

Waynesville Public Art Commission Conflict of Interest Policy

No artist sitting on the Waynesville Public Art Commission or member of his/her household may compete, during his/her tenure for public art commissions/purchases over which the WPAC has approval authority or administrative responsibility.

No member of a selection committee or task force or of his/her household may compete for public art projects for which the WPAC has approval authority.

No member of the project architect's or landscape architect's firm may apply for a public art project being designed by that firm.

No artist sitting on a Selection Panel may compete for a commission/purchase for which the panel was formed.

WPAC members must declare a conflict of interest if a project comes before the panel with which he/she is involved. WPAC members must also declare a conflict of interest if a person with whom he/she shares a household or whom he/she professionally represents has a matter before the commission.

Any Selection Panel member who is an artist representative or person sharing a household with an artist must declare conflict of interest in the event that an artist that he/she represents or shares a household with is being considered for a commission/purchase.

If a conflict of interest exists, the commission member or selection panel member will leave the discussions and abstain from voting.
