4th Annual Food Drive

The Waynesville Town Employees will be conducting their 4th annual food drive



during the fall of 2011. This effort began in 2008 when employees saw a need in the community and collected two pickup truck loads of food internally for donation to Haywood Christian Ministry. In 2009, the effort spread into the community when the students at Hazelwood Elementary School joined with the employees and the effort resulted in 12 pickup truck loads of food. In 2010, Junaluska Elementary students joined with those at Hazelwood Elementary and the Town employees, and 18 pickup truck loads of food were delivered to Haywood Christian Ministry.



The need for food is no less in 2011, and the Town employees are trying to expand the project again.

This year, Jonathan Valley Elementary students will join Junaluska and Hazelwood students in the food drive.

There will also be a chance for the community to donate food at the football games between Pisgah and Tuscola. Those attending the J.V. game on Thursday, October 6 and those attending the Varsity game on October 7 will have the opportunity to donate canned and packaged food at the entry gates. Fans will be placing their food items in boxes marked "PISGAH" or "TUSCOLA", and the food collected at both games will be combined and

weighed during the following week. The school that brings in the most food will receive a trophy in recognition of this effort. The Leo Club at Pisgah High School has generously volunteered their time to co-ordinate the collection efforts at Pisgah High and to work with the Waynesville Town employees with the collections at the football games. After being weighed, food collected in the "PISGAH" boxes will be delivered to the Community Kitchen in Canton, and food collected in the "TUSCOLA" boxes will go to Haywood Christian Ministry.

In the past, e m p l o y e e s collected food at the municipal buildings on Fridays during the fall. This year, there will be a concerted



effort on Friday, November 18, and a collection point is being established at Ingles off Russ Avenue and at the Wal-Mart Shopping Center on South Main Street. On that date, from 8:00 a.m. until 8:00 p.m., citizens may drop off their cans and nonperishable food items to collection points at those two shopping centers. November 18 is the Friday before Thanksgiving, a time when we give special thanks for the many ways in which we are blessed, so Town employees thought this was a great time for everyone to give back to the community.

Accepted items include: flour, corn meal, sugar, soups, rice, beans, tea, coffee, cereal, peanut butter, cooking oil, canned vegetables, fruit and meat. No glass please.

Town employees hope that citizens throughout Haywood County will become involved in these efforts to "Pack the Pantry" at Haywood Christian Ministry and at the Community Kitchen in Canton.

Keep Trash Out of Our Waterways

Garbage makes its way into the streams by being tossed out of car windows, directly dumped into the streams, or through stormwater runoff from parking lots. Stormwater is water that runs off of streets, parking lots, rooftops, and other hard surfaces whenever it rains, especially when it rains hard. Unlike the sewer system where the water is treated, stormwater is not treated before entering the waterways. Polluted stormwater runoff is a problem because it carries trash and potentially toxic chemicals from the land directly into our waterways. The toxic chemicals are harmful to fish and other aquatic life. The trash carried in stormwater runoff can clog stormdrains causing localized flooding and becomes an eye sore when in our creeks. Help keep our streams clean by placing trash in cans, recycling and when transporting trash in the bed of your truck, make sure it is secure.

Clean streams benefit everyone. Clean water helps support the Western North Carolina economy. Every year thousands of people



choose the region as their vacation destination. The whitewater rapids attract rafting and kayaking enthusiasts and the cool clean waters offer some of the best trout fishing in the country.

The Town of Waynesville Invites You to Adopt a Street

The Town of Waynesville began the Adopt-A-Street program approximately 11 years ago. In this program, residents or businesses can choose a street in their area, or in another section of town, and be responsible for picking up litter on that street. For their efforts, a street sign is erected with their name or business name. Gloves, vests, garbage bags and blue bags for recyclable items are furnished by the Town. Adopters are asked to clean up a minimum of four times per year, but may do so weekly or monthly. Any adopters must be at least 18 years of age and a contract must be signed prior to adoption of streets.

Currently, 89 streets have been adopted, and the Adopt-A-Street program has definitely made a difference in the appearance of Waynesville's streets.

Take Time to Visit One of Waynesville's Parks

Sometimes a simple outing helps ease the strain of a busy week. The Town of Waynesville offers many outdoor areas for your pleasure, from large to small, in the middle of downtown to off-the-beaten-path. Explore them to find what suits you best:

- Sulphur Springs Park, part of the Civil War Trails, is located on Timothy Lane. This is a fenced, grassy expanse with a small stream running through. A remnant of the grand Sulphur Springs Hotel, the springhouse gazebo still stands on this site. Bring a blanket; no tables at this shady location.
- Fourth Street Park off of Smathers Street is convenient to Frog Level National Historic District. This beautifully landscaped park offers two large (uncovered) picnic tables.
- ◆ Dutch Fisher Park is located off of Westwood Circle and within walking distance of the Town of Waynesville Hazelwood Office. This park is complete with play equipment, ballfield, bathroom facilities, covered picnic shelters* and rushing Richland Creek.
- East Street Park is a neighborhood park with a covered picnic shelter and a basketball court. Beautiful oak trees provide plenty of shade.
- MainStreetMini-Park is a newly renovated park at the corner of Main and Depot Streets. A paved, urban pocket



park with raised landscaped beds, it affords tables and chairs perfect for busy merchants and shoppers.

 Waynesville Recreation Center has covered shelters* at both Marshall Street and Vance Street locations. These are beautiful, creekside

- facilities befitting large groups and within walking distance to tennis courts, dog park, soccer fields, disc golf and plenty of play equipment.
- Carolyn's Point is located where North Main, Wall Street and Woolsey Heights converge. It offers three benches and beautiful hardscaping and landscaping. This is a surprisingly peaceful oasis to recharge and watch the cars go by.

Protect Your Family From Fire!

October 9 - 15 is Fire Prevention Week. This year's theme is "Protect Your Family From Fire".



The Waynesville Fire Department provides Fire and

Life Safety Education throughout the year. Waynesville Firefighter Darrell Calhoun also serves as Fire & Life Safety Educator for Waynesville. In teaching fire safety, Mr. Calhoun uses three key phrases with children in the fire service education programs and suggests that you use these terms when you discuss fire safety with your children.

- When you hear a smoke alarm "Get Low and Go"
 do not investigate, don't look for other family members or toys.
- "Get Out and Stay Out". Never go back inside to look for your favorite toy or even your mom and dad.
- When/if your clothes catch fire "Stop, Drop, Cover (your face) and Roll".

It is also recommended that batteries in your smoke detectors be changed twice per year - in the Spring when time "springs forward" and in the Fall when time "falls back". And remember to test them at least once per month!

South Main Street Corridor Plan

The Town of Waynesville has received a planning grant from the French Broad River Metropolitan Planning Organization to conduct a corridor study for improvements to South Main Street from Hyatt Creek Road to Ninevah Road. This study will look at traffic projections for the corridor and recommend roadway widening and intersection improvements to accommodate future traffic demands. The study

will also plan for bicycle, pedestrian and public transportation on the corridor. Landscaping and streetscape improvements will be an important part of the study's recommendations.

A kickoff meeting was held to present the project to stakeholders this past July and an all-day public workshop was held on September 20. The consulting group, lead by the firm La Quatra Bonci of Asheville is now preparing a draft document for presentation to the Planning Board and Board of Aldermen. Leaf Season

Beginning Monday, October 17 (or as soon as leaf volume is sufficient to justify manpower and equipment) until mid January, the Town will collect leaves by vacuum machine. Leaves should be raked to the curbside but not in the ditches, gutter lines or in a manner




that would obstruct the street or sidewalk. Leaves must be free of sticks or other debris and will be left if improperly prepared. The leaf collection schedule will vary due to volume and weather and may not follow your regular garbage pick-up day. You can continue to bag leaves if you prefer - they will be picked up by another truck. Please keep all other material separate from leaves.

Brush pickup will be reduced during leaf pickup season.

Tree Trimming to Prevent Power Outages

Trees are one of the primary causes of power outages, whether they cause minor "bumps" or fluctuations when limbs brush against power lines or cause major extended outages when huge branches and trees pull lines down in bad weather. With selective cutting of limbs and trees, Electric Department Crews trim away the potential dangers the trees present.


During the fall and winter months, Electric Department Crews will be trimming trees and limbs adjacent to or overhanging power lines to prevent blinks and outages. Although our personnel try to trim in a neat and attractive manner, they are not professional arborists. If you feel that your tree should be professionally trimmed, this should be done before tree limbs encroach within the ten (10) foot buffer zone maintained by the Town.

Stay Safe!

- Before planting trees on your property, consider the location of utility lines.
- Consider the variety and mature height of any tree before planting.
- Never attempt to trim or remove any tree next to a power line.
- Never build tree houses in trees near power lines.
- Never climb trees near power lines.
