Drug Collection and Disposal Program Expanded



Prescription drug abuse has reached epidemic proportions, as each day more young people die from prescription drug overdoses than from heroin, cocaine, methamphetamines and inhalants combined. Most abused prescription drugs come from family and friends. Drugs should not be flushed down the drain or disposed in the garbage, as medications find their way into waterways, contaminate surface waters and harm the environment.

To prevent prescription drug abuse and help the environment, the Village of Skokie has expanded its Drug Collection and Disposal Program. There is now a white drop-off box in the lobby of the Skokie Police Department, 7300 Niles Center Road, for residents to dispose unwanted, unused and expired medication at anytime. This location offers 24-hour secure monitoring, collection and subsequent disposal in accordance with federal regulations. This site also accepts nar-

cotics and other controlled substances.

Accepted drugs include prescription medications, controlled substances, all over-the-counter medications (i.e. pain relievers, cold medication, etc.), medication samples, pet medications, vitamins and supplements, medicated ointments, lotions, creams and oils, liquid medication in leak-proof containers and homeopathic remedies.

This program does not accept needles/sharps, syringes with needles, thermometers, IV bags, bloody or infectious waste, personal care products, empty containers and hydrogen peroxide.

Since May 2007, the Skokie Health Department, 5127 Oakton Street, has accepted medications and used syringes/needles in puncture-proof containers. In 2011 alone, the Skokie Health Department collected 8,270 bottles of expired/unwanted medication. This site did not offer 24-hour drop-off convenience and was unable to accept narcotics and non-prescription liquids as does the new Police Departments drop-off.

Board Reviews Multi-Unit Licensing Program

In early fall, the Village Board will consider a multi-unit licensing ordinance to strengthen communication and the partnership between landlords, tenants and the Village. The ordinance will ensure that multi-unit buildings are maintained in a safe and secure manner that minimizes code violations, and also in a manner that promotes public safety and crime prevention.

The proposal first came under consideration by the Public Safety Commission in April 2012. The commission approved the concept in May 2012, after a meeting to which all Skokie landlords were invited, was held. In mid-July, the Village Board authorized staff to draft the ordinance after yet a fourth public hearing on the matter.

The proposed multi-unit licensing program will require landlords to obtain licenses for each rental unit at a cost of \$25 per unit, per year. The fees will cover the cost of hiring a new police officer who will be assigned to work with landlords throughout the community on safety and tenant issues. Of 17 area communities with similar licensing programs, Skokie's proposed \$25

per-unit annual fee is below the average of those assessed in other communities. Landlords also will be required to attend a one-time training session that will be subject to a \$10 fee to cover training costs. The training will include information on safety, crime-free lease principles and other issues. Staff from the Community Development Department, Property Standards Division, also will

continue existing efforts to inspect multi-unit buildings on an 18-month cycle and issue citations for code violations.

There are a total 1,201 multi-unit buildings with 4,851 units in Skokie. The majority of multi-unit buildings contain four units or less. Statistics from the 2010 Census show that 53% of renter heads of household are white, 20.9 percent are

Asian, 13.5 percent are black, 9.5 percent are Hispanic, 2.6 percent are two or more races and 0.4 percent are other races.

Tech Park Employees Give Back

In late May, 2012, employees from the Illinois Science + Technology Park (IS+TP) in Downtown Skokie volunteered their time to benefit the community. On May 22, more than 30 employees from the nearly 20 nano-technology, bio-technology, pharmaceutical and health care firms in IS+TP attended an informational workshop about the Village's new Big Brothers Big Sisters (BBBS) program. In cooperation with the Skokie Park District and School District 69, the Village has partnered with BBBS to establish a program that currently provides 13 young people from Lincoln Middle School with a bi-weekly mentoring session. The Village's Human Services Division administers the program, and reports that a number of IS+TP employees have expressed interest in serving as mentors when program recruitment resumes this fall.



Also in late May, five employees of Forest City Enterprises, Inc., owner of the IS+TP, volunteered at the Niles Township Food Pantry. The Forest City employees spent the day stocking shelves and preparing bags of food from the "Food Rescue Truck" program.

Police Utilize New License Plate Recognition Software

On any given day in Skokie, there are drivers on the road with suspended licenses, and even more operating with expired license plates. These individuals might have managed to avoid law enforcement for months or even years by rigidly adhering to traffic laws.

Currently, officers manually enter license plate numbers through in-car laptop computers and then await a response. An officer is typically able to manually process 10 to 15 license plates per

hour. The Skokie Police Department recently installed new automated license plate recognition software (ALPR) that allows officers to automatically run approximately 3,000 license plates per hour during a routine patrol, whether the police vehicles are moving or stationary. ALPR is an image-processing technology that enables police officers to cite or apprehend individuals who may be a threat to public safety, with officers notified of problem plates by both audio and visual alerts. License plates are captured and run through both state and federal databases. The results can mean increased recovery of stolen vehicles, arrests and better detection of stolen license plates.

Additional benefits of the ALPR system include the apprehension of wanted persons, arrest of persons driving on suspended or revoked drivers licenses, recovery of stolen vehicles and potential persons in possession thereof, identification of persons on terrorist watch lists and recovery of missing persons and children as well as identification of registered sex offenders and domestic violence/order of protection respondents in prohibited areas. At crime scenes, police vehicles equipped with this system are able to quickly identify all nearby vehicles for potential follow-up investigations. The ALPR system was purchased with Justice Assistance Stimulus Grant Funds.

Village Board Action

The Village Board approved a water rate adjustment of 4.9% which is necessary to cover the 2% annual rate increase for water purchased from the City of Evanston along with the costs associated with maintaining an aging water system infrastructure. Skokie's water rate will remain the lowest water rate available among area municipalities for a second straight year.

The Village Board heard a description of a proposed job training program which includes the collaboration of the Village of Skokie, Oakton Community College, the Illinois Science + Technology Park (Forest City) and the Chicago Community Trust. The Village received a \$250,000 grant from The Chicago Community Trust to implement this program. A \$250,000 match from the Downtown Science + Technology TIF was requested and approved.

The Village Board approved, in concept, funding from the Downtown TIF for School District 69 and the Skokie Park District to develop and build a skate park at Lincoln Junior High School.

The Village Board approved a contract with Welch ATM for an ATM Machine at the parking lot at the northwest corner of Searle Parkway and Skokie Boulevard near the new Oakton-Skokie CTA Station. The Village will receive \$305 a month from this lease.

The Board approved a facade rebate assistance matching grant for Kaufman's Bakery and Deli on West Dempster Street.

The Village Board approved an upgrade in broadcasting equipment for the Council Chambers.

With funds received through federal funding, the Village Board approved the construction of a bike path and walking path on the south side of Old Orchard Road between Gross Point Road and Skokie Boulevard. Construction of the project will occur in 2014. ↻

Remember to Purchase Your Vehicle Sticker

Vehicle stickers went on sale on June 1 and must be purchased and displayed by August 31. Passenger vehicle stickers purchased through August 31 cost \$20. After this date, the cost increases to \$30. Other vehicles have different licensing fees. Vehicle stickers are available at Village Hall, 5127 Oakton Street, Monday through Friday from 8:30 a.m. to 5 p.m. Vehicle sticker renewals may be made online at www.skokie.org through August 31.

Having trouble removing last year's vehicle sticker? Peeling the sticker seems like the obvious solution, but if this doesn't work, a small razor or window scraper may do the trick. Stubborn stickers may require pre-

soaking before removing. If a large portion of the sticker was removable, soapy water, an alcohol solution or even WD-40 may be able to remove any excess adhesive. With a spray bottle of soapy water in hand, generously spray the sticker. Allow the water to soak for about ten minutes.

Remove as much of the sticker as possible. If necessary, re-spray the area. Continue the steps until all traces of the sticker are gone. These are inexpensive approaches to removing sticky items from automobiles. Unfortunately,

these methods can be tedious and time consuming. Many auto parts stores also have chemical solutions intended to remove stickers from windshields.

Skokie Police Department Committed to Excellence Police Sergeant Graduates from Northwestern University's Center for Public Safety

Skokie Police Sergeant Daniel O'Brien recently graduated from the School of Police Staff and Command (SPSC) at Northwestern University. Sergeant O'Brien has successfully completed the 10-week Staff and Command program held in Evanston, Illinois from March 19 to May 25, 2012. This program, which was implemented by the Center for Public Safety in 1983, has graduated over 9,000 students both nationally and internationally.

The SPSC provides upper-level college instruction in a total of 22 core or mandatory blocks of instruction and utilizes nine additional optional blocks of instruction during each session. The major topics of study include: Management and Management Theory, Organizational Behavior, Human Resources for Law Enforcement, Budgeting, Staffing Allocation and Personnel Deployment. Each student is challenged through a total of 18 written examinations, projects and quizzes in addition to two research papers that are a required part of the curriculum. Upon successful completion, students may be awarded a total of eight units of undergraduate credit from Northwestern University in Evanston, Illinois.

The Center for Public Safety was established at Northwestern in 1936 with the specific goal of expanding university-based education and training for the Law Enforcement Community.

Since its inception, the Center has broadened its original objective and now provides a variety of courses and programs in the area of Police Training, Management Training, and Executive Development. The Skokie Police Department anticipates a variety of benefits from Sergeant O'Brien's attendance at this program. Many program graduates achieve a variety of leadership positions within their respective agencies. Currently, over 750 graduates hold the title of Chief of Police and 39 of the 50 Directors of State Police Agencies also are graduates of this program.

Sergeant O'Brien joins the majority of Skokie Police Department supervisory personnel who have previously graduated from the SPSC. This training prepares supervisory personnel to be at the forefront in police decision-making matters. The Skokie Police Department requires that all supervisory staff attend this training with their attendance at the time of their promotional date.

The Skokie Police Department prides itself on providing personnel with the most contemporary, Federal and State approved training courses by recognized organizations such as North East Multi-Regional Training (NMRT), Northeastern Illinois Public Safety Training Academy (NIPSTA), Suburban Law Enforcement Academy (SLEA), and Northwestern University's Center for Public Safety (NUCPS). ∞

Let's Talk Turf!

Fall is a great time for seeding because soil temperatures are warm enough for germination, but weed competition is low. Did you know that different types of grass perform better depending on site conditions? Kentucky bluegrass performs well in sunny locations, whereas seed mixes that include fine fescues are more shade tolerant. Perennial ryegrass germinates quickly, but it should not make up more than 15% of the mix as it is not as vigorous in the long term.

If you are seeding bare spots, it is important to rake the seed into the soil. Apply a thin layer of peat moss over the seed which helps retain moisture and protects the seed from birds. Be sure to water every one to two days, keeping the area moist, but not soaked. Mistlers and other low-pressure sprinklers work well. Remember, if the seed dries out, it dies out.

Fall is a great time for aeration too. Aeration reduces soil compaction, improves water infiltration, and promotes root growth. Lawns with healthy root systems are able to better fight weeds, diseases, and pests.

Proof of Skokie residency is required. If a resident has Medicare Part B, they are asked to bring their Medicare card so the Health Department can bill for reimbursement of the shot.

Influenza is a contagious respiratory illness caused by different influenza viruses. Older people, young children, and people with certain chronic health conditions are at high risk for serious flu complications.

The best way to prevent flu is by getting vaccinated each fall and following these sensible precautions:

- Clean your hands frequently.
- Cover your coughs and sneezes.
- Stay home from work or school if you are sick. 🐾

Living with Urban Wildlife

Skokie is home to a variety of wild animals, including deer, coyote, fox, raccoon, squirrel, opossum, beaver, muskrat, rabbits and others.

Although Skokie wildlife typically stays away from people, there are steps you can take to prevent animals from becoming a nuisance.

Do's

- Tightly screen all possible access holes in buildings to prevent wildlife from getting into the attic or under the home.
- Secure trash in your garbage cart.

- Eliminate any food source that may attract wildlife such as fallen fruit or unattended pet food.
- Clear brush, dense ground cover, wood piles, and garden debris where rodents may be living.

Don'ts

- Don't feed wildlife.
- Don't set out poison bait. Often the wrong animal will eat it and be poisoned.
- To prevent animals from getting into a chimney, install a wire mesh cap over the top.
- Don't corner or try to catch a wild animal.



- Don't seal an entrance hole in a building or opening to a den unless you are certain the animals are not present.
