With Spring finally arriving, most residents are happy to get outside after being couped up inside for the entire Winter. And as we transition into the dog days of summer, I wanted to let you know about a very exciting program we are instituting for Sycamore Township residents and small business owners, that will save you a significant amount of money on your electric bills.

As you know, the residents voted in favor of aggregating natural gas purchases for all of the Sycamore Township residents with an "opt out" program. We have been working with many electric providers around the state for over a year to find a means of reducing electric costs for all of our residents, and I am happy to report that we have endorsed Duke Energy Retail Sales as a Non-Regulated provider for electricity in Sycamore Township. This decision only increases your options for electric and does not preclude

any resident from doing business with the electric company they choose. It also will allow you to be signed up in the program before your electricity usage increases in the high demand summer months from air conditioning.

In the near future, you will be receiving a letter from Duke Energy Retail Sales, a subsidiary of Duke Energy, explaining this cost savings option. This company represents the "Non-Regulated" side of Duke's electric business, and is not bound by the same pricing structure that Duke Energy is, as regulated by the Public Utility Commission of Ohio. One of the attractive parts of the Duke offer is that you, the customer, can choose to either take an 18% reduction of the Duke Energy price at the time or, choose a fixed price of .065/kWh, whichever you prefer. They also offer a "peace of mind" guarantee that states if the price of electricity decreases in the marketplace, and Duke offers another community a lower price, you will also receive the lower price on your next bill.

Unlike the gas aggregation program, your savings on electric will be substantial and you will notice the savings on your bill as soon as you are switched into the program. Your bill and service will all come from Duke, and the entire process will be 100% seamless.

We are proud to say that after over a year of discussions with Duke about this product, Sycamore Township is the first community to sign up with Duke Energy Retail Sales, LLC for this service. This is another example of how your Trustees continue to reduce the cost of services to all of the residents and small business owners in the township.

We believe that this is a favorable option for all of our residents, but as I said, the final decision is up to you. Keep an eye on your mailbox for all of the details, which will be following shortly. If you have any questions, feel free to contact Sycamore Township at 791-8447.

The heavy snowfall this year may have created yard and home maintenance concerns for many. Here are a few tips for inspecting your home

when you are cleaning up in the spring.

This is the time to check for gutters that may have pulled loose because of the heavy snow buildup. Check your shingles to make sure that the seals in the valley and chimney areas are tight. During heavy snow and sub zero weather, ice tends to build up and break the seal around these areas. Once they become loose, water can seep back under the decking of your roof and cause damage to your ceilings.

Concrete and asphalt driveways can also sustain damage because of the cold weather. This includes stairs and walkways around your house. Cracked or broken steps are dangerous and can lead to someone falling. A little preventative maintenance in early spring can keep conditions from deteriorating. The fire department has community programs available to residents which include home safety programs, CPR classes, address signs, neighborhood meeting presentations and smoke detector awareness. LOOKING OUT FOR OUR NEIGHBORS

Recently in Kenwood, a burglary was thwarted by an alert neighbor across the street from where the crime was occurring. This helpful neighbor called police when she noticed two very suspicious subjects who were going up and down her street knocking on doors to see if anyone was home. She noticed them lurking around the house directly across

the street, walking back and forth from the rear of the house to the front several times. She knew the owners worked during the day and would not be home. We then received the call. The responding officer was there in a minute and caught the two suspects coming out of the back door of the house. The result was that two "bad guys" were arrested and the homeowner lost no property.

To reduce crime in our community, we need more people like this-neighbors looking out for each other. If something looks strange to you, then it probably is. I have heard many times after similar circumstances, "Well I thought it looked strange but I didn't want to bother you." The residents of Sycamore Township are our eyes and ears on the street. We need you to be alert to strange happenings in your neighborhood because quite frankly we cannot be everywhere at once. If you have a "gut feeling" about something or someone that is not right then it probably isn't, and you need to call. For emergecies, please call 911. For non-emergencies, call (513) 825-1500 or (513) 825-2280.

We are heading into the warm months now and a lot more people are going to be out and about. This includes the criminals. If you see someone or a vehicle that doesn't belong in your neighborhood call the police. It is always better to be safe than sorry. We like to be able to stop crime before it happens. Even if you don't get involved in an organized "Block Watch" program you can practice the philosophy every day by being alert.

HOUSEHOLD HAZARDOUS WASTE PROGRAM CHANGES IN 2010

The popular Household Hazardous Waste (HHW) Program will continue in 2010. Hamilton County residents can drop off hazardous products, such as automotive fluids, pesticides, and fertilizers that could be dangerous to dispose of in the regular trash. Using the free HHW Drop-off:

- protects waste haulers
- avoids accidental poisonings
- prevents hazardous waste from being poured down the drain

The new contractor, Clean Harbors, will operate the drop-off at a new location:

4879 Spring Grove Avenue, Cincinnati, Ohio 45232 April 10 - October 16 Tuesdays 2-6 Saturdays 9-1 Closed for holidays on May 29, July 3, and September 4.

In order to reduce costs, the HHW program will no longer accept latex paint for drop-off. Latex paint is not hazardous and can be thrown away with the regular trash once solid. Dry the paint out with sand, sawdust, or kitty litter and leave the lid off so waste haulers can see that paint is dry. See below for a complete list of acceptable items:

SYCAMORE TOWNSHIP RESIDENTS RECYCLED 680 TONS IN 2009!

Congratulations Sycamore Township residents! In 2009, you recycled 680 tons of metal, glass, plastic, and paper. Sycamore Township recycled 34 more tons in 2009 than in 2008! Residents saved resources, conserved energy, and reduced pollution by recycling.

The recycling efforts in Sycamore Township:

- Conserved enough energy to power every home in Sycamore Township for 6 days.
- Reduced more greenhouse gas pollution than if every household in Sycamore Township did not drive a car for 19 days (almost three weeks!).
- Saved 5,581 trees from being harvested.

Recycling reduces pollution so the air we breathe is cleaner, conserves natural resources so we will have them to use in the future, and decreases the energy needed to make new products. Recycling also boosts our local economy by creating 169,000 jobs and \$6 billion in annual wages just in the State of Ohio.

On average, each household in Sycamore Township recycled 164 pounds in 2009. That's 9.76% of all the waste you generate. If you would like to see even more material recycled in 2010, check out the list below to make sure you include all these materials in your recycling bin. Don't have a bin? Rumpke customers call 242-4600 and CSI customers call 771-4200 to request a bin. Residents can also drop-off recyclables behind the Sycamore Township Administrative Complex at no charge!

RESIDENTS HAVE RESPONSIBILITIES TOO!

Sycamore Township is proud of its quality of residential life and has adopted ordinances requiring all residents to be responsible for maintaining that quality of life. The following are general summaries of common ordinances:

Greg Bickford, Zoning Director, Assistant Township Administrator

Lawn Mowing

- 1. Grass and weeds must be cut
- before reaching a height of 10".

Building Exterior

- **2.** All exterior surfaces shall be maintained in good repair, structurally sound and sanitary.
- **3.** House numbers must be mounted on the house and clearly visible from the street.
- **4.** Painted surfaces which are peeling, flaking or weathered must be scrapped and covered with the appropriate protective covering.
- **5.** Roofs and flashing shall be sound, tight, and not have any defects to admit rain.

Fences & Landscape

- 6. No fences are permitted in the front yard.
- **7.** All landscape material must be properly maintained necessary to keep plantings healthy and in orderly appearance.

8. Permitted fences in the rear yard may be six-foot in height and be of a solid variety. In the side yard they may be four-feet in height and must have a 75% open face.

ENWOOD

Swimming Pools & Hot Tubs

- **9.** Swimming pools must be maintained in a clean and sanitary condition.
- **10.** Swimming pools, hot tubs and spas containing water more than 24 inches in depth shall be completely surrounded by a fence or barrier at least 48" in height and have a self latching gate.

House-Garage-Yard Sales

11. House, garage and yard sales are permitted, and are limited to the personal possessions of the owner-occupant of the dwelling at which the sale is being conducted. Such sales are limited to three consecutive days and no more than three such sales shall be conducted from the same residence in any twelve-month period.

Cars, Trucks and Motor Vehicles

7. Boats, RV's, and trailers are permitted to be parked in the rear yard only and must be setback from the rear property line a minimum of 30 or 35 feet depending on your Zoning District. They are not permitted to be parked or stored in the front or side yards, which includes most driveways. In addition, no one may reside in the boat, RV, or trailer and its wheels must be maintained and remain affixed.

CAGIS ONLINE

Sycamore Township is a proud, longstanding member of the CAGIS (Cincinnati Area Geographic Information System) Consortium. CAGIS is a tool that combines spatial data with physical maps. Through CAGIS, information is available on all parcels in the Township. Recently, the system has been expanded to include convenient web access where residents can view aerial photographs and find out information about their property.

TRASH BASH

To better serve the residents of Sycamore Township, the schedule of the 2010 Trash Bash will be one event in the spring and one event in the fall, as last year. Sycamore Township residents are welcome to take advantage of both events. The dates for the south Trash Bash at Bechtold Park, 4312 Sycamore Road, 45236, are scheduled for Friday, May 14th through Sunday,

May 16th. The dates for the north Trash Bash at the Clete McDaniel Sports Complex, School Road Entrance, 7841 School Road, 45241, are scheduled for Friday, September 17th through Sunday, September 19th. The Trash Bash hours of operation shall be from noon to 4 PM on Friday and Sunday and 8 AM to 4 PM on Saturday. The Sycamore Township maintenance staff will be on hand to offer assistance at both locations. Trash, junk, debris, tires, old construction materials, furniture, lawn mowers and appliances of all sorts will be accepted. *Please note that paint, chemicals, pesticides and yard waste including leaves, limbs and brush will not be accepted. Be prepared to show proof of residency. A valid driver's license or utility bill with your Sycamore Township address will be accepted.*

COMPOST GIVE-AWAY

The Township will once again make available compost and wood chips on Saturday, May 8, from 8:00 AM until 4:00 PM. The material may be picked up at the Township's compost site adjacent to Hartzell United Methodist Church at 8999 Applewood Drive.

Maintenance personnel will be on hand to assist you in loading the material. There is an abundant supply of both compost and wood chips so come early and come often. Due to scheduling conflicts, no rain date has been set.

STORM DAMAGE

When storms pass through Sycamore Township, you can rest assured that we are looking out for you! Storm damage collection is a service Sycamore Township has provided for many years through the maintenance department. The storm damage policy of the Township begins with the safety services department. Sycamore Township Fire Chief Jetter declares whether a "storm damage condition" has occurred. When a "storm damage condition" has been declared, residents must call 791-8447 within two working days after the storm to have the branches picked up at no charge. Branches must be stacked at the street, butt end out, within two (2) weeks of the storm. When you call, tell the office staff that you have storm damage, give them your name, address and phone number. It is not the policy of Sycamore Township to cover the whole Township street by street after a storm, but rather collecting from only the addresses reported to the office. The maintenance department will only pick up limbs and branches from the recent storm. Leaves, which are picked up during our annual fall "leaf season", will not be collected. Foundation plantings, old firewood, and tree and bush pruning will not be collected as storm damage. They can be disposed of through your trash collection or at our monthly brush chipping program held behind the Sycamore Township Maintenance Building, 8540 Kenwood Road, from 8 a.m. until 4 p.m. on the first Saturday of each month.
