

Also at the South Trash Bash, we will once again provide a document shredding service which will allow you to safely and confidentially shred all the documents that you no longer need to retain. The document shredding service is free to all residents and will be available on Saturday, April 29th only between 10:00 a.m. and 2:00 p.m.

Safety Services in the Township is something that your Board of Trustees takes very seriously. Our EMS/Fire Department has been running with both full time and part time employees, and recently the number of part time EMS personnel has diminished to a very low level county wide. Chief Penny brought this to the Board's attention and the Trustees agreed to hire an additional three full time EMS/Fire personnel to insure that when you make a call for emergency services, we will have the necessary personnel to meet all your needs.

You may be seeing more Sheriff's patrol cars in your neighborhood throughout the day as well. With the rash of break-ins we have been experiencing, we decided to add an additional 24/7 patrol car, which is manned by four additional Sheriff's Patrol officers. Lt. Kettelman would like to remind you to remove all valuables from your cars and keep all car doors locked. Also, please make sure that your garage doors are closed before you retire for the evening. Our night patrol personnel have been leaving reminder notes for people who forget to close their garage doors at night.

Your Trustees are following the proposed Duke pipeline project very closely and have begun the process to legally intervene in opposition to the route they have chosen. Duke's application was accepted by the PUCO, and there will be upcoming public hearings as part of the ongoing process. Please refer to the Township website for more detailed information.

Finally, we will be celebrating our 25th Annual Sycamore Township Festival at Bechtold Park on July 14th and 15th with the Greg Kihn Band and The Marshall Tucker Band as the national acts on Saturday night. We will continue to have rides for the children on both nights of the festival. One single price of only \$5.00 allows your children to access the rides the entire night. Check the Township website for a complete list of all the festival events during this fun filled weekend.

On behalf of fellow Trustees Cliff Bishop and Denny Connor, and our Fiscal Officer Rob Porter, I want to thank you for continuing to support Township government, and I look forward to seeing you at one of the many Township activities scheduled in the upcoming months.

Police & Crime Prevention

Sycamore Township contracts with the Hamilton County Sheriff's Office for police services. This includes four 24-hour cars a day, plus one additional car during peak times. These officers are specifically dedicated to Sycamore Township and its residents to protect the community 24 hours a day, seven days a week.

In 2016, officers assigned to Sycamore Township responded to 12,415 calls for service/dispatches and drove over 216,951 miles. A total of 527 original arrests, which included felony, misdemeanor, minor misdemeanor offenses, and 1,424 warrant arrests were made in Sycamore Township last year.

EMS/Fire Department

Itching to get the yard into shape for the summer? Here are ways to help ensure your spring spruce-up is disaster-free.

Always wear protective clothing when you handle pesticides and fertilizers.

More than 60,000 people are treated in emergency rooms each year for lawn-mower injuries:

- Rake before you mow to prevent any stones and loose debris from launching into the air.
- Never operate a mower in your bare feet and avoid wearing loose clothing.
- Never start a mower indoors.
- When refueling your mower, make sure the engine is off and cool. Don't spill gasoline on a hot engine—and **DON'T SMOKE** while pouring gasoline.
- Never leave your mower unattended.
- Don't use electrical mowers on wet grass.

At least 55,000 people each year sustain injuries from trimmers, lawn edgers, pruners and power saws:


- Read the manufacturer's instructions carefully before using the tools.
- Inspect the product for damage and don't use it if there are problems.
- Use proper eye protection.
- Make sure blade guards are in place on all cutting equipment.
- Don't let tools get wet unless they are labeled "immersible."
- Unplug all tools when not in use.
- Make sure the tool is in the "off" position before you plug it in.
- Store gasoline-powered equipment away from anything that uses a pilot light.
- Make sure you use the right saw for the task, and always wait for the saw blade to stop before pulling away from a cut to avoid kickback.
- When pruning trees, be careful not to let metal ladders or trimmers contact overhead wires.
- Before you do any "hands on" weed removal, be sure you know how to identify poison ivy, sumac, oak and similar toxic plants. Find out ahead of time how to treat the rashes they cause to reduce the irritation.

Ladder Safety:

- Read the manufacturer's instructions that come with your ladder. They contain guidelines for weight and height limits as well as for the proper use of their product.
- Inspect the ladder before using it to make sure there are no loose or broken rungs.
- Make sure the ladder is the right height for the job. Many accidents happen when people overextend their reach because their ladders are too short.
- Never stand on a ladder's bucket shelf.
- Make sure the ladder is completely open, and that all of its feet are planted on a firm, level surface. Extension ladders should not be placed at an angle that is too extreme.
- Avoid using a metal ladder near electrical sources.
- Face the ladder when climbing down and make sure your weight is centered between the two sides.
- Proper Angle for Climbing a Ladder: Once the ladder is set up, place both feet on the bottom rung and stand straight. Reach both arms straight out and grab the rung at shoulder level. If you are still standing straight, the ladder angle is correct. If you are leaning inward or outward the angle is not correct. This illustration shows the proper method for the correct angle:

PERMITS REQUIRED!

Spring brings the promise of warmer weather and with it thoughts of home improvement projects! Please keep in mind that a zoning certificate is required for the following residential projects:

A zoning certificate ensures that the project is compliant with the current zoning resolution. For most residential projects, with the exception of fences and sheds under 200 sq. ft. in area, the zoning certificate is the first step in the process, and a building permit through Hamilton County Building Department will also be required.

Zoning certificate applications, submittal requirements and fee information are available on our website at www.sycamoretownship.org. Many residential projects have no review fees associated with them, and those that do have minimal fees, provided residents apply prior to beginning any work. If you have any questions or are unsure if a permit is necessary, please call the Planning and Zoning office at 513-792-7250 *before* starting your project.

PLACEMENT OF GARBAGE/RECYCLING CONTAINERS

Last year, the Board of Trustees passed Resolution 2016-33 which requires all residential garbage/recycling containers to be placed at the curb or authorized location (not in the street) for pick-up no more than 24 hours preceding the scheduled pick-up day. In addition, all containers must be removed within 24 hours after the pickup unless prior arrangements have been made with the Township regarding a special pickup time or location. All garbage/recycling containers shall either be in an enclosed building or placed behind the front building line when not placed for pickup.

ROAD WORK AHEAD

Sycamore Township will initiate several road improvement projects in 2017 to serve the residents of our community.

First, there will be a reconstruction project on Donna Ln. from Plainfield Rd. to Estermarie Dr. and on Estermarie Dr. from Donna Ln. to Mantell Ave. This project includes new pavement, curbs and driveway aprons. Residents who drive these roads know this is a much needed project! The road has been patched quite extensively and is quite rough. During rains one can see that there is mud pumping up from the base through the pavement.

The Township contacted all the utility companies inquiring if there was any work that needed to be performed in this area. It turns out that the water main on these streets is in need of replacement,

therefore, Cincinnati Water Works is working with the Township to replace the water main in conjunction with this project. The project will begin with water main work in the spring, so that the bulk of the reconstruction may be done during the summer, when the two schools on the street will not be in session.

Second, there will be repaving projects in the Charter Oak Subdivision in Kenwood, which includes Charter Oak Dr., White Chapel Dr., Ivybrook Ct. and Hermitage Ln., and in the Gwilada area of Dillonvale, including Gwilada Dr., Donegal Dr. (Wicklow Ave. to the west terminus), Highton Ct., Langhorst Ct., Jeffrey Ct., and Guam Ct. The water main is currently being replaced on these Dillonvale streets, with the exception of Gwilada Dr. where a new water main was installed previously.

Finally, new sidewalk will be constructed this year on Montgomery Rd. extending from Galbraith Rd. to Dearwester Dr. This is another project initiated by the Trustees to connect our neighborhoods and make the Township a more walkable community. Expect to see more of these types of projects in the future. In addition, the underground utility project continues on Montgomery and Galbraith Rds. This project is a huge improvement to the area and is scheduled for completion this summer. Our Township Maintenance crews will also be in the neighborhoods repairing sidewalks, storm sewers, curb, pavement and more throughout the spring and summer.

As always with all road construction projects, please slow down and drive cautiously through the construction areas to ensure the safety of both you and the workers. While there will be some inconveniences, the end result of these endeavors will be a tremendous improvement to these areas for our residents and property owners. We thank you for your patience and cooperation.

2017 TRASH BASH & DOCUMENT SHREDDING (DATES TO RIGHT)

Trash, junk, debris, old tires, used motor oil, construction materials, furniture, lawnmowers, appliances of all kinds, and electronics will be accepted. Mattresses and box springs will also be accepted provided they are wrapped in plastic or in a plastic mattress bag. **Be prepared to show proof of residency.** Sycamore Township Maintenance staff will be on hand to offer assistance to residents at these events.

This year, the annual document shredding event for residents will take place at Bechtold Park in conjunction with the South Trash Bash on Saturday, April 29, 10:00 a.m. to 2:00 p.m. Oil based paint, household chemicals and pesticides will be accepted at the SOUTH TRASH BASH ONLY.

Please note that latex paint and yard waste, including brush and leaves, will not be accepted. Latex paint may be taken to Matthew 25 Ministries at 11060 Kenwood Road.
