed and judged by Township Department head staff.

NOMINATIONS

Nominations to be judged may be submitted by property owners, friends, neighbors, etc. Applications may be found below, on our web site www.sycamoretownship.org or at the Township Administration office.

RULES

Winners are not eligible to win more than once in a three year period.

DEADLINE

All nominations must be postmarked by Friday, July 25, 2008. Judging will be held in the month of August. Winners will be announced in September.

AWARD WINNERS

Award winners will be welcomed by the Township Board of Trustees at a special awards ceremony where beautification award certificates will be presented. Award winners will receive special recognition on the Township web site and in the newsletter and several gracious gift certificates from local businesses.

Fall Compost Give-Away

The Township will once again make available compost and wood chips on **Saturday, September 20 from 8 am until 4 pm.** The material may be picked up at the Township's compost site adjacent to Hartzell United Methodist Church Parking Lot at 8999 Applewood Drive.

Maintenance personnel will be on hand to assist you in loading the material. There is an abundant supply of both compost and wood chips so come early and come often. No rain date has been set at this time.

Road Work

With warm weather here, our crews will be out working on your streets. Typically the Maintenance Department performs blacktop work, storm sewer repair, road sign repairs and various maintenance projects. We ask that you please slow down in work zones for the safety of our crews.

SYCAMORE TOWNSHIP RESIDENTS RECYCLED 604.22 TONS IN 2007!

Congratulations Sycamore Township residents! In 2007, you recycled 604.22 tons of metal, glass, plastic, and paper. Your recycling efforts benefited the environment and the local economy in a big way.

The recycling efforts in Sycamore Township saved the equivalent of:

- 4,823 trees
- 36,578 gallons of gasoline
- Enough energy to power 108 average homes for an entire year
- 502 tons of greenhouse gases - equivalent to removing 399 cars from the road

Recycling reduces pollution so the air we breathe is cleaner, conserves natural resources so we will have them to use in the future, and decreases the amount of waste going to the

landfill. Recycling also boosts our local economy by creating 169,000 jobs and \$6 billion in annual wages just in the State of Ohio.

On average, each household in Sycamore Township recycled 146 pounds in 2007. That's a lot of pop cans and newspapers!
