Police & Crime Prevention

In my role as the Traffic Safety Unit supervisor, I'm frequently called on to speak before public groups on the topic of traffic safety. People always want to know what we as a community can do to reduce traffic crashes. Obviously, there are many factors that contribute to any crash: weather, time of day, road conditions, volume of traffic, etc. The one constant in any traffic crash, though, is the human element—the

driver. In virtually every crash, there is some causative factor on the part of a driver. In the vast majority of crashes that causative factor is some form of inattention on the part of the driver. No matter what ultimately led to the crash (changing the radio, taking a phone call, eating, dealing with screaming kids) the driver has failed the task at hand, which is to focus all of his or her attention on operating a motor vehicle in a safe manner.

When I took a look at crash statistics over the past few years in Sycamore Township, I was not surprised at what I found. In every year from 2013 to 2015 December has been the busiest month for crashes in the Township. If you want to know why, go back and take a look at that one constant in any crash the driver.

December is a busy time of the year for most of us. Preparation for the holidays puts all sorts of demands on our time. As we prepare to move into December, I would ask everyone to please do their best to limit distractions when operating a vehicle. No matter what time of year it is, I believe that everyone has the same goal every time they get in a vehicle: to arrive at their destination safely.

EMS/Fire Department

As we head into the winter months it is a great time of year to enjoy the holidays and spend time with our families. The winter can also bring harsh weather, leading to potential hazards that can be avoided by taking precautionary measures.

The men and women of Sycamore Township Fire Department and Life Safety Section are working to remind everyone that home fires and certain medical emergencies are more prevalent in winter than in any other season.

Here are some tips to help keep you safe throughout the winter months:

• Never discard hot ashes inside or near the home. Your fire department makes runs every year in the winter for ashes that were burned in the fireplace the night before and appear to be out and cold. They are placed in a cardboard box or paper bag and set out on the rear deck or in a garbage can near the house. These ashes may have just enough of a hot ember

deep inside a piece of ash or unburned wood that when placed in a closed container will heat up and start a fire. Always place burned ashes in a metal container and wet down with water until they float.

- If you use an electric heater, be sure not to overload the circuit. We run into fire situations all the time where electrical outlets are overloaded, extension cords and gang plugs are used along with an electric heater. Extension cords and gang plugs can catch fire. Home breakers and fuses will continually trip, causing an interruption in your electrical service. Breaker boxes can heat up and catch fire from overload.
- Never thaw frozen pipes in your home with a blow torch. The fire department has made several house fire runs over the years where a blow torch being used to thaw a pipe catches wood or insulation on fire. Even thick dust and spider webs can ignite. Use hot water or a UL-labeled devise such as a handheld dryer for thawing.





HELP THE ELDERLY

It's very hard for elderly people to get around in the winter when snow is on the ground. If you see an elderly person out in the snow, try to give them a hand getting into their home. If they are out trying to shovel the drive or sidewalk, help them out. Elderly residents need the snow removed from their walks and drive more than any of us; however, the cold air and stress from shoveling snow is very hard on an elderly person. Let's help each other out to keep our neighbors safe and healthy.

As winter approaches, the Township's Planning and Zoning staff is working vigorously to keep up with new development, redevelopments and property maintenance demands. In the fall and winter months, we normally see a decline in property maintenance complaints; however, the same is not true regarding abandoned properties. If you see a home and are concerned it may be abandoned, don't wait, notify the Township immediately. It is important to our communities that we work to minimize these types of properties and the unwanted guests that often come with them. They are usually unmaintained and may bring down surrounding property values, having a negative effect our community.

With a steady flow of permit applications, Sycamore Township continues to show positive growth. Some of our most recent tenants at the now-completed Kenwood Collection at 5901 E. Galbraith Road are LL Bean, Old Navy, Crunch Fitness and Cycle Bar. These have all been approved and are either opened or will be opening soon. On the other side of Montgomery Road, there is a new Five Below retail store and an expanded, two-story Dick's Sporting Goods.

In addition, the Trader Joe's center has undergone dramatic changes to improve their traffic and parking lot flow. There is now an additional turn lane into the shopping center, creating a wider and safer entrance. This also provides easier accessibility from Montgomery Road and additional clearance distance from the traffic light when exiting the center. A crew is also restructuring the area beside David's Bridal, creating nine new employee parking spaces which in turn will allow for more customer parking. Trader Joe's is constantly focused on creating a wonderful shopping experience for their customers, and is very excited to make these parking lot improvements.

SNOW PLOW ROAD-EO

Each year, the Township maintenance crews in Hamilton County get together and compete in a Snow Plow Road-eo. In the Snow Plow Road-eo, each driver must first demonstrate his mechanical knowledge with a pre-trip inspection of his vehicle. Then, the driver's maneuverability skills are tested by driving a plow truck through an obstacle course. This year, Sycamore Township's very own Ernie McFarlin demonstrated exceptional technique and took first place in the Road-eo! Ernie is a twenty-year veteran of the Maintenance Department who has been flirting with the top spot for a number of years and accomplished it this year with a terrific run. **CONGRATULATIONS ERNIE!**

TOWNSHIP RECYCLING

Sycamore Township residents recycled 432.94 tons in the first half of 2016, which is a recycling rate of 13.56% of all waste collected. This level was achieved through curbside recycling, drop-off recycling behind the Township Administration Building at 8540 Kenwood Road, and items dropped off for recycling at the Township's annual Trash Bash. This year at two Trash Bash events we collected 694 tires, 2,034 pounds of electronics, over 4,500 pounds of hazardous household chemicals and 8,850 pounds of paper through document shredding at the Bechtold Park event. This is a considerable amount of waste to keep out of the landfills, saving space as well as the environment. Great job everyone. Keep up the good work!
