Welcome to Summer in Sycamore Township! While it's a time of vacations and relaxation for many of our residents, it's a very active period for us as we work to keep Sycamore Township a thriving, successful community for all of us.

First of all, I want to thank all of you for your support of the Joint Economic Development Zones in the May Primary Election. The residents of Sycamore Township supported the JEDZ by an overwhelming 82%. This is a great victory for all of the residents, and will help to preserve core services in the Township without burdening our residents with additional property taxes. It also enables the Township to continue to participate in the economic development of our Kenwood Business District, which is the driving economic engine for our entire Township. The fourth JEDZ (Northwest) will be on the ballot in November.

As you probably know, Phillips Edison, a Sycamore Township company, has purchased the half built tower along I-71 (formerly Kenwood Towne Place, now renamed Kenwood Collection). We have been meeting with them weekly and are very happy to report that interior work has resumed on the building, and they anticipate putting the skin on the outside of the building and closing it up completely by the end of the year. I know you will be very happy with the final results of this great building.

If you have been traveling Kenwood Road south of Montgomery Road, you know that navigating that stretch has been a real challenge the last four weeks. We are in the process of burying all of the utilities underground, placing a median down the center of the road with plants and vegetation, and resurfacing the entire stretch. When this is completed, it will be a great addition to Kenwood and will reduce the number of accidents in that area as well.

I'm sure you have also noticed the changes taking place at the corner of Montgomery


and Hosbrook Roads. This will be the new site of a great upscale restaurant out of Chicago called Cooper's Hawk. Cooper's Hawk is both a restaurant and a winery, and features a wine driven menu which changes every season. This is the second Cooper's Hawk Restaurant in Ohio and is going to be a great addition to the Township.

Just a reminder that our annual Sycamore Township Festival is coming up on July 12th and 13th at Bechtold Park. ## SUMMER VACATION SAFETY

Vacation is a time for fun and relaxation. Don't let yours be ruined by crime. Follow the crime prevention tips below.

### BEFORE LEAVING . . .

- Have good locks on all doors and windows, and **USE THEM!**
- Never leave your house key hidden outside under a doormat, in a flower pot, or on the ledge of a door.
- Make your house appear "lived in". Use timers for lights and radios. Leave your trip plans and an emergency phone number with a neighbor or a friend and have them pick up mail, packages and newspapers, and keep the lawn mowed and watered.
- Contact the Sheriff's Office at (513) 683-3444 and request to be added to the vacation watch list.

### ON THE ROAD...

- Never carry large amounts of cash; use traveler's checks.
  - Keep a record of traveler's check numbers and your credit card numbers in a safe place. Have the telephone numbers to call in case your checks or credit cards are lost or stolen.
  - Be aware of your surroundings and never advertise your plans to strangers; this includes travel routes and the amount of cash you are carrying.
  - Do not stop to offer help to a stranded motorist. Call 911 for assistance.
  - If you suspect someone is following you, drive to the nearest service station, restaurant or business and call the police or sheriff's department. If you believe it is unsafe to get out of your car, sound your horn and flash your lights to draw attention.
  - If your car breaks down, raise the hood and turn on your hazard lights. If someone stops to help, it is advisable that you stay in your locked car and ask them to call the police. If you must abandon your car, keep all passengers together.
  - Always lock your car after entering or leaving it.
- should avoid. Stick to well-lighted main streets and public areas.
- Looking lost (stopping and looking at addresses or staring at street signs) may make you look like an easy target for crime. If you do get lost, find an open business and ask for directions.
  - If older children go off separately, be sure they understand the importance of keeping track of time and returning promptly at appointed hours.

### HOTEL AND MOTEL SECURITY...

- Determine the most direct route to and from your room and to the fire escapes, elevators and nearest phone.
- When occupying or leaving your room, lock all doors and windows.
- Use the door viewer to identify anyone requesting entry. Open the door only if you are certain the person has a legitimate reason to enter your room. Report any suspicious person or behavior to the hotel/motel office.
- Arrange your things so you'll know if anything is missing and keep suitcases locked so they cannot be used to carry your property out of your room.
- Never leave money, checks, credit cards or car keys in the room. Take them with you.
- Place extra cash, expensive jewelry or other valuables in the hotel/motel safe.
- Report any lost or stolen items to the hotel/motel management and to the police.

### SIGHT-SEEING...

- Ask for directions at a hotel/motel on how to get to those attractions you want to visit.
- Select tour guides carefully.
- Ask if there are any areas in town you

# EMS/Fire Department

## DROWNING PREVENTION

The Sycamore Township Fire Department encourages life safety around water - especially as we approach the summer season. Drowning prevention should be a priority when planning your vacation schedule and your children's summer recreation activities. While your child may know how to swim better than when he was younger, swim lessons are not a substitute for active supervision. Childhood drownings and near drownings can happen in a matter of seconds. They typically occur when a child is left unattended or during a brief lapse in supervision. Whether they are in a backyard swimming pool, at a community center or in the ocean, always actively watch your child in and around water. For general drowning prevention, here are some safety tips to make this a safe and happy summer.



- Actively supervise children in and around water, giving them individual attention.
- Appoint a designated "water watcher" to watch the children in the pool, taking turns with other adults.
- Enroll your child in swimming lessons after the age of four—they'll be more likely to practice and retain information.
- Teach children how to tread water, float and get out of the pool.
- Don't rely on "water wings" or other inflatable toys. If your child cannot swim stay within arm's reach at all times.
- Ensure that children know where the deep end is and how far they can safely go.
- Know if and where diving is allowed; and never dive in less than 9 feet of water.
- Do not allow children to swim alone.



## SCHOOL'S OUT!

Now that school is out for summer, there will be plenty of little people walking, playing and riding bikes in our neighborhoods. Please slow down in residential areas and look twice when entering and leaving intersections to help keep children and bicyclists safe!

- Install multiple drains in all pools, spas, whirlpools and hot tubs. This minimizes the suction of any one drain, reducing risk of death or injury.
- Teach children to stay away from pool and spa drains, and to tie up long hair securely to protect against entanglement.
- Install four-sided isolation fencing at least five feet high and equipped with self-closing and self-latching gates, around a home pool or spa.
- Hot tubs should be closed and locked at all times.
- Install a door alarm, a window alarm, or both to alert you if a child wanders into the pool area unsupervised.
- Teach children never to go near or in water without an adult present.
- Learn CPR and keep rescue equipment, a telephone and emergency numbers poolside at all times.

Remember that drowning safety tips also apply to other types of water hazards hidden within your home. This could include bath tubs, buckets of water, toilets and spas. Adhere to precautions with the same level of supervision as with outdoor water hazards.

- Once a bath is over, immediately drain the tub.
- Empty all buckets, containers and wading pools immediately after each use. Store them upside down and out of children's reach.
- Keep toilet lids closed and utilize toilet locks.
- Keep doors to bathrooms and laundry rooms closed at all times.
- Children in baby bath seats and rings must be watched at all times.

These are just a few safety tips to aid you in preparing for the summer activities in and around water. Communicate valuable safety information with your children and reinforce those lessons throughout the summer season. Always supervise your children around water and teach them about the hazards associated with water related activities. Don't become a statistic this summer!



# Planning and Zoning

## PROPERTY MAINTENANCE CODE

Property Maintenance Code - Sycamore Township has a property maintenance code and all property owners are required to meet the minimum standards of that code for the public safety and welfare of the Township. This code applies to both residential and commercial properties and helps keep our community safe.

Most Sycamore Township property owners take great pride in keeping their property in pristine condition. On occasion, however, a property within the Township has been neglected or fallen into disrepair. Please use one of the following options to report such concerns:

- Go to [www.sycamoretownship.org](http://www.sycamoretownship.org) and click on "Property Complaint Form" to enter a complaint online.
- Call the Planning and Zoning Hotline at (513) 792-7279 to leave a message for the Code Enforcement Official.

You may leave your name and contact information or choose to remain anonymous. It is very important to have the correct

address of the problem property and be as specific as possible regarding the complaint. The standard time to review complaints is within ten business days.

*The Township **does** have authority to enforce compliance for the following issues:*

- Tall grass/weeds
- Junk vehicles on private property
- Garbage/refuse and debris
- Boats/trailers parked on residential property
- Dumpsters and material such as mulch, gravel and pavers left in our roadways

*The following items are **not** enforceable by the Township and may be a civil matter between you and your neighbor:*

- Dead or dying trees on private property
- Property line disputes
- Drainage issues including natural drainage areas designed by the subdivision developer
- Vehicles parked in front of your residence on a public street

## ROAD WORK AHEAD

Sycamore Township maintains over 100 lane miles of roadway throughout the Township. This year the Township maintenance crew will be crack sealing more than 50 roads that total over 18 lane miles. There is also a microsurfacing project this summer that will be underway by the time you read this

article. The project will cover 21 streets for a total of approximately 10 lane miles and will be performed by Strawser Construction.

The Township will also have a road resurfacing project this year. Barrett Construction was the low bid and awarded this project. The resurfacing project will include the milling and removal of old surface asphalt, curb repair as needed, the installation of an interlayer to prevent reflective cracking and the placing of new surface asphalt. This project will cover eight streets at just over three lane miles.
