# Message from the Mayor

To the Citizens of Waynesville:

## "Pack The Pantry" Community Food Drive 2009

The current economic crisis has made the needs of the citizens in our community even more apparent. Sometimes it can be overwhelming. Although the Town of Waynesville doesn't provide social services, we do provide several opportunities for our citizens to assist less fortunate folks in Waynesville and throughout the county. One of the newest is a community food drive. Last year on their own initiative several employees organized a food drive. Because of the efforts by the town personnel and generosity of citizens, a large truckload of food was delivered to Haywood Christian Ministry. As helpful as this was, it was distressing to see how bare the shelves were, especially in the middle of the holiday season. Haywood Christian Ministry has the storage space and volunteer manpower needed to distribute donations throughout the County, but they need the food to make it happen. This year employees aspire to extend their efforts and requests to the county as a whole. The following plan was devised by them to fulfill their dream.

Food donations will be accepted at every Town facility, including the Recreation Center, Public Works, the Police and Fire Departments and Town Hall (new and old). In addition, everyone will have opportunities to donate goods at many community events beginning with Halloween and continuing throughout the Holiday Season. Most gratifying is that this is true not only in the Town of Waynesville, but in Clyde, Canton and Maggie Valley. County employees and facilities are also participating. The full list of collection sites is being compiled as this newsletter is going to print, so please check the town website, county cable channel and the papers for updates and information.

I encourage you to make every gathering of family and friends an opportunity to collect food, blankets or coats which could be used by someone in need. Drop off your food collections at any governmental facility, or take it directly to Haywood Christian Ministry.

# Waynesville Watershed Hike Scheduled

The 8,600 acre Waynesville watershed is normally closed to public access, but free guided hikes are offered twice a year, in the spring and fall.



The final hike of this year will be on Saturday, October 17th.

Two departure times are offered: at 7:00 a.m. Naturalist Don Hendershot will lead a group specifically for those interested in bird watching. A second group will depart at 9:00 a.m., led by Dr. Peter Bates of Western Carolina University. Dr. Bates will discuss the Waynesville watershed management plan as well as current conditions within the property. Eric Romaniszyn of Haywood Waterways Association will also attend to discuss water quality throughout the county.

The hike will be between 3 and 5 miles long, across moderately strenuous terrain. Hikers should bring their own lunch, water, appropriate (warm) clothing, hat, rain gear, and wear sturdy shoes. Birders should also bring their binoculars. Both groups will leave from the Waynesville Water Plant and return by 2:00 p.m.

Advanced registration is required and can be done online at www.townofwaynesville.org or by calling 452-2491. When registering, please specify which hike you are interested in attending.

#### State Bans Plastics From Landfills

Beginning October 1, 2009 plastic bottles (#1 and #2) will be banned from the Haywood County Landfill. These plastic bottles include those "that have a neck smaller than the body of the container, and that



accept a screw top, snap cap, or other closure." This does not apply to rigid plastic containers that are intended for use in the sale or distribution of motor oil.

The acceptable plastic bottles can be placed in blue bags for collection on your regular household garbage collection day. Please remove the lids from the bottles. The lids are not recyclable. Other items that can be placed in these blue bags include aluminum cans, catalogs, small pieces of corrugated cardboard, foil roasting pans and pie pans, glass (food or beverage containers only), household cardboard boxes (cereal, cracker, cake mix, etc.), junk mail, magazines, newspaper, paper grocery bags, steel or tin cans and telephone books. Please rinse all containers. Labels can remain.

Interesting Info - each year, North Carolinians throw out enough plastic bottles to line the Blue Ridge Parkway 642 times.

## HISTORIC PRESERVATION CORNER

#### A BRIEF HISTORY OF WAYNESVILLE

The Town of Waynesville was founded in 1809 by Colonel Robert Love, a Revolutionary War soldier. He donated land for the courthouse, jail and public square, and named the Town after his commander in the war, General "Mad" Anthony Wayne.

Waynesville also has a connection to another war. Waynesville was the scene of the last and perhaps most unusual skirmish in the eastern theater of the American Civil War. On May 6, 1865, Union Colonel William C. Bartlett's 2nd North Carolina (Federal) Mounted Infantry were raiding, pillaging, burning homes and engaging in other activities to undermine the economic base of the area and were attacked at the Sulphur Springs (east of Waynesville) by a detachment of rebels from the Thomas Legion of Highlanders, who had been summoned for help by locals. East of the Mississippi, Thomas' Legion fired "The Last Shot" of the Civil War in White Sulphur Springs, North Carolina. The Legion consisted of soldiers who had served under Jubal A. Early during the Shenandoah Valley Campaigns of 1864, but had been sent back to their native North Carolina mountains to engage in guerrilla warfare against the remaining Union forces. The disoriented Union soldiers retreated into Waynesville, and on the evening of May 6 remaining elements of the Thomas Legion surrounded the town. The soldiers lit numerous bonfires on the ridges above the town and engaged in war chants in an effort to intimidate the Federals. The following day the Confederate commanders Gen. James Green Martin and Col. William Holland Thomas (for whom the Legion was named) negotiated a surrender. These commanders had been made aware that Generals Robert E. Lee and Joseph E. Johnston had already capitulated, and that continued hostilities would prove pointless.

#### Leaf Season

Beginning Monday, October 19 until mid January, the Town will collect leaves by vacuum machine. Leaves should be raked to curbside but not in the ditches, gutter lines or in a manner that would obstruct the street or sidewalk. Leaves must be free of sticks or other debris and will be left if improperly prepared. The leaf collection schedule will vary due to volume and weather.



You can continue to bag leaves if you prefer - they will be picked up by another truck. Please keep all other material separate from leaves.

Consultant Craig Lewis of the Lawrence Group has submitted his initial assessment report, and the committee has begun work in dealing with the current Land Development Standards and evaluating the report from Mr. Lewis. On August 19, the Committee had a three hour meeting with Mr. Lewis to discuss his initial report, and the group would like to delve into the details so that by the end of the year, a recommendation will be forthcoming to the Town Board. The Committee plans to meet every other Wednesday from 7:30 – 9:00 a.m. at the second floor lobby of Town Hall. Their first meeting was held on September 2.

#### Yard Waste and Bulky Items Pickup Schedule


Waynesville uses the PinPoint system to collect yard waste and bulky items. When the garbage truck comes by your residence or place of business on your waste collection day, the driver of the truck can pinpoint electronically through a tracking device, yard waste, bulky items or recyclables that need to be collected. A list is then printed for the driver of the appropriate truck so that an employee can go directly to the locations identified. In order for this system to work, *yard waste and bulky items must be at curb side no later than 7 am on your household waste pickup day*. The pickup schedule for October, November and December is posted below:



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# Evidence Processing Area Dedicated to the Memory of James Kenneth "Chief" Moore



Alderman James Kenneth Moore initially perceived the need for a state-of-the-art evidence processing area for the police department. This proposal was instrumental in the construction of a modern police station that will serve the needs of law enforcement officers and the citizens of Waynesville for years to come. Mr. Moore served his community as Waynesville Police Officer from 1965 – 1967; Hazelwood Chief of Police 1967 – 1994 and Waynesville Board of Aldermen 1995 – 2009. A plaque was dedicated to his memory on August 25, 2009.

Employees from the Police Department, Planning Department, Inspections, Code Enforcement and the Public Works Director are now located in the newly renovated and expanded Police Station/Development Office located at 9 South Main Street. All telephone numbers remain the same.

Administration and Finance Departments remain in the Municipal Building at 16 South Main Street. The Hazelwood Office at 280 Georgia Avenue will continue to be Station No. 2 for the Fire Department and the drive-thru window will remain open for bill payment from 8:30 a.m. - 12:00 noon, Monday through Friday.

## **Utility Line Repair Work**

The Town has contracted for the replacement of deteriorated water and sewer lines in the Belle Meade Drive and Camelot Drive areas, where there has always been a considerable amount of sewer system infiltration and overflows. Hopefully, these improvements will result in a much tighter system and ground water will not be seeping into the system.
